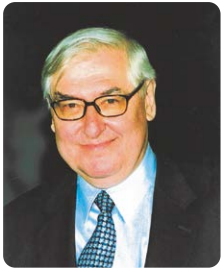

# THE HISTORY OF **L'ANNÉE HIPPIQUE**



**In December 1943, two French-speaking Swiss photographers published the equestrian sport yearbook L'Année Hippique Swiss. It became an immediate success. The yearbook's two creators, Oscar Cornaz and Jean Bridel, continued to publish L'Année Hippique until 1969. At that time, the now elderly gentlemen sold their publishing rights to French interests. Those rights were subsequently sold to different publishers in Switzerland, the Netherlands and Germany. Then in 2023, the yearbook returned to the Netherlands, where it is now published by Academy Bartels.**

The first L'Année Hippique, which was published during the war years – a period of no international equestrian activity – contained a complete survey of Swiss equestrian activity in 1943 and included hundreds of photographs. The captions for the photographs, taken by Cornaz and Bridel, contained an intimate and personal touch, rarely seen today.

In addition to this national survey, the first L'Année Hippique included several feature articles: a review of Swiss international activities in between the two World Wars; a history of Freiburger horse breeding; and a nostalgic report of the first recognized horse show in 1900 in Yverdon, Switzerland, with jumping and dressage. Notably, the winner of this first national jumping competition of 1900, Max de Rham, who had become a well-known graphic artist, designed the cover of the first L'Année Hippique in 1943.

The inaugural yearbook boasted 40 pages of amazing advertisements. On the one side, the pages were filled with companies run by cavalry officers and active competitors, such as Schwarzenbach, Haecy or Müller; on the other side, advertisers included banks, watch-makers and hotels. From mineral water and wine to liquor, one was informed of all kinds of beverages.

Of course, the yearbook included advertising from the major horse dealers. The introduction to the first L'Année Hippique was written by General Henri Guisan, the revered Commander of the Swiss Army in World War II.

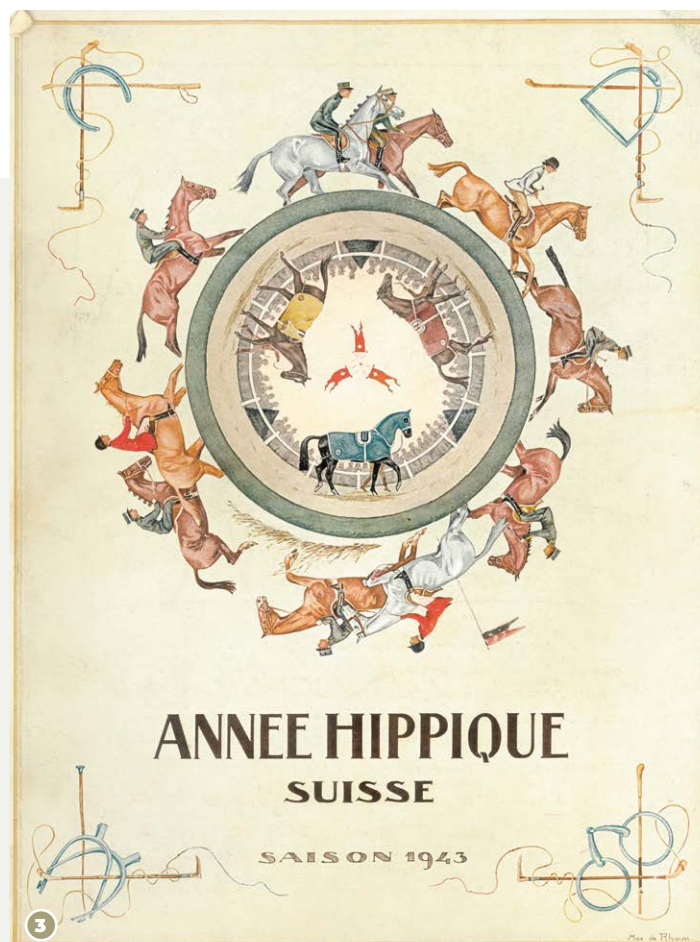
As a national publication, the first L'Année Hippique contained all the ingredients which made it a success for decades: a complete annual survey of activities, with a rich selection of photographs; historical, nostalgic and educational features; a results section; and an introduction by a prominent person.

