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Pairs Tactics

Don't Play for a 'Perfecto'

WHEN DECIDING how high to bid, you should try to construct possible hands for partner and see how many tricks are likely. Say you hold:

- ♠ A8532 **∀** A 3
- ♦ AQ863

You open 1♠ and hear partner jump to 3♠. Should you look for slam with your fine shapely five-loser hand, or just settle for game?

Construct some 10-point hands for partner and see what could be made. If you give partner:

- **★** KQ64 **7** 5 4 2 ♦ K J 2 ♣ 186
- You can make twelve tricks as long as trumps don't split 4-0. After drawing trumps, you play out five rounds of diamonds, shedding

two hearts from dummy and can then ruff your small heart in dummy. Playing teams (or rubber), you might well bid 4♦, best played as a natural slam try, which would elicit great excitement from partner if he holds this 'perfecto' (perfect hand).

Playing pairs, however, you should play the frequency game. Partner is unlikely to hold this hand. You are unlikely to have a slam. By bidding 4, you tip the opponents off that (a) you have a diamond second suit and (b) you have slam interest. Their opening lead and subsequent defence will surely be more accurate as a result. Simply raise 3♠ to 4♠. Maybe they'll lead a diamond from the king; maybe they'll discard a diamond as you draw trumps.

Do not play partner for the 'perfecto'. Give as little as possible away during the bidding and you'll make far more overtricks than with an overly scientific approach. Say you hold:

- **▲** AQ93 AK8543 ♦ A 10 **♣** 3
- You open 1♥ and hear partner raise to
- Your first thoughts might be: 'If my partner holds:

- **★** K762
- **9** 7 6 2
- 863
- **4** 4 2

'Just three high-card points, we can make a 4-4 fit 6♠ on reasonable majorsuit splits, by drawing trumps, then cashing hearts dis-

carding dummy's diamonds.' (Note you cannot make 6♥ as you need the discards on the unequal-length side-suit). Should you begin the exploration with a bid of $2\spadesuit$?

No. The key word is 'if'. Do not play the 'if' game. Be practical and jump to 4♥, not tipping off the opponents. Here is a much more likely layout than the 'perfecto':



The bidding (playing for the 'perfecto'):

West	North	East	South 1♥

- ¹ Showing his club values (if partner is describing his hand, North is dutybound to follow suit).
- ² No slam facing semi-wasted club values.

The practical pairs bidding auction:

West	North	East	South

After North-South's investigative auction, South playing for the 'perfecto', West will lead an unbid diamond. Declarer beats the king with the ace and will lead up his singleton club. Wary that this may well be a singleton for South's shapely bidding, and with a promoted diamond winner to cash, West will rise with his ace and cash the queen of diamonds. Declarer can make the remainder with the aid of the spade finesse, but that's just eleven tricks and game made plus one. Probably a 30% score.

After the practical pairs auction, West's natural lead is the jack of spades. This will run to declarer's queen and the singleton club will again be led. West will probably play low here, loath to help declarer set up dummy's suit (even if he plays the ace, that will be his side's last trick). After winning with dummy's queen, declarer ruffs a club, then crosses to the queen of hearts and ruffs a second club. When West's ace appears, South plays flat out: he crosses to the jack of hearts pleased to see the 2-2 split, cashes the king of clubs and the long club discarding a diamond and a spade, crosses to the ace of spades, and ruffs a spade with dummy's remaining trump. That's thirteen tricks and game made plus three.

Should South now regret that he didn't bid a slam? Certainly not – for 4♥ plus three will score 95% of the match-points. Those overtricks make little difference at other forms of bridge - where South would have mild regret he didn't have a go at slam. At pairs, the overtricks are everything and there is absolutely no need to bid a slam, because making thirteen tricks in game will be a virtual top.

Match-point scoring à la pairs rewards practical no-frills bidding: no looking for 'perfectos'.

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

The Reverend Benson led the king of hearts against the club slam and down went the dummy. 'I thought I had to bid with these spades,' said Neil Phillips. 'Sorry if it's not enough.'

John Hutson stared glumly at the cards that his partner had laid out. With no entry to the dummy, what on earth was he meant to do with his five red-suit losers? If he tried to ruff a heart in dummy, the Headmaster would overruff. Wait a minute. Perhaps Charlie B would hold the eight of clubs!

The red-haired fourth-former led a second round of hearts at trick two. The Reverend Benson stepped in with the jack of hearts and the Headmaster signalled heavily, discarding the king of diamonds. When Benson continued with a third round of hearts, Hutson called for dummy's seven of trumps. To his great delight the Headmaster was unable to overruff, discarding another diamond. Hurray! He had managed to reach the dummy. 'Ace of spades, please,' said John Hutson.

Two more top spades followed and the young declarer was able to discard his three diamond losers. He then displayed his six top trumps and claimed the contract.

'What an ill-considered opening lead!' thundered the Headmaster. 'It's automatic to lead a singleton against a slam. I could have held the ace of diamonds.'

'I might have done, I suppose,' the elderly cleric replied. 'Can't he follow the same line as before, though? He plays ace and another heart, which I have to win, Then he can reach dummy with a heart ruff, as before.'

For a brief moment the Headmaster closed his eyes. 'It might just occur to me to ruff your second-round heart winner and cash two diamonds,' he replied, 'Lead a diamond, or a trump for that matter, and the slam must go down.'

It seemed to John Hutson that the Headmaster might have beaten the slam anyway. What if he had discarded a spade on the second round of hearts, followed by another spade discard when the next round of hearts was ruffed with the seven? There would then have been only two diamond discards available. The Headmaster could ruff the third spade winner.

'There was no defence after that awful heart lead,' continued the Headmaster. 'Very expensive. It'll cost us a whole top.'

John Hutson was in two minds whether to point out the winning defence that the Headmaster had missed. A brave act like that would make some story to tell his fourth-form colleagues. Unfortunately, the outcome was all too predictable. The Headmaster would add his name to the detention list and he would miss the cricket match, where he was due to open the batting for the first time. He would also miss the best tea of the season afterwards. Last year the Mill Hill cream buns had been unbelievably good. They had even gone so far as to serve ginger beer shandy.

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Ask Heather

Switches, Signals and Raises

SATISH PANCHAMIA, Middlesex, asks: In a no-trump contract, when would it be right for a player *not* to return partner's opening-lead suit and instead switch to another suit?

An opening lead is the only card which is played with just one hand to view. We try to play the odds by listening to the bidding and using the evidence of our own hand but, despite our best efforts, our opening leads are sometimes pretty disastrous. Instead of ruing what might have been, you may need to consider how to recover from an unfortunate start. Sometimes this will mean not returning partner's suit in a no-trump contract when the evidence tells us that something else is likely to be better. What evidence might there be?

- You have a very strong suit of your own, say a solid suit, or a one-loser suit with an outside entry.
- There is a strong holding in partner's suit in dummy.
- Playing Smith Peters, your partner suggests an alternative.
- The Rule of 11 tells you that declarer is either strong or long in the suit led. For example, partner leads a two and both you and dummy hold a doubleton. You do not want to continue this suit since you will be establishing declarer's five card suit. Consider this situation:

A 4

Partner's lead of the 2 (fourth highest) tells you that declarer holds four card in the suit. Also declarer has at least two of the king, queen, ten and nine since partner would have led an honour card with any combination of three of these cards. Therefore you will only be helping declarer by continuing this suit, and should look

for something else.

RD asks by email for an outline of obvious suit-preference situations.

Suit-preference situations principally occur where partner is about to gain the lead and will need to know which suit to switch to. This assumes that continuing the current suit is known to be either impossible or undesirable, and that there is a choice of possible alternatives. The most common positions are:

- When giving partner a ruff, lead a high card to indicate a switch to the higher ranked of the remaining two suits (discounting trumps and the suit led), or a low one for the lower ranked suit.
- In a trump contract, partner leads an ace and dummy has a singleton. Now a switch is likely to be desirable and partner may want to know your preference. Again we discount the suit led and trumps, and give our preference as above.

Other situations where you may decide to give a suit-preference signal include:

- As a secondary signal in a suit. You have already given your primary message with your first card in a suit. The second card you play in the same suit may be high or low depending on your preference between the other suits (again, if it is a trump contract, the trump suit is generally disregarded for suit-preference purposes). If it is a no-trump contract, it will usually be fairly clear which of the remaining three suits is not a logical switch, and your suit preference signal will be based on the remaining two suits.
- When declarer is drawing trumps, you may agree with your partner to use your spot cards in trumps to give a suit-preference signal.

HANNA BROOMBERG, London, writes: Is it wrong to support partner's opening bid of $1 \spadesuit$ when holding four spades to the queen $(1 \spadesuit - 2 \spadesuit)$, no other high-card points, but a singleton heart?

It is not wrong from a legal point of view, but it is not recommended to raise with such a weak hand. Bidding to the level of the trump fit more commonly occurs when the auction has become competitive. It is best to use unassuming cuebids (see Neil Rosen's article on pages 24-25 in the June 2012 issue) to show decent hands, and raise directly with pre-emptive hands. When the opponents are silent, you should use constructive high-card raises, in other words 6-9 HCP to raise to the two level and

The danger with raising partner with a very weak hand is that he will not be able to judge whether to bid game or make a game try, and will go down because he imagined that you would hold more points.

10-12 HCP to raise to the three level.

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Director Please!



Julie is not Impressed

'THE HANDS have been so boring tonight, I hope we get some more exciting ones soon,' said John.

'I think boring is good,' replied Julie who feared that John might use his imagination if the hands got wild.

