Miss Gladys Ogilvie Shepherd MBE

On 30th June a much-loved and well-respected member of the local community, Miss Gladys Shepherd, celebrated her 100th birthday. Gladys was born in Edinburgh but at an early age moved to Lundin Links with her parents, older brother Bill and younger sister Vilma. Her father was a Brigadier in the Army and her Grandfather a lawyer in



Leven. Even as a youngster, Gladys had a tremendous interest in animals, especially dogs and horses.

Soon after war broke out Gladys joined the Women's Land Army and was sent to Balgrummo Farm near Leven. She and the other girls there all slept in the attic. They were up at 5 a.m. to milk the cows, then would come back for a bowl of porridge before going out to labour in the fields by day and then milking again in the evening. It was hard work. She kept a horse on the farm and on a Sunday evening would ride home for a hot bath!

Towards the end of the war, she had to return home as both her parents had longstanding health problems and she and her sister cared for them. She maintained her interest in horses and dogs. She supported the Fife Foxhounds and bred and trained dogs over most of her life. She won many prizes at Crufts and was nationally recognised for her knowledge and skill. A few years ago she was awarded an MBE for her longstanding support of the Royal Dick Vet. College. Only recently has she slowed up a little, but it is not so long ago she would work in her garden and drive her car to visit friends. All who know her would agree she is a woman of indomitable spirit, great kindness and possessing a fine sense of humour. Her birthday was celebrated in

style at Monturpie when she hosted a lunch for a large gathering of family and friends, many of whom had travelled considerable distances to be there.

Largo Arts Week's Firm Foundations

Largo has long attracted the creative and the artistic to its shores. Hugh Cameron RSA RSW (1835-1918) rented Viewforth, east of the Temple, for several years circa 1900 and from there created many of his masterpieces featuring Largo Bay. A couple of decades later, it was Scottish Colourist George Leslie Hunter (1877-1931) who returned year after year to Largo – painting the Pier, the Crusoe, the beach and even Drum Lodge and Dunkirk Cottage. Acclaimed artists from the past have also been Largo born. The extremely talented Ballingall brothers included engraver William (1840-1919), seascape artist Alexander (1847-1913) and corkcutter turned painter John (1859-1919) who had an exhibition room opposite Largo St David's Church in the late 1890s. All the villages have had arts and antique shops over the years. Lower Largo once boasted the Loomshop Gallery and Gillies Studio, both of which held regular art exhibitions. The Montrave Hall in Lundin Links has hosted frequent art exhibitions put on by the Largo Bay Art Society. Tucked away in Lundin Links was once the gem that was Norman Grant's Dust Jewellery workshop. Until recently, arts and crafts shop, Very Crafty, was a fixture in Lower Largo.

As well as local talent for painting, including artists such as Irene Wood and Martin Anderson (who still has a studio on Main Street), art in many other forms has also sprung from Largo. Pottery was produced here by Anne Lightwood between 1972 and 1984 before a devastating fire destroyed the potterymaking premises. Sculptor Alan Faulds has left his mark on Lower Largo in recent years with works such as Malagan (2008) in his garden on Main Street and the Largo Obelisk at The Orry. In the wider creative arts, the Lundie Theatre Group has long provided entertainment to the community with their regular productions. And for many years locals were taught to dance at Ida Ballingall's Robinson Crusoe School of Dancing. Who can forget the film-making talents of postman Ernest Mackie, who cajoled many a local into taking a role in his humorous films of Largo life. Professional film crews have also descended on Largo over the years to capture footage for shows such as 1987 drama series Tutti Frutti and long-running travel series Weir's Way.

Over the years, the entire community have poured their creative efforts into fetes, fairs, festivals and galas. Decorating the villages, putting together fancy-dress costumes, reenacting historic events and inventing innovative machines upon which to fly off the pier are just some of the ways that Largo folks have demonstrated their creative flair. So, when Largo Arts Week was established in 2019, it was upon a long-standing firm foundation of creative talent. This annual celebration has shone a light on the huge array of creative endeavour that continues to flourish in Largo today and will help to cement Largo's reputation as a cradle of creativity long into the future.



Sunday 23rd July saw the end of the 4th annual Largo Arts Week. The Best Dressed Blues Band, who opened the week at the Upper Largo Hotel, closed the festivities in the sunshine on the pier outside the Crusoe Hotel.

Once again visitors and locals alike were treated to an array of arts and crafts from 60 artists and makers over 37 studios throughout Lundin Links, Upper and Lower Largo.

