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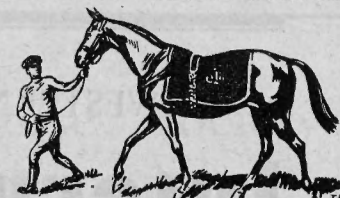

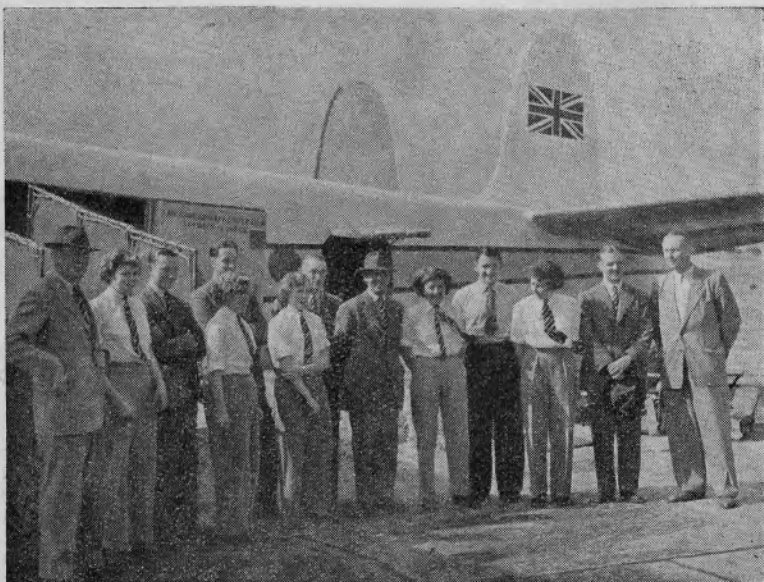

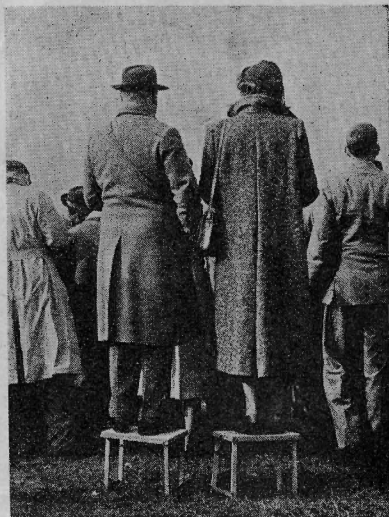

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BADMINTON HISTORICAL

THE DUKES OF BEAUFORT trace their descent from John of Gaunt, son of King Edward III. Their association with Badminton began in 1655, when the then Marquis of Worcester succeeded to the property and the Lordship of the Manor of Badminton from Elisabeth Somerset, daughter of Thomas Viscount Somerset of Cashell, Co. Tipperary.

Raglan Castle, in Monmouthshire, was the former home of the Earls of Worcester, the predecessors of the Dukes of Beaufort and the Marquises of Worcester. When this fell to the onslaughts of Oliver Cromwell's troops, after a long and gallant defence, the garrison and its Commander were allowed to march out fully armed, and the family moved to Badminton and there took up permanent residence. Cromwell later in 1656 sanctioned the first Duke of Beaufort to enclose lands to form a Deer Park—the present Badminton Park. This deed is still safely preserved among countless other interesting documents in the Muniment room at Badminton House. Many of the woods referred to bear the same names to-day as they did three centuries ago—'Swangrove' and 'Allengrove' being examples.

The greater portion of the house, Tudor and of a still earlier period, has been rebuilt. Much of it is attributed to Vanburgh. The baroque influence of Kent, who added the Archway and the two other octagonal features to three of the external angles of the Mansion, is clearly seen in the large front entrance hall. It was here that the earliest game of Badminton was played. In about the middle of the last century, so the story goes, a house party was compelled by inclement weather to amuse itself indoors; a line was stretched between the fastenings of the front door, and the overmantel of the fireplace opposite, and over this, sides, armed with the children's battledores, drove the shuttlecock backwards and forwards for points.