John was delighted that at last he had some distribution and hoped that he would get the chance to leap around in the bidding to show Julie just what he had. After 1♣ – 1♠ he felt that he should show his hearts; however, he was wary of bidding 2♥ as Julie would take this as a reverse and so expect more high-card points than he had. He reasoned that if he leapt to 3♥ surely Julie would get the message, but he was wrong!

Julie alerted John's 3♥ and, on enquiry,

said: 'As it is an unnecessary jump, it is a splinter agreeing spades and showing a singleton or void heart.' John's heart sank as he had completely forgotten about splinters, even though they were on his convention card.

When Julie cue-bid 4♠, showing first round control, John realised that he must carry on as if Julie thought he had clubs and hearts so he attempted to sign off in 4♥ knowing full well that Julie would think he held a void or the singleton ace. In response to Blackwood he showed his one ace and when Julie leapt to 6♠ he felt he could do little else other than pass.

'Knowing' that John had a heart void, West decided against leading a top heart and instead decided to cut down dummy's ruffs by leading a trump. Unsurprisingly as John tabled the dummy, West was bellowing 'Director!' as soon as he saw dummy's hearts.


'I was told that John had a heart void but, as you can see, he has five of them. If I had been given a truthful answer I would have led a top heart,' insisted West.

'You were given a truthful answer,' retorted Julie. 'I told you what his bid showed. I can't be held responsible for him getting the system wrong.'

'But then John should have said something before I faced my opening lead,' replied West.

'John is only obliged to say something if his partner has given an incorrect explanation which, in this case, she clearly has not. John has confused his partner as much as he has the defence, so I am afraid the lead stands and you must play out the hand and accept whatever score is reached,' said the Director.

Julie duly wrapped up thirteen tricks and they moved on to the next hand in silence.

After the previous hand John was all of a dither, so it was hardly surprising that he managed to put his seven of hearts in with his diamonds. When Julie responded 1♠ to his 1♠ again he couldn't believe his luck; this time he was able to rebid 3♥ knowing that it was a splinter bid. The 4♠ cue-bid was exactly what he wanted to hear so he launched into Blackwood just to check that they weren't missing two aces and then bid 6♠.

West settled for a neutral club lead and John tabled the dummy, at which point Julie asked innocently: 'Why have you got a heart in with your diamond suit?' John blushed as he put the seven of hearts in the right place and West shook his head, knowing that once more he had avoided cashing the first two heart tricks and that there was nothing he could do about it.

'Partner, you should start using splinter bids correctly before you start causing splintered relationships instead,' observed Julie while John just kept his head down, not daring to look Julie in the eye.

ENGLAND SENIORS STUMBLE AT LAST HURDLE

THE TELTSCHER TROPHY (previously known as the 'Seniors Camrose') is for seniors from the four home nations, plus the Republic of Ireland, and was held in May in Cardiff. Since its inception in 2008, the event has been generously sponsored by Bernard Teltscher, who led the Great Britain team that brought the number of teams up to six. Bernard was partnered by fellow nonagenarian Tony Priday. The Patron's team could come first, but they could not win the trophy.

England were leading at the half-way point; indeed after six of the ten matches they were the only team above average! There were some memorable deals involving the diamond suit: a bidding sequence of 2♦ − 7♦ was successful against England and, on another board, the Patron's team played in 2♦ in both rooms, scoring +110 in a 5-0 fit and -1100 in a 5-3 fit.

There was a report of a 'senior moment' when a declarer claimed his contract on a cross-ruff. The bad news was that he was playing in 3NT; the good news was that he was still able to scramble nine tricks.


England lost heavily to Northern Ireland on Sunday morning to fall back into the pack, and their subsequent wins were not big enough to regain the lead. Scotland (Liz McGowan, David Liggatt, Irving Gordon, Danny Kane, Brian Short, Alan Goodman and NPC Anne Symons) finished strongly to win the Teltscher Trophy, with Northern Ireland second and England third.

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Traps for the Unwary

The Mysterious Redouble (Part II)

IN THE last issue we started to look at the situation where you had redoubled after an opponent had doubled your partner's opening bid for take-out. This time we will see what happens next and how you should go about punishing the transgressors when it is right to do so, and making a different call when it is not.

What happens after a redouble? The most important thing to appreciate is that by redoubling you have declared owner*ship of the hand* – you must either play the contract yourselves or double the opponents for penalties. It is illogical to redouble saying: 'We have the balance of power,' and then suddenly pass the opponents out in $2 \clubsuit$ on the next round.

Sometimes, of course, opener isn't suitable for defending: rather than having 13 points and you owning the hand, he has a light opening bid with a six-card suit and a shapely 10 count. How can you tell the difference?

The answer is for opener to describe his hand after the redouble. Most of the time the fourth player will bid and now opener has the option to do one of several things:

1. If opener doubles, that is a penalty double showing a good opening bid with some clubs. Typically he would have four, but three good ones and a reasonable hand is fine given that your redouble invited him to penalise. These types of hand would be OK for a penalty double of 2♣ in the above sequence:

♠ AKJ65	♠ KQ1086	♠ AJ106
Y 7	y 87	♥ Q103
♦ 876	♦ J3	♦ K32
♣ KJ87	♣ AK106	♣ KQ9

If opener passes, he is simply con-

firming a sound opener, 12+ HCP or so. This is a forcing pass and he is inviting you to make a decision. This is the call opener will make on at least 50% of hands - he will wait for you (the redoubler) to make a decision.

3. If opener bids a suit at his second turn, he is saying he is unsuitable for defending as he has a poor hand and either extra length in the suit he is rebidding (so rebidding his suit would show six cards) or a shapely two-suiter (so bidding a second suit would normally show 5-5 in the two suits). The higher opener bids, the more shape he has, so a jump to 3 dafter opening 14, for example, would simply show a very shapely hand, e.g. 6-5, without any extra values. This is known as 'bidding in front of partner', a similar situation to the one we

looked at in the April issue (page 13) when a 1NT opening has been doubled for penalties. Note that in order to rebid after a redouble, opener must have a shapely hand and a low point count – with a normal six-card suit and

Although it can be frustrating for the redoubler to be desperate to double the opponents for penalties and suddenly see his partner bid before he has a chance to do so, opener must do his duty and show the full nature of his hand when he lacks defensive strength.

average 12 points he should just pass.

4. If opener holds a good hand in terms of high-card points, but is very shapely (e.g. a 5-5 16-count), then he must pass at his second turn to confirm a fair hand and subsequently pull partner's penalty double. This auction:

would therefore suggest the same very

shapely hand as if opener had bid 2. without waiting for partner to double but with one crucial difference: it promises extra values, hence it would be forcing. The redoubler is expected to support one of opener's suits if he can, or else retreat to no-trumps (since a hand that makes a penalty double of a suit is usually assumed to have a stopper there).

Note that the redoubler makes his decision to make a penalty double on the assumption that opener has a normal opening hand - if opener's hand is significantly different, then the redoubler needs to be told.

Let's review some of the Dos and Don'ts of Redoubling:

- Make sure that when you redouble you have enough values to 'own the hand' – if partner is in the habit of liberally applying the Rule of 19 and opening on very slim values, then make sure you make up for it with a sound redouble based on at least 10 points.
- Remember that when partner has redoubled, opener can pass (forcing) if the fourth hand bids a suit and opener is not sure whether or not to double him; this will give the redoubler a chance to 'express an opinion, as the saying goes.

Don't:

- Redouble when you have no interest in penalising the opposition – if you just have a long suit and the requisite values, then bid your suit instead.
- Rebid *in front of* partner's redouble when you have a good hand as opener - if you don't give him a chance to double, you are showing a weak and shapely hand.



BRIDGE BASE Online allows you to watch just about every important bridge event anywhere on Earth. The Spingold, one of the three major annual championships in the United States, is a very important bridge event in which most of the best players alive compete for the trophy donated in 1934 by a movie mogul. In the final of the 2012 Spingold, I was commentating when this deal arose late in the match. The team now based in (rather than from) Monaco* held a narrow lead over the renowned Nickell team from the United States, and nothing seemed likely to change here:



At one table East-West for *Monaco* played in 1NT by East and made an overtrick. At the other table Monaco also played in 1NT,

The 1♦ opening was natural and commonplace in 2012, though it is a fair bet that Nathan B. Spingold would have passed in 1934. South's double of West's overcall was a product of the late fifties rather than the mid-thirties, and West's redouble showed values with specifically a doubleton spade. When Bobby Levin thought enough of his own values to whack his opponents in 1NT, the Norweg . . . er, Monegasques were headed for disaster. Geir Helgemo didn't want to play in 1NT, but he didn't know what alternative would be preferable, so he redoubled for rescue hoping that Tor Helness did know. Whether Helness didn't know either, or thought that his partner actually had something, is not clear, but 1NT redoubled by South became the final contract.

The defenders had five spade tricks and three diamond tricks. Two down, 1000 to East-West, 13 IMPs to Nickell, a new leader in the match . . . those were the comments bandied about by the BBO spectators. I, a veteran of more disasters than I care to remember (but cannot, alas, forget) wasn't at all sure. Watch what unfolded, and if you have tears prepare to shed them now.

Weinstein led the queen of spades. Helgemo asked Helness for the king, which held the trick. Was that ridiculous? Not particularly - Levin, who knew that Weinstein had exactly two spades, feared that if he took the king with the ace the defence would not be able to come to more than two spade tricks, since he had no sure entry. By ducking he would make certain of four spade tricks for the defence, so he ducked.