In 1946, L'Année Hippique became international. Cornaz and Bridel introduced a new photo feature "Petits Ennuis," depicting riders experiencing difficulties in an amusing light, rather than a critical one. By 1960, L'Année Hippique contained 255 pages, including 90 pages of advertising. Among the advertisers were Hermes, Mercedes and the Holland-America Line. At this point, Cornaz and Bridel also began accepting feature texts in German or English, an example of which are several reports of equestrian activities in the United States, written by the author of this text.

By 1969, Cornaz and Bridel, now around 70 years old, sold their publishing rights to French interests. As a result, a Comité de Rédaction – which included Gaston Cavin, Roger-Louis Thomas (publisher and editor of L'Information Hippique), Louis Tissot (the husband of then leading equestrienne Janou Lefèbvre), Cornaz and Bridel – took over L'Année Hippique that year. After Cavin's untimely death, François-Achille Roch, a TV-journalist from Geneva, joined the committee.

An unfortunate decision was made for the 1970 edition of L'Année Hippique: it would not be published – as had been the case since 1943 – for Christmas, but in the spring thereafter. This change would allow the entire equestrian year – from January to December – to be included in the yearbook, unlike in decades past when only events through October were published. As a result, many annual buyers of L'Année Hippique grew angry, especially those who had bought 10, 20 or even more books annually for the purpose of giving them as Christmas gifts.

These angry buyers were also frequent advertisers in L'Année Hippique. The new team published L'Année Hippique again in 1971 and 1972, and then they quit. In the last two publication years, they had introduced translations of all texts and expanded the results section. Although the yearbook's structure had improved, much of its earlier charm had been lost. The 1972 L'Année Hippique, the 30th edition, contained only 40 pages of advertising. The prior year, Cornaz and Bridel had been dropped from the Comité de Rédaction.

# FEI WORLD CUP FINAL **DRESSAGE OMAHA 2023**



**The favourite to win the World Cup for dressage was Jessica von Bredow-Werndl based on 20 straight victories on TSF Dalera BB beginning with the Tokyo Olympics and including the 2021 European and 2022 World Cup championships.**

The victory by the 37-year-old Jessica in Omaha brought the individual World Cups won by a German rider to 13, equal to the total notched by the Netherlands (nine by Anky van Grunsven alone) since the series began in 1986. But for time out from the sport for the birth of her second child, the string of victories for Jessica could have been more.

This year's Final, organized by Lisa Roskens, the successful business executive who also did so in 2017, unleashed applause from spectators that was so enthusiastic from the beginning of each of the 13

Freestyle rides (down from 18 invited) that the “Sshh!” heard throughout most dressage performances was drowned out. The support appeared highly appreciated by most of the riders, some of whom appeared pumped up by the rhythmic clapping, cheering and whistling. It also helped overcome disappointment from many fans at the reduced field—especially the absences of well known riders such as German Olympic eventing medalist Ingrid Klimke and Holland's Dinja van Liere, both of whose horses were pulled out after arriving in Omaha.