In the main the weather gods smiled upon us, apart from the high winds over the first weekend. Unfortunately this proved too challenging for some of the gazebo-based exhibitors. Thankfully, community spirit prevailed with neighbours and friends offering alternative venues. Everything worked out well in the end.

The Largo Painting Competition was spiced up this year by the addition of a TV camera crew filming the 3rd series of *Life On The Bay* for BBC Scotland. Keep an eye out when it's aired next year to see some weel-kent local faces on the small screen. Thank you to Zubair's Shop for ensuring none of the younger contestants went home empty-handed by providing them all with an ice cream.

In the evenings we were entertained by an eclectic mix of events across the Upper Largo Hotel, the Crusoe and the Aurrie. Highlights being the ever-funny Fred McAuley at the Aurrie and a surprise guest appearance by Hot Chocolate's lead singer, Kennie Simon, during Rewind's set at the Crusoe. Episcopacy

Largo Kirk has not been immune from discord caused by national events. At the restoration of the monarchy in 1660 the government of the church became Episcopal being forced on Scotland by King Charles II. The minister at the time in Largo was Rev James Makgill who was removed from office in April 1665 for refusing to accept this form of government. He was replaced by Rev John Auchinleck in November 1665 but "was ousted by the rabble*" who closed the church doors 29th May 1689 for a period of six to seven weeks. Subsequently Rev Makgill returned to Largo in 1689 and was restored by Act of Parliament 25th April 1690.

Editor's Note

Alexander Selkirk was reputed to have joined ... the rabble* which ousted Auchinleck. He would have been 13 at the time.

Justice Of The Peace, Cupar

Trespass in Search of Game. Robert Carmichael, miner, New Gilston, was charged with having been on the farm of Caskerdo, Ceres, on the 2nd of December, with a dog, gun, and bag, for the purpose of killing game. He pled not guilty and was defended by Mr Davidson. The defence was that the accused, who had been shooting with permission on some lands in the neighbourhood was, when found on the farm of Caskerdo, on his way to ask leave from Mr Robertson, farmer, to get a day's shooting over it. The crown found the charge proven, and imposed a fine of £1, with £2.18s.3d of expenses.

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Recipe for September

I return to my recipe ideas again and continue to encourage use of seasonal ingredients. September is a wonderful time for lamb from our own fields, try grilling cutlets or gigot chops with a tomato salsa. Scottish tomatoes will be plentiful just now as well. Tree fruits will be available now with greengages and damsons and, of course, plums and apples very soon. All sorts of green vegetables give you a chance to work through my veg cook books!

On the wild side, look out for Chanterelles, which, as I write in July, have just harvested several kilos but they go on into the autumn. Along with brambles, and rowan berries which make a wonderful jelly to go with game. All the usual places for produce: Blacketyside, Bowhouse and Largo Walled Garden as well as East Neuk Market Garden.

TOMATO SALSA

This is delicious with grilled meats, especially lamb, and is good to have at a barbeque, but goes equally well with oily fish, such as mackerel and salmon. Use different herbs if you like – chives are good and basil. I sometimes add chopped fresh ginger as well.

<u>Ingredients</u> 450g ripe tomatoes

- 2 cloves garlic, peeled and crushed with a little salt
- Grated zest and juice of a lemon
- 1 tblsp wine vinegar
- 6 tblsp olive oil
- 1 shallot, peeled and finely chopped
- 1 chilli, seeded and finely diced.
- 1 tblsp chopped parsley
- 1 tblsp chopped coriander
- Sea salt and freshly ground black pepper




<u>Method</u>

- 1. Blanch, skin, quarter and de-seed the tomatoes. Dice the flesh into small chunks, set aside.
- Press the seeds and skins through a sieve and combine the juice with the herbs, garlic and chilli, discard the skins and pips.
- 3. Whisk together the oil and vinegar with the lemon zest and juice, to make a dressing; check for seasoning.
- 4. Gently combine all ingredients.

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

The Simpson Institute in Upper Largo was opened in 1891. Several architects submitted designs, one of which is on the left. The picture on the right shows the desgn which was actually built. At the time, the *Dundee Evening Telegraph* described the building:

The building is in the old Scotch style of architecture, having crow-stepped gables, and is surmounted on the main roof by a small turret, which is used for ventilation. It contains a large hall, capable of accommodating 300 persons and there is also a library which will hold about 2000 volumes, which can be enlarged if required. Retiring rooms, lavatories, &c, are provided. The entrance hall has a ribbed plaster ceiling, with tiled dado and floor. The stone used in the construction of the building is from Burntisland quarries, and the roof is covered with green slates from Coniston. The red ridges give the Institute a simple but picturesque appearance. The building will be lighted by oil lamp pendants.