Helgemo could now have played

directly for a make if East held three hearts to the queen. But a reason Helgemo is one of the finest players there's ever been is his ability to assess when to play flat out and when to bide his time and create difficulties for his opponents. He led a diamond from the table to the second trick, and that went to the nine, ten and king. Weinstein played his remaining spade, which to Levin's chagrin was the ten. Still the defence could take four spades and three diamonds, still the contract would be one down redoubled, still the Nickell team would collect a substantial swing on the board . . .

Levin overtook the ten of spades with the jack and ran two more rounds of the suit. Weinstein, under some pressure, threw the jack of clubs from his sequence and then the eight of hearts (a discouraging card in the partnership methods). Levin, convinced that his partner had the king of clubs rather than the ace of diamonds, didn't cash his last spade. Instead he played a club, and because Weinstein had thrown a heart Helgemo could now take four heart tricks, two clubs and a spade (you remember that spade at trick one?) - North-South plus 760.

Monaco, who had made a total of fifteen tricks as declarers in 1NT, won a total of 13 IMPs (and the Spingold) on a deal that started out as nothing. Levin and Weinstein, one of the best partnerships in the world, had run into an accident which started out to happen to somebody else.

The moral: sometimes disaster will strike your partnership because each of you in a difficult position will do something well-intentioned but inferior. Take courage - that happens even to Spingold finalists. The more important moral: don't be a double-dummy merchant. How many of you, looking at the hand records after an event, have told a partner or a teammate: 'It says here you could have made four hearts'?

It said there that North-South could not make 1NT, but somehow . . .

Basic Cardplay

The 'Tight Fist' Syndrome

THERE ARE various pitfalls in trump contracts that can trap the unwary. Perhaps one of the most common is the 'tight fist' syndrome when ruffing. We'll start with an easy example where brilliance in bidding may be eclipsed by a lapse in card-play. As South you do well to reach a grand slam in spades and West leads the two of diamonds:


Deal 1

South plays in 7♠.

West leads the ♦2.
♠ 8 6 3
♥ 8
♠ A J 8 7 6 4
♠ A K Q


A K Q J 10 7
♥ A 5 2
♠ 3
♠ 7 3 2

Count – Plan – Execute. There are eleven top tricks so, as declarer, you realise that you have to ruff the two heart losers on the table. So . . . win the ace of diamonds, play off the ace of hearts, ruff a heart, cross to hand with a trump, ruff a heart. We are down to:



If you now ruff a diamond to hand with the seven of spades West overruffs with the nine! One down. Is it unlucky that the diamonds break 5–1 and that West has the nine of spades? No, it's just bad play. You can afford to ruff that diamond with a high trump (the ace of spades for choice – if you've got it, flaunt it) and then draw trumps. Why ruff low? The only reason can be that you are too tight-fisted to 'waste' a top trump on the menial task of ruffing a low card. From the days of whist comes an appropriate aphorism: 'Don't send a boy on a man's errand.'

The same principle of ruffing high when you can afford to do so applies to ruffs in the dummy:




The defenders lead three rounds of clubs and try to cash the ace of diamonds, ruffed in the South hand. Now, plan the play from here. Count – Plan – Execute. The formula never varies.

You can see that you can ruff two heart losers in the dummy, so should play off the top hearts and lead another. Now, it is sheer carelessness to ruff the third heart with the two of spades. If East is also out of hearts he will overruff and the deal will be transferred to the archives of the Guinness Book of Butchered Contracts.

The hand is secure if declarer ruffs his two hearts with the eight of spades and the nine of spades as East will not be able to overruff.

This deal follows similar lines but is more subtle (we'll show all four hands for a change). West leads the king of spades against your contract of 4. How should you play?




As declarer you spot three obvious losers in spades and diamonds, so you should be able to see that you have to ruff your losing clubs in the dummy. Accordingly, after winning the spade lead with the ace of spades, you should cash the top clubs and ruff one in the dummy – but with which trump? As you are intending to ruff two clubs, you should ruff the first low club with the seven of hearts and the second with the ace of hearts. If you carelessly ruff the third round of clubs with the three of hearts, you will be overruffed with the lowly heart four and suffer an embarrassing defeat.

In detail, then, win the ace of spades, play off the ace and king of clubs, ruff a club with the seven of hearts, play the

three of hearts to hand, ruff the last club with the ace of hearts. That's six tricks and you have four top trumps to come.

Now, this principle can be extended to more difficult hands. I'm sure the editor has space to fit this one in . . . !



The defenders play off three rounds of diamonds, the last being ruffed by South. Now, to to be certain of making 4♥ you must ruff the two club losers in the dummy. So, king of clubs, ace of clubs, ruff a club... with what?

If you try the ten of hearts, then East just might be able to over-ruff with the jack of hearts and return a trump, leaving you with a club loser.

The defence has slipped badly by not leading trumps, you mustn't give them another chance. To be completely secure you must ruff the third round of clubs with the king of hearts, return to hand by cashing the ace of spades and ruffing a spade (actually, you ought to ruff that high as well) and ruff the last club with the ten of hearts. The defenders will make the jack of hearts at some time at their convenience but the power of your trump intermediates means that you can lose no other trick. Your losers are confined to two diamonds and a trump.

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
Down to the Wire

ONE HUNDRED and thirty-one teams entered the 2013 Crockfords Cup, the English open teams-of-four championship. Four rounds of knockout matches reduced the field to a very strong looking last sixteen. The fifth round, even with the longer 48board matches, produced some shock qualifiers for the eight-team final weekend. Christine Duckworth (Jane Moore, Gillian Fawcett, Brian Callaghan and Ian Payn) eliminated Jason Hackett's strong team. David Jones (Trevor Ward, Andrew Thompson, Rob Lawy, Patrick Jourdain, Tony Ratcliff) defeated Anita Sinclair's allinternational London outfit by a single IMP. Malcolm Oliver (Mike Leese, John Collin, Steve Wood) took out Janet de Botton's cosmopolitan squad. The final match drawn by the EBU computer was a delight for everyone else involved: Alexander Allfrey vs Nick Irens. Allfrey had pipped Irens on the last deal to win the 2012 Crockfords but 2013 was different. Irens beat the holders to join Brian Senior, Chris Jagger, Paul Hackett, Peter Hawkes and the others in the final.

It was *Hawkes's* largely Berkshire team which led with two matches to go, but their remaining matches were against closest pursuers, *Irens* and *Hackett*. This explosive deal severely dented their chances:



When East pre-empted with a vigorous 4♦ over 1♠, Zia Mahmood (South for *Irens*) simply jumped to 6♠ to give West a problem. Saving in 7♦ looks normal. Dummy is bound to be void in one of the minors, West is looking at nothing in the majors and can't expect much help from partner in defence.

But pass worked fine. Faced with a guess for the VQ for his contract, David Bakhshi (North) understandably placed West with this defensive asset to justify his decision to defend rather than sacrifice. One down. Not as expensive a view as it might have been, as this is how the action unfolded at the other table:

West	North	East	South

The key to the auction was my partner Espen Erichsen's 5♣ bid on the way to 5♠. With the double fit established, we had no thoughts of defending below the seven-level. The double of 6♣ with nothing in that suit was a definite mistake, and South may still be asking himself why he led a spade, not the ♥A. It wasn't too hard to ruff, cross to the ♠A and pick up North's trumps to make the doubled slam.

So *Hawkes* lost 23-7 VP to *Irens* to make a close three-way finish with *Hackett* who had beaten *Jagger* 17-13 VP. The boards were generally forgettable but this deal was critical:



In *Hackett vs Hawkes* South's weak 2♥ opener went for 400 (four off undoubled) and 500 (two off doubled) for 3 IMPs to *Hackett. Jones* also collected 400 the hard way against Zia Mahmood's pre-empt. Could *Irens* collect a big penalty at the other table to clinch the trophy?

No, Patrick Jourdain soberly passed

throughout with the South hand and watched Erichsen make 1NT plus two. This held *Irens* to 19 VPs in the last match, not enough as the Anglo-Irish *Hackett* syndicate swept home with 22 VP to take home the cup on a split-tie.

My last deal comes from the first match of the final weekend:

Anticipating a more balanced hand in dummy (because West had not made a splinter raise) Dublin's Tom Hanlon for *Hackett* chanced his arm with the ♥2 lead. East played low from dummy and the ♥Q won the first trick. Hanlon won the heart return and exited with a diamond. Declarer still had hopes of making his contract by drawing trumps, eliminating the red suits and endplaying a defender with his singleton or doubleton club honour to give a ruff-and-discard. But it was much too late in the day to catch Paul Hackett, North, napping. The ♣K was dumped under the ace and that was one down.

The final result was:

- (on tie-break) Paul Hackett, Tom Hanlon, Peter Lester, Hugh McGann, Ian Panto 133 VPs.
- Nick Irens, Espen Erichsen, Tom Townsend, Zia Mahmood, David Bakhshi 133 VPs.
- 3. Peter Hawkes, Tim Rees, Ian Reissmann, John Howard, Mike Perkins, Andy Bowles 117 VPs. □

Ask Jeremy

Matters of Disclosure

This is Jeremy Dhondy's last Laws column and we owe him a very big thank you for making the Laws intelligible as well as entertaining – no mean feat! – for so long.

The column, however, will continue (see bottom of the page) so please keep your questions coming.

English Bridge and the EBU are not responsible if the information in the letters is incorrect or incomplete.

KEN DAVIES asks: I partner a stranger. We agree to keep it simple. Acol, weak no-trump, Stayman, transfers and Blackwood. Our opponents join us, then partner asks if we are to use a strict 12-14 HCP, or use judgement. I reply that we open a good 11-HCP with strong intermediates and downgrade 15 HCP with nine small cards. RHO says you now have an agreement and defenders cannot reliably count your hand if you announce 12-14 ergo defenders will be disadvantaged. What should my answer be?