The interior of the house is full of priceless furniture, objets d'art and pictures. The Oak Room is lined with rich black oak panelling and has a heavily carved overmantel, all taken from Raglan Castle before fire and pillage by Cromwell's supporters left it bare. In the dining room are some beautiful and delicate examples of Grinling Gibbon's carving. Space does not permit a description of the numerous treasures—historical and otherwise. Pictures include examples of the works of John Wootton, Winterhalter, Sir Joshua Reynolds, J. Hoppner, Henry Morland, Jan Wyck, A. Canaletto, M. Hondecoeter, D. Teniers, Sir Godfrey Kneller, Sir Peter Lely, Sir Anthony Van Dyke and many others. 'Capability' Brown, celebrated landscape gardener, re-designed the grounds, doing away with the large old formal gardens near the house, and laying out certain avenues. Worcester Avenue, perhaps the main feature of the Park, still survives in all its glory. It is three miles in length from the house to Worcester Lodge at its Northern end. Worcester Lodge is entirely Kent's work and is thought to be a perfect example of that style. The magnificent main room has now been restored and spectators may visit it on application.

The Duke of Beaufort's Hounds have never changed hands since they were first established. When this was it is not easy to say, for the Somersets kept hounds at Raglan Castle from the earliest days of hunting. It is recorded that the first Marquis of Worcester who so gallantly defended Raglan Castle against the Roundheads, hunted the fox in 1642. A carefully kept Kennel Book records the hounds at Badminton in 1728, but there is ample evidence that they were kept there long before that date.

In those days one pack of hounds was kept for hunting deer, and another pack for hare hunting, but the latter was discontinued in the early 1740's. In about the year 1762, it is recorded that the Fifth Duke on his way home after a very unsatisfactory day's Stag-hunting, threw his hounds into Silk Wood (still well-known to many who hunt to-day). A fox was found which gave such a good run that the Duke determined to change his Staghounds into Foxhounds. This Duke amongst his many other activities, devoted his attention to scientific hound breeding, and from that day to this the Kennel has gone from strength to strength.

Badminton hounds have distinguished themselves not only in the field but on the Flags at Peterborough. In 1952, out of a large entry they won :

The Dog Hound Championship

Stallion Hound Class

Best Single unentered Dog Hound

Best Two Couple of entered Bitches.

From their ranks have gone out hounds to many of the most famous Packs, not only in this country, but to all parts of the world wherever hunting takes place. Once more to quote William Fawcett on this most famous Pack : "It has been Mastered from father to son since the days of the Merry Monarch." It is a wonderful tradition, and one which has never stood higher than it does at the present time.

The Park and its surroundings are full of interesting features, some of which spectators may see whilst walking round the cross-country fences.

The old ice-house on top of the rise in front of and to the right of the house was built about 200 years ago. During the winter blocks of ice were taken up from the lake and stored for use in the summer. Between this and Jump 13 is a low grass mound, this is a burial ground of the Bronze Age and must have been in use about 3,000 years ago. Not far from here is a curious small thatched building (near jump 34) and known as the Hermit's Cell. This was built about 1750 from local material. Large House-parties were the rule rather than the exception at Badminton, and often by way of amusement guests would visit the cell, where one of the staff, suitably dressed as a hermit, with long hair, beard, etc., would entertain them.

Nearby again (fence 34) is an old Oak, known as the Fitzherbert Oak. The story goes that about 1700 a Mr. Fitzherbert, who lived at Luckington, was shooting deer in the Park when he was chased by a stag and took refuge up the tree.

Red and fallow deer still roam the Park and a herd of the ancient Gloucester cattle, so distinctly marked and so attractive to look at, have flourished at Badminton 'from time out of mind.'

Lt.-Col. P. LEECH, M.B.E., Ex-Weedon Instructor, will undertake the training of horses and ponies for the Show Ring, hunting, jumping, polo and combined training. Difficult and badly trained horses improved and warranted.

