William held a workshop explaining the various stages of his artwork and he supported the children in order for them to produce their own illustrations. Surprisingly, he allowed both the children and the staff to freely browse through his personal sketch books, giving us a privileged insight to his process.

International Women's Day

Aldro celebrated International Women's day earlier this month with a visit from three members of the emergency services. Assistant chief constable Alison Barlow, station commander Tessa schooling and Dr Sophie Mitchinson spoke at assembly about their work in the police, fire and ambulance services. Initially dressed in 'civvies', the children had to try and work out what they did for a living before they changed into their respective uniforms. After assembly they joined PSHE and science lessons where they talked further about work. What fabulous role models for our pupils.





Art of the Week

Children in Form 7 have created these stunning Dry-point Etchings. First, they spent a few weeks carefully composing an A3 still life drawing from some of the many interesting objects in the art room. They worked only in pen and they had to work hard to overcome the challenge of achieving light and shadows. They discovered hatching and cross-hatching as well as stippling. They then photographed and printed their drawings in A4. These prints were placed behind sheets of transparent acetate and carefully transferred onto the acetate using very sharp etching needles. These needles allow the artist to achieve incredibly fine lines by scratching into the acetate.

Once the marks have been scratched into the acetate, ink is rubbed onto the surface and it embeds itself in the tiny grooves made by the etching needle. After the excess ink is wiped away, the acetate is placed under a sheet of damp paper and passed through the printing press. And here are the results!

Ladies and gentlemen...

Well, that was pretty incredible. To have not been able to show their work for so long because of world events, and then to come up with that kind of a day, SPECTACULAR! And it was great to see so many parents who we had not properly met, thank you all for your support, it was great to see you all.

Joy and I were able to sit and watch nearly 80 Aldro boys and girls get up on stage and control their nerves and just go for it. Speaking from a purely Actor's perspective, the exams are all well and good, and great scores are always great and it helps to give schools something tangible to point to as a successful program, but we have always maintained that getting up on stage in front of an audience (and surviving) is the best way to build and foster confidence in a child and give them a genuine sense of having done something special.



There is a definite bounce in the performers step, which has led some of our quieter boys to talk about the festival and express an interest in it next year.

For us, it is a way to see how the children react to an audience, and how they cope with their nerves, and for the children, it was another step forward in their personal growth.

Now firstly I would like to say a big thank you at the Godalming festival, who managed to accommodate all of us and the 10 different group we were entered in. How brilliant to see so many children do so many different things for the first time in quite a while.

I cannot remember seeing so many high quality performances from so many different schools, and it is always great to come out on top. (Sometimes I can't help myself!)

Nerves were certainly a factor for some of our new students, which led them to be a little quieter, and a little smaller then we are used to seeing, but next time they will all be that bit bigger and that little bit louder.

We had the majority of the performers in the year 4 and 5 groups, so walked away very happily with I believe 4 x 1st ,James G, Tom N, Katie T and Henry C. 4 x 2nd , Joshua R, Cesca F, Jamie P and Alexander Y and 5 x 3rd places, Freddie E, Maisie T-W Henry E and Charlotte L. These were the judges picks on the day but we were incredibly proud of everyone for getting up and delivering on stage. The year 6 monologues, again we had most of the performers, but it was great to see some of the year 5s take their first steps. Again, a clean sweep of all places, a testament to some great talent, backed up by other very talented children. Alfred W 1st, Alfre G 2nd, and James P 3rd.

The year 6 poetry was also a learning and growing experience, with our entries earning a 2nd Alejandro E and 3rd place Glen D.

Year 6 duologues, an incredible array of scenes, with I think 13 different entries, we had 4. And these guys really went for it in a packed room, with a very big and close audience. Watching our pupils give it every-thing, with a calm confidence that hid the wild peddling that was going on underneath was wonderful, we took 1st place Alfred W and James P.

The year 9 to 7 acting Shakespeare, was all us again. All brilliant performances, with as ever great constructive comments from the judge, a clean sweep of Oli A 1st, Cormac S 2nd, and William B and Barnaby E joint 3rd.

The year 7 to 9 poetry group had a surprise winner, none more surprised than himself, but again a clean sweep for Aldro. Jack G 1st, Zachary W 2nd, Jacob K 3rd.

The year 9 to 7 Monologues were fabulous. Watching our year 7 boys deal with the year 9 boys in the room with some cracking performances, and we managed Albie F 1st and Theo P 2nd.

And finally to the year 9 to 7 duologues. Last class at the end of a very long day, I sat early as did the 3 pairs of Aldro year 7 children, only to watch maybe 10 pairs of, children seems the wrong word, young adults, all of who take acting very seriously, most of whom will be looking to go further with acting past GCSE. Our three pairs went at the end, and I am not sure if I could have felt prouder of how they went in that scenario. Alden and Barny did not put a foot wrong, Wren and Grace, having stumbled at first, got back up and delivered a good performance, and then Augi and Benjy absolutely stole the show, making every one laugh, and managing to stay in character all the way through. I am very happy to say that these guys did not look out of place amongst these other older talented performers, and thrilled for Benjy and Augi for picking up third place. Oliver Adelsbach was festival champion for Shakespeare, all age groups, and that Alfred W and James P were festival champions for duologue scenes, for all ages.

And we had a full house of distinctions for all those who did a LAMDA exam in march. Fingers crossed for the next 6 days of exams in may and June.

We try not to look at the placings and focus on the courage it takes to get up and perform, and we have had many lovely comments from Aldro parents, and indeed parents from other schools. The children all behaved beautifully, being great support for each other and anyone else who performed, and the judges gave great feedback, so all in all an amazing day and I hope you had as much fun as we did, sorry if we seemed distracted, but Joy and I had lots to keep track of.
