#### 1. Longside Primary Bench

The bench was manufactured by the boys during their time in the What's Right For Me Group, run by Paula Rawson, Community Learning and Development Officer. The boys are carrying out a series of workshops which gives them life skills in a variety of different settings. The group have manufactured picnic benches both in adult and junior sizes with the help of Technology teacher Ali Hynd. The aim of the group is to sell the picnic benches to staff in the school to help raise funds for their trip at the end of the year.

#### 2. S4 Work Experience

Six girls from Mintlaw Academy have recently taken part in a two-week work experience programme sponsored by Shell.

The secondary school pupils have been taking part in Banff & Buchan College's "Skills for

Work - Energy", a two-year programme designed to show young women the range of career opportunities in the energy industry.

The girls' work experience included a visit to an offshore supply vessel, laboratories, CHC Helicopters in Dyce and St Fergus Gas Plant where they met scores of oil and gas specialists.

The girls spoke to members of Shell's



Women's Network about diversity and inclusiveness, as well as the importance of supporting colleagues in the workplace and building a network of contacts.

The young students also attended a meeting at Oil & Gas UK, where they delivered a presentation on what they learned during the course.

Glen Cayley, Technical Vice-President for Shell Upstream Europe, said:

"I am delighted this course is producing such successful students. It is particularly pleasing to see young females taking their first steps to a career in the oil and gas industry. Encouraging and supporting the next generation of engineers is a key priority for Shell"

Grace Brown, who participated in the work experience programme, said:

"This experience with Shell has influenced my decision to pursue a career in the energy industry. Meeting employees from the company has expanded my knowledge of the different careers and opportunities on offer".

Susan Lumsden, who also took part, added: "Before I came to Shell my thoughts about my future career changed every week. But after hearing about the different opportunities available I would like to pursue a career in mechanical engineering".

#### S4 Work Experience

Work Experience provides students with first-hand experience of the world of work. Across Aberdeenshire, the work experience programme is highly valued by the students, school staff and the local companies that welcome our young people into their organisational environments.

Almost 80% of our 54 students took part in the work experience programme during the last week of September. Placements ranged from administration to engineering, classroom assistant to hairdressing, giving students access to a variety of skills and experiences and all helping to aid the decision about future career choices.

#### 3. S1/S2 Science Festival Trip



In early September S1 and S2 pupils attended the Science Festival in Banff & Buchan College. The pupils attended included S2 pupil Shannon Crighton and S1 pupils Jemma Yule, Danielle Morgan, Katy Simpson and Lena Forsyth, thought this an enjoyable event. They said they did many experiments such as the Naked Scientist which was the most popular activity, Real Life X-Men and Real Life science drawing. I spoke to Mrs Simpson who said she thought the whole event

was very exciting for the pupils and there were a lot of hand on activities such as building circuits, outdoor craft activities. She also said the talks and presentations were very interesting as well. All science staff and other staff from around the school went on the trip.

#### 4. German Trip

If you'd happened to wander past the car park outside Mintlaw Academy on Tuesday 26<sup>th</sup> June, at roughly 5.30am, you may have been shocked to see so many teenagers dressed, washed and on the go at such an early hour – some even looking quite alert – accompanied by coach, their luggage and envious parents and siblings. This was due to the departure of a large group of 3<sup>rd</sup> year pupils of Mintlaw Academy (now 4<sup>th</sup> years) and their chaperones Mr Richardson, Mrs McHugh, Mr Stewart and Mrs Sutherland.

The first leg of their journey was the long drive from Mintlaw to Hull, where they boarded the ferry which would take them to Zeebrugge overnight. They enjoyed a wonderful meal at the ferry's "all-you-can-eat buffet" and then, after exploring the boat and visiting the shops on board, they retired to their cabins to catch up on sleep for their next day of travelling. It was another bright and early start for the group, who were awoken by the sounds of the overhead speaker wishing them all "Good Morning" in more languages than it is possible to count at that time of day. After breakfast, they settled themselves back onto the coach for the final part of their voyage to the town in which they would spend their week, Igel (which also happens to be the German word for "hedgehog"), near Trier in the beautiful Moselle Valley. They were lucky enough to stay in the lovely Igeler Säule hotel where they slept in rooms of two and spent their evenings making full use of the hotel swimming pool and walking in the town. The next day was spent in the city of Saarburg on the river Moselle, where they completed assignments, admired the surrounding scenery by chairlift and whizzed around on toboggan rides in the morning and, in the afternoon, they crossed the nearby border to get a snapshot of France. Friday was the highlight of many people's trip, as they visited the legendary Phantasialand and went on as many rides as possible without bringing their breakfast back up! On the following day, they enjoyed even more swimming at an outdoor swimming pool, or "ein Freibad" nearby. They used the afternoon to visit Bernkastel, a traditional German town, well-known for its wine tasting. On the fourth day, Sunday, they took a boat trip down the river Moselle and their final day was spent in Trier, doing assignments and shopping and later in Luxembourg, where those learning