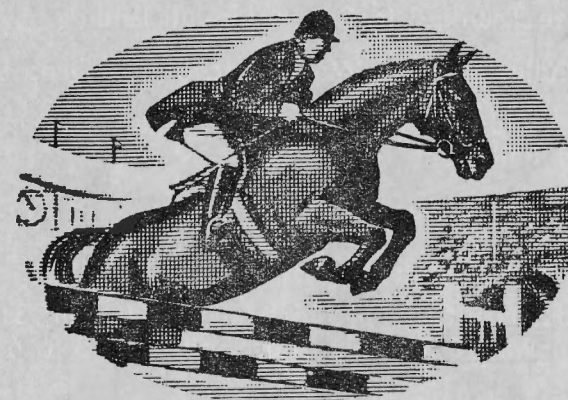

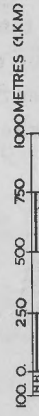

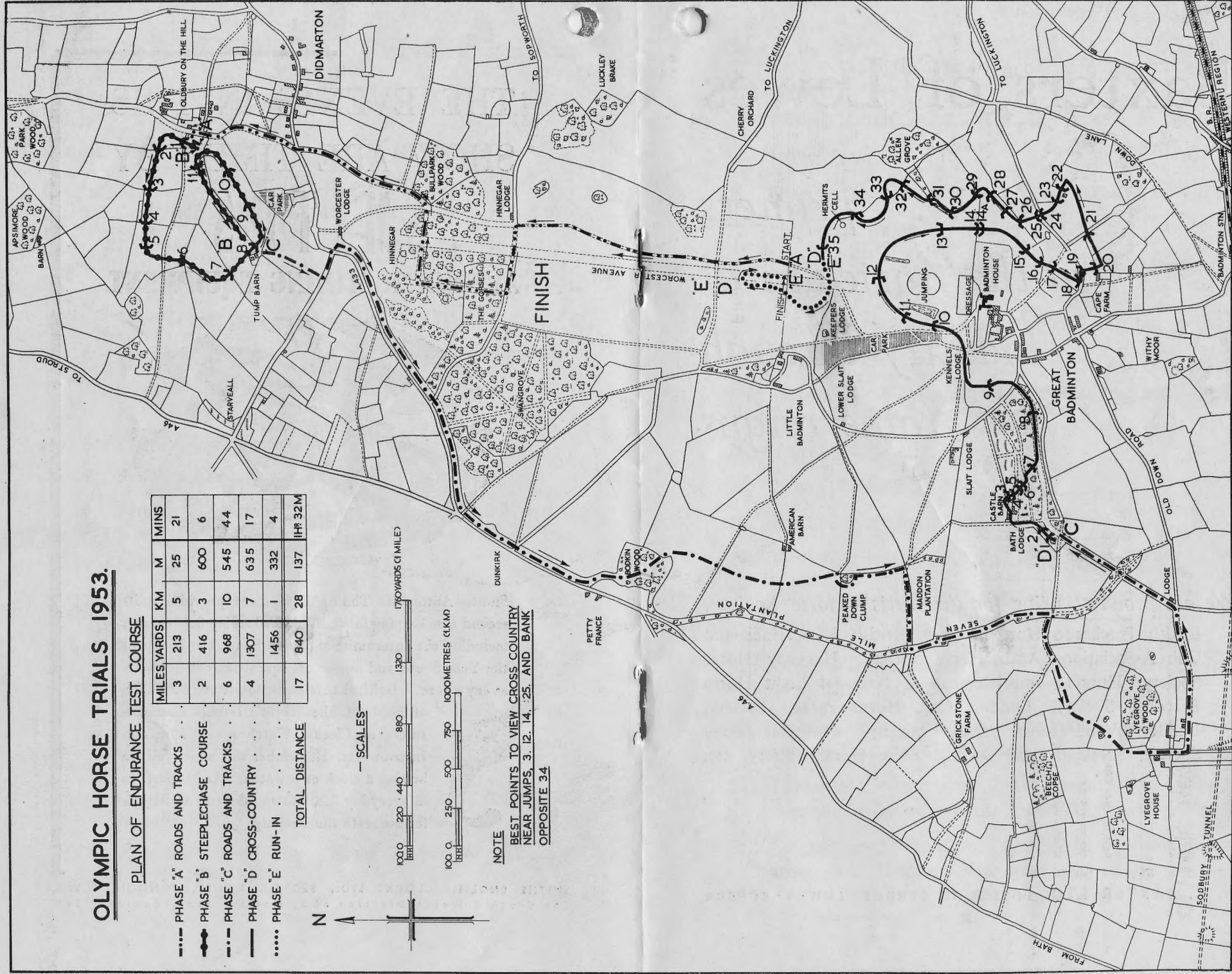

General Regulations

The Equestrian events of this competition are governed by the General Regulations of the Fédération Equestre Internationale, and by the Special Regulations contained in this book, which gives, at the same time, a programme and details of the competition.