By the time Isabell Werth, the German who is the most decorated equestrian in history, rode into the arena the crowd was more than ready to show their appreciation of the 2017 champion on Weihegold OLD in Omaha. This year she was riding DSP Quantaz, a 13-year-old German Sport Horse gelding owned by her student Victoria Max-Theurer of Austria. They performed 22 one-time changes on a curve as well as walk into a piaffe pirouette straight into a double canter pirouette. She even found time to look up and smile at the audience's appreciation of her incredible showmanship to the strains of Bonnie Tyler. “I'm very, very happy with Quantaz,” said the 53-year-old Isabell Werth. “He did a super job, and I think it was really his best freestyle so far. The music really inspires me, and I think it also inspired the crowd, and so it was just fun. “I could feel that the crowd wanted to clap. Then at the end, it was a great feeling, and I really have the feeling that Quantaz also enjoyed it, because he is really cool and in the rhythm.” The ride earned the duo a score of 85.761% and third place. In the 24 Finals in which Isabell has competed beginning in 1992, she has been the victor five times, reserve champion five times and taken third place four times.

# OSLO

Switzerland's Bryan Balsiger snatched maximum points for the win at the first leg of the Longines FEI Jumping World Cup™ 2022/2023 Western European League in Oslo. Riding the 13-year-old mare Dubai du Bois Pinchet Balsiger set the target when fourth to go in the 11-horse jump-off with a brilliant clear in 41.38 seconds and couldn't be caught. The Norwegian crowd had plenty to cheer about however when their own Victoria Gulliksen clinched runner-up spot with the exciting Equine America Papa Roach when just over two seconds slower, while Ireland's Eoin McMahon finished third with Chakra when clear in 46.13. Brasil's Marlon Módoło Zanotelli reigned supreme in the Rikstoto Grand Prix with VDL Edgar M with Daniel Deusser (Kiana van het Herdershof) in second and Gerrit Nieberg (Blues d'Aveline CH) in third place.

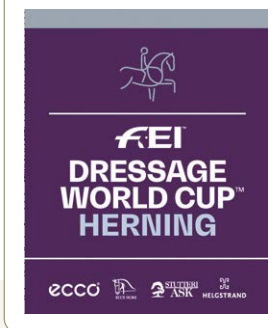

Carina Cassøe Krüth and the 11-year-old mare Heiline's Dancier led the route in the Short Grand Prix in which Denmark claimed all of the top four places at CDI-W Aarhus. And they did it again in a slightly different order in the Grand Prix Freestyle in which Cassøe Krüth remained at the head of affairs while her world championship team-mates Nanna Merrald Rasmussen and Daniel Bachmann Andersen finished second and third and her trainer, Andreas Helgstrand, finishing fourth. With her brand new Freestyle, Cassøe Krüth grabbed a big lead when posting a score of 85.925, all five judges placing her first. Talking about her new fun-themed party-style Freestyle, Cassøe Krüth said, "I think I already had a bit of a party with the old one but I wanted to keep the same vibe but not the same music so we stepped it up!"

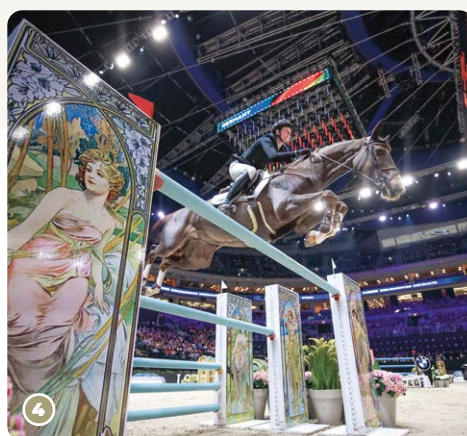
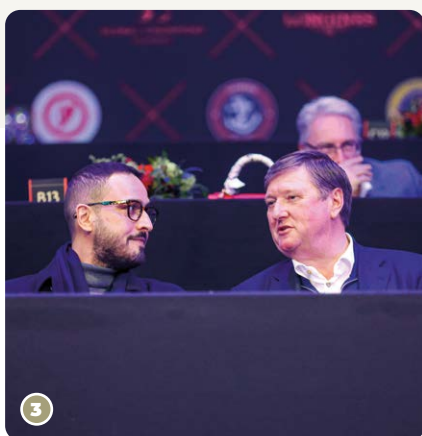
# PRAGUE

Katrin Eckermann secured silver with nine-year-old Cala Mandina as the only other double clear. McLain Ward (USA) rounded off the podium with HH Azur after a single time fault in round 1. It was a battle right up to the last fence as Miami Celtics of Bertram Allen, Michael G Duffy and U25 rider Edouard Schmitz were crowned the 2022 GCL Super Cup Champions. In the high adrenaline Final the young team beat Valkenswaard United's years of experience from Marcus Ehning, John Whitaker and Andre Thieme by being the faster team on 12 faults overall.