What you must disclose is your agreement. It sounds to me as if you have a view about what you think you should do when you are just outside the range and many would agree with your assessment. If you open, for example, 20% or more of your no-trump bids outside the published range (and we all know that Milton Work Count is far from perfect), then you are not telling your opponents the whole story. Personally, I would ignore your opponents who sound like barrackroom lawyers from your description but if I played in a regular partnership and opened quite a few 11-counts (which for some reason upsets people more than the possibility of you having a 15 count), I might say '12-14, occasionally 11' or something similar. It's all in the presentation!

The most relevant thing is whether your partner acts as if it is 12-14 when raising and does not allow discussion or previous experience to let him pass marginal raises. If so, then it is hard to criticise what you have decided to do. If he allows for the fact that you may have 11 and does not mention this when announcing the range, then the level of disclosure is not sufficient.

DAVID FAIRBARIN writes: I request your opinion on the following auction.

West	North	East	South
2♦1	Pass	2 ♠ ²	3♦

- ¹ Weak, any 6-card suit,
- 2 16+ points and asking for partner's suit.
 2♥ would have been a relay with fewer than 16 points.

When dummy tabled his hand, it held only 12 points. South, my partner, called the Director, and I pointed out that she was prevented from bidding again in the belief that East-West had a minimum of 22 points.

The Director ruled that the score should stand. No-one argued with this; however, this use of 2♠ (Psyche? Misbid? Irregularity?) seems a cheap ploy which only stands to gain, since partner is bound to bid his six-carder, unknowingly fielding the bid. The 2♠ bidder can pass, and has smugly misled opponents.

I would appreciate your comments on this use of this 2♠ bid holding only 12 points, and whether you would have any words for East-West and their bidding in future?

The first question I would ask as a tournament director is why East-West believed this to be a permitted method. Assuming your club allows anything at Level 4, then playing the bid as 'weak only' is fine and choosing any two suits is also fine (i.e. it does not have to be a traditional Multi with hearts or spades, it could be spades or clubs but any of the four suits is *not* allowable in normal club bridge).

So perhaps the hand should not have come to what followed; however, to answer your general point . . .

If this were a one off and the agreement really was 16+, I would take no action because what East has done is psyched. If South is fixed by this then that is life.

If it is something that happens regularly, then West's description of the system bid needs amending to something like 16+ but he has been known to have fewer non-vulnerable.

If West's bid allows for this while explaining it as 16+, then I might take action against West for fielding the misbid. If, for example West had a maximum for his 2♦ bid, I would want to know why he bid only 3♥ and what calls such as Pass or Double would be, or bids such as 4♦ or 4♥ might be. The hand in the pass-out seat might also want to ask some of these questions to determine what is going on, but not doing so does not allow East-West off the hook.

I do believe that doing it on a 12-count is peculiar. If you want to psyche, then a weaker hand would be much more suitable.

Stage 2 Conventions

Leaping and Non-Leaping Michaels

FURTHER TO my article developing modern ideas on the use of Lebensohl continuations when defending against Weak Two bids and the Multi 2 (April 2013 issue, pages 22-23), I thought we would look at Leaping Michaels as a defence to two-level openings (Weak Twos and the Multi) and also consider non-Leaping Michaels against three-level pre-emptive bids.

Leaping Michaels

These are terrific bids to have in your armoury. They are highly descriptive, very effective but, just as importantly, enormous fun to play!

The basic idea is to play as follows:

Over a weak 2♦ opener:

3♦ = Asks for a stopper for no-trumps 3♥/3♠ = Natural and strong

(six cards, 16-18 HCP)

4♣ = Clubs + major (at least 5-5) 4♦ = Both majors (at least 5-5)

Over a weak 2♥ opener:

3♥ = Asks for a stopper
3♠ = Natural and strong
4♠ = Clubs + spades
(at least 5-5)

4♦ = Diamonds + spades
(at least 5-5)

Over a weak 2♠ opener:

3♠ = Asks for a stopper 4♠ = Clubs + hearts (at least 5-5) 4♦ = Diamonds + hearts

(at least 5-5)

Over a Multi 2♦ opener:

 $3 \clubsuit / 3 ♦$ = Natural $3 \checkmark / 3 \spadesuit$ = Natural and strong,

at least six cards

4♣ = Clubs + major (at least 5-5) 4♦ = Diamonds + major

(at least 5-5)

The principle is that you can 'leap' to a Michaels-style bid at the four level. These bids *guarantee* at least 5-5 in the two suits shown. Since they commit the partnership to the four level by deliberate choice, a good hand is needed, typically four or five losers at most. The current trend is to play the bids as *almost* forcing (95% or so, anyway).

As with normal Michaels cue-bids, I recommend that you *do not use* the bid when holding a *strong* six-card major, as it makes reaching the best contract so much more difficult.

Hand A is a typical example (absolute minimum in my opinion):

Hand A

♠ A K J 10 5

▼ 3

♦ K Q J 8 2

♠ 4 3

Over 2♥ (weak) you can bid 4♦ to show the two suits immediately. This would reserve the cue-bid to ask for a stopper, so with Hand B:

Hand B

♠ A 5

▼ 3 2

♦ A 8

♠ A K Q 7 6 4 2

You could bid 3♥ over the opponent's opening 2♥ bid to ask for a heart stopper with no fear that partner would interpret it as a Michaels cue-bid.

Responding to Leaping Michaels

Typically what you do is to 'choose' to play in either of partner's known two suits. Very rarely you might decide to pass – and I must stress the 'very' in 'very rarely'!

Given that the Leaping Michaels bid shows a really good hand, the partner of the 'leaper' can sometimes make an immediate slam try either via a cue-bid of the opponent's suit or Roman Key-Card Blackwood etc. In order to avoid ambiguity, I would play that RKCB agrees the suit just bid by the 'leaper', e.g. in the following auction:

West North East South
2♥ 4♦¹ Pass 4NT²

- ¹ Diamonds and spades
- ² Roman Key-Card Blackwood

RKCB is for diamonds rather than spades.

Non-Leaping Michaels

If you do start playing these methods, it is very rewarding – not to mention quite logical – to play non-Leaping Michaels as well. These bids apply when the opponents have opened at the three level. Thus:

Over 3♣:

4♣ = Both majors 4♦ = Diamonds + major

Over 3♦:

 $4 \clubsuit = \text{Clubs} + \text{major}$ $4 \spadesuit = \text{Both majors}$

Over 3**V**:

4♣ = Clubs + spades 4♦ = Diamonds + spades

Over 3♠:

4♣ = Clubs + hearts 4♦ = Diamonds + hearts

Since you are not jumping, I suggest the need for such a good hand (as was the case for Leaping Michaels, discussed earlier) is not so strong. For example, with Hand C:



This hand might well chance 4♦ over a 3♠ bid from the opposition. The bid is now not remotely close to being forcing.

Adding non-Leaping Michaels to your repertoire does not impact significantly on your traditional approach to dealing with pre-empts. Thus doubles, overcalls at

the three level and bidding no-trumps, all remain the same - it is just the four-level overcalls that are affected.

However, an issue remains with hands which might previously have wanted to overcall naturally at the four level in a minor, e.g. with a hand such as Hand D:

Hand D **♠** A 5

Y 2

♦ K74

♣ AQJ7542

Over 3♥ be careful! You cannot now bid 4♣ as it shows clubs and spades. Your options therefore are to pass, jump to 5♣, or occasionally have a bash at 3NT

(you will need a stopper in the opponent's suit, of course!).

Further Treatments

Just for completeness, I recommend the following:

Over 3♣/**♦**:

4♥/4♠ = Natural

Over 3\(\forall\):

= Game-forcing two-suiter (spades + minor)

= Natural

4NT = Minor two-suiter

Over 3♠:

= Huge two-suiter 4♠

(hearts + minor)

4NT = Minor two-suiter

So there you have it. Try these methods out, and let me know whether you enjoy them.

Answers to June Problems

Pick your lead out of: (a) a spade; (b) \forall K; (c) \blacklozenge 7; (d) \clubsuit 8.

- (a) A spade: 3 marks. This will only be right if declarer needs to take a lot of ruffs. It may work but is heavily odds-against in my opinion.
- (b) ♥K: 7 marks. Nobody can criticise you for leading from a K-Q-J combination until now! This more or less needs the hearts 2-2-2 around the table for it to matter and so, while it is probably safe, you have a much better lead available.
- (c) ightharpoonup 7: 1 mark. This is just insulting partner, who did not bid 4
 ightharpoonup 6 to see you lead a diamond.
- (d) ♣8: 10 marks. The indicated lead. Partner has bid clubs and even if you do not play that as lead directional, surely it is the right lead. Here partner had made a very good bid on ♠ Qx ♥ xxx ♠ xxxx ♣ AKJx. Dummy had Q-x-x-x of clubs so four rounds of clubs promoted a trump trick and was the only way to beat the contract.



Pick your lead out of: (a) ♥A; (b) ♥2; (c) ♦J; (d) a club.

- (a) ♥A: 9 marks. North has bid very strongly and clearly thinks they can make 6♠. Thus you will need to cash two tricks quickly, or cash a trick and hope for another one. Hence the ♥A gets good marks and you can decide what to do after seeing dummy. It is not quite as good however as . . .
- (b) \checkmark 2: 10 marks. Either North has taken a flyer with two or more low hearts or North will have the king, so a low heart to try and induce a misguess seems a good shot. I do *not* lead the ten as I do not want partner ducking the queen. At the table any heart would work as North had indeed taken a flyer on \bigstar KQJx \checkmark xx \bigstar AKQJxx and partner had the K-Q!

