





What we value

Anyone with a birthday near Christmas will know that it can be a bit of a curse. Just before Christmas and you are probably making things too expensive for everyone. Just after Christmas and it can all feel a bit lost.

The only time it worked in my favour was on my 18th birthday. I persuaded everyone who might conceivably have been considering a present for Christmas or birthday, to make it

cash. Putting everything together with some slender savings I had just enough to buy my first car.

The Morris Minor saloon remains, in my view, a triumph of engineering. It was virtually indestructible, with an engine housing roomy enough to walk around, wings that were bolted on not welded and a hole in the front bumper allowing the engine to be hand-cranked if the electric ignition failed. With a top speed of just over 60 mph, it would never set the pulse racing, but I loved it.

A wing needed replacing and the elderly paintwork was starting to fail but that was easily put right. I couldn't afford a respray but my father, a City of Salford policeman found some left over 'police station blue' paint, and I could afford a paint brush. I spent hours sanding and painting and the end result, although less stylish than I'd hoped, did at least give the bodywork a consistent colour.


After two years I traded up to a Vauxhall Viva, mainly because it had an electric aerial. I sold the Morris to a teacher in my local school. A born-again Christian, she promptly made her mark and put a 'Jesus is Lord' sign at the top of the windscreen. Shortly afterwards, it was stolen and used as an unlikely (but very reliable) getaway car following a bank robbery in Manchester. The thieves also stole her bible and hymn book, which she viewed as a piece of missionary work.

Perhaps it was because it had such character, or perhaps it was because I had to really work on it, but of all the cars I've owned none has called out in me the same emotional bond as that Morris. I suspect this is true of many things. Things which are too easy leave us untouched; things we have to work at, stay with us and have abiding value.

The Theme is Written by the Christian Women of Palestine 'I beg you, bear with one another in love'



Neighbourhood Plan Update

Thank you very much to the 125 people from around the parish who replied to last year's consultation for the Neighbourhood Plan. This was a strong and welcome response with a lot of detailed and well considered information for us to consider. We will be analysing your responses in detail to identify your concerns and aspirations and to see what policies we can support with evidence from the survey. Our next steps are to complete the analysis and then see what support we may need from a consultant in order to develop robust policies that are not in conflict with the draft Wealden Local Plan that will be put out for consultation in February. We will keep you posted as we develop these policies and will consult further with you, hopefully later this year."

Road Improvements – A272 Piltdown at Goldbridge Road and Batts Bridge

ESCC has notified the Parish Council that following the concerns raised about the current vehicle speeds on the A272 it would be undertaking improvements that will encourage appropriate speeds and improve safety for drivers and pedestrians. The works, due to be completed by winter 2024, include:

Improvements to the existing speed limit terminal signs; Installation of new village name plates; Refresh of '40mph' roundels; Refresh of warning signs; Refresh of road markings; Installation of red surfacing at the gateways.

Recreation Ground Pavilion - refurbishment works starting

Hopefully by the time you read this the work will have started on the refurbishment of the Pavilion at Fletching Recreation Ground. It has taken some time to get to this point mainly due to the length of time the building took to dry out following the burst water pipe in the roof and the loss adjuster signing off on the claim. Due to a very generous donation from the Cricket Club, the Parish Council has been able to take this opportunity to improve and enhance the interior of the building. The works are due to be completed in April.

Fletching Parish Council Precept 2024/25

At its meeting on 8 January the Parish Council voted to set the Parish Precept for 2024/25 at £59.60 for a Band D dwelling. This equates to an increase of £1.72 (0.56%) on the 2023/24 parish precept.

Splaynes Green Phone Box

At its December meeting the Parish Council held a discussion with residents about the future of the phone box and it was agreed that there were a couple of options that could be considered: refurbish the phone box and install a defibrillator but not replace the door; or refurbish, replace the door and level the base slab. A number of offers of support were received at the meeting and the Parish Council would like to invite anyone who would like to offer their skills and support to help refurbish the phone box to contact the parish clerk via email at clerk@fletching-pc.org

Wealden District Council

I have resigned from position as Chair of Wealden District Council in order to concentrate on campaigning in the coming General Election, as the Green Party parliamentary candidate for East Grinstead and Uckfield. It really has been an honour to serve the community by engaging as far and wide as possible with different organisations, charities, schools and individuals. I am particularly proud of having spoken with more than a quarter of schools in Wealden, about the importance of nature recovery in a time of climate and biodiversity crisis. It was a tough decision to stand down, but I believe that it is in the best interest of the residents of Wealden, as it raises the platform in which I can advocate for my local community. Liberal Democrat councillor Gavin Blake-Coggins will act as interim Chair, until a successor is appointed at the next Full Council meeting. The Alliance for Wealden will be nominating Jessika Hulbert, Green Party Councillor for Withyham ward, as the new Chair. Although I am resigning as Chair, I will continue as ward councillor for Danehill and Fletching and it is my intention to remain so even if I am successful in the General Election.