# GENERATION **STORY**



“Every disadvantage has its advantage,” the world-famous Dutch football player Johan Crujff (1947-2016) once said. The converse is probably true as well. Consider sons and daughters of well-known equestrians and equestrian families: they undeniably have an edge or, as we can call it, an advantage. However, they have disadvantages as well because being the son or daughter of a famous equestrian comes with higher expectations and often unrelenting comparisons. Yet, if we look at the entries in and results of major five-star events and championships, we find increasingly more children of the big names in the sport. Perhaps this trend is because talent, love of equestrian sport and passion develop even better when these qualities are complemented by experience, know-how, as well as financial and infrastructure opportunities provided by family.

## **The Philippaerts family: they all live for horses**

*Ludo Philippaerts inherited his equestrian passion and drive from his father Toine Philippaerts. Today, Ludo is the father of four sons. Among them, the twins Nicola and Olivier have been jumping at the very highest level for more than a decade. They win Grands Prix with clockwork-like regularity, while their brother Thibault has already moved up to five-star competitions. Before long, they will be joined at the same high level by their brother Anthony. In Aachen, Thibault and Anthony competed in the Young Riders classes, while Nicola and Olivier showed at the highest level – a unique family achievement indeed!*

## **Magical Aachen**

Ludo: I think it's great that all four of them can take part here. Aachen is magical, and this is a fantastic experience for the two youngest riders; and they are also doing great in the sport. Nicola and Olivier are also showing in a tough competition here in Aachen. All four of them do well. They are very driven and passionate. They work for it. As a parent, you can only be very satisfied and proud.

### Father to son

**Ludo:** For my father, equestrianism was a hobby; but he was obsessed with horses and had a huge amount of knowledge and horse wisdom. I really learned a lot from him. The basics are so important. He always kept repeating that. He also always made sure we had good trainers. If my father went for something, he really went all the way. A very driven man ... I guess I inherited that.

### An expensive sport

**Ludo:** It's incredible how the sport has evolved in the meantime. It used to be difficult, but now it is very difficult: there are more horses, more riders, better management. You can't really say that this generation is spoiled. We experienced the really nice period, whereas today it's more about the money. We see a lot of people with money coming into equestrian sport, and that is perhaps a threat to the real 'horse people.' It is an expensive sport, and I get asked a lot how I can keep providing my sons with good horses ...

### Valuable toolbox

**Ludo:** Those guys also encounter obstacles on their way, but they already start much higher up the ladder. They get a big chunk of my 40 years of experience, and that is a very valuable box of tools. But they still have to do it themselves in the arena! In general, our youth are more and more protected, as they are in society. But sometimes, it's not a bad thing for them to make a mistake. That is when they learn the most.

### Coach

**Ludo:** Here in Aachen, I fulfil not only the role of father, but also that of coach. Of course, we also have a number of people we regularly work with or train with. I'm not always at the competition anymore, but I still like to be there and involved at those big events, such as Aachen. There was a time when I was in the stables far less, always on the road looking for horses. But now I stay home a lot, more with our horses, more often in the stable and much more involved there.