- (c) ◆J: 3 marks. Can this really be the right lead? Unless the opposition cannot count, partner does not have the ◆A and so to set up a trick you need partner to have bid 5◆ with only three and you need them 3-2-2 around the table. All very unlikely.
- (d) A club: 2 marks. In my view this is just too likely to be North's second suit to make it a viable option.

Pick your lead out of: (a) a spade; (b) ♥2; (c) ♦2; (d) ♣3.

- (a) A spade: 1 mark. Why are you leading around into declarer's trumps allowing declarer to make cheap trump tricks?
- (b) ♥2: 4 marks. Usually you want to try and set up tricks. But here there are more important concerns. At the table declarer had a singleton heart and was able to ruff hearts.
- (c) ◆2: 10 marks. The auction has gone very well for you but you must be careful. There is such a thing as too many trumps. If you become trump bound, you will end up ruffing partner's winners and leading into declarer's trump tenaces. It is vital you reduce your trump length, so the singleton lead it is.
- (d) ♣3: 6 marks. This suffers from the same problems as the heart lead, but not as badly.


Benito Garozzo Returns

Mixed Pairs

THE 2013 European Open Championships in Ostend began with a Mixed Pairs. Several England participants reached the final: Sally Brock and Barry Myers (finishing 12th), William Frisby partnered by Austria's Eva Caplan (34th), Nevena Senior and Nick Sandqvist (39th), Jenny Cooper partnered by Tim Rees of Wales (49th), also Catherine Seale and Thomas Paske (52nd).

There was interest in the bidding and the play on this deal from the final:

East opened a Multi and West's 2♥ was to play opposite a Weak Two in hearts. What would you say as North when partner rebids 2♠? Some Norths passed. At the table where I was watching, North leapt to 4♠! Catherine D'Ovidio's 3♠ looks exactly right. Phillipe Cronier suggested 3NT as the final spot and that ended the auction.

West led the ♥8 and East very reasonably played the ♥10, to preserve communications. Declarer, who had been fearing ♥A and a club switch, claimed eleven tricks for a fine 76% score. The result was the same for all the declarers in 3NT.

Suppose East is super-human and rises with the ♥A, switching to the ♣4. What should declarer do then? Since East cannot hold the ♣A or he would be too strong for a Weak Two, declarer should play the ♣2. West can take the ♣Q and ♣A but the club suit will then be blocked. Declarer will at least pick up +400, salvaging a 16% score.

Rosenn Gunev and Desislava Popova of Bulgaria took gold (57.55%); France's Sylvie Willard and Marc Bompis claimed the silver (57.27%); Netsy Sayer (Turkey) and Zahari Zahariev (Bulgaria) won bronze (56.45%).

Mixed Teams

The second event was the Mixed Teams. The *Troll* team (Helen and Espen Erichsen, playing with Norway's Tonje and Boye Brogeland) flew the English flag. They finished fourth after thirteen rounds of Swiss Teams, qualifying for the bronze medal match. There was some great bidding on this spectacular deal:

Boye's 5♥ was a cue-bid, inviting a grand slam. Tonje, who had already done her bit by bidding 5♦ on a modest hand, signed

off in 6♦. When Peter Schaltz sacrificed in 7♣, Boye took the opportunity to make a forcing pass – showing first-round club control and inviting a grand slam for a second time. Tonje could then place him with good diamonds, the major-suit aces and a club void. She bid 7♦, completing a wonderful auction, and there were no problems in the play.

Sadly for them, there were no IMPs in the plus column either. At the other table the bidding from Peter Fredin and Nadia Bekkouche was equally impressive:

In the match for the gold and silver medals, South played in 6♦ at one table. This was the auction at the other table:



South opened with a strong 1♣. West made a (lead-directing) Lightner Double of 6♠, hoping to receive a diamond ruff followed by a club trick Two possible drawbacks of the Lightner Double were exhibited on the same deal. Firstly, East held five hearts and only three diamonds, so therefore chose a heart as the opening lead. Secondly, there would have been no second trick even after a diamond lead.

The gold medals went to Netherlands-Austria (Huub Bertens, Marion Michielsen, Jovi Smederevac, Ricco van Prooijen, Martine Verbeek and Sascha Wernle), beating the silver medallists Austria (Iris Grümm, Arno Lindermann, Martin Shifko and Terry Weigkricht). The Danish Schaltz team edged out Troll by 61-47 IMPs and claimed the bronze medal.

Women's Teams

China 1 (Xuefeng Feng, Wen Fei Wang, Liping Wang, Yu Zhang) and the Dutch Women (Carla Arnolds, Jet Pasman, Anneke Simons, Wietske van Zwol) reached the final of the Women's Teams. This deal produced the largest swing:

What action would you have taken as South? Would you double or bid 4♠?

Carla Arnolds's double was passed and ten tricks could not be prevented. North led the ♠9, South winning and switching to a club. (If she delivers a spade ruff instead, declarer throws her diamond loser on the ♠J.)


Wen Fei Wang preferred to bid $4\triangle$ and, after two passes, East chose to double. With a heart trick no certainty, this was a dubious action. (It takes a heart lead to put the spade game one down.) Wen Fei Wang made the inspired decision to move to $5\triangle$! This was passed out and made with an overtrick. The double game swing gave 15 IMPs to *China 1*, who went on to win the final 94-44. *Italia I* took the bronze.

Seniors Teams

Sweden took gold (Peter Billgren, Sven-Olov Flodqvist, Mats Pettersson and Björn Sanzen), with teams from Austria and Italy claiming silver and bronze.

Open Teams

The main event was the Open Teams. The 85-year-old Benito Garozzo, a member of the Italian *Blue Team* that won 16 world titles between 1957 and 1975, played wonderfully well when I watched him in the semi-final against *Groupe France*:

Instead of raising to 4♥, Garozzo bid a lead-directing 4♠. (3♠ would have the same meaning on a hand worth 3♥.) Romain Zaleski, his 80-year-old partner, continued the good work with 4♠. When North took the push to 5♠, Garozzo was then able to find the diamond lead! Back

came a club for a ruff. One down.

This was the bidding at the other table:

Riccardo Intonti's 4♠ allowed no space for lead-directing mechanisms. The contract was made on a heart lead.

Garozzo's *Breno* team reached the final and the veteran maestro handed over a 31-7 IMPs lead at half-time, when another pair stepped in. The Polish opponents then overtook *Breno* and won by 8 IMPs (including a 6-IMP fine for Zaleski's mobile phone ringing!). Gold went to Krzysztof Jassem, Marcin Mazurkiewicz, Piotr Gawrys, Piotr Tuszynski, Pawel Jassem and Jakub Wojcieszek. Israel-Germany took bronze.

Open, Women's and Seniors' Pairs

In the Open Pairs Sabine Auken and Roy Welland took gold, Jan Jansma and Zia Mahmood the silver, and Nils Kvangraven and Terje Lie the bronze.

The Women's Pairs gold went to Catherine D'Ovidio and Janice Seamon-Molson, silver to Marion Michielsen and Meike Wortel, and bronze to Véronique Bessis and Carole Puillet.

Senior medals went to Nick Fitzgibbon and Adam Mesbur (gold), Michael Elinescu and Entscho Wladow (silver), and Stephan Cabaj and Wlodzimierz Ilnicki (bronze).

Blue Point Bridge Holidays

WE ARE pleased to be offering five EBU Blue Point Bridge Holiday events in 2014. This is in response to the demand from members for a more social and friendly play environment with national ranking point awards. The national Green Point tournaments are serious bridge events which can be a little intimidating at first. We hope that these Blue Point holidays can either be a stepping stone towards those competitions or simply a fun bridge holiday. As such, they are not intended for seasoned bridge congress-goers: they are aimed primarily at those who are below a Jack in the NGS and below the rank of Regional Master – but these are just guidelines, not absolute limits. There is no lower limit but you will need to be comfortable with your ability to play at a respectable pace and without referring to notes. If you are unsure, do not hesitate to contact us for more guidance.

Bridge Overseas has been assisting the EBU with venue selection and accommodation successfully for some time, and will be the booking agents for these holidays. You will be able to use the Accommodation Booking Service (ABS) already in place. A free phone number (0800 0346 246) is available and you will be able to discuss your bookings with advisers who have been to the hotels in question and will help you with your travel requirements. The locations on offer also boast golf, spa and bowling, as well as interesting local excursions. The bridge will be directed by Tournament Directors approved by the EBU.

All bridge fees are included in the total price of the holiday, but you must be a member of the EBU. You may join the EBU in order to book one of these holidays, either by joining an affiliated bridge club, or on payment of the direct annual membership fee of £26.

Blue Points

Blue Points were introduced by the EBU at the start of 2013, for those members who don't go to the larger EBU events where Green Points are awarded, to help them get on the master-point ladder and start progressing through the master-point ranks. The way they work is that they have the same value as Local Points and Green Points, but they can be used in place of Green Points for ranks that require them, in the ratio of 3 Blue Points = 1 Green Point, up to a maximum of 50 Green Points. For example, you would be able to reach Premier Regional Master rank entirely with Blue Points, or with a combination of Blues and Greens, but will require some Greens as well as Blues for higher ranks.

These EBU Blue Point Bridge Holidays are the only bridge holidays that will be able to issue Blue Points.

Bridge Programme & Venues

There will be seven sessions of duplicate bridge starting on the first evening after your welcome drink and evening meal. Bridge will be played each morning and evening leaving the afternoon free to enjoy the hotel's facilities or the local area. Afternoon seminars will be offered and details of these will be available nearer the time.