Starting. The order of starting in each event will be drawn for by the Committee shortly after entries have been received.

Liability. The Organising Committee does not accept any liability for any accident or illness to horses, grooms, riders, spectators or any other person.

Complaints. The only persons entitled to lodge complaints or protests are owners or riders of horses. Protests must be made in writing and accompanied by a deposit to the value of £5. They must be addressed to the Secretary of the British Horse Society on the ground.

Protests should be made not later than one hour after the happening which gave rise to the protest, one hour after the marks have been published, or, in the case of protests against the qualification of competitors or horses, not later than one hour before the start of the event.

The Jury of Appeal gives its decision after investigation. The decision of the Jury of Appeal is final.

Minimum Weights

The 165 lb. includes the saddle and weight-cloth. Each rider must weigh himself in advance and provide himself with the necessary weights if such are required.

Any loss of weight during the competition involves elimination with the sole exception that on dismounting the weight of the bridle may be used to make up the 165 lb. if necessary.

The weighing of riders is compulsory before and after on the second and third days and will be carried out in the presence of an official especially appointed for the purpose.

It is absolutely forbidden for a rider to dismount until he has received an order to do so from the Steward in charge of the paddock. Any infringement of this rule entails disqualification. A special enclosure will be reserved for weighing.

DRESS

Uniform, hunting attire or dark jacket, hat or hunting cap.

The carrying of a whip during dressage tests is forbidden.

On the second day a hard hat or crash helmet (giving protection to the head) must be worn by all competitors.

SADDLERY

Dressage Test. English saddle, double bridle and curb chain with padding if needed. Martingales, bearing reins, bandages, gaiters and blinkers of any kind are forbidden.

Cross-Country and Jumping Test. With the exception of blinkers, which are forbidden, the choice of saddlery is optional.

OBSTACLES

The profiles of the obstacles in all the jumping tests of the Three Days' Event will not be made known in advance nor printed in the regulations. No rider shall have any knowledge of these before the beginning of the competition or before the course and obstacles for the steeplechase and the cross country have been shown to the competitors the day before the competition.

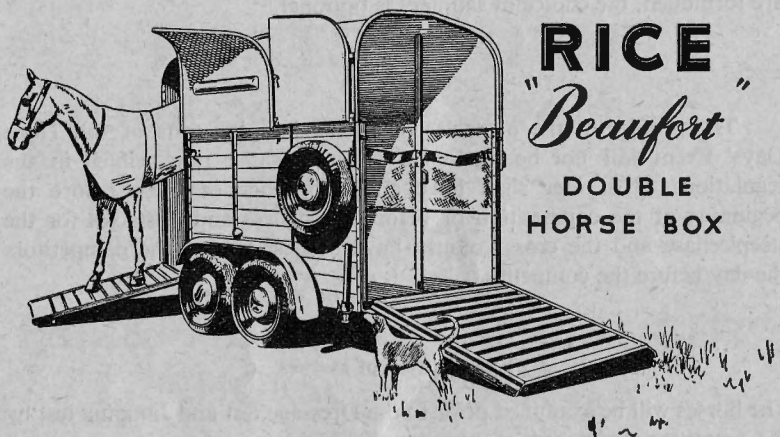
Examination of Horses

The horses will be examined prior to the Dressage test and Jumping test by a Committee composed of two members, one of whom is a qualified Veterinary Officer. The time for such examination will be conveyed to competitors at the briefing meeting on the evening of the 21st. The Committee has the right to exclude, on its own responsibility and without question, any horse or horses from taking part in the competition or in the last test for the following reasons :

- (a) horses which are obviously exhausted,
- (b) horses which have become seriously lame from any cause whatever,
- (c) any horse which has been subjected to any special treatment (sedative, stimulant). Anti-tetanus injections may only be given by the official veterinary surgeons. Horses treated for colic, duly certified by the official Veterinary Surgeon, may, in exceptional circumstances, be allowed to continue the tests with the other competitors and to participate in the classification if they have not been eliminated during the progress of a competition.

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FIRST DAY : BADMINTON DRESSAGE TEST, 1953

To be held in front of Badminton House

The object of this test is to prove the suppleness of the horse, its equipoise and obedience to the aids of the rider (responsiveness to leg, light in hand).