Local Plan: It is clear that protecting our countryside is a major priority for this local community. One of the only tools that we as Councillors have to try to do that is to have an up-to-date Local Plan. We anticipate bringing a first draft to the public for consultation at the beginning of February.

What is a Local Plan? It is the responsibility of the District Council to permit or refuse proposals for development within the area. A Local Plan guides how these decisions are made in relation to housing, employment, retail and more. The law says that it is the job of the District Council to prepare such a Plan, in consultation with the local community, and in line with strict government guidelines. Many residents will know that Wealden is without an up to date Local Plan, after a previous submission failed to pass the government's inspection in 2019.

The headline: The government sets out a formula as a starting point for determining future housing needs for Wealden. This is often termed 'housing targets'. Meeting these 'targets' would mean more building and development than many of our residents would want to see in Wealden. However, the Local Plan we submit must be approved by the government's Planning Inspector, so it must carefully follow the government's rigid rules.

Didn't the government just remove housing targets? The short answer? No! Just before Christmas, the government said the targets were not compulsory, but "an advisory starting point". Sometimes it might be

possible for a Council to choose a lower target. However, if we do that, we will need to justify it by showing that Wealden's population and housing market are exceptional when compared to other Districts. Arguments about our exceptional landscape do not impact this advisory starting point.

So how many new homes will be allowed in Wealden? The Government's formula calculates that Wealden should give permission for 1200 new homes each year for 20 years. But we do not think that we have enough appropriate land for that many. We are currently investigating whether the sites which have been submitted to us are suitable, so that we can assess the number of new homes that Wealden can sustainably provide.

Why do we need to have a Local Plan at all? Without an up-to-date Plan, we experience a planning 'free-for-all'. Developers can apply for permission to build wherever they like, and it's much harder for Planning Committees to refuse. A Local Plan makes it easier to ensure that development happens only on sites included in the Plan. It will also allow us to insist on things like lower carbon emissions, improved building standards, water conservation, better design, and more protection of nature and biodiversity. We also hope to be able to increase the proportion of affordable housing, and more 2 and 3 bedroom houses to better reflect local need.

We are already under some pressure from central government to get the Local Plan in place as soon as possible. The worst-case scenario would be that we lose our planning powers altogether and have to hand over the whole process to central government.

When will the draft Local Plan be shared with residents and how can I comment?

On February 8th there will be an Extraordinary Full Council meeting at Wealden District Council offices in Hailsham, also webcast online. The draft Local Plan will be debated and brought to the vote. If it passes, we will enter the vital phase of consultation with the public.

If you would like to receive updates about the Draft Local Plan and take part in the consultation process, please register using our consultation portal at https://consult.wealden.gov.uk/kse/.

What happens after the consultation? Once the consultation ends, we'll review all the comments made on the document and use them to feed into the next draft of the Plan. There will be a further consultation on the Plan the Council wishes to bring forward in due course around Winter 2024 before it gets submitted for Examination by an independent Inspector.

Southern Water, which covers most of Sussex, Hampshire, Surrey and Kent recently gave a presentation to councillors and other interested parties. They provide water and sewage services to different parts of this large area. The picture as to which company provides what service is a bit complicated. However, there were some interesting points in their presentation of their long-term plan from 2025 to 2050. I appreciate some of this could seem a bit irrelevant to the here and now, but investment does take a long time to plan and bring to fruition.

With an anticipated population increase of 25%, there will be a requirement for an extra 300 million litres of water per day. To provide this they plan to

Invest £7 Billion compared with the current plan of £2.5bn; Improve 38 waste water sites; Introduce smart meters for everyone; Try to reduce rainwater flow using reed beds and new technology rather than storm overflows which when overwhelmed cause sewage discharges; Transfer water by pipeline from other parts of the country which have even more water than we do; Build a new reservoir in the Adur District.

This will, of course, cost money and water bills will rise. There is little alternative unless the taxpayer foots the bill. We all have to pay whether as customers or taxpayers.

Specific questions were asked about investors and dividends. The private sector has put in significant funds and apparently not taken a dividend since 2017.