NICKO DEADLINE

THE NICKO, as the National Inter-club Knock Out is affectionately acronymised, is probably the most popular of all EBU tournaments, with around 300 teams entering annually. The Green-pointed NICKO is open to all fully affiliated EBU bridge clubs. The early rounds are of just 24 boards, increasing to 32 boards for the quarter-finals and semi-finals and 48 boards for the final, with the draw regionalised so as to reduce travelling.

All players must be members of the registering clubs.

There is no limit to the number of teams any one club can enter, so why not get together with your regular partner and a couple of team-mates from your club and ask your club secretary to enter your team for the NICKO?

New for 2013: the seeding will be based on Gold Points for the top teams (probably 32). Seeded teams will be exempt from the first two rounds and will be ineligible for the Plate competition.

Deadline for entries: 20th September 2013.

CROCKFORDS DEADLINE

THE CROCKFORDS Cup is the prize at stake for England's premier competition for teams of four. The competition consists of five rounds of knock-out matches played privately, qualifying eight teams to contest an all-play-all final. **Note: for the first time,** this will take place in September, on 6th-7th, 2014. This is a Green-pointed event.

The last eight from the Crockfords Plate will play alongside the main final (same dates, venue and format).

Deadline for entries: 26th September 2013.

GARDEN CITIES TROPHY

CONGRATULATIONS TO the Coventry and North Warwickshire Bridge Club for winning the 2013 Garden Cities Trophy for club teams of eight. Winning six out of seven matches they finished a comfortable 13 VPs ahead of second-placed Sheffield. Cheltenham were third.

The team comprised Roger Bryant, Ian Handley, David Kenward, Gareth Roberts, Martin Jones, Stephen Green, Garry Watson and Nick Stevens.

PACHABO CUP

GOOD LUCK TO OUR TEAMS AT THE WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

A short introduction to the events and our representative teams

THE 41st World Bridge Team Championships will be played in Bali on September 16-29 (watch them on Bridge Base Online!). The two main events are the Bermuda Bowl for Open Teams (the oldest and most prestigious event in bridge, held for the first time in 1950 in Bermuda) and the Venice Cup (a more recent, but no less prestigious event, first held in 1974 in Venice) for Women's Teams. Qualification to either event is by zones which, as regards Europe, means that teams, selected by their respective national bridge authorities, must come in the top six at the preceding European Teams Championship (this time, it was the 2012 event held in Dublin). The last time England qualified for the Bermuda Bowl was in 2005; our Women qualified more recently, in 2011. The World Teams Championships are held every odd-numbered year.

WOMEN'S TEAM

This is the same team that won the European Women's Teams Championships in Dublin and then went on to win the World Mind Sports Women's Bridge Teams Championships in Lille last year.

Our Women's Team is one of the strongest ever, with several world titles under their belts. All six are ranked in the Top 50 by the World Bridge Federation. Heather Dhondy, Nevena Senior, Nicola Smith and Sally Brock are all bridge professionals, though Sally also works as a typesetter. Susan Stockdale works as a director of a company that markets and distributes products to the animal healthcare sector; Fiona Brown works in a pharmacy.

As is by now well known, our women have a team ritual: they don't sit at the bridge table before putting on a few drops of lavender oil to keep the bad spirits away. It obviously works well for them!

Jeremy Dhondy, a retired school-teacher, is well known to *English Bridge* readers from his popular Laws column. He will choose the line-up, check the scores, ensure the right players turn up in time, and generally run around double-checking there are no glitches. Coach David Burn, a bridge professional, will lend his strong shoulders and an amazing bridge knowledge in support.

As the bridge correspondent for the *Times*, *English Bridge* columnist and sought-after bridge teacher and lecturer, Andrew Robson needs no introduction. His partner, Alexander Allfrey, is a psychotherapist and occasional bridge teacher. Together, they have dominated the national English bridge teams scene for some time.

When Allfrey and Robson, for family reasons, had to pull out of the European Championships in Dublin last year, David Bakhshi and Tom Townsend replaced them at short notice and played an important part in qualifying for the Bermuda Bowl in Bali. David is a professional bridge player and teacher; he is the first Brit to win a major US pairs title, the Silodor Open Pairs, in 2013, since Forrester won the same event in 1998. Tom Townsend was in the team that won the Junior World Championship in 1995 in Bali – so that's a good omen!

Telegraph bridge correspondent and most-capped England player, Tony Forrester is another England star who needs little introduction. His partner, David Gold, was not even born when Tony started dominating the English game. David is now a full-time bridge pro with several major international successes to his name, and is one of only three English players ranked in the Top 100 by the WBF.

Simon Cope, the young bridge pro who captained our Open team at the European Teams Championships in Dublin last year, will again be the non-playing captain. Ben Green, a management consultant and bridge professional who was coach to our Open team in Dublin, will once again fulfil this demanding role.

Our teams thank all those players and clubs who supported them by taking part in the Bridge England Sim Pairs, enabling them to enjoy better training facilities and go to Bali.

LAWS & ETHICS UPDATE

THE L&E has reviewed its publications and published new editions online effective from August 1st.

The new publications are:

- 1. **The Blue Book:** This replaces the Orange and Tangerine Books and is half the length of the previous Orange Book. There were sufficient different versions of the Orange Book floating around that a decision was made to have a clean break and a new colour.
- The White Book: This is about fifty pages shorter than the previous version. It contains some material transferred from the old Orange Book and is aimed at Tournament Directors, Clubs and Organisers.

My thanks go to all the volunteers who have commented on, contributed to, and proofread our new publications.

What are the Major Changes Affecting Players?

1. Announcements: These have been extended, so that you will now announce a natural 2NT opening (by saying the range) and the responses of 3♣ (assuming it is normal four-card Stayman) and 3♦/3♥ (assuming they are transfers). The pattern will be the same as for a 1NT announcement. It won't apply to overcalls, again exactly like the scheme relating to 1NT openings.

The second change is announcing short minor-suit openings. If 1♣ or 1♦ can be two, one or no cards, then you will announce by saying e.g. 'May be two'. The reason for this extension is because a lot more people are playing five-card majors with a short club than were when announcements started. If 1♣ is strong, forcing and artificial – a Precision 1♣ for example – then it will continue to be alerted.

2. **Alerting:** There are minor changes to alerting over the level of 3NT. You will now alert any suit bid on the first round of the auction so that in auctions such as 1NT – Pass – 4♥ showing spades, as well as 2♥ Weak from the opposition – 4♣ (overcall, showing clubs and spades) the 4♥ and 4♣ bids will now be alerted. Although you can ask when

such bids are made against you, you may give some of your hand away to opponents or put partner in a tough position. If you don't ask, there is no reasonable way of knowing. We already alert opening bids above 3NT, so the regulation will become alerting any suit bid on the first round (there is a definition of this to ensure that if we alert 1NT – Pass – 4♥ we will also alert Pass – Pass – 1NT – Pass – $4 \checkmark$). We are not going back to alerting Blackwood.

- 3. Regulations for opening strong artificial two-of-a-suit bids: No change.
- 4. **Alerting of doubles:** No change.
- Level 3: Scrapped. No EBU tournaments have been held for some time using this level. For clubs who have used this level and wish to continue to play something simpler, the Blue Book includes a short list of agreements which might be excluded for a simpler game. Clubs, of course, are free to determine their own regulations for agreements, although the vast majority prefer to stick to a published level.
- 6. **Agreements:** There are some minor amendments to what is allowed. This is tidying up for greater consistency and clarity rather than a substantial change.

The new White Book also includes a revised victory point scale for teams events which applies to all EBU-run events from September 1st onwards. Counties and Clubs are likely to wish to switch to this sooner rather than later. The common scales are in the diary and on the EBU website. There is also, on the website, a facility to enter any number of boards so a scale can be determined for matches of an unusual length. The change results from the World Bridge Federation introducing a new scale for its events, which the EBU has decided to follow. In a standard Swiss Teams match of, say, seven boards, the amount needed to obtain a 20-0 score will rise from 30 to 36 IMPs. There are also scales which include decimal places but these will only be used initially for such events as trials and international (Jeremy Dhondy) matches.

The New Rules

RE. THE Laws and Ethics report in your June issue, it was pleasing to note that those responsible for such things do sometimes take notice of feedback, and hence that, for example, the announcing and alerting rules will be standardised for 1NT and 2NT openings.

However, one despairs at some of the things those same people do. In particular, getting rid of Level 3 – just because no EBU tournaments are held at that level – is entirely symptomatic of the EBU's thinking. If you don't play in EBU tournaments, congresses, etc. we are not interested in you.

A large number of ordinary players do not play in such tournaments, but they do play at one or two, or perhaps even several, different clubs where 'ordinary' conventions are used and which operate at Level 3. Such clubs use Level 3 to avoid members who wish to play serious but enjoyable bridge being baffled by the clever clogs who enjoy the esoteric conventions permitted at higher levels. 'EBU News' says: 'Some clubs still use [Level 3]' but every club at which I play does so!

Is it really the EBU's intention that every club must now presumably poll its members in order to decide which bits of Level 4 are to be removed? Are ordinary members then really expected to remember which of the clubs at which they play

Jeremy Dhondy, Chairman of the L&E Committee, replies: The L&E considered valuable feedback from individuals and groups such as the National Club Committee. In the matter of Level 3 we are, of course, aware that not all are tournament players and that different levels are needed for different groups hence Level 2 for inexperienced players. Many clubs play Level 4 but some don't wish to. Although clubs are free to do as they wish in this respect, many don't wish to reinvent the wheel and it isn't all that desirable that different methods are played in clubs as that makes life difficult both for visitors and those who visit other clubs. I doubt many members actually care provided it is a level playing field and the allowed agreements are not too bizarre.