This test will be interpreted under the rules and regulations laid down in Chapter III, page 85 of the General Regulations of the Fédération Equestre Internationale 1950.

Time

The prescribed test must be executed entirely from memory. Each competitor will be allowed 8½ minutes in which to complete it. The time will be counted from the exact moment, after the salute to the Judges, when the horse moves forward until the horse is brought to a standstill at the end of the test and the rider salutes the Judges. In the event of a rider failing to complete the test within the prescribed time, he will nevertheless continue with it and the Judges will evaluate his performance until the end : but for every second over and above the time limit a penalty of half a point will be given. The total of these penalties will be deducted from the score sheet of each judge after the total number of points obtained has been divided by ten.

In the Dressage test, the evaluation is based on a scale from 0 to 6 good points which is then multiplied by the co-efficients assigned to each movement and finally divided by 10.

In order to conform to the proportion of marks in the three days as laid down by the Fédération Equestre Internationale, the maximum dressage marks will be 360. The aggregate number of points obtained from all the judges' score sheets will be divided by three and subtracted from the maximum of 360 points. In this manner a total number of penalty points is obtained, which is added to the penalties incurred in the other tests.

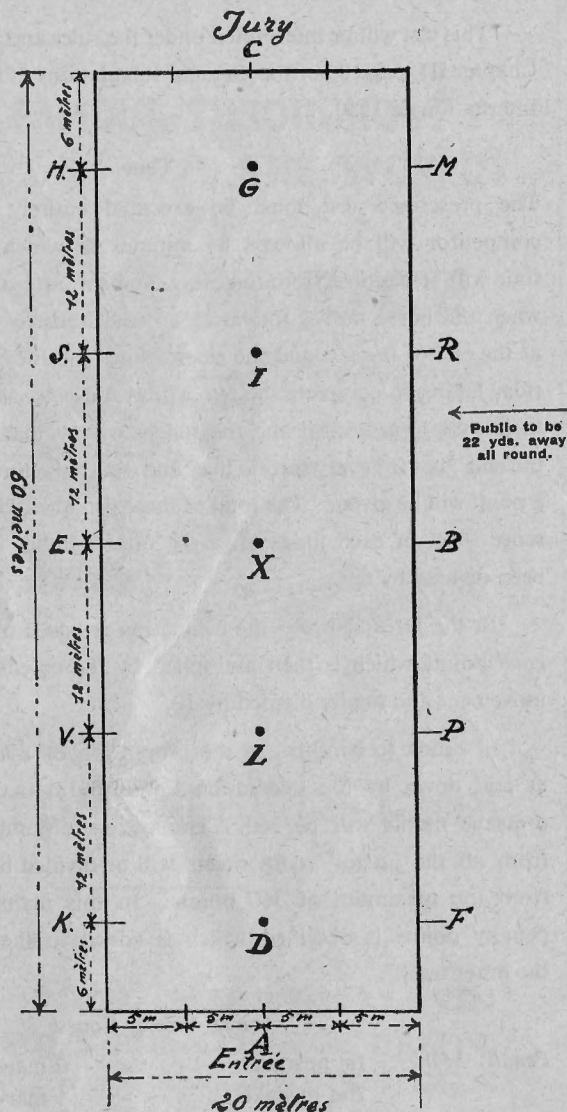
Arena

The Arena has a length of 66 yards (60 metres) and a breadth of 22 yards (20 metres) with a free space of 22 yards (20 metres) separating it from the public on all sides.

Guiding marks will be placed not less than 4 yards from the sides.

The centre line will be marked visibly on the ground throughout its entire length with a dotted line, 2 yds. away, on either side. The position of the points G, I, X, L and D will each be marked by a large spot.

Under no circumstances whatever will riders be allowed to use the arena prior to the competition.



The quarter line is equal to a fourth of the width of the Arena.
The points H, G, M, K, D, F, are placed at 3 1/2 yds. from either end.
The points B, I, R, V, J, P, are placed between H, E., G, X, and M, B. and
E, K., X, D. and B, F. respectively.