Local Transport Plan

The other long-term plan being considered at present is the Local Transport Plan which again covers the period from 2025 to 2050. This is very strategic and looks at the whole range of transport options including walking, cycling, public transport and cars taking into account new types of vehicles, lower emissions and cleaner fuels. Our talk this month will be on Thursday 8th February in the Chailey Village Hall at 7.30.p.m. when we have a talk on Nightjars by Greg Conway from the British Trust for Ornithology (BTO). This is a subject of great local interest generally and to those who have joined in the walks on the Chailey commons, usually during June, when these unusual birds visit each year flying over from Africa to spend the summer. Their call is very distinct,

Toad-in-the-hole (Sussex Wildlife Trust)

Once upon a time, the British people were divided. Impassioned debates raged throughout the land, truth and common sense became distorted, and the public rose up and demanded an answer. How did that toad get inside that rock?

In 1898, two burly workmen in a chalk quarry near Lewes cracked open a hollow chunk of flint. The solid rock, formed 85 million years ago, split open to reveal an airtight cavity at its core. To the quarrymen's amazement, entombed within the ancient flint was a dead toad.

'Toad-in-the-hole' hysteria soon hit the headlines. It seemed like every month the newspapers reported how someone had split open a rock and found a toad inside. Some of these toads had already croaked but others would inexplicably still be alive and hopping. The Victorian world was thrown into theological and philosophical panic. Clergymen preached that the Creator had placed the eternal amphibians in rocks at the dawn of time. Subscribers to Darwin's new theory of evolution were perplexed. Charles Dickens wrote of his bewilderment, while others believed it was simply sorcery. Scientists began burying living toads in sealed boxes to investigate the unfortunate animal's longevity.

The Lewes toad of 1898 is the world's only surviving artefact of the entombed toad craze. It now resides in Brighton's incredible Booth Museum of Natural History – one of my favourite places in the whole world. Amongst the many awe-inspiring exhibits at The Booth, you'll find a special cabinet dedicated to curiosities. In it, lying reverentially on a bed of maroon felt, there is 'Probably the most famous toad in the world'. Admittedly when it comes to world-famous toads it's not a particularly crowded field, with only Toad of Toad Hall to contest the title. Alongside the original oval of cleft flint sits the shrivelled body of the infamous amphibian. The whole surreal exhibit is like a Kinder Surprise designed by Hieronymus Bosch.

But this cracked up flint isn't all it's cracked up to be. The Lewes toad was originally presented to the Brighton and Hove Natural History and Philosophical Society by Charles Dawson. That's the same Charles Dawson who would soon be sticking some Orangutan teeth on a human skull and declaring he had discovered the 'missing link' at Piltdown, near Uckfield. In 1953, Dawson would be unmasked as a fraudster and the whole 'toad-in-the-hole' phenomenon would come crashing down, dismissed as poppycock.

A month on the farm

It is good to be back and it couldn't be a better time! January is the start of calving and we have already had a couple of early arrivals as I write this on New Year's Day....

The first cow to calve was one of our – how do I say this without causing her offence? – less attractive girls. Nevertheless, she is always the first in calf, the first to calve and never has a problem so this makes up for any other shortcomings! The second was the first of the heifers – calving for the first time. This is always more tense. Not only are their bodies new to giving birth, so are their hormones and emotions! You never quite know how things will go. It was quite tight getting the calf out and we needed the ropes and a good deal of human brawn! The mum was amazingly good

after a rough time and her milk came down quite quickly. But the calf - a big bull - took about twelve hours to stand up - which is far too long so intensive nursing was necessary.

There are a few things you must do as soon as you can after birth. First, you need to put iodine on the umbilical cord to avoid an infection, which is called "navel ill" and can really drag a calf down. If the infection tracks into the calf's system you can end up with "joint ill", which is horrible and can leave them with damaged joints. Incidentally, should you see farmers with brown fingers, it probably isn't a nicotine addiction, but iodine! The next priority is to get some of the Mum's milk inside the calf. It contains life-protecting colostrum, protecting against bacteria while hydrating and nourishing. Normally, calves suckle on their own, but our little one was far too dopey so I milked the cow and then put it into a special bottle with a long tube putting it straight into the tummy. That way I knew he was safe until he "came to", which he duly did the following morning.

By law, we have to put tags in the calves' ears as soon as possible after birth. Each tag has a number, the first half of which is our herd number and the second half is unique to the animal. Then its birth must go onto our computer records after which we apply for a passport from the Government. It is a bit of a palaver, but relatively straightforward once you are used to it and total traceability really matters for food safety.

There is something magical about the start of calving. The cycle of life begins again. Soon there will be snowdrops as the days lengthen. The birds will be spying out their nests. The sap will begin rising up the branches. Of course, we will have a spell of grim weather, but we know Spring will follow and there is nothing as exciting as that!