French got a chance to practise their language skills. On Tuesday, with their suitcases packed full of Mezzo Mix and Milka chocolate, they started their return journey, taking the coach back to Zeebrugge and taking the overnight ferry back to Hull. After such a wonderful week of new experiences and a taste of German and French culture, these students will undoubtedly have another fantastic year of learning languages.

#### 5. Return to Forbidden Planet

From the 19<sup>th</sup>-21<sup>st</sup> of October, pupils from second to fourth year brilliantly transformed the drama studio into a spaceship in their performance of *Return to the Forbidden Planet* - a jukebox musical based on Shakespeare's *The Tempest* and the film from the 1950s called *Forbidden Planet*. Not only was the acting and singing excellent, the live music performed by 'The Sharp Band' and Mr Holroyd was also first class. When speaking to someone involved in the production they told us, "We are all very pleased with how it turned out but it wasn't without its challenges. Just before the summer we had an almost complete change of cast but everyone worked really hard to make it work. I think it is safe to say by judging on the comments from the audience that it was a very enjoyable evening." Well done to all involved!

All is not quiet in drama now though as there is still a lot coming up; the 5th and 6<sup>th</sup> years are working towards their investigative drama pieces, the 4<sup>th</sup> years will be performing their pantomimes and a few extracurricular groups are starting up including a Shakespeare group.

#### 6. KCA Deutag Work Experience

During the last week of the summer term I travelled to Bad-Bentheim in Germany to do work experience for a week in connection with KCA Deutag in Altens. In order to take part in the work experience I had to apply and have an interview in both English and German and 3 pupils from different schools were chosen. Bad-Bentheim is around 10km away from the Netherlands border so I was flown to Amsterdam and then took a taxi to my host family's house. I stayed with a German family with 2 children, the father of which works for KCA Deutag. Every day I went to work and learned about all aspects of the Oil Industry and how drilling for oil works. The sister company of KCA Deutag -Bentec - has a factory opposite the offices and so I visited that and saw part of the process that goes into making oil rigs. I also got the opportunity to visit the Land-Rig 'T700' in the Netherlands which was very interesting. Some of KCA's apprentices took the three of us around Bad-Bentheim and we visited the castle and other sights around town. At the weekend we went to Berlin and went to the Reichstag, Alexanderplatz, Brandenburg Gate and the Fernsehturm. When we returned to Bad-Bentheim I spent the day in a German school which I found very different from schools in Scotland and to be honest I prefer the system here. I had a great time in Germany and I think the work experience was a brilliant opportunity to improve my German and learn about a different and I hope to return soon.

#### 7. Writefest

On Thursday the 13<sup>th</sup> of September Mrs Donald took the Advanced Higher English class to Writefest at the University of Aberdeen. The programme which runs every year is

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designed to give English students the chance to develop their writing skills and help them with their folio. The day began with a welcome, and then Alan Bissett, a young author, took to the stage to perform an extract from his book 'Boy Racers'. Next was the turn of playwright John Binnie who spoke to us about one of his plays, which has been performed all over the world, and acted out one of the scenes to an amused audience.

Our group's first workshop was with Alan Bissett where we examined attention grabbing openings of novels and techniques used by authors to keep the readers' interest throughout a story. In the next workshop we were asked to write a personal monologue on a topic chosen, such as somewhere you feel safe, a time of great sadness or a time you felt really angry. We were then given a topic from the news and asked to write from the perspective of someone involved. We each had to read one of our pieces aloud to the group and were given advice on how to build on it or ways in which it could be extended to make a short play. After lunch Claire Louise Duffy described her play written from the perspective of someone with locked in syndrome and read us an extract, which described the person's thoughts. Next Kenneth Stephen read from 'The Diving Bell and the Butterfly' an extraordinary book which was written entirely by a man with locked in syndrome blinking his left eye, showing us that if he could persevere and put in all that hard work then so can we.