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THE BADMINTON DRESSAGE TEST

JUDGING DRESSAGE

No better description of the points to be observed on judging dressage can be had than the following remarks taken from a recent lecture given by Col. A. Podhajsky, Chief of the Spanish Riding School :

" I wish to sum up the principles which have to be strictly followed in judging a dressage horse and which signify the whole structure of training :

1. A straight horse, moving forward with impulsion.
2. Perfect rhythm and cadence of the different paces—only this rhythm can give real beauty to the dressage horse, producing the same effect as that experienced by listening to good music.
3. The horse must accept the bit quietly and confidently, giving himself willingly and obediently to the guidance of its rider. The horse must look for this guidance from the rider, not the other way round—when the rider uses the reins in order to press the horse into a certain head and neck position. Furthermore this wrong collection of the horse will always express itself in a lack of freedom of the paces.
4. Alertness achieved by progressive training, shows itself in the smoothness of the movements, the fluent transitions and last but not least in absolute balance of the horse in all its paces. This balance can only be achieved if the hindquarters are active enough and take an even part in carrying the weight of the rider. A horse going in such a manner, translated into mechanical terms, will give the impression that the motivating power lies in the hindquarters, this impulsion is guided only by the action of the reins and thus transferred into the right direction. This power must first be created and then controlled by the influence of the reins.
5. The smoothness of the horse which is mainly due to suppleness, the complete control of the limbs and perfect balance, will be reflected in the correctness of the various school movements as well as the sequence of the paces—This smoothness must always be present, not only in the most difficult exercises such as 'Piaffe,' 'Passage,' 'Pirouette' and 'flying changes of leg'—to mention only a few—but also in ordinary collected movements.
6. The obedience of the horse—I purposely mention this chief requirement of a dressage horse last of all, because the obedience is the result of strictly following the other requirements. This obedience must not be that of a circus dog, but the proud result of correct training which has caused the horse to give himself willingly and with pleasure to the indications of the rider."

Col. Podhajsky has pointed out the requirements of a dressage horse—the following are the main faults which can generally be observed :

1. The horse is not straight. His hind-legs do not follow the tracks made by the fore-legs. In transitions to a canter he will often bring his quarters to the inside.
2. The horse loses rhythm and cadence. He takes a shorter stride generally with one hind-leg ; in the extended work he quickens his stride instead of lengthening it.
3. The transitions from one pace to another are not fluent but are often jerky, chiefly due to the fact that the horse has too much weight on his forehead, or by throwing up his head he loses his balance.
4. The horse is not supple. The horse is stiff which is particularly noticeable when taking his corners or doing circles when he often looks outwards instead of bending his body round the rider's inside leg. This stiffness is very apparent during the extended trot when the horse will often shorten his stride when going round the short side of the arena instead of keeping the same cadence throughout.
5. The horse is not obedient. Transitions are not performed at the exact place indicated and the horse may show signs of evading the bit or resisting the rider's leg-aids.
6. The horse is not accepting the bit. He evades it by (a) holding his head too high with the nose poked out ; (b) head too low and over-bent with too much weight on the hands ; (c) getting behind the bit when he will not accept it and it becomes unsteady in his mouth.

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SECOND DAY : ENDURANCE, SPEED AND CROSS-COUNTRY TEST

The object of this test is an endeavour to prove the degree of endurance of a really good horse which has been well trained and brought to a state of excellent condition. At the same time it is a test of the rider's knowledge of pace and the use of his horse across country.

The test for 1953 is divided into five distinct consecutive phases which must be completed without a break.

Maximum height : 3 ft. 11 in. (1.20 metres).

Maximum width : 13 ft. (4 metres).

A timetable for starting phases A, B, and D, will be fixed and notified beforehand. The time for each phase is counted from the moment the starting-line is crossed until the moment when the rider—MOUNTED—passes the finishing post. The starting line of each new phase lies close to the finishing post of the previous one.

Penalties—Allowances. The phases are considered and judged according to the amount of time taken to complete them and the number of faults made at the jumps.

Over-time will be penalized.

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Jumping August 29th

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No credit will be given for time gained on phases A, C and E.
Time gained in the steeplechase and the cross-country ride will be rewarded.

Penalties and allowances are scored for each second.

Fractions of a second are not counted. The corresponding points are given in separate tables on page 54, and subsequent pages.

Manner of Awarding Points in the Different Phases

Phases A, B, C, D and E, are entirely independent of each other, so that a loss of time in one phase cannot be compensated by a gain of time in another.

Riders will start phase A at intervals of at least five minutes so as to prevent the riders from overtaking each other.

