# A Message from the Chudfest Committee...

At our recent Chudfest Committee meeting, the decision was made to try to go ahead with Chudfest in July this year. If the Government's road map out of Covid Restrictions continues as planned, we should be free from social distancing by the start of Chudfest. This is dependent, of course, on no changes to their plans.

This is also dependent on the good people of Chudleigh being willing to come to our events. If we can't sell tickets, we can't have Chudfest. Our unscientific research into whether people will be happy to attend indoor events in July seems to be split 50/50, although the general feeling is that people are really keen to be out doing things.

We are therefore going ahead with the printing of our brochure, which will include the events the Carnival Committee is still hoping to run this year. Brochures will be delivered to every home in Chudleigh in late May, early June. Our box office will open on the Town Hall forecourt on 3rd June and will be there every Thursday and Saturday in June. We will also accept bookings and queries via email.

Can we remind everyone it will be a much smaller Chudfest this year and will be held in various venues around Chudleigh. It will include a Murder Mystery Dinner, put on by CADS; our very popular Quiz; a Ceilidh; Comedy Night; and the Chudfest Disco. Every event will be ticketed and tickets must be bought in advance. We will have to cancel any event for which we haven't sold enough tickets by the end of June, so that we don't lose money. (Remember the money we raise goes towards paying our share of the Christmas Lights bill).



We will definitely be going ahead with our two outdoor events. Open Gardens will be held on 26th and 27th June. We are very pleased this is being organised by Chudleigh Wild. It will be a ticketed event, with tickets available from the Box Office in advance or from the gardens on the day.

Our very popular Fete will take place on 11th July. This is a free entry event, so no ticket is required. It's going to be a bumper affair this year. We have sold out all our spaces and will have thirty-nine stalls to visit, including a licensed bar, BBQ and Cream Teas. We will have musical performances from The South Devon Singers and a wonderful band called Lvov Affair, who perform music inspired by Eastern Europe. There will be a Tai Chi demonstration and we will have our usual Dog Show. For children, we will have a Bouncy Castle, Balloon Modelling, Face Painting and children's only Craft Stalls.

So, a final plea, if you would like our Chudfest events to happen and wish to attend an event, please buy your tickets early. (Sorry for the nagging).


From Monday 17th May we will be reintroducing these services:

## **Town Hall News**

#### Millstream Meadow

I'm delighted to be able to tell you work should start on the construction of a new pump track on 17th May. This project is being paid for from Section 106 funding and a grant from British Cycling. The pump track will be situated between the skate park and the outdoor gym. The work is being



undertaken by Forte Trailscapes, a local company (Kingsteignton) run by Kye Forte. Kye is an ex-professional cyclist with an excellent reputation in this field. There will inevitably be some noise during the construction process. However, noisy work will be limited to weekdays.

#### Some Positive Feedback

It's always nice to get feedback about our facilities. It's even better when we receive positive feedback about the users of these facilities. We received the following recently:

"Having, sat by the Chudleigh Skate Park watching my granddaughter trying to pluck up the courage to join the skaters one beautiful afternoon this week, I was absolutely in awe of the skills performed by the skaters, the safety measures they took and their courtesy for my younger granddaughter. They were playing great music, which was not too loud and which created a lovely atmosphere for them to skate to.

was safe and even took a lunch break to give her free use on her first go on her scooter. When she had been there for a while one of them even tried to teach her a few simple skills.

Another family member spoke to the lads later on and discovered that they always tried to have one of them there to oversee and keep it clean and tidy – apparently out of towners recently caused problems down there, spread litter everywhere and when the regulars politely asked them to clear up before they left, the visitors were abusive and kicked in one of the litter bins. Consequently the local lads cleared up the mess themselves. When asked why they did not report it to the police, they said that nobody would believe them and would just blame it on them!! Come on Chudleigh, give these lads the support they deserve.'

#### Council meetings.

For the last year local councils had a dispensation from central government which allowed them to hold remote council meetings using platforms like Zoom. That dispensation expired on 7th May. Despite extensive lobbying by the National Association of Local Councils, central government has refused to renew the dispensation, saying that they are way too busy with their legislative timetable to renew the legislation that would allow remote meetings to continue.