Our last workshop was with poet and the previous head examiner for the SQA Creative Writing Folio Richard Bennett. He gave us a list of helpful do's and don'ts for submitting poetry to the SQA. Finally the last two speakers read extracts from their own works, Richard Bennett a selection of his poetry and Helen Lynch from her novel.

Throughout the day we had the opportunity to write pieces which can be used as a starting point for writing our own folios or just as ideas for the future if any of us want to pursue writing. Overall the day was very inspirational and it was great to have the chance to meet real, published authors, poets and playwrights.

#### 8. Pupil Achievements

#### Zak Loney (S5)

Zak was selected for the Scottish Cycling Team after impressing coaches with his talents. Zak has already competed in more than 50 races this year, taking 11 first places, 6 second places and 6 thirds. He competes in time trials over 10 and 25 mile circuits as well as track cycling. He is currently nationally ranked 25<sup>th</sup> in the UK - the highest ranked Scottish rider in nation ranking. Zak has raced all over the UK including Newcastle under Lyme, Lincoln, Liverpool, Middlesborough and Scunthorpe, but headed to Newport in South Wales, recently, as part of the Scottish team in the Inter Regional Track Championships. Zak is a member of Ythan Cycling Club and hopes to emulate his hero, Mark Cavendish one day.

#### Morgan McDonald (S2)

I started Judo at Mintlaw Judo Club which used to take place in the Academy. When it was the school holidays I went to Aberdeen Judo Club. I visited Turriff Judo club one night and met Stuart McWatt who invited me along to Garioch Judo Club in Inverurie where he is head coach. After that I started travelling one night a week to Inverurie. After a while, one night became two then three and now I travel four nights a week to

train and I go two full days a month training in Edinburgh and various other clubs in Scotland as part of the Judo Scotland Talent Development Programme. I went to one or



two tournaments before I joined Garioch club but after training for a few months at Inverurie I discovered the significance of taking part in competitions, and in September last year, in my 2nd tournament for Garioch I won a silver medal at Dufftown Open. In December 2011, I was presented with Garioch Judo Club Trophy for the most improved Club member in 2011. After that I took part in the Grand Prix events which consisted of 6 tournaments throughout Scotland. I won a silver medal at the Granite City Grand Prix and bronze medals at the Ultimate Grand Prix in Edinburgh, BUPA Charity Grand Prix in Motherwell and also Highland Budokan Grand Prix at Inverness in May.

After Inverness I finished 2nd in the Grand Prix circuit points table. On Saturday 15th September 2012 as part of the Garioch team we competed at the Age Band Scottish Championships in Meadowbank Sports Centre, Edinburgh where I won my first gold medal and became Age Band B under 50kg Scottish Champion (5 members of the Garioch Club became Scottish Champions). After winning the Scottish, I now want to win the Grand Prix Circuit this coming year and to compete in the British Championship in January being held in Sheffield and be the first pupil to represent the Academy in the British School Championships in 2013. Only this week my coach informed me that I have to do a 5th night training but the bonus is that the Judo is going to be starting up again in Mintlaw Academy which will mean one night I won't have to travel. I am indebted to my head coach Stuart McWatt for all I have so far achieved in my two years at Garioch

Iona Shield attended the Girls' Camp while the following week, Grant Massie participated in the Boys' Camp. Throughout their respective weeks they were involved in a range of activities including hill-walking, raft building, mountain biking, swimming, rock climbing, kayaking, canoeing and gorge walking! Each day they had a lecture by a guest speaker aimed at teaching them the importance of being a leader, the qualities needed and to find and develop their own style of leadership.

Iona and Grant gave a presentation to the Central Buchan Rotary at a dinner at the end of September. " I would say that from this experience I have gained a lot...you get the chance to do things you have never done before and push yourself to try new things",

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said Iona. Both students would like to thank Central Buchan Rotary Club for giving them such an amazing opportunity.

#### 11. Higher Education Convention

A Group of 55/6 pupils visited the Higher Education Convention at Aberdeen University this month to explore their options for after school. They met with representatives of the main Universities in Britain as well as some of the local colleges. This was an opportunity to find out more about Higher education as well as University life. They attended a talk from a representative of UCAS which was informative and valuable. The pupils were all in agreement that this was a valuable learning opportunity and had informed them as they prepare to take the big step of preparing for life after school.

