
Nercwys News



In September, we spent a long weekend in Germany, staying in a very picturesque area, well off the usual tourist trail, east of Luxembourg and (for the racing aficionados) south of the Nürburgring. On the Sunday, we went to the Himmerod Abbey, a place of pilgrimage and a working monastery. Unfortunately the numbers of monks are declining but the service was very impressive and considering that the Abbey is in the middle of no-where, the choir sang beautifully. The sermon, being in German (and although I worked in Germany for a few years, my German consists mainly of 'noch ein bier, bitte!'), meant that my mind wandered. I noticed that the building, although very impressive, was starting to look a little frayed around the edges and I wondered how the Abbey was financed.

Later, there was a collection. We were in the fifth row, with at least ten people in front of us. When the plate reached us, I was surprised to see just a few coppers, probably not more than about two euros worth. No wonder the place looked a little tatty.

But what do we want from churches? Do we want them just for the major celebrations in our life? If so, how do we propose that the buildings are kept in good order in between? Churches, like any other building, need adequate funding and maintenance and it is up to us to provide it, otherwise births, marriages and deaths will no longer be celebrated as we have become accustomed to over many centuries.

This leads very neatly onto an excellent article on Family History, written by Cllr. Norma Evans. I hope that it provides food for thought as well as providing an impetus for further research.

Finally, I would like to thank very much all the distributors and writers of articles who have kept the Nercwys News going through the past year.

NADRA NEWS

Having hoped that the saga of the Bryngwyn Quarry would be over by the time that this issue was produced, it is disappointing to report that the matter is by no means at an end. For the second time, the owners of the site of Bryngwyn Quarry waited until the last possible moment to register their objection to the Prohibition Order (when the Welsh Assembly was due to vote on the Order) and the Assembly have now started the procedure to hold a Public Enquiry (at whose expense?) which is to be held at Gwernymynydd Village Centre, starting on the 26th of February 2008. The Enquiry has a limited remit, only considering (and I quote), 'The objections against the confirmation of the Flintshire County Council (Bryngwyn Quarry, Gwernymyndd) (Prohibition of resumption of Mineral Working) Order 2007.

The effect of the order, if confirmed, will be to prohibit any development consisting of the winning and working of minerals and/or involving the depositing of mineral waste at (sic) land at Bryngwyn Quarry'.

The last section is also of concern because even if no minerals are extracted, there could be proposals to deposit mineral waste which has not been advertised or considered. This would still involve heavy vehicles going along single track roads.

We hope to provide further information as soon as possible.

BRYN GWYN QUARRY

Although this seems quite a distance away from Nercwys, the village would be affected by DP Williams' proposed re-opening of this Quarry behind the Owain Glyndwr Public House. The access to the quarry would be along Ffordd Bryn Gwyn, down the hill on Glyndwr Road to the phone box and right up to the cross roads with the Eryrys Road, then left down Nercwys Road to the junction with Wrexham Road and thus on to the bypass. The owners propose to extract 10.8 million tonnes of stone which would result in 272 lorry movements per working day. Cllr. Nancy Matthews

FAMILY HISTORY

Who's interested in family history? It is an 'age' thing! It's only when most of your relatives have gone and you have no-one to ask questions of, that you realise how ignorant you are of your ancestors.

Since the Nercwys book (*only a few copies left, Ed*) was published, I have been amazed at the number of contacts I have made from those who are looking for information about their family.

The lady from Milton Keynes, whose ancestors lived in Tir-y-Coed, was thrilled to visit, realising that lots of children had played in the farm yard and had run up and down the long drive / cart track from the road to the house on school days.

Another lady visited, just after the Nercwys sign by the White Lion, had been erected – her name incidentally, is Nerquis Lloyd (I wonder how she coped in school!).

The last Village Fete brought a lady looking for her Grandparent's grave in our churchyard. She has just moved to live in Mold.

There is a Society called the Clwyd Family History which is very helpful in this field. They publish a magazine three or four times a year and people from many parts of the world contribute articles, relating their journey to find their ancestors. The Society helped me to 'find' a relative in Los Angeles. Her Great-grandfather, Dafydd Jones, was a brother of my Great- grandmother. Judy came to stay with me in 2004 and we went to Llanwchllyn, near Bala, where many of our relatives have lived. Churchyards / Burial grounds become very familiar places and one learns a lot from gravestones, so the disposal of 'old' stones creates a problem for those keen on Family History.