So, what to do now? We are now in a position where we can no longer meet remotely but if we were to meet in person over the next few weeks we would be breaching Covid legislation. Community halls like ours can only open for activities relating to children and education up until 17th May. Thereafter, there is a limit of six on all indoor gatherings up until 21st June. We will then need to see what, if any, social distancing rules remain in

In terms of planning indoor gatherings Council meetings present particular problems. While we know in advance how many councillors and officers will be in attendance we have no idea how many members of the public might attend as they are not required to give prior notice. This makes the provision of a Covid secure environment rather difficult.

In Chudleigh we chose to bring forward our annual meeting to 5th May so that a virtual meeting was permissible. We cleared as much predictable business as possible which we hope will allow us to not meet until July. In the meantime we are exploring whether hybrid meetings are permissible; a mix of face to face attendees with others signing in remotely. This would allow us to control the numbers attending in person and ensure we can allow a level of distancing so that attendees feel safe and secure. More news next month.

#### **Exercise Classes**

Following advice from Teignbridge District Council, it was been decided that from Monday 17th May, exercise classes at the Town Hall will not be limited to a maximum of six people. The limit on numbers will be set by the need to maintain 2 metre spacing. Both the Large Hall and the Woodway Room are marked out in 2 metre squares.



# **Chudleigh Bowling Club**




# On A Lighter Note...

There are various walking groups in Chudleigh & a while back carefree enjoyed Thursday evenings throughout the summer on AROUND CRUDLE GH walks led by Alan Brunton. You might have seen his book which details sixteen of them. Each week we could relax in the knowledge that he had planned a new route that would lead us around the lanes, bringing us back to our starting point, the Town Hall, at dusk. # Wild About Chudleigh Celebrating Hedgehog Awareness Week in Chudleigh



Hedgehog Awareness Week (2nd to 8th May) aimed to raise the profile of hedgehogs and highlight the important work that's being done to protect them all around the country.

Linden Homes' The Oaks development in Chudleigh is now a hedgehog friendly development. Site manager, Daniel Fisher commented: "We've been installing hedgehog highways at The Oaks and we're delighted to be part of this fantastic initiative. Creating these small holes in the fences enables the hedgehogs to travel easily between gardens and wilder areas. It's a small amount of work but it will have a large impact on the local hedgehog community, helping them to thrive.'

The 13cm by 13cm holes in the fences allow hedgehogs to roam freely at night, enabling them to find enough food, mates and shelter—and to preserve their natural habitat.

Daniel added: "It's also a great opportunity for natureloving residents to learn more about the wildlife in their gardens and to see how small changes like this can help to support efforts to conserve the hedgehog population."

Chudleigh Prickly Hedge is a relatively new group which aims to protect hedgehogs by raising awareness and support in the town. Barbara Steele from Chudleigh Prickly Hedge added: "Unfortunately many hedgehogs are killed and injured on our roads as they can roam around a mile at night foraging for food. Hedgehog highways are an easy way homeowners can prevent this happening by giving them an alternative safe route through our

gardens and access to the wider countryside. It is a good sign that make a huge difference for these delightful creatures." new developments in Teignbridge fully support and implement

As part of Hedgehog Awareness Week, the British Hedgehog Preservation Society asked everyone to create their own hedgehog haven and offered advice on how to make their garden hedgehog friendly:

- · Link your garden
- Ensure there's an easy route out of ponds and pools
- Create a wild corner
- Deal with netting and litter
- Put out food and water
- Stop using chemicals on your garden
- Check before strimming
- Build a logpile

Fay Vass, chief executive of the British Hedgehog Preservation Society said: "Hedgehogs roam around about a mile a night, that's a lot of gardens! Hedgehogs are in decline and have recently been added to the UK Red List as a species 'vulnerable to extinction'. Loss and fragmentation of habitat are serious issues for them, which is why this connectivity is so important. We hope residents will soon enjoy hedgehogs visiting their gardens and would ask them to log any hedgehog sightings on the BIG Hedgehog Map. They could even sign up as a Hedgehog Champion for their new community. Hedgehog Street is a project we run with People's Trust for Endangered Species and is currently celebrating its 10th year!"

Ecologist and author, Hugh Warick added: "The response help yourselves. of Linden homes should send a message to all developers—it is not difficult to help hedgehogs—just a little care on their part can
