Seascale Mobex

Seascale Mobex has been running now for six months and it has proved to be very popular with the youth of Seascale and the surrounding areas. We have an integration of four different groups aged between 11 to 18 years.

Activities include Community Arts projects, conservation through the John Muir Award and Community Volunteers (ASDAN), level 1 and 2.

So far 33 have been accredited with Responders First Aid, 40 have passed the course of Drugs and Alcohol Awareness and 24 are going for their Duke of Edinburgh award. There is also available the LANTRA Award which teaches bushcutter, strimmer, pathclearing etc which could possibly lead to maintaining community areas or even future employment.

In addition to this, eight meet on a Thursday for the LinC courses that aim to give the skills and confidence to work with groups, or to make things happen in the community. Established by Mobex in 1995, these training courses lead to a Level One and Two Open College Network qualification.

NEIGHBOURHOOD FORUMS

What are Neighbourhood Forums?

Good question - we're glad you asked us that!

Forums are public meetings at which anyone can attend and raise an issue that they feel is of local importance, with three tiers of local government, the County Council, the Borough Council and the Parish Council.

When possible, and it usually is, the relevant council can respond to these local issues and concerns. Forums facilitate community consultation and participation and, in a real sense, connect councils with both local communities and the individuals living in them.

In Copeland there are ten Neighbourhood Forums and your local forum is Bootle & Seascale. This forum meets a minimum of four times per year and meetings have been held throughout the area. We advertise meetings via notice boards, the libraries, door-to-door leafleting, local radio, local papers and, if you are on our mailing list, through the post.

Information gathered and shared at forum meetings is feedback to the Local Strategic Partnership through the Community Empowerment Network. In many cases this information is used to inform the development of the Community Strategy for West Cumbria.

At many forum meetings a senior budget holder within the Public Sector will give a short presentation on their work prior to answering questions from attendees. This is an opportunity for the public to put local government officers on the spot and get answers.

Forums also support community groups through the distribution of forum grants. This process can also help groups in the exchange of funding information and examples of good practice.

Neighbourhood Development officers working for Cumbria County Council organise and deliver the programme of forum meetings. They also provide information and advice on a wide range of issues, liaise with statutory bodies, help to identify funding opportunities for community groups, provide support for community groups, highlight community needs and issues and work closely with regeneration bodies.

SCAMWATCH

We have had a report from the family of a victim, who is hale and hearty and in her 90s. who has lost approximately £300,000 over a number of years despite the family begging her not to carry on trying to win some money. Another report is from two sons who became aware of their 90-year-old father writing lots of cheques for lottery draws. Initially they paid little attention to it but then their father started to focus on these competitions. becoming addicted to responding with the hope of winning some money. After further investigation they discovered that he had written cheques to the value of almost £800 in iust three months. Of course no money was ever received by these two victims.

The Office of Fair Trading (OFT), Help the Aged and Neighbourhood Watch are increasingly concerned about international fraudsters targeting older people in the UK via 'Canadian Lottery' telephone and mail scams. People respond to an unsolicited mailing or phone call telling them that they have entered into a prize draw. Their names are added to a 'sucker list' which is made available to numerous direct marketing and telemarketing operators.

Victims then receive an unsolicited phone call from Canada congratulating them on winning the big prize in a National Lottery such as the Canadian, Australian or Spanish. The victim is told that before they can claim the prize, they must send money to pay for taxes and processing fees.

Thousands of older people in the UK have been targeted and the OFT is aware of some cases that go potentially into six figures. The prize does not exist, and they never receive any winnings in return for their cash.

Anyone who has been a victim of this crime or is worried that an elderly relative or friend has been targeted can call a telephone reporting line which has been set up by the OFT to collect evidence which the Canadian authorities can use to prosecute the fraudsters.

WHAT TO DO IF YOU RECEIVE A PHONE CALL?

Be cautious. If you have any doubts about a caller – hang up.

Never send any money in order to receive a prize.

Do not give out private financial information or any other personal information.

Canada does not have a national lottery like the UK.

HOW TO SPOT A SCAM

There are a number of key behaviours that people can look for to spot a scam:

If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is. You are often asked for money up front to release your 'win'.