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

Friends Of Largo Bay Engage in Conservation and Artistic Efforts

A Comprehensive Biodiversity Study. Under the guidance of local resident Janice Duncan, the group has undertaken an extensive study to monitor the shores, waters, and species of Largo Bay. Supported by NatureScot, this program aims to gather critical data that reflects the area's biodiversity and habitat changes.

A recent discovery by the group, a surprise cluster of seagrass beds in the bay, has added intrigue to the study. Recognized for its vital role in providing habitat for many marine species and its ability to sequester carbon, seagrass is an incredible resource that is a focal point of national restoration efforts. Organisations like Restoration Forth have been working to restore seagrass along the Firth of Forth.

By building a species library and employing photo stations to monitor habitats, Friends of Largo Bay are working to collect information on the ever-changing environment of Largo Bay. The collected data will guide decision-making on priorities, increase local awareness, and draw on community skills to paint a rich and detailed picture of the biodiversity and value of Largo Bay.

Artistic Endeavours: The 100 Species Project. In collaboration with Edinburgh Shoreline's 100 Species Project, Friends of Largo Bay have channelled their creative energies into art. Locals chose the dog whelk, a seemingly unassuming but fierce and fascinating creature, as their subject. The resulting sculpture, "Gigantor," reflects many hours of hard work and creativity. Currently displayed at the Largo Library and Community Hub in Lundin Links, Gigantor embodies the collective artistic spirit of the community. Other groups, including the Largo Preschool Playgroup, the Paxton Craft Group, and the Upper Largo Camera Club, have also contributed fantastic renditions of the dog whelk. There was an event on July 29th, where children could learn about this remarkable species.

Largo Arts Week: Connecting with the Community. During the past Largo Arts Week, Friends of Largo Bay were present at the Temple Car Park, Lower Largo. The group provided opportunities for tide-dependent rockpooling, litter picking, and learning more about their conservation efforts. This event, held only during low tide when the pools were exposed, allowed the community to get hands-on with marine exploration. Participants were encouraged to bring gardening gloves for litter picking and to learn about the potential toxic effects on wildlife.

What's been happening in the Paxton Centre

Volunteers' Week was 1 – 7 June 2023. Volunteers are active in the Paxton Centre and around the grounds. To acknowledge their efforts, we posted a daily 'shout out' on Facebook to our regulars during the week. We held a volunteers' lunch in the centre, and invited the regulars who

attend activities to join us. During the very hot spell, some of our lodge guests kindly watered our grass, planters and raised beds in the evening. This was greatly appreciated. Our volunteers have been busy creating a wildlife trail, with a small grant we received. A leaflet will be available soon at reception (01333 329039).

We've made a bug hotel and created a bee & butterfly garden with lavender, sunflowers, geranium, and wildflowers. We've filled cotton nets with pinecones for ladybirds. Several bird feeding stations have been set up and bird baths are available to keep the birds cool and hydrated – although I wouldn't fancy



drinking my own bath water! A couple of hedgehog houses have been hidden in the bushes, and a small frog pond has been made using an old basin.

A timetable of all activities in the Paxton Centre is available at reception. Anyone can attend. Mindfulness classes, led by

Our activities are open to **everyone**, not just disabled residents, and guests in our 9 accessible, selfcatering lodges. The Centre is a safe, welcoming place

providing opportunities for inclusion, creativity, helping combat loneliness and promoting wellbeing. Many of those taking part feel more comfortable in the smaller group sizes. The Centre has many supporters in the local villages, and it is providing a valuable service within the community.



Largo Communities Together A Vision for a Thriving Community Insights from Deep Dive Workshops



Within the communities of the Largo Area through our Local Place Plan the dream of a thriving future isn't just a vague idea; it's a vision that is taking shape through your voices and contributions. We have gathered opinions to sketch a comprehensive picture of what our community's future should be.

Abundant Green Spaces and Healthy Ocean Environment

From the young and old, all spoke of a desire for more green spaces where they can enjoy nature and connect with the environment. These young voices symbolise a broader desire for an all-inclusive community where everyone, regardless of age or ability, has access to what they need, including affordable housing and clean outdoor areas.

