Lomond Hotel Development

On 15th April, the developers of the Lomond Hotel site organised a public meeting to update the community on their current plans. Despite the short notice and the early hour, three Perth & Kinross Councillors and over 50 residents were able to attend.

The developers gave a brief resumé of the history of the site. They then explained their new plan, which they view as not being materially different from the existing approved plan. Changes include –

- Reducing the number of flats from 14 to 12.
- Slightly reducing the footprint of the proposed new building.
- Incorporating a stone finish on some of the exterior facings.
- Adding balconies to some of the flats.

There had been a meeting between them and the Planning Department and they were awaiting a decision on whether a new application would be necessary.

From the discussion that followed, it was clear that the principal concern of the community was that demolition should start as soon as possible. The present site was described as an eyesore and unsafe.

The developers gave a verbal commitment to apply for permission to demolish within the next week or so, and also intended to replace the old hoardings with new ones that would eventually display advertising graphics. However, they also intimated that their funding would not be released until they had obtained planning consent. Therefore, demolition could not start until the full project was in a position to proceed.

Your Community Council has been in regular contact with the developers, and with our P&KC Councillors, who have since held their own meeting with the Planning Department. At the time of

going to press, the developers are telling us that the replacement hoardings and the application for the warrant to demolish are to go ahead 'within a matter of days'. We are looking for confirmation of this and will keep you informed via the community website.

At the recent meeting of the Community Council it was decided that, since P&KC have already ordered the demolition of chimneys, we would request our elected representatives to approach Building Standards and ask if that order can be enforced.

A good time was had by all and the girls have asked if they can go for a week next year!

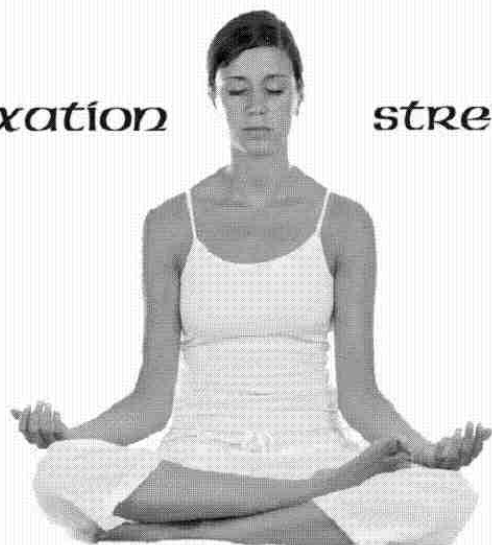

National Theatre in Glenfarg?

You have probably heard about the ‘live feed’ performances by national companies, such as the National Theatre and Covent Garden, where audiences across the country can join in the experience of those in the London theatre. You may even have travelled to a local cinema showing such a performance.

Well, as Chair of the Glenfarg Community Cinema, I wondered if we could arrange for such an event in our village hall. THINK BIG, and there’s no harm in asking.

So I asked, and the answer is probably “No”. Not unless there is no live feed taking place within a certain radius of us, and even then we would have to guarantee an audience of 140.

However, each live performance is recorded, and can be shown by four ‘encore’ venues in the weeks following the live performance. We still wouldn’t be able to show an opera, as Covent Garden’s requirements are too restrictive at present, but a National Theatre performance might be possible. As an example of what might be on offer, they have shown *Warhorse*, *King Lear*, *The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night Time*.

The NT sets the ticket price at £14 (£10 concessions) and takes 55% of the door. We would have to pay a licence fee and other overheads. However, I think that an audience of 40 would make this viable.

This would be separate from the cinema’s normal film nights, but we could make it a special occasion, with commemorative programmes, drinks in the interval etc. I understand that these performances in local cinemas are often sold out. If you have been to our community cinema you will know that we give added value.

As a first step, it would be useful to know if there is any interest in this idea. If you feel you would attend such an event, please email me at janet_watson@mac.com (tel 830355). If I find we have enough interest, I will take it further; and I will have your contact details to keep you up to date with my progress.

Kinross-shire Volunteer Group & Rural Outreach Scheme

What better way to spread the word about a voluntary service available to Glenfarg residents than to experience the delights of the May 'Soup & Chat' lunch in the village hall. It was a most impressive gathering which covered all age groups, and after having made the difficult decision to choose from a selection of seven very appetising soups, I was grateful for the opportunity to tell those present a little about the Kinross-shire Volunteer Group & Rural Outreach Scheme.

This Group provides a voluntary private car service to those residents of Kinross-shire and Glenfarg who have difficulty in gaining access to public transport for medical appointments in local health centres and hospitals in Perth, Dundee, Fife and Edinburgh. We specialise in providing a door-to-door service, home collection, accompaniment during the visit, and return home. In addition, we provide a befriending service with transportation to local shops and services, and visits to friends and relatives.