If clubs prefer their members to be protected from some of the elements of Level 4, then the new Blue Book has a list of agreements that may be omitted for a more restrictive game. It is significantly shorter than what was in the last edition and this reflects most people's desire for briefer and less intrusive regulation where possible, hence a book of 32 not 72 pages! If I were on the club committee I would either adopt Level 4 or, if my members preferred that this was not so, adopt the restrictions mentioned in the new book.

RECENTLY the Daily Telegraph letters column included a piece of marriage guidance which applies equally well to bridge partnerships. It is in the form of verse attributed to Ogden Nash: 'To keep your marriage brimming with love from the loving cup / When you're wrong admit it. When you're right shut up.'



Mislaid Plans

WHEN PLAYING as declarer, one of the most important habits to develop involves effective planning. This requires a degree of counting, and a level of anticipation about the likely developments over the first couple of tricks.

Choosing the Best Suit to Develop in No-trump Contracts

First, consider some no-trump planning, as in Example A:



You are South, the declarer in a 3NT contract. West leads the two of spades. How should you plan the play?


Mistakes People Make: Taking Unnecessary Risks

It is a good habit to begin by counting your certain winners (top tricks). If you fail to count your winners, you might be tempted to choose diamonds as your best source of tricks. You start with seven top tricks – two spades, one diamond and four clubs. While playing on diamonds could allow you to make an overtrick if they split evenly, your contract will now be at risk if they split 3-1. Say you play the ace of diamonds followed by the five. The defenders

can win and continue spades. Whether you now lose a second diamond trick or turn to hearts, the defenders can potentially win two spades, one heart and two diamonds to defeat your game.

However, starting out with seven winners means that you only require two more tricks, and these can be guaranteed by forcing out the ace of hearts immediately. You will not have any chance of making an overtrick if the defenders continue spades, but your contract will be secure.

Now consider Example B:



Once again you are South, the declarer in 3NT and West leads the two of spades. How should you plan the play?

Mistakes People Make: Failing to Draw Inferences

This time you only have one stopper in spades, so it is tempting to win the ace of spades, cross to the ten of clubs and lead the three of diamond to the jack hoping to find your left-hand opponent with the king of diamonds. If the finesse succeeds, you will make at least three diamond tricks without losing the lead. However, this approach will also lead to defeat if it is your right-hand opponent who holds the

diamond king. Does this represent the best chance of success?


Assuming that your opponents are playing 'fourth highest' leads, then it is still safer to attack hearts immediately. Why is this? You begin with seven top tricks – one spade, one diamond and five clubs, so can again make two winners by force in hearts. This might seem risky once the ace of spades has been played, but will only lead to defeat if spades do not divide 4-4. West's lead of the two of spades is consistent with a four-card holding, in which case the safest approach is to force out the ace of hearts rather than finessing diamonds.

Suit-contract Planning

Counting winners is still a good habit to develop, but it is often a good idea to also count your potential losers when planning a trump contract. This is particularly important when assessing whether to draw trumps immediately or not.

Mistakes People Make: Mis-timing Trump Plays

Consider Example C:



Once again you are South, but this time ⇒

When did you start playing bridge? In 1960, while studying for my Chartered Accountant exams.

prefer narrative to text-book style. I also recommend the monthly Bridge World; it's first class.

What are your hobbies?

Reading, cricket, horse racing and bridge!

What do you like and what would you change in bridge?

Bridge has given me great pleasure so there is not much that I would change. However, the problem of presenting the game on television has reduced sponsorship and stopped new and young recruits. Therefore I think that the EBU should cosset their old-age members! As regards the future of the game, internet bridge is possibly a huge growth area.

What's the bridge success (so far) closest to your heart?

The silver medal I won with Paul Hackett in the 1995 European Pairs championship in Rome.

⇒ you are the declarer in a 4♥ contract. West leads the king of diamonds. How should you plan the play?

Counting your winners, you would see three spades and one diamond. Five extra tricks can be made through length in trumps and a further trick can be made by ruffing a club in the dummy. It may therefore seem natural to win the first trick with the ace of diamonds and start drawing trumps. While this would lead to ten winners given time, the defenders will first have the chance to win four tricks - one heart, one diamond and two clubs. Given that it will be necessary to lose the lead in

hearts, it is important to first consider how many potential losers declarer has at this point. Once you have noted the possibility of losing four tricks, it is essential to consider ways of disposing of a potential loser before losing the lead. If declarer first plays on spades, there is the small risk that the defenders will ruff in, but if spades divide no worse than 5-3, you can cash the ace of spades, then cross to the king of spades and cash the spade queen, throwing the two of diamonds. Having discarded the potential diamond loser, it is now safe to lead trumps, as the defenders can now win just one heart and two clubs.

Opening Leads

Clues from the Bidding

SITTING WEST, on lead to 3NT, what would be your choice with the following collection?

★ 84 **7** 7 6 3 ♦ K | 8 7 ♣ K852

'Hold on, what about the bidding?' vou exclaim. Well, that is the point of this article. The bidding almost always provides clues -

some subtle, some fairly obvious. So let us consider this uncontested auction:

North	South	
	1♦	
1♠	1NT	
2NT	3NT	
Pass		

There are some (hopefully, not many) whose choice would be completely unaffected by the auction and who would have the ♦7 on the table, almost before the final pass has been made, in the firm belief that 'fourth highest of longest and strongest' is the answer to all lead problems. This might prove effective but because of the opening bid many would prefer a club.

My choice, however, after considering the bidding, would be a heart. I would lead the ♥7 (top of nothing) or the ♥6 (second from bad suits), depending on partnership agreement, to ensure that partner can interpret the lead.

In general, there are two main strategies that the defenders might adopt:

- Passive, to avoid giving declarer any free gifts.
- Attacking, to cash winners or set them up before it is too late.


The opening lead should be chosen with the appropriate strategy in mind. A successful lead will be in accordance with it, although occasionally there might be enough time to change tack. Often the correct plan can be inferred from the bidding.

What are the clues on the featured hand and auction?

- The opponents do not have a surplus of high-card points (opener can pass 2NT with a minimum).
- 2. Moreover, it is probable, but not certain, that their hands are fairly balanced.
- 3. West's diamond holding is likely to make it difficult for declarer to develop tricks in this suit.
- 4. It is probable that partner's spades will stop declarer from developing that suit as well.

All things considered, it would appear that declarer will not have many tricks to start with and will not find it easy to establish many more. This analysis strongly suggests a passive defence.

Here is the full deal:



It can be seen that persisting with hearts only gives declarer that which is readily available to him, the approach resulting in a comfortable defeat of the contract. A minor-suit lead will give declarer a free trick and a much better chance of making

Note that if East's hand is changed to **♠** A1093 **♥** 9842 **♦** 103 **♣** A106 but the South and West hands are not altered, then the bidding would be the same but this time a club lead would work well. The salient issue, however, is that leading hearts would still be better, confirming the wisdom of adopting a passive stance, which, in the context of the auction, is strongly indicated by the diamond holding.

What about the following lead problem for West with the hand below after this auction?

♠ K 10 4 ♥ 7 6 3	North	South 1♦
♦ 875	1♠	3NT
♣ K852	Pass	

The prognosis is very different this time in that any diamond finesse that declarer might require, rates to be working and all the suits are breaking evenly for him, which suggests that declarer will be able to generate several tricks given time. Therefore, there is much more to be said for attacking with a club lead. Although this might give away a trick, it might strike gold – and to beat 3NT there is evidence that the defenders will have to grab their tricks quickly.

Tips:

- Listen to the bidding. When there is evidence that declarer might have to struggle, adopt a passive approach.
- Leads from holdings without honour cards are not likely to give a trick that declarer could not have made otherwise and are in keeping with a passive approach. When choosing a lead of this sort, lead a high pip so that partner can tell what you have done.
- Leads from unsupported honours (such as Q-x-x-x) are not passive and are in keeping with an attacking stance, which a defender should be prepared to adopt when it can be seen that tricks might have to be taken quickly.



1. Game All. Dealer West.



ALL OUR hands will be taken from the 64-board final of the USA's Vanderbilt championship, which was heavily laden with slam deals. Seven of the ten players in the final were European (three Danish and four Dutch). What would you bid on the second round with those East cards? Kevin Bathurst saw no value in 3 \checkmark , since his partner would have reversed to 2 \checkmark if his shape was 4-6 in the red suits. Nor did it seem appropriate to seek delayed support for his weak five-card spade suit.

East bid $4 \checkmark$. Many players like to save space by using the bid one higher than four of the trump suit to ask for key-cards. If you use only $4 \diamondsuit$ and $4 \checkmark$ (when clubs or diamonds are trumps), this is known as 'Redwood'. If you use the method for all four trump suits $-4 \diamondsuit$

for hearts and 4NT for spades – it is known as 'Kickback Blackwood'.


West's 4♠ response(the first step) showed 0 or 3 key-cards. 4NT then asked for the queen of trumps. West's 6♠ showed the trump queen but denied any side-suit king.

East decided to leave it there, rather than converting to 6NT. If partner held only six diamonds and there was a diamond loser, perhaps the side suits would provide another seven tricks.

7♦ is better than 7NT because you have a good chance of establishing an extra spade trick.

■ Awards: 6NT/6 ♦ (10), 7 ♦ (9), 7NT (6), games (4).

