**Dear Parent** 

As the Spring Term draws to an end I'd like to thank you for your continued support and make you aware of some new ways we are using to get your views.

The feedback on the Parents' Questionnaires you completed at the Parents' Evenings contained some suggestions that we need to be more active in seeking your views. In response we have just added to the school website a link for all parents to give us their views on any matter they choose. We will regularly access views and respond accordingly. Specifically, we will try to post or publish our response so that parents know their concerns have been acted upon. Secondly, we have begun to hold year-specific meetings following on from each parents' evening. After analysing the contents from parents for each year group we have compiled a list of issues that concern you most. We have then invited a random selection of parents to come to a meeting one night after school. The Year 8 follow up was on Tuesday 11th March and Year 7 was on Thursday 13th. The other years will follow in the Summer Term. If there are any parents of students in Years 8, 10 and 11 who would specifically like to attend these consultations, please contact the school and we will arrange it. Finally, as part of the school's Disability Equality Statement we would like to meet parents, again in the Summer Term, to find out how we can make ourselves more accessible to members of the community with disabilities. Again, if you have any views please contact me at the school directly or via my email at headteacher@clayton.staffs.sch.uk. views do count and you are telling us we need to try harder to seek them. In the Summer Newsletter I will give you some feedback on what you said the school's Strengths and Weaknesses were.

The school is also working hard on our Key OFSTED Targets. Firstly, considerably extra resources have been put into improving Key Stage 3 SATs results. For the first time all Year 9 students sat Mock SATs in all 3 core subjects and the papers were externally marked. We now have the papers back plus some detailed notes. This is a key improvement in the way we prepare our students for the exams. Our second target asked us to prepare and deliver the school for an outstanding OFSTED judgement and this is something the governors are keen to take an active lead on. This area of focus was added as fourth strand of the school's Strategic Plan in order for it to be given the status, importance and resources it requires. An action plan is therefore being prepared and I will make sure it is widely publicised when it is finished.

Finally, can I wish you all a Happy Easter and a restful break over the Bank holiday period.

### DRESS CODE

A school is a place of work. Students need to appreciate that there is a difference between dress for work and the free self-expression which goes with dress for leisure time.

- Coats and other items, which are not part of school uniform, should be removed when entering the foyer areas of all buildings. Such items of clothing should not be put on again while going between lessons but only when students are about to leave the school premises.
- 2. **Shirts** should: not be fitted; button up to the neck; always be worn properly buttoned and tucked in.
- 3. **Girls' Skirts** must be: black; plain A-line style with no pleats; knee length; The material must not be tight hugging;The skirts must not have splits at the front or sides.
- 4. **Girls'Trousers** must: be plain tailored with a defined waistband and zip; hang from the waist line; not drag or touch the ground; not be hipsters; not have a belt or buckle

- either sewn to the trouser or loose; not be of tight fitting material; not have logos on them.
- 5. **Ties** should be properly knotted.
- Sweatshirts should be worn by all students.

- 8. **Jewellery**, apart from 1 ear stud per ear and a watch, is not allowed. This is in the school uniform information and should not be worn both for health and safety reasons and on the grounds of security.

# Poetic Justice for the English Department.

A great day was had by Clayton Hall students at Keele University this term. Fifteen students from Year 10 were given the opportunity to spend the day at Keele University studying poetry and learning about how English is taught in higher education. The poetry workshops included an in–depth focus on detailed interpretations of poetry and gave students the opportunity

to engage with and dramatise poetry. Student comments on this part of the day included the following;

"... it has given me a broader knowledge of poetry and taught me how to understand more complex pieces better."

"This gave us a much better insight into the world of poetry and we learned to annotate and look deeper into the hidden meaning of poetry."

# Shakespeare Makes Waves in the English Department.

The English Department's launch of 'The Tempest' in Year 9 was, in the tradition of Shakespearean theatre, a dramatic event. A whole day was dedicated to workshops, a director's master class and of course a performance of the play, which is a key text for the English National Curriculum Tests later this year. The day was run by the experienced company 'Shakespeare in Schools' and aimed to bring the comedy and tragedy of 'The Tempest' alive for almost 200 students.

The cast, some themselves qualified teachers, encouraged and involved every student in the initial workshops, where students got to try out different roles from key scenes. The director's master class explored how performance can alter the audience's response to characters in the play, and the quality of the performance was



enjoyed by staff and student's alike, including a Year 11 G.C.S.E. drama class who were also invited to attend. Responses from students have been incredibly positive and all have their own favourite moments from the day. In

lessons, staff have been able to reinforce the visual nature of theatre and students have used their experiences to inform their own understanding of the play and the key examination scenes. The English department's thanks go to 'Shakespeare in Schools' for the quality of their actors and of the experiences they provided. Our thanks also go to the Drama department for their earlier work on 'The Tempest' with Year 9 which gave the students such a sound understanding of the plot and key characters.

'Shakespeare in Schools' will be returning next year, when we hope to be 'making waves' again! A vengeful Prospero berates the wretch Caliban, whilst a soft-hearted Miranda looks on.

# Year 7 PSHE Day: February 5<sup>th</sup> 2008

Our last PSHE day covered a topic of health and fitness, due to the rising number of obese children in the UK. The health side was the side that really showed through, as periods 5-6 were devoted to a healthy eating classroom talk.

Firstly the talk started with a brief overview of the main food groups – fruit and vegetables, carbohydrates, protein and dairy products. A correct balance is needed for a healthy diet, and the last food group – sugars – had to be a minority, as they are detrimental to overall health and fitness.

Then, we moved onto the fitness side of the day. We began with a minute of measuring our pulses to find out our heart rate, and found that few pupils who thought they were unfit were actually perfectly healthy with heart rates at around 70 bpm.

We were then asked to fill in a sheet of the exercise we take in a regular 7-day week. Some people found it hard as they realized that they did not take the full 20 mins a day heavy exercise, and rather concentrated exercise into one day of the week.

After lunch break, we split up into our chosen activity groups and were led to the sports hall for circuit training, the gym for aerobics, and due to the rain, outdoor activity into the sports hall as well. I was in the circuit training group, and after a short safety lecture split into pairs and introduced to the circuit.

Activities included rowing on the rowing machine, burpies, memory games, press-ups, agility runs and tricep dips. Activities lasted for two minutes per pair, or one minute each, and after we had completed the day we recorded our results and handed them in.

The best score in the year group received 10 points, second received 8 points, etc. but all completed tasks earned at least one point. The overall winners have their names currently up on the PE department wall, but everyone who participated was given a certificate as a memento and reward.

On Tuesday 5th February (Shrove Tuesday) 7D had a delicious breakfast at school lit would



Part of my role as a Connexions Personal Adviser working in schools is to follow up the previous year's school leavers to find out what they are doing in terms of education, work or training by the end of October after they have left school.

2007's destination survey gave the following information about last year's school leavers at Clayton:

77% continued in full-time education as opposed to 74% for all schools in the Newcastle district. 16% went into workbased training (including employed and nonemployed status apprenticeships) which is the same as the average for all schools in the Newcastle district. 6% were not yet settled as opposed to 7% for all schools in the Newcastle district 0.5% went into jobs with not training as opposed to almost 2% for all school in the Newcastle district.

As you can see, the vast majority (93%) of Clayton school leavers continued into some kind of learning post-16. This is good news, indicating that young people at Clayton are willing to gain further qualifications once they have left school, thus giving them a head start in the jobs market.