JUNK MAIL

Do you share my irritation at the amount of junk mail that lands on the doormat? Not to mention the 78,000 tons that ends up in landfill every year (letsrecycle.com).

If you want to avoid the bulk of unsolicited mail, then there are three organisations to contact:

- 1) The Mail Preference Service (MPS) at: mpsonline.org.uk will take about four months to remove your name from direct mail lists. Or phone: 0845 703 4599.
- 2) Mail sent to 'The Occupier' can be stopped by contacting: <u>optout@royalmail.com</u>
- 3) Unwanted telephone calls (no, I don't want my house double glazed / to change my electricity supplier...) can be stopped by speaking to the Telephone Preference Service on 0845 070 0707. This service apparently cannot stop calls that originate from outside the U.K.

However, none of these will stop the mail that you receive from people that you have dealt with and who have 'captured' your name and address on their mailing lists – or have sold their lists to another organisation but it does clear a lot of the clutter. In future, look carefully for the 'small print' that must be on the paperwork to enable you to opt out from unwanted mailings. Mavis Bartlett

COED NERCWYS

At the time of writing, we're not quite into December – yet we have had our first covering of snow, heralding the arrival of winter. Many of us assume that the wildlife in our countryside sets off into a deep sleep to survive the onslaught of the cold months that lie ahead. But if you look around, there is still plenty of activity.

Coed Nercwys is home to large numbers of winter migrant birds who have escaped colder climes. On the ground layer, Woodcocks, who reside here all year round have their numbers buoyed from an influx of winter visitors - and around the edges of some of the wetter areas, snipes sit tight, who use their long beaks to probe into the soft soils in search of food. In the tree canopy, flocks of siskins, bramblings and crossbills can be seen feeding in amongst the conifers.

But it isn't just wildlife that can be seen in the forest at this time of year! This is the fourth consecutive year that pupils from the Mold Alun School have been coming to the forest as part of a Green Gym. Each week, the students have been working tirelessly, focussing on key conservation projects that have been of benefit to the habitats at the forest.

It is anticipated that students from Llysfasi will also be involved with works here this year too.

If you would like to get involved there are always volunteer days taking place too. Up and coming are:-

10th &11th December – we will be clearing Lodgepole Pine trees that are regenerating freely, this will prevent the heather and bilberry that grows here too from being shaded out. If any one finds a suitable specimen, they are welcome to keep it as a Christmas Tree!

7th & 8th January – we will be clearing trees from the southern end of the forest where our visiting nightjars like to nest. This should also be of use to work off all of the turkey from Christmas!

For anyone interested, we meet at the main northern car park at 10.00am. More details and a Programme of Events area available from Loggerheads Country Park, or contact me directly.

A SEASONAL MESSAGE FROM THE FLINTSHIRE NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH ASSOCIATION!

With the Christmas holiday season almost upon us, now is a good time to take steps to make sure your Christmas isn't spoiled by criminals.

CRACKING CRIME @ CHRISTMAS TIME IS THE MESSAGE FROM FLINTSHIRE NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH....

Whilst shopping, Remember !

The busy town centres at this time of year are ideal for criminals to steal from people who are distracted and sometimes flustered. We might also be more trusting and generous at Christmas when requests for charity are made, giving the unscrupulous a chance to collect for themselves.

When the shops are crowded, a pickpocket has more chance to steal from a person. Try to shop at less busy times, make sure you stay alert and be extra careful with your wallet or purse. Always zip up your handbag and never leave it unattended on a counter or on the floor.

If you have too many bags you will be too busy trying to hold on to these to be aware of anyone stealing from you.

- It may be worth arranging smaller shopping trips so you don't have to carry too many bags at once.
- Keep your purse or wallet close to your body and don't carry too much cash.
- If you travel by car, make sure you park in a well lit area. Be careful to lock all doors and windows and do not leave presents in view.
- Try not to return to your car to leave purchases in the boot before continuing with your shopping trip as thieves may well watch car parks for just such a chance.
- Arrange to collect heavy items from stores when you have finished all your shopping. Keep your chequebook and cheque card separately.