Community Halls and Support Networks

Community halls bustling with activities and well-maintained support networks form an integral part of this vision. These facilities and networks are the heartbeat of our community, providing essential support and services. There was a strong desire to protect and enhance these, securing their future for years to come. We also heard that communications about what's on could be increased and amplified.

Accessible and Affordable Living

Housing, a fundamental concern, emerged as an area needing attention. The dream is for accessible and affordable housing for all stages of life. The community acknowledged that turning this dream into reality requires time and access to land. Areas, particularly in Upper Largo, were identified that could be developed, which would also relieve parking pressure and increase the availability of accommodation for young families.

Recognizing and Protecting Our Community Assets

Our community is rich in tangible and intangible assets, from community halls and groups to the many connections and historic heritage like the Pier, to natural treasures like Largo Bay, Keil's Den, and Largo Law. These assets need protection and thoughtful development to ensure future generations continue to benefit from them.

Communication: The Heartbeat of a Connected Community

Communication stood out as vital for a connected community. Whether it's staying informed or fostering a sense of shared purpose, strong communication is essential.

Looking Ahead with Innovative Ideas

In addition to these primary themes, we also heard exciting ideas about:

- **Reaching Isolated people**: Programs like soup buses to help those homebound, and volunteer-led transport as well as more warm welcome drop- in cafés.
- Engaging Young People: Community gardens, youth programs.
- **Celebrating History and Culture**: festivals that embrace our heritage; capturing people's voices, creating a virtual museum; having a people's history project; experiences in stories; creating community-designed heritage trails and maps.
- Fostering Intergenerational Collaboration: Uniting all ages through shared projects encouraging younger people to use halls and join clubs.
- Future-Proofing Community Halls: Making them more energy-efficient and adaptable through retrofitting; using the many existing facilities we have – New Gilston Hall, Upper Largo's Simpson Institute and Stables, Montrave Hall, Durham Hall and Largo Community Library.
- Celebrating and appreciating the many Sports Clubs: Cricket Club, Bowling Club, The Golf Clubs, Sports Club and the Sailing Club.
- **Protecting Natural Spaces**: Like Keil's Den and Largo Law and doing study on Largo Bay's biodiversity, whilst investigating upgrades to sewage systems.
- **Regenerating Nature and Promoting Biodiversity**: Planting trees, restoring wetlands, and more; having a biodiverse area that is accessible and nurtured.
- **Cycling Resources Through the Community**: Implementing a circular economy.

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General S F Sosabowski

I didn't know my great grandfather well, I was two when he died. His son, Dr Major S J Sosabowski would often tell me about him. He was a soldier's General. This was partly because,

unlike most officers, he had been conscripted into the Austrian Army and fought in WW1; he often described this as Polish boys in Austrian uniforms killing Polish boys in Russian uniforms. The fact that he had worked his way through the ranks would come back later to affect his relationships with other officers at Arnhem.

I often walk around Largo House when I am in Scotland – nature is clearly reclaiming what was hers and the calm melancholy it exudes is almost reassuring. I do like to think of the house in happier times when 1st Polish Independent Parachute Brigade was there.

The Monkey Grove was what looked like a children's adventure playground; it was their training ground. One of the big innovations that was developed was the *Parachute Tower*. This allowed the same para to execute several jumps per hour rather than one or two per day via aircraft.

The cold hard reality was the General Sosabowski's fate was sealed before the first para had exited a Dakota over Arnhem. He made the mistake of being right, having said something along the lines of: *What of the Germans? What of the Germans? Do you not think that since we know how vital that bridge is to their success that they might know this too?* After Operation Market Garden, General Browning wrote a scathing letter to the Imperial General Staff requiring the removal of General Sosabowski on account of his being "difficult to work with …" On 9th December 1944, the Polish President-in-exile, Wladyslaw Raczkiewicz, under pressure from the British command, wrote to General Sosabowski and informed him that he was relieved of his post. The General resigned his commission and told his soldiers who went on hunger strike: "*My boys, do not so this, I shall not kiss the colours* (the traditional last act of an outgoing commander) *… I will be gone physically but will always be here spiritually.*"

He left the Brigade and, after the war, was unable to return to Poland; where he would have been, at best, imprisoned or, at worst, executed. He had £300 in savings and no pension. He was employed in Acton as a storeman at CAV Electronics. He would drive his forklift around the factory where many of his soldiers also worked; and to the bemusements of the non-Polish operatives his soldiers would often snap to attention and salute. To most of the operatives at CAV he was Stan the Storeman but at weekends he was again General Sosabowski and used to travel around giving lectures and after-dinner speeches.