You are asked for your bank account, credit card details or other confidential information. The caller is more excited than you are! The stranger who calls wants to be your best friend.

You must reply straight away or the money will be given to someone else.

Unfortunately, scams are on the increase and Seascale has had a fair share over the last few years. Throughout Cumbria unscrupulous criminals passing themselves off as roofers, gardeners, and property improvement businesses have ripped off householders for large amounts of money. Often using false names and addresses they leave distressed, bewildered and frightened people with little or no chance of redress.

Neighbourhood Watch has been aware of this and last year formed Scamwatch. Trading Standards pass on information immediately of any scams operating in Cumbria and people are alerted via e-mail. Anybody wishing for this information please e-mail me at: victoria@borrino.co.uk

On a last note can I point out that the notices stating 'Doorstep Callers Not Welcome' available at Seascale Pharmacy, are not aimed at local charities or reputable traders. They have been supplied by Cumbria Trading Standards to try to stop the vulnerable being bullied and conned by rogues Cold Calling.

SEASCALE CRICKET CLUB

The Cricket Club has had one of its most successful years ever by winning the Cumbria Cricket League Second Division championship for only the second time in the club's history (the last time was in 1979 with the author of this article the only remaining member of that side!)

The Club's recent success is a great tribute to captain Steve Brown, who has led a blend of youth and experience; Steve is also a highly respected spin bowler and topped the league bowling averages with 46 wickets at an average of 10.8. Our opening bowler, Clayton Lee, also finished in the league averages for the first time in his career. The top place in the batting averages eluded the club, but the next four places were Seascale's, headed by 'Mr Dependable' Mark Farries. Paul Knott and Stephen Brown (junior) also finished creditably in the batting averages but perhaps the most exciting batsman to grace the Seascale team is Robin Sparshott, who smashed the league record by becoming the first batsman in the league's history to score a double century. For that achievement Robin will be presented with the John McEuan memorial trophy at the League AGM; at the same event 13 year-old Daniel Lee will be presented with the Joe Lister memorial trophy for best player under 20.

The club has successfully entered two teams in the West Cumbria Midweek League this season and, although these teams have not enjoyed the same success as the weekend team, they

provide vital support to the club.

The club also runs successful junior teams at Under 11 and Under 13 age groups which are entered in the Cumbria Junior Cricket League. Many people have commented about the Under 13 team who play on Sunday mornings in 'blue' rather than the traditional whites. The Under 13 team have finished a creditable mid-table playing against teams from much larger clubs than ourselves. My particular praise is to the Under 11 team which finished top of their league, and second overall in the county after a well contested final against a strong Cockermouth team. It is worth mentioning that two of our juniors represented the county – Daniel Lee at the Under 13 age group and Adam Brown at Under 11. The junior season finished with a well contested double wicket competition and trophy awards for the season (including two new trophies kindly donated by Seascale Youth Centre). The trophy winners were as follows:

Double Wicket Competition Winners: Daniel Lee and Jack Graham

GWEN MOSSOP REMEMBERED

August saw the memorial service held to remember the life of Gwen Mossop (1918– 2004), late of Victoria Villas in Seascale. Gwen was the last resident member of the old Mossop family of Wholehouse farm in Seascale, which in turn was the very last of the original Seascale families. These early farming families included the Jackson's, Kitchen's, Leech's, Mossop's, Porter's, Sharpe's and Sherwen's.

Gwen Astill met and married her husband Matthew Mossop in Barrow in Furness (1940) during the last war while they were both working for the railway. Their daughter Dorothy, now living in the USA, was born in Barrow – whilst their son Roger, now resident in Hampshire, was born after they had returned to live in Seascale at the family home of Victoria Villas.

Matt and Gwen played a major role in helping the "Atomics" or the new residents of Seascale settle into village life in the late 1940s. Matt was the long-time secretary of the parish council and Gwen was a member of the staff of the late lamented Scawfell Hotel. They were well known for participating in the many social activities that were then available in the village, whilst Gwen also took a leading role in the running of village Brownie Packs from 1950 to 1981.