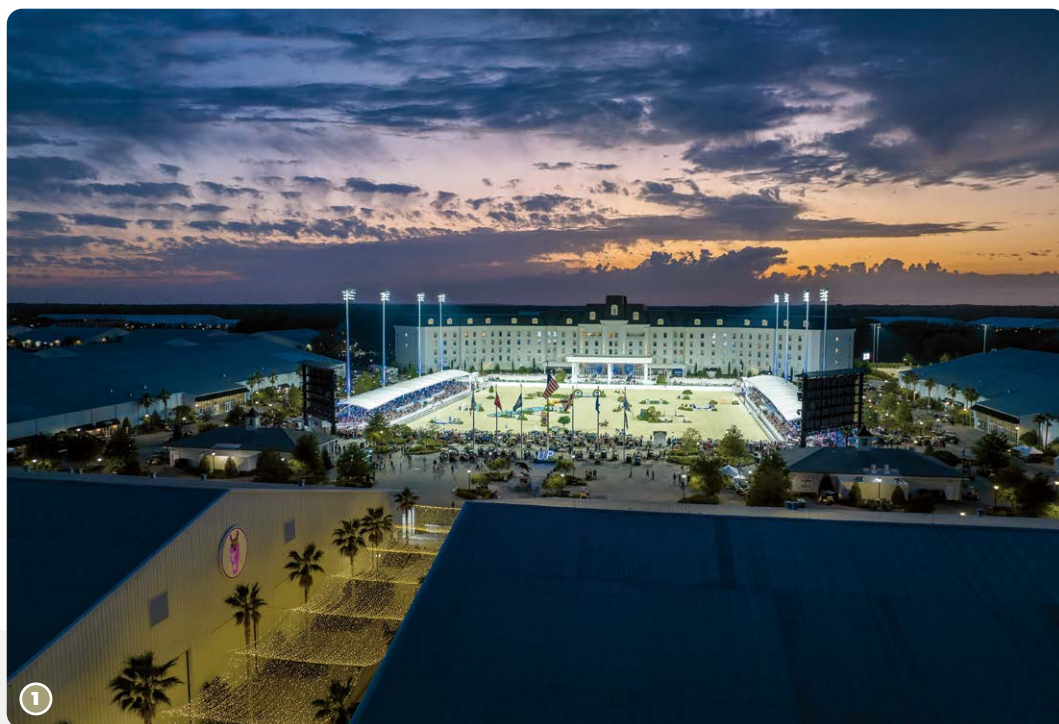
### Young horses

**Ludo:** We buy young horses and try to give them a good education. We have a lot of six- and seven-year-olds in our stables. And out of that pool, we regularly have a horse eligible for the highest level. And we also sell horses regularly. It is a wheel, and it has to keep turning. If a piece falls out of it, we have a problem. When it comes to who will ride which horse, I trust my gut feeling for now. As long as we have enough good horses, it's not too big a problem; as soon as there is a shortage of good horses, it might become one.

### Satisfied

**Ludo:** And I see that things are going well: Nicola and Olivier have been at the very highest level for ten years. The list of Grands Prix they have won is already much bigger than mine. The children take responsibility in the company, including with respect to horse sales, for example. I really cannot complain; I am satisfied with the way everything is going. And the children still listen to me ... most of the time (Ludo smiles)!

# SCENE **FLORIDA**



**When Olympian and show jumper rider Laura Kraut first started competing in Wellington as a child in the pony division, few could imagine that the area would become the world-class horse show destination that it is today. By the time Laura had earned gold at the 2008 Olympics and silver in Tokyo in 2021 more than four decades later, Florida had become a premier equestrian center with Wellington hosting the Winter Equestrian Festival (WEF) as the world's longest running equestrian event.**

With about 3,000 horses for each of 13 straight weeks of competition, plus about 300 horses for seven weeks of dressage competition. The main grounds contain 18 show arenas with four outdoor competition rings plus warmup spaces and a covered arena in a separate dressage area called Equestrian Village. The entire show grounds are within an equestrian enclave of almost 600 farms, designed to preserve the unique character of Wellington in the booming population growth of South Florida.