A number of Glenfarg residents already use our service, and we would be delighted to hear from anyone else, of any age, to whom we can be of assistance. We currently have one Glenfarg based volunteer driver, Christian Meldrum, and we are always interested to hear from any car owner who would like to join our team of drivers. It can be a very rewarding experience.

We are a Registered Scottish Charity and receive some Local Authority funding each year, but to cover all our costs and to enable us to offer a reasonable mileage allowance to our volunteer drivers, we rely heavily on donations from various charitable Trusts, Churches and local organisations. We have recently been nominated as Charity of the year by Dobbies Garden Centre in Kinross, and some of our volunteer drivers will shortly be involved in some of the gardening projects in the Centre, armed with collection cans of course!

My thanks to Community Council Secretary, Janet Watson, for the lunch invitation, and to the makers of all the delicious soups.

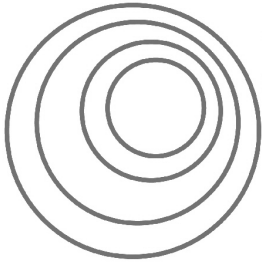

If they are successful and get information on the individuals, it is intended to hold an exhibition of their work in the ante room of the Village Hall. If that happens notices will be placed around the village and on the village website advising of dates and times.

News from the Health Centre

NHS24 Telephone Number

When the surgery is closed emergency medical cover is provided by NHS24 and the Primary Care Emergency Service. The telephone number for NHS24 has changed. It is now 111. Patients who require emergency medical help during the evening, overnight, at weekends or when we are closed for public holidays should call 111. The call will be dealt with by NHS24 call handlers. The call will be assessed by a nurse, and the patient will either be given advice on the phone, directed to a Primary Care Emergency Centre, advised to go straight to a hospital, or arrangements will be made for a doctor to call. Calls to NHS24 will be recorded. They should not be contacted about matters which can wait until the Health Centre re-opens.

Our own emergency telephone number remains 01577 865252. This number should still be used for daytime emergencies. The call will be answered by our Reception Team and the Duty Doctor will be advised.

From 1st July 2014 patients calling 01577 865252 out of hours will no longer be automatically transferred to NHS24. Instead, a recorded message will advise patients to hang up and re-dial 111. Calls to 111 are free from landlines and mobiles.

New Computer Hardware

Some of the computer hardware which we use is now several years old. A decision has been taken by the IT Department at NHS Tayside to replace the main file server. This is a major piece of work for them and will be done over two days on Wednesday 30th July and Thursday 31st July. On those days we will have no access to our computer system. We will not be able to make or cancel appointments, give out test results, view a patient's clinical history or check their prescriptions. There will therefore be no pre-booked appointments for the nurses, healthcare assistants or GPs on those two days. Patients will be seen

where there is a medical emergency and housecalls will be carried out if appropriate, but we would ask patients to try to wait until our computer system is working again on Friday 1st August. We would also ask patients to ensure that they do not run out of medication on these two days. If necessary, please submit your request for repeat medication a few days early to make sure that you have sufficient medication.

Docmail

The practices are changing their mail provider and much of our mail will now be sent via Docmail. Docmail is used by many organisations to print their mail. The mail is transmitted electronically to a secure site in Livingston where an automated system prints the mail, folds it and inserts it into envelopes. It is then taken to the Royal Mail sorting office for onward delivery. The site has passed the necessary security requirements for confidentiality and it is also used to print PIN numbers for bank cards and other sensitive financial information. Mail processed by Docmail will have the Docmail logo in the top right hand corner of the envelope in place of the stamp. Letters will also have a bar code on them in the address window. The bar code is used by Docmail and the Royal Mail for automatic sorting of the mail. Further information is available on their website: www.docmail.co.uk

GCC - Minutes of Annual General Meeting

MONDAY 12 MAY 2014
GLENFARG VILLAGE HALL

PRESENT CCLrs MacKenzie (Chairperson), Watson (Secretary), Arnold, Johnston and Macpherson. Also present Jan Macpherson (minutes). Three members of the public attended.

APOLOGIES CCLrs Vaughan (Treasurer), Armstrong and Ponton.

CHAIRPERSON'S WELCOME CCLr MacKenzie welcomed everyone to the 37th AGM of Glenfarg Community Council.

MINUTES OF THE LAST MEETING 13 May 2013 were agreed and signed as a true record of the meeting. Proposed by CCLr Johnston, seconded by CCLr Watson.