The advertised starting times for phases B and D are calculated exactly on the same plan.

Phases C and E follow immediately after phases B and D.

Therefore, the rest given by, for instance, a gain of two minutes in the Steeplechase can only be taken before the start of phase D. This gain does not give the rider any more time to do his 6-mile phase. The 6-mile phase must still be completed in the stipulated time.

Examples of the Different Phases

Phase A—3½ miles.

Rider starts at 2 o'clock.

Due to finish at 21 minutes past two.

(a) Premature arrival.

If a rider gains 2 minutes and 10 seconds on phase A so that he reaches the post at 18 minutes and 50 seconds past two, he will be compelled to remain there for 2 minutes and 10 seconds. The timekeeper will start him off at precisely the time fixed on the notice board, *i.e.*, at 21 minutes past two. He will receive no credit for the time gained.

(b) Arrival on time.

If the rider arrives exactly on time, *i.e.*, at 21 minutes past two, he will immediately start off on the next phase.

(c) Arrival after time.

If, on the other hand, the rider has lost two minutes and arrives at 23 minutes past two, he proceeds immediately, and without further delay, on the next phase. The exact time of his crossing the starting line will be noted by the time-keeper as 2 o'clock, 23 minutes. The rider is penalised for the loss of two minutes on phase A in accordance with the established scale. It is useless to try and make up the lost two minutes. They are definitely lost and penalized: but for phase A alone. Most probably the rider will be two minutes late in starting the following phases, but this will not have any influence upon the time taken for the other phases. It simply means that a strict account of the time must be kept on the corresponding tables.

(d) The subsequent phases.

The same method applies to the remaining phases. If a rider arrives at the end of phase C before the time appointed to start on D he must wait.

If he arrives on time or late he continues without delay.

If he pulls up his horse to rest, he does so at his own risk. The stopwatch moves on and it is up to the rider to make up *in this phase* the time lost in resting his horse. The exact time of his departure is carefully registered.

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Pace

Riders are allowed to choose their pace and to halt in order to rest their horses between the departures from and arrivals at the different phases. Horses may be led on phases A and C, but a Competitor must pass the finishing post of the Phase—MOUNTED. Phases B, D. and E must be covered, and all jumps taken, in the saddle. Time moves on. All loss of time in covering the phases, no matter from what cause, will be penalized according to the corresponding scale.

In all Phases Competitors must pass between the finishing posts.

Marking Flags

The start of all the five phases is clearly defined by pieces of bunting and by indicating pennants. Boundary flags (red and white) mark the turns and wings of the jumps. They are placed in such a manner that the rider must always have the red flag on his right and the white one on his left. Care must be taken to pass between these flags to avoid being disqualified. If, in making a regular jump, the rider knocks one of these flags down it is not counted as a fault. Direction flags (yellow) are placed so as to mark the road and to help the rider in keeping to the course. Keeping close to them is not necessary. Boundary and direction flags will be large and placed in a conspicuous position.

Obstacles

There will be from 10 to 12 obstacles on the 2-mile steeplechase course, two of which will be of a solid nature, and 35 obstacles in the cross-country ride. They must always be jumped between two flags. The obstacles will be rigid and as far as possible resemble natural objects (hedges, ditches, farmgates, brooks, streams, road-crossings, barriers, banks, etc.). In height they will not exceed 3 ft. 11 in. and will not be wider than 13 feet.

Map

Each Competitor will receive a map showing the plan of the course to be followed. The course will be marked for riders by flags clearly visible or by bits of paper.

On principle the course for the cross-country test will be shown to the competitors on foot on the day before the competition. Once shown, the competitors should be allowed, on request, to revisit the course on foot but on the understanding, at the risk of disqualification, that they outline the obstacles without attempting to jump over them themselves.

Assistance

It is forbidden to have recourse to outsiders for assistance. Prohibited assistance means any action by a third party, whether solicited or not, aiming at facilitating the task of the rider or helping the horse. After a fall, bringing back the runaway horse, helping the rider to readjust his saddlery or to remount is not considered prohibited assistance. The course must be resumed at the exact spot at which it was interrupted. Likewise it is forbidden to take the jumps in couples, or to be led by a companion. Further, it is forbidden to make a previous inspection of the course either personally or through the medium of a third person, on foot, or on horseback, in a carriage or a motorcar or on a bicycle. Whether a rider has received outside assistance or not will be decided by the judge.