Although the initial attraction of Wellington for equestrians was to escape the snowy winters of the northern United States and neighboring Canada, the area has since become a winter lifestyle destination for riders from all 50 states in America and more than 52 countries around the world. Restaurants, beaches, world-class golf courses, nearby Palm Beach and all that the cosmopolitan city of Miami has to offer about an hour away are part of the lure of Wellington. In addition to Florida's mild winter weather and lifestyle attractions, many equestrians are drawn to the state for its tax advantages.



Unlike New York and most of the New England states where income tax rates are typically 13% to 15%, Florida does not levy income tax on its residents.

Wellington's WEF is the prime magnet for riders, ranging from Olympians to amateurs to children, most vying for more than \$10 million in total prize money in competitions held in 12 show rings throughout the 500-acre complex. Olympic gold medalists who competed at the WEF in 2023 include Rodrigo Pessoa of Brazil; the USA's McLain Ward, Laura Kraut, Leslie Burr-Howard, Beezie Madden, Will Simpson, Chris Kappler and Joe Fargis; Britain's Ben Maher and Nick Skelton; Ullrich Kirchhoff of Germany; and Jeroen Dubbeldam of the Netherlands. German team riders have been successful in the Global Dressage Festival, capturing the Nations Cup for two straight years.

In addition to its renowned equestrians, Wellington's image is burnished by the presence of billionaire families and entertainment stars. Among them are Georgina Bloomberg, daughter of the former mayor of New York City and successful developer of financial services; Jessica Springsteen, daughter of the "Boss," Bruce Springsteen; Eve Jobs, daughter of Apple co-founder Steve Jobs; Jennifer Gates, daughter of Microsoft's Bill Gates; Mary Alice Malone, heir to the Campbell Soup fortune and a major horse breeder; Leslie and John Malone of the international Liberty Media group; and Oscar-winning movie star and polo player Tommy Lee Jones.

The success of the Wellington shows owes much to Mark Bellissimo, an entrepreneur who put together a group of wealthy horse owners to buy the venue and the show dates in 2006. He was successful in revamping the show grounds and developing Wellington as a "destination," more than doubling the length of the winter circuit from six weeks and buying

land around the facility to sell stables to a growing equestrian community. In fact, almost 30 weeks of shows were scheduled after the winter circuit, making Wellington almost a year-round competition venue.

Thanks to Bellissimo's successful efforts, the shows were sold in 2021 to a European investment group which includes dressage rider and horse sales operator Andreas Helgstrand of Denmark and Ludger Beerbaum, Olympic jumper rider of Germany (now retired from competition). Plans followed to move the Global Dressage Festival from the Equestrian Village to merge operations with hunters and jumpers.



Other plans included building a second major stadium to serve as the center stage of show jumping, while the current International Arena would host dressage and hunter competitions. Dressage competitions would likely remain at the Equestrian Village through the 2024 winter circuit, while efforts were underway to implement the new plans.

Katrin Eckermann and her 10-year-old Cala Mandia took the title for the second year in a row in the LGCT Grand Prix and again collected her ticket for the LGCT Super Grand Prix. A tough yet fair track set by Global Champions' course builder Uliano Vezzani saw a few results that shocked many show jumping fans. Names such as Devos, Baryard-Johnsson, Ahlmann, Ward, Von Eckermann and Farrington failed to qualify for the jump-off. However, Spain's Eduardo Alvarez Aznar (Bentley de Sury) and Maikel van der Vleuten (Beauville Z N.O.P) did not fail and finished runner-up and third respectively. It was Madrid in Motion's Maikel van der Vleuten and Eduardo Alvarez Aznar who moved it in Miami securing the win in the GCL competition by a collective 1.67 seconds ahead of second place getters Prague Lions powered by Czech Equestrian Team.