#### 12. European Day of Languages

On Wednesday, 3 October, classes in the Modern Languages Department were suspended Pupils had the opportunity to take part in four activities in Spanish, for the day. German and French. Each group spent 20 minutes in each of the activities. There were guizzes, songs and art activities. Pupils worked in groups and pairs and older pupils helped the younger ones - and perhaps vice-versa!

Feedback from pupils has been very positive. Thank you to Mrs. McSeveney for organising the day.

#### 13. Visit to Abbey Court

# On Friday, 5 October the 5<sup>th</sup> Year Care Intermediate 1 group visited Abbey Court Sheltered Housing Complex as it was "Older Peoples Week".

Information for Parents/Carers:

- If pupils require to take medication during the school day, the medication must be their own, provided from home and a consent form completed. Consent forms are available form Mrs Robertson, Nursing Assistant.
- If your child suffers from asthma, please remind them to carry their inhaler at school.
- To prevent spread of infection, pupils should remain absent from school for 48 hours <u>AFTER</u> symptoms of vomiting or diarrhoea have settled. Good hand hygiene is promoted at school.
- <u>S1 Health</u>- I will shortly be offering all S1 pupils an individual introductory appointment and distance and colour vision screening. S1 pupils will also receive a Tuberculosis risk assessment form for completion by parents/carers.

Any S3 pupils, who have not received vaccination against Mumps Measles and Rubella preschool, will be offered vaccination in March 2013. Consent forms will be issued prior to these sessions.

#### 23. Positive Behaviour Management Policy and Procedures

This term, we have introduced a revised Behaviour Management Policy. The policy has been devised by a working group which was set up to review approaches to behaviour management and to come up with procedures which reflected current thinking and best practice in behaviour management.

The policy which has been produced puts an emphasis on encouraging and acknowledging good behaviour, while working with pupils whose behaviour does not meet expectations. Teachers will try to build positive relationships with pupils and will try to teach in appropriate behaviour. This strategy will replace the issuing of levels (lines).

#### **Behaviour Expectations**

Expectations of behaviour have been set out, using the word Merit as a hook:

- Meet deadlines, be prepared and be on time
- Ensure that you always do your best
- Respect other people, their work and property
- Instructions should be followed first time
- Treat yours and others' safety seriously

#### Responding to Poor Behaviour

Where a pupil's behaviour consistently fails to meet some or all of these expectations, the teacher will try a range of strategies within the class to try to help, but if these strategies do not work, may decide to monitor the behaviour for a time, using a Merit Support Card. The Merit Support Card will highlight what goes well and/or what is causing concern. Parents will have the opportunity to track their child's progress either by seeing the card after each lesson, or through comments noted in the Diary/Planner.

Experience tells us that most pupils will change their behaviour when it is monitored closely and discussed frequently with them by teachers and their parents. If a pupil's behaviour improves, the slate will be wiped clean.

If behaviour does not improve, the pupil may be removed from class into a time-out area for a short time, and may be referred to the year head who will, if necessary, seek further support for the child or use more punitive sanctions.

#### Acknowledging Positive Behaviour

While we will be trying to tackle poor behaviour, we also plan to acknowledge those pupils who consistently meet expectations. Every week, pupils will be awarded points by teachers for different reasons. One expectation will be highlighted each week:

Expectation	Points Criteria
Meet deadlines, be prepared and be on time	<ul> <li>Meeting deadlines consistently</li> <li>Being on time consistently</li> <li>Bring diary/planner to school daily</li> </ul>

Alongside this, teachers will, from time to time, nominate pupils for a Positive Referral. Positive Referrals are given for exemplary behaviour, and are given for one of the following reasons:

- Being a good ambassador for the school
- Going the extra mile
- Being a good citizen

#### How can be parents be involved?

We are encouraging teachers to use pupil Diary/Planners to record concerns: this may involve a note about work not being done, or about behaviour which does not meet expectations, or an acknowledgement of positive behaviour and effort. We would encourage you to check your child's Diary/Planner regularly, not only to monitor homework, but also to check for comments of this kind.

#### 24. Dress Code

#### Admin

Pupils are expected to wear school dress while at school and when participating in organised school trips or activities.