Her husband Matt died in 1994 but Gwen continued to live at Victoria Villas until she went to live with her son Roger in 1998 thus ending the Mossop-Seascale connection.

FARMING CRACK

Decause of the continuing poor price paid to Ddairy farmers for the milk they produce, the rush - or should I say stampede - out of milk production continues. Many farmers have decided to give up producing milk and turn to some other enterprise which is more rewarding and less demanding. During the last few months another three producers in West Cumbria have given up, plus two more in the Furness area, including one of the biggest in the north of the country. The number of dairy cows in this country is now the lowest for over five years. How long can this continue before we have to import milk from other countries? What time and distance would be involved before it got to the doorstep? Bull calves from the dairy herd are now again worthless so they are having to be destroyed as soon after birth as possible. Farmers do everything possible to ensure the health and welfare of their animals and they find it sickening and depressing to see healthy stock destroyed in this way. I took two three week old calves to the market recently; they made £5 each. They cost about £1.50 per day to feed, plus the cost of the ear tags, which is compulsory, plus the cost of transport to Carlisle - I reckon that comes to guite a loss. This month DEFRA will be introducing a charge of about £5 each to take them away.

In the last newsletter I said Herdwicks are sometimes difficult to keep in a field. Every time they get out they always try to head east to get back to the fells at Wasdale where they originally came from. One evening we had two of them, with their lambs, escape from a field and were last seen heading towards Panope (up Hallsenna Lane). At 8 o'clock that night someone phoned to say that two sheep and their lambs were running up the middle of the road at Coffin Corner, half way to Gosforth. Sure enough, they were the same ones! It is unbelievable that they could have travelled so far in such a short time. I was telling a fell farmer about this and he said when lambs get to a certain age the lambs and their mothers are turned back out on to the fells. It is instinct with them to try to get back on to the fell they know at this time of the year. Is that not amazing? How did they know which way to go? Could they see the fells of Wasdale from our fields? I very much doubt it. They must have built-in homing devices like pigeons.

The sheep I told you about in the last newsletter, that had been bitten by an adder, survived but regrettably went blind. The lady who wrote the poem about the lambs getting into her garden won a top prize at Gosforth show with a photo of one of them eating her garden hedge, entitled "The Organic Hedgecutter".

What do you think about the clocks altering for winter? They say it is because farmers want light mornings but I do not know a single one that would agree with this. Give me the light evenings any time.

Wildlife

Also in the last newsletter I wrote about disappearing hedgehogs because of the increased numbers of their main predator, the badger. One lady from Seascale phoned me to say that she regularly had 23 hedgehogs visiting her garden. She had marked them and given them all names. That kind of shot my theory to pieces, but I suppose the badgers would mostly be in the countryside, not in the urban areas where she lives.

Returning from work one day this summer a lady found her husband running around the house with a rolled up newspaper. Asked what was going on he replied that he was swatting flies, as instructed in the last newsletter. So far he had killed five, three males and two females. She asked how could he tell the sex of a fly and he replied, that's easy, two were on the phone and three on a beer tin.



The owl is one of the few British birds whose feathers are not waterproof, so they can only hunt for food when the weather is fine. With this autumn being such a wet time it has been a disaster for them, especially the barn owl. Lots of them have been found dead from starvation. In this area they are already fairly scarce. In the old days most farms had resident farm owls living in their hay barns. They catch a lot of mice and young rats, so they are a good thing to have around. The biggest problem was that they nested on top of the hay. Every time the farmer wanted to put more hay into the barn he used to have to remove the nest complete

with eggs and place them back on top of the hay, which was a bit of a nuisance. To overcome this, boxes were fastened up in the rafters for the owls to nest in. We have an owl box in our barn, but sadly it has not been used for quite some time. Barn owls, tawny owls and little owls are the only ones seen in this area. They are beautiful birds and it would be tragic if they were to disappear. (The Wildlife Trust said that you could help by keeping a stock of dead mice or chicks in your freezer to feed them on, if you fancy that.)

To finish on a lighter note: a mother of a three year-old girl was telling her friend that they were flying to Cyprus for a holiday. The little girl burst into tears and said she would have to stay at home because she didn't know how to fly...