He was a true patriot and dearly wished to revisit Poland but would only do so after he had died. His body was allowed to be repatriated and interred in the family vault in the Powaski Military Cemetery in Warsaw. His son Stasinek was allowed to take his father to Poland, this was because the then Polish airborne led by General Rozłubirski, who - although was a Communist CIC - was a soldier's General like my great grandfather. Moreover, Sosabowski's colleague was General Kuropieska, one of the creators of the airborne forces in Poland, using the experience of the Brigade officers. He was very sympathetic to Sosabowski and made it possible for Stasinek to attend.

Mercurial, obstinate, stubborn and direct; he was all these things and the polar opposite of the British Officer class. He was a talented soldier and leader and of all things that he wanted, the affection of his soldiers was uppermost.

In his book *Droga Wiodła Ugorem* (The Road was Fallow) he wrote: *My life was tough and fallow. I don't regret what I experienced and if I was told go again the same way I would not hesitate to do that.*

How many of us could say that? Professor Hal Sosabowski, great grandson of the General

It will be repeated this year at Falkland, which is another place used by 1st Polish Independent Parachute Brigade for training before Operation Market Garden. And on 29 September (7.00pm) Sally Foster, Professor in Heritage/Conversation at the University of Stirling, will join Ian Anderson and Alex Lawrie to explore the history of Largo Parish Church and the Largo Stone.

On *Sunday 01 October 2023* we will welcome another former Moderator, the Very Rev Colin Sinclair, as the guest preacher to the morning service. Following the service there will be a congregational lunch held at the Old Manor Hotel. Everyone is welcome to all of the services and varied events and activities and you will be warmly welcomed.

Children And Family Worker. We expect to appoint a part-time children and family worker to engage with the schools and with the many young families in the community. Better Disabled Access. Whether on a Sunday morning, or at wedding or funeral services, we are aware there are people attending the church who have problems with their mobility or who require to use a wheelchair. With that in mind one of the improvements we are planning to make to the sanctuary is improved disabled access. Consultations have been taking place and we are planning to improve the access soon.

Digital Technology. Another improvement we would like to make concerns our use of digital technology. At the moment our Sunday services are recorded and appear on the church website in video form. Live streaming our Sunday services is something we would like to investigate and, with families living far and wide, having the capacity to live stream a wedding or a funeral service has become increasingly important. However we need help – and so this is an appeal to you or someone you know who has the knowledge, skill and interest to help us install and maintain the technology.

Pastoral Care. Meanwhile the normal life of the congregation continues with Sunday services (10.30am) being held in the sanctuary with the service on the last Sunday of the month (10.30 am) being held in the Durham Halls. Russell is also available to support you in the event of a bereavement, and will be glad to help you arrange a funeral service. Keil Burn



The word 'Keil' is a very familiar one in Largo. The Keil Burn intersects the Parish, from Pirrwindy, where it forms at the confluence of the Gilston Burn & the **Boghall Burn, flowing** south for a couple of miles before emptying into the sea at Largo Harbour. (The map at the side does not extend as far North as Pirrwindy). For much of its journey, the burn flows through Keil's Den - the long, narrow glen of ancient woodland that stretches north to south. Several local

buildings have had names that reflect their proximity to the burn and den, including Keil Bank Cottage, Keil's Den Cottage and Keilside Bakery. So what might the origins of the word 'Keil' be? The Fife Place Name database makes a credible suggestion in its entry for the Keil Burn. Essentially, this states that the name derives from the Scots word 'keel' meaning red ochre. There are deposits of ochre in several places in the parish of Largo. While much of this is yellow ochre, it can be converted to red ochre by heating.

Transformation of Silverburn's flax mill gets underway

After almost 11 years of planning and fundraising, Fife Employment Access Trust (FEAT), has announced that renovations will start during August 2023, bringing a new lease of life to the semi-derelict mill.

There'll be something for everyone. Expected to take over two years to complete, the current space will be transformed into a visitor centre and community hub, with a café/restaurant, backpackers' hostel, artist studios, shop, flexible/community spaces and offices for staff. The renovated building will also celebrate the rich industrial, social and natural heritage and history of Silverburn Park and the mill through displays and exhibition space.