MATTERS ARISING There were no matters arising from the minutes.

CHAIRPERSON'S REPORT CCLr MacKenzie thanked all the Community Councillors for their support and presented his report, which was proposed for adoption by CCLr Macpherson and seconded by CCLr Johnston. The report will be posted on the notice board and made available on the community website

TREASURER'S REPORT Already circulated. In the absence of CCLr Vaughan, the Chairperson read the Treasurer's report, the accounts having been verified by an independent examiner. There were no questions, and the adoption of the report was proposed by CCLr Johnston and seconded by CCLr Arnold. It was brought to the meeting's attention that there are a number of funds in the bank account named Newsletter account. It was felt that one account was preferable to having several, but on the other hand it could be misleading to the public. It was decided, however, that it wasn't necessary to change the name of the account, as long as it was borne in mind that not all the money in that account related to the newsletter.

In response to a question it was explained that PKC only see the accounts in order to check that the admin grant is being spent appropriately. Originally that was the only part of the accounts that PKC saw.

ELECTION OF OFFICE BEARERS The present members of the Community Council were elected to serve until November 2015, but the positions of Chairperson, Secretary and Treasurer are elected each year. Donald MacKenzie was proposed, seconded and appointed Chairperson with no other nominations, Janet Watson similarly as Secretary and Gillian Vaughan as Treasurer.

At this point the Chairperson intimated that CCLr Armstrong had tendered her resignation with immediate effect, and her statement saying 'I have enjoyed my time as a CCLr and I have so much admiration for the voluntary industry, commitment and actions of my now former CCLrs' was read out. This leaves seven Community Councillors, with up to twelve allowed. There is a minimum number of Councillors below which the Council would be dissolved, but Glenfarg CC is still well within the limit. The Chairperson reminded the meeting that it was within the power of the Community Council to co-opt members who could serve on an annual basis up until the time when elections are next due. It was suggested advertising in the village shop, the newsletter and on the website to invite people to offer themselves for co-option. Jan Macpherson was asked to consider being minutes secretary on a permanent basis.

SUB COMMITTEES

Planning Currently CClr Johnston (convenor), CClrs MacKenzie and Arnold. All willing to continue.

Newsletter Currently CClrs Macpherson, Watson, Vaughan and Armstrong. Rather than replace CClr Armstrong it was agreed to continue with the remaining three, and try to involve members of the public, including the new editor.

Binn Farm There are two groups: the Wind Farm and the Community Forum, with representatives on both being CClrs Ponton and Macpherson. The latter is happy to continue; the former will be asked.

CBF Panel The member at the moment is CClr Ponton, and it is hoped that she will continue.

APPOINTMENT OF INDEPENDENT FINANCIAL EXAMINER It was proposed and agreed that Jean Andrew be asked to continue.

DATES OF NEXT MEETINGS

2015 - 12 January, 2 March, 11 May (which will also be the AGM).

GCC - Minutes of Meeting

Monday 12 May 2014
GLENFARG VILLAGE HALL

PRESENT CClrs MacKenzie (Chairperson), Watson (Secretary), Arnold, Johnston and Macpherson. Also present Jan Macpherson (minutes). Three members of the public attended.

APOLOGIES CClrs Vaughan (Treasurer) and Ponton.

MINUTES OF THE LAST MEETING 3 March 2014 were agreed and signed as a true record of the meeting. Proposed by CClr Macpherson, seconded by CClr Johnston.

MATTERS ARISING

Ladeside Drains may be a capacity issue and P&KC will investigate further.

Junction of Main Street and Ladeside Potholes have been repaired.

Kinross Volunteer Group and Rural Outreach attended, and gave a talk at, the Soup and Chat meeting at the end of April. It was suggested that a donation be made from the Nursing Association fund, as several people from Glenfarg use the service, but there is only one volunteer from the village.

Folk Feast Camping in Wallace Park went ahead without incident. Camper vans remained on the hard standing as requested, and cars were parked responsibly. Rubbish was collected and no damage was caused.

PKC admin grant There has been communication with PKC regarding the conflicting instructions as to how money used from the grant should be recorded. There is also a gap of three months between the year end in March, and June when the grant is paid out. PKC agreed to help financially if required.

Newsletter A new editor has been found.

Bus Shelter on Main Street. It was thought that this was hard to justify. It was noted that a condition of building houses at the southern end of the village is that a bus stop be provided on each side of the road where the access road from the new estate meets the main road.

Litter in Glen The Secretary had written to John Ferguson regarding the overflowing bins at the end of the Binn Farm Road and litter blowing off lorries, with a follow up as he said he hadn't received the letter, but so far there has been no response. It was suggested that John Macgregor be contacted direct.