YOUR HOME

Having bought all your presents, make sure to keep them out of sight until last thing on Christmas Eve and if you 'hide' or store larger items such as bicycles in the shed or outbuildings, make sure they are secure and CODED to protect them ! (Permanent Ultra Violet Marker pens are available from Flintshire Neighbourhood Watch Association)

With the extra presents you have bought and have stored in your house, you may well find you need to check your insurance to make sure you are covered for the value of goods.

Make a note of the frame numbers of new cycles and the serial numbers of new electrical equipment for future reference.

Also, empty boxes left outside, advertise that you have new goods inside - dispose of your packaging carefully.

The time for Christmas and New Years parties will be here soon.

- If you go out for the evening make it look like someone is at home by turning on lights and the radio.
- Close your curtains as potential thieves could see into your home.
- Always be careful about locking doors and windows.
- As a fire precaution, don't leave Christmas lights on in the house whilst you are out and don't overload extension cables. Be careful using scented candles - do not leave them unattended. If you do not have a smoke alarm please get one fitted - you can either contact North Wales Fire & Rescue service or contact us at the Neighbourhood Watch office who will make a referral to them on your behalf.

REMEMBER - forming a Neighbourhood Watch in your area especially on the run up to the festive season - COULD SAVE YOUR CHRISTMAS.

If you go away for the holiday period - use an automatic timer for lights and ask a trusted neighbour to watch your home.

Don't forget to cancel newspapers and milk if you have them delivered and either redirect your mail through the Post Office or have your neighbour take mail into the house - unopened Christmas cards and mail are a sure sign that a house is empty.

FLINTSHIRE RECYCLING

Following on from the article in issue 13 about which materials can be put into the blue boxes, I wanted to find out what happens to the various materials once they have been collected from the various public recycling sites. This is not an exhaustive list but I hope that it gives an indication of what awaits the collected items. (All information supplied by the Recycling Office of Flintshire County Council).

<u>PAPER</u> – sent to Shotton Paper Mills – converted into newsprint.

<u>CARDBOARD</u> - sent to Oswestry - converted into egg boxes, etc.

<u>CANS</u> - sent to a FCC depot in Flint, where magnets and eddy currents are used to separate the steel and aluminium cans.

Steel - sent to Corus - used for new steel products

Aluminium - sent to Warrington (Novelis) - made into new cans.

<u>PLASTIC</u> - Bottles – sent to St. Helens – made into drain pipes, etc. All other plastic – possibly as a result of adverse publicity towards other authorities and waste disposal companies exporting their waste, all other plastic collections have now ceased and this plastic is now taken to land fill sites.

WOOD - sent to Chirk (Kronospan) - used in paper production.

<u>SOIL & RUBBLE</u> – used for capping land fill sites.

- <u>SCRAP METAL</u> sent to Sandicroft (Chadwicks) sorted into various metals for further use.
- <u>TYRES</u> sent to Rochdale converted into playground surface material and garden mulch.
- GLASS recycled into new bottles
- <u>GREEN MATERIAL</u> sent to FCC's Greenfield site converted into organic fertiliser / soil improver (for sale at most recycling centres at £2 per bag!)
- <u>GENERAL WASTE</u> sent to Material Reclamation Facility at Buckley sorted and all recyclable goods sent on and the residue sent to the local land fill site.
- <u>OIL</u> sent to an oil salvage company and re-refined to produce new oil based products.
- <u>PAINT</u> (FCC rep. not sure what happens to the paint but it is treated (?) and not dumped).
- <u>ELECTRICAL GOODS</u> sent to Manchester (Symonds) all components recycled.

I hope that some of our readers may be able to expand on what is fairly basic information. Although recycling is very much in fashion, there are some unanswered questions about the efficiency and cost effectiveness of this expanding industry. My own view is that it has to be a good thing if we can become more aware of what we are consuming in terms of raw materials and subsequently, the less we have to dig out of the ground, the fewer holes we leave and the less energy wasted in transporting the materials, often over vast distances. Although we as a nation are slowly appreciating these choices, there is a lot of work to be done to convince other countries. My Son and Daughter-in-law travelled throughout China in the summer and they were appalled by the pollution, both airborne and on the ground.

Can I have some other viewpoints or more detailed information on this vast subject, please? Peter Addiscott