# AACHEN

27 June- 2 July 2023

What an anniversary! Coinciding with the tenth birthday of the Rolex Grand Slam in Aachen, there was a German trio on the podium and the heroes of the hour were Marcus Ehning and Stargold. Five pairs reached the jump-off, three from Germany: Philipp Weishaupt with the nine-year-old Zineday, then the winning pair from 2021, Daniel Deusser with Killer Queen VDM, and Marcus Ehning with Stargold. The two further pairs were Mexican Eugenio Garza Perez with Contago and Rodrigo Pessoa (BRA) with Major Tom. They were the first two pairs to go in the jump-off, but both picked up four faults each. Then it was the turn of Weishaupt and Zineday – they were as fast as lightning: 43.36 seconds, but they too knocked a rail. Next to go: Deusser and Killer Queen VDM, the

**Breido Graf zu Rantzau**, the well-known President of the German Equestrian Federation for 16 years, passed away on 6 November, aged 73 following an illness. Graf zu Rantzau was born on 25 October 1949 in Breitenburg. He held a degree in business administration and, after serving as Vice President since 2001, he was elected as the President of the German Equestrian Federation four years later. He held this position for 16 years until his retirement in 2021, when he was appointed Honorary President.



Beatriz Ferrer-Salat had to say goodbye to her former international Grand Prix horse **Delgado** on 25 January. Their career included winning a bronze medal at the European Championships in Aachen in 2015. Delgado was given an official farewell at Madrid Horse Week in 2021 after which he retired. Early 2023 he was diagnosed with Cushing's disease.



# SAYING FAREWELL

Unfortunately some of our prominent equestrian friends and famous horses died during the past period. They will be remembered by most of us for their contribution to our great sport. Although we would have liked to publish many more names of equestrian friends and horses, we had to limit ourselves. Our sincere condolences are going to all family, friends, riders and owners who have lost a dear person or beloved horse.



On 28 January 2023, the legendary **Shutterfly** "Petey" died at the age of 30. Meredith Michaels-Beerbaum got Shutterfly under saddle as a six-year-old and an impressive career followed. The combination won three World Cup finals, became European Champions, took bronze at the World Championships and finished fourth at the Olympics. After winning the Preis von Europa at CHIO Aachen, the show jumper retired in 2011 at the age of 18.

On 3 February 2023, Adelinde Cornelissen announced that her top horse **Parzival** (Jazz x Ulft) had died. The chestnut gelding who won silver at the London Olympics and the World Cup final in 2012, among others, turned 26 years old.





Pippa Funnell had to say goodbye to **Primmore's Pride** on 20 March 2023. Funnell won two out of three The Rolex Grandslam competitions with Primmore's Pride in 2003 and two medals at the Athens Olympics a year later, silver with the team and individual bronze. The gelding lived to be 30 years old.



In August 2023, legendary auctioneer **Uwe Heckmann** passed away at the age of 73. With his personality, the purebred entertainer filled the entire hall, whether at the Oldenburg Verband, the Trakehners, the Holsteiners or at the PSI auction.

**James Cunningham – Jim – Wofford**, who passed away on 2 February 2023 at the age of 78, represented the United States in Eventing at two Olympic Games and won individual bronze at the World Championships 1970 in Punchestown (IRL). He enjoyed a long and distinguished career as an athlete, coach, and author. He served as president of the American Horse Shows Association (now USEF) and member of the FEI Eventing Committee.



Former Olympic dressage rider **Carol Lavell** passed away on 27 March 2023. The rider represented the United States, among others, at the 1992 Barcelona Olympics, where she won team bronze. Lavell founded the Carol Lavell Advanced Dressage Prize Fund in 2009. With this she offered financial support for coaching and training to talented and dedicated riders who have the ambitions to compete at the absolute top. Lavell passed away the day before her 80th birthday.



Beginning December 2022 Anky van Grunsven had to say goodbye to her **Salinero** "Salli". Anky was Olympic champion twice with the impressive gelding: in Athens in 2004 and in Hong Kong in 2008. Their long list of honours also includes the gold medal at the 2006 WEG in Aachen and multiple World Cup victories. Salinero retired from the sport in 2013 and was enjoying his retirement since then. He lived to be 28 years old.