Lomond Hotel A project update was promised, but so far has not been received. Cllr Giacopazzi reported that Councillors have met with the planning department, but because of extensive changes to the original plans being made, the planning application would have to be re-submitted. New hoardings have been promised, but are still not in place. It is not known if the application for a demolition warrant for the chimneys has been submitted. PKC have already ordered the demolition of chimneys, so Building Standards will be approached via Cllrs Giacopazzi and Robertson to ask if the order can be enforced. It was suggested that a notice be put in the newsletter and on the website saying that promised work has not been carried out, and that the matter is being pursued. The chairman expressed the view that whilst the Community Council had sought to work constructively with the developers, it now seemed as if the Cllrs and the community were being treated as fools and irrelevancies. Nothing that has been promised has been implemented to date.

Auchterarder and District Community Council had suggested that local CCs hold an information meeting on local landscapes. This has now been superseded by P&KC's organisation of consultation on Local Landscape Designation, and Cllr Macpherson attended a meeting where each person present was given a map and asked to mark areas considered suitable for this scheme. A notice will be put in the newsletter and on the website.

TRACKS No further developments at the moment. It was noted that there is a difference between Rights of Way and Core Paths, although some paths fall into both categories. Gates on Core Paths may not be locked by the landowner. The matter of clarifying precisely the respective roles of the CC and of the newly created Paths Group that emerged from the Glenfarg Conversation will be put on the agenda for the next meeting.

Glenfarg Renewable Energy Association is now a constituted body, and has asked to attend the next CC meeting to update the CC on its work to date.

TREASURER'S REPORT Already circulated. It was agreed that £100 should be given to the school as usual. Following discussion at the last meeting re the relocation of the village notice board, it was reported that Mark Crossey (village shop) has applied to Historic Scotland for a grant to refurbish the whole of the outside of the building, and doesn't want the notice board to be put on the wall of the shop until the outcome of that application is known.

POLICE REPORT A written report had been received to the effect that there had been one incidence of housebreaking in the Glenfarg area and enquiries were continuing. It was not clear if this was in the Glenfarg Neighbourhood Watch area, and PC Dougie Stapleton would be asked to liaise with that group. A warning was also issued that householders should, as always, be wary of bogus workmen.

PLANNING Report already circulated. There was some discussion about the cattle court at Duncruevie, and it was explained that an agricultural permit is seen as notification from a farmer to PKC and only in very exceptional circumstances is it refused, and Community Councils are not notified. What was subsequently erected, however, required planning permission, and so this was applied for retrospectively. This application has since been refused.

It has been confirmed that there are no plans to commence building in the field next to Wallace Park this year.

Concern was expressed regarding the emptying of the septic tank at the new tennis pavilion in case this involved heavy vehicles driving over the park, but it was thought that the tank would have a 3 year capacity, so this was unlikely to be a major problem.

CYCLISTS A letter had been received from a villager expressing concern over the number of cyclists, both individuals and members of clubs taking part in organised events, and the resulting road safety implications. Some cyclists are found to be rude and aggressive, although these do appear to be in the minority. The police can warn any cyclists who are abusive. It is felt that cyclists are becoming a major problem in Duncruevie, so it was agreed to approach the Scottish Cycling Union for advice. The Chairperson will write to the Scottish Cycling Union, and the Secretary will respond to the original letter.

CORRESPONDENCE Already circulated.

War memorial Water is coming off the Avenue and under the wall with the risk of seriously undermining it. It has been established that there is a natural spring behind the war memorial and PKC's intention is to divert the water from the source away from the memorial garden. Drainage pipes could be purchased at a cost of £80 and placed in the gully to protect the wall, and it was agreed that PKC would be asked for an estimated date for the work to be carried out, before deciding whether to take this temporary measure.

Micro grant request 'Brighten up Duncruevie' (BUD) has applied for a CBF micro grant of £97 for planters and compost. There has been some misunderstanding and poor communication between BUD and GDIB (Glenfarg and Duncruevie in Bloom) which has led to a sense, some years ago, that GDIB was not interested in improvement in Duncruevie. It was agreed, however, that the request was justified, so it was decided to make the award and to try to foster a better relationship between the groups.

AOCB There was no other business.

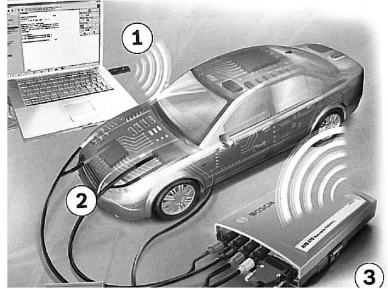