On the second day, the watering of horses is allowed between the phases, but not when the horse is actually competing in any phase.

double or triple obstacle does not entail the retaking of the obstacle in its
entirety from the first jump. The rider will extricate himself as best he
can. All his attempts will be counted. At the fourth attempt he will be
disqualified. Provided they occur outside the obstacles, fall by horse or
rider, contrariness on the part of the horse, circling, changing to a walk or
a trot and errors in the course, if rectified, do not count as they are auto-
matically penalized by loss of time.

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THIRD DAY

To be held in front of Badminton House Jumping Competition

This third test is neither an ordinary horse-show, nor a test in style or endurance. Its object is solely to demonstrate that, on the day after a tremendous effort, the horse retains that suppleness and energy required to continue in service.

This competition will be interpreted under the regulations laid down for Jumping Competitions by the Fédération Equestre Internationale with the exception of the Scale of Faults which have been modified as follows: *Table of Faults*. Penalties will be given for faults at obstacles according to the following scale:

Course. The maximum length of the course will not exceed 1,000 yards. It will be irregular and winding—with halts, changes of direction and half turns.

Obstacles. The obstacles, 9 to 12 in number, will be placed at appropriate distances from each other, without slips, between wings: they will be massive, imposing in shape and appearance. They will be fixed but not absolutely immovable and will resemble, as far as possible, such obstacles as might be encountered in the country.

No fence to exceed 4 ft. in height; 11 ft. in width (water); 4 ft. 6 in. in spread.

Speed. The competitions will be carried out at the gallop—437 yards a minute. A speed exceeding this will not be counted. On the other hand all time taken in excess of the time allowed will be penalised by a quarter of a point for every commenced second. The maximum time allowed for completing the course will only be notified on the day of the event.

Classification in the Three Days Event

Disqualification in any one of the competitions entails disqualification for the whole of the event.

Riders will be classified by totalling all the penalties which they have incurred throughout the different events and subtracting from such total the number of points they have gained, if any, in the Steeplechase and Cross-country tests. The rider with the least number of penalty points will be adjudged the winner.

In the Dressage test, the evaluation is based on a scale from 0 to 6 *good* points which is then multiplied by the co-efficients assigned to each movement and finally divided by 10.

In order to conform, as far as possible, to the proportion of marks in the three days as laid down by the Fédération Equestre Internationale, the maximum dressage marks will be 360. The aggregate number of points obtained from all the judges' score sheets will be divided by three and subtracted from the maximum of 360 points. In this manner a total number of penalty points is obtained, which is added to the penalties incurred in the other tests.

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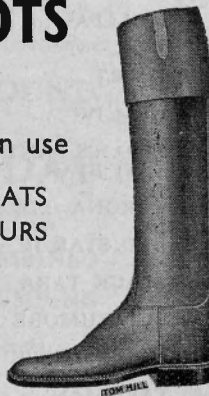

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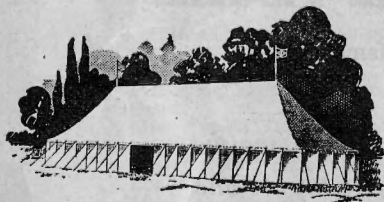

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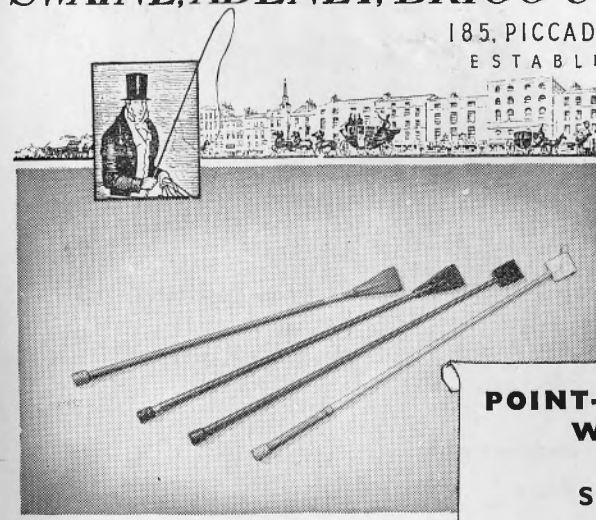


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
