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
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

New U3A Goes From Strength To Strength







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Amenity Society News

Our first talk of the autumn season, Running South America with my husband and other animals was given by Katharine Lowrie. She and her husband are determined to do what they can to safeguard the World's flora and fauna so they decided to raise money for their chosen wildlife trusts by being the first man and woman to run the length of South America. Sponsorship was obtained and in 2012 they sailed from Topsham to Uruguay in their own wooden boat.

They started their run on 28th July 2012 from the southernmost tip of South America where it was bitterly cold and snowy. They were determined to make the run unsupported, which meant they had to carry or obtain all their needs en route without any helpers. This was achieved by carrying their belongings in a two wheeled cart of their own design that each runner in turn dragged behind them. There were four prototypes, each better than the last with the final version comprising two bicycle wheels attached to the rear of a bicycle frame and carrying a bamboo body with bamboo supports that were lashed to the frame using the inner tubes from discarded bicycle tyres. It sounds crude but it

worked extremely well.

During their run of 6504 miles, they suffered from thirst, and hunger along with extremes of temperature and humidity. On 20th October 2013, they reached the Caribbean in northern Venezuela. They had done it but not only that, along the way they visited schools and colleges to talk about their work and to enthuse the students to appreciate the importance of their wildlife and environment.



Pottery Court Café is a hidden gem tucked away off Fore Street between Sugar Mill and Woods. It is especially good when the weather's fine as it has a nice, quiet garden. It is now run by Anne Gentry of the Pheasant, Old Exeter Street; not the first time Anne has been at the helm at the café.

It is always interesting to see what a new owner makes of a place, so I went for lunch. I was impressed by the interior. It is much lighter than before and there was no hint of cooking smells. I had a homemade cottage pie for lunch, which was very good, washed down with a decent cup of coffee.

While there, Anne told us about her series of Bistro nights. There was one coming up in a couple of weeks, with a Spanish theme, so I booked two places and waited with eager anticipation.

When the night came, Anne had arranged the tables so that several parties would share. This worked well and allowed us to meet some new people.

The meal started with several tapas dishes of chorizo, manchego cheese, aubergine, olives, anchovies and tomato. All were delicious. This was followed by gazpacho; a tortilla; and the main dish, which was paella. The dessert was a cross between

creme caramel and a crème brûlée. The meal was ended with tea and that good coffee again.

As the café doesn't have a license we all brought our own drinks, I'd also brought a corkscrew which was in great demand. Everyone seemed to have a good time with more than enough to eat and at £15 per head it was very reasonable. Anne is planning an Italian night in November, details on the poster above.

Anyone for (short) tennis?





Claims for Universal Credit (UC) are normally made online, although claimants who cannot make a claim online, for example because of poor literacy skills or difficulties using computers, may be able to make a claim by telephone. People who have difficulty making a claim online should contact the universal credit helpline on 0800 328 9344 and ask to make their application by phone.

Town Hall / Community News

The Town Car Park

This story begins in September 2017 when we met with TDC officers and were advised of the need for the dental surgery to relocate due to the inadequacies of the current premises. We understood this and supported the need to look at alternative options. The idea of selling off part of the car park was touched upon but we made clear we could not support an option that would reduce car parking facilities in a town that already has immense problems with on-road parking. We did, however, make various suggestions regarding alternative sites for relocation.

It all went quiet until this June when we were surprised to learn that the District Council was proposing to sell part of the car park to allow the surgery to relocate. Our comments were invited Devon and Cornwall Alert is a free community messaging system and we submitted the following response:

Firstly, thank you for the additional time you gave us to respond to the proposal.

This additional time has proved useful in that it has given us the time to publicise the proposal via our website and Facebook page. This has solicited a large volume of responses, all of which are opposed to the loss of any space in the car park. This mirrors the feedback our District Councillors have received from the public.

Several councillors met with Neil Blaney last September to discuss the future of the dental surgery. It was clear to us then that there was an urgent need for the practice to find new premises due to the inadequacies of their current surgery. We made clear at that time that the Town Council was fully supportive of the practice and, indeed, made several suggestions of potential alternative sites. However, we also made clear that the loss of any car parking facilities was not a price we were prepared to pay. That remains the case.

Yesterday Neil shared some data regarding car park usage. Unfortunately, that really doesn't help at all in that all that it tells us is the numbers of short-term tickets sold. This inevitably shows that the car park is undersubscribed. However, this does not include the season ticket holders and, more importantly, those that use the car park (for free) between 6pm and 9am. The only way to understand the impact they have is to physically count the number of spaces left at, say, 9pm in the evening. I have to say that our experience is that there are precious few available spaces, particularly on Friday evenings and through the weekend. In many ways this is unsurprising as roadside parking is at a premium in the town. This will be exacerbated by forthcoming housing developments on the fringes of the town. The Linden Homes development at Rocklands will bring an additional 230 dwellings and the Taylor Wimpey development at Grovelands will add another sixty. We are also awaiting a substantial planning application from Cavanna Homes. As these developments come on line then we have little doubt that the car park will be oversubscribed on many occasions. The current construction of the rain gardens in the car park has also concentrated minds. Whilst we are advised that there will be no loss in spaces there will unquestionably be a loss in manoeuvring space within the top part of the car park. The dental surgery proposal will only exacerbate this.

To conclude, the Town Council cannot agree to any proposal that reduces car parking spaces on a permanent basis. Consequently, we would wish that the proposal to relocate the dental surgery into the car park not be pursued. We think it is also quite clear that there is little or no support amongst the people of

Chudleigh for the proposal which would make the pursuit of it extremely unwise.

We remain committed to keeping the dental practice within the town and would be happy to work with yourselves to try to find a sustainable solution to their problems.

This week we learnt that the portfolio holder for car parking in Teignbridge had over-ruled the proposal from officers and that the sale will not take place. We are indebted to our two District Councillors for their lobbying which has undoubtedly helped to achieve this outcome.

run by Devon and Cornwall Police to inform members of the public about crimes and incidents affecting their local area.

Recorded messages are sent by telephone, email or text message to individuals or groups/businesses.

It is a two-way messaging system which helps the police service to connect with the communities; it tells people what is happening in their area and allows them to respond directly with any information.

People who register choose the type of information they would like to receive concerning crime and anti-social behaviour, witness appeals, crime prevention, community events and local

Fly-tipping

We know that fly-tipping is a problem in most areas but I always thought Chudleigh suffered rather less with the problem than most. I'm beginning to change my mind. The most recent occurrence involved the tipping of several bags of general household waste at Culver Green. This tipping was found on the morning of Tuesday 2nd October and if anyone can provide information on the perpetrator I would like them to contact me.

So what can we all do to reduce this problem? If the flytipping occurs on private land then it is the responsibility of the landowner to dispose of it. I realise this seems very unfair on the landowner but that is the way the law is. However, the vast majority of fly-tipping occurs on public land such as by the side of the road, on verges and in public open spaces. If you find fly-tipping you should contact the District Council who will send out their blitz team to collect the waste. While collecting it, they will also sift through it to see if the tipper has left anything that identifies them. This is far from uncommon - it seems that fly-tippers are rather light in the brains department. The District Council has the power to impose fines and prosecute offenders, a power that the Town Council does not.