2. Game All. Dealer East.



I usually choose bidding sequences that are natural and easily comprehensible. Let's go mad and look briefly at the sort of artificial bidding that some top pairs use.

Sabine Auken opens 1♠ which is (hurray!) natural. Roy Welland's 1NT is an artificial game-forcing relay. (He would bid 2♠ to indicate a normal 'forcing 1NT' response.) Auken's 2♥ is a transfer bid, showing at least six spades and a single-suiter. 2♠ is a relay asking for further information and 3♦ shows a singleton diamond. West, who has a reliable diamond stopper, then bids 3NT.

I will leave it to you to judge whether Auken should have gone to 4♠. Louk Verhees was on lead with ♠J 8 4 ♥10 9 6 4 3 ♦7 6 ♠A 6 2. Five club tricks could be taken but of course he led a heart. That was +720 and a 2-IMP pick-up against 4♠ plus one at the other table!

■ Awards: 4♠ (10), 5♠ (8), 3NT (5), 6♠ (2).

3. Love All. Dealer West.



The first four bids may look familiar – East showing five hearts and four spades. That was not the meaning here. The Dutch pair use a method that is becoming increasingly popular. Following a transfer response of 3♦, the opener rebids 3♥ only when he has at least three-card heart support. Otherwise he bids 3♠ or 3NT.

Playing this method, you cannot stop in 3 when responder has a weak hand with long hearts. However, there is a big advantage on strong hands. With hearts agreed as trumps, responder can suggest a slam at a low level, by

rue-bidding.


Sjoert Brink's 3 was a cue-bid. Drijver showed a slam-suitable hand with a Serious 3NT and East cue-bid his diamond control. RKCB confirmed two aces without the trump queen and the better slam was reached.

Two clubs go away on the diamonds and an overtrick was made when spades broke 3-2 and South held the ♥Q.

■ **Awards:** 6♥ (10), 6♠ (9) 7♥ (5), games (4), 7♠ (3).

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4. E/W Game. Dealer South.



It is more or less standard nowadays to play Lebensohl opposite a take-out double of a weak-two opening. (2NT is bid on most 0-7 point hands; a direct suit response suggests 8-10.) Many pairs use it on this auction too and 3 • would suggest 8-10.


Father and son, Morten and Dennis Bilde do not use Lebensohl here, so 3♦ carried a very wide range. East suggested a slam with a void-showing leap to 4♥ and West signed off. East was looking at several potential losers in the black suits. As I see it, he had little justification for bidding the small slam. How would you play 6♦ when North leads the ♠Q?

Dennis Bilde won in the dummy and played the other top spade, He then entered his hand with a spade ruff to lead towards the \clubsuit K. His luck was in when the weaker of the defenders' hands (North) contained the \clubsuit A, He gave up a club and was then able to ruff three black-suit losers in his hand. The lucky slam was made.

A trump lead would have scuttled the contract, since a second trump can be played when the defenders win a club trick.

■ **Awards:** 5♦ (10), 6♦ (6), part-scores (4), 3NT (2).

5. N/S Game. Dealer West.



If East held only a 12-count, he might raise to 2♥ on this shape. With his splendid five-loser hand, he prefers the wider-range 2♠ rebid.

When West shows limit-bid values in diamonds, East leaps to 4. This is a splinter bid, showing at most a singleton spade. How should West react to this?

West has no aces, it is true. He has limited his hand with the 3♦ bid, however, and holds a magic 8-7-5 opposite partner's shortage. He also likes the look of his ♣K-2 in partner's second suit. Brink duly jumps to 6♦, completing a splendidly elegant auction. The same fine

contract was reached at the other table.

East's Support Redouble indicated three-card heart support. West's 5♣ showed one key-card.

■ **Awards:** 6♦ (10), 5♦ (6), part-scores (2).

6. N/S Game. Dealer South.



This was the 64th and last board of a wonderful Vanderbilt final. Auken was leading 128-117, so van Prooijen needed a big swing to win the match. What would you say as East over 3♣?

3 ♦ was possible but Roy Welland preferred a take-out double, to pick up a possible major-suit game. Sabine Auken responded only 3 ♠, since partner might be light for a double in the

protective seat. Welland had an easy raise to game and twelve tricks were made on a club lead.

At the other table Morten Bilde opened a full-blooded 4♣ on:

♠10 9 4 **♥**K **♦**2 **♣**K J 10 9 8 7 4 3.

After two passes, Brink protected with a double and this was passed out for only +200. Auken had won by 18 IMPs.

Our congratulations go to Sabine Auken, Roy Welland, Morten and Dennis Bilde. It is rare for a team of just four players to win this event.

■ Awards: $5 \triangleq /4 \triangleq (10)$, $5 \triangleleft (9)$, $6 \triangleq /3$ NT (5), part-scores (3), $3 \triangleq$ by South doubled (1).



A commendable 51/60 for the Vanderbilt stars. Not so easy for you to match that! Let's look for some tips.

Tips to remember

- Ordinary Blackwood can carry you too high when the trump suit is a minor. Consider using the spacesaving Redwood or Kickback Blackwood.
- Use splinter bids in as many situations as possible. They are essential for evaluating how well two hands fit together.
- When the auction starts 1♠ Pass 2♠ Dble (or similar), use the Lebensohl convention when responding to the double.
- When partner responds to your 2NT with a 3 → or 3 ♥ transfer, rebid in the indicated major only when you have a fit. Your partner can then cue-bid to suggest a slam.






Heather's Hints

Conning the Opponents

PLAYING TEAMS, South opens 2NT. What should North reply?

Unlike 1NT, it is quite usual for a 2NT opening to have a five-card major, and it is therefore sensible to have a system to help locate a 5-3 fit. North should bid 3♣, five-card Stayman. Over this partner will bid a five-card major if held, 3♠ with a four-card major, or 3NT with no five- or four-card major. Here South rebids 3NT which becomes the final contract.


West leads the queen of hearts, and East follows with the three. This queen lead is likely to be from a king-queen holding since the lead of the king would request an unblock. Playing these methods, the three will be an attitude signal from East. How do you plan the play?

You have eight tricks, and winning the ace and returning a heart will set up your ninth. The problem with this is that the defence should wake up and realise that you are establishing your ninth trick and switch to diamonds. If they do, they will almost certainly be able to defeat your contract.

Your best chance will come from

conning West. If you duck this trick, it will be very hard for West to believe that you have made this play from your actual holding, since you have reduced two certain winners in the suit to one. He may continue the suit believing his partner's three to have been from, for example, jack-three doubleton.

This was the full deal:



Heather's Hints

- Consider using some methods over 2NT to locate a 5-3 major-suit fit. Holding 20-22 points and a five-card major, you will be reluctant to open at the one-level, for fear of playing there when partner has 4 or 5 points. Therefore you will want to be able to open 2NT, and yet still be able to locate the major-suit fit if held.
- When planning the play to your contract always count both the winners and the losers. There will be many occasions where you are able to establish nine winners in 3NT, but the defence will have established five first, as in this example.



'GENTLE DUPLICATE' AT FOLKESTONE

2013 HAS seen a number of new initiatives at Folkestone Duplicate Bridge Club, leading to a welcome growth in club membership.

In February the club moved home to a new state-of-the-art pavilion at the Three Hills Sports Park in Folkestone, which has a bar, refreshment facilities and a large free car park. It also has a lift to the upper floor where the club meets on a Monday evening.

At the same venue the club's fully qualified EBU teacher and chairman, Chris Lohan, runs two daytime classes for beginners and improvers. 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Bridge with a Twist



A Matter of Style

Bridge writers and editors try and work together to give you an easy read, and that means having a house-style for bridge articles. Each publication has its own set of rules for terminology and layout.

I AM SURE the editor had a fit when she first read this article. (Nearly. Ed.) Have a look at my write-up of this hand from a recent Camrose match and see if you can spot the causes of her apoplexy.



North	East	South	West
Pass	1♥	1♠	Double

West led the ♥K against 3♠ and continued with ♥6 at Trick 2. East won and played the VJ. Declarer ruffed with the knave of spades, West discarding ♦2. Declarer now played the &K to East's ace, and East persevered with hearts, hoping to promote ♠10 in West's hand. South ruffed high, drew trumps and played on diamonds, discarding two clubs from hand. Contract made and, with East bringing 4♣ home in the other room, that was seven imps away.

What went wrong? Well, first of all, let us credit declarer with ruffing with the ♠J, leaving East the option of trying to promote ♠10 in West's hand. At two other tables, where the Souths were playing in Two Spades and three spades, the declarers ruffed with the ten of spades at trick three. Now the Easts had no difficulty switching to a club when they were in with A, and both contracts were held to eight tricks.

Some of you play reverse-attitude discards and would happily have discarded ♣2 to suggest a club switch. It is not so easy if you play count or standard attitude discards.

So is it just a matter of the partnership's defensive agreements? I thought so until the VuGraph commentator said: "West can make it clear to partner that he doesn't want a trump promotion by under-ruffing with the ♠2." An underruff at trick three! Whoever heard of such a thing? The only time I ever under-ruff is when declarer is making the last few tricks on a high crossruff and I have no choice. (OK, there was that time when I underruffed at about trick seven, but that was because I thought we were playing in no trumps.)

How did you get on? I hope you found the deal interesting and weren't too distracted by my abject failure to follow Elena's rules.

Virtually all bridge publications now agree that a hand is thirteen cards and a deal is all fifty-two cards. They vary on how to show the contract in narrative text: 2♠, Two Spades or sometimes two spades. Similarly a card can be the six of clubs, the club six, the ♣6 or just plain ♣6, without the the. Consistency is the key, something I spectacularly failed to achieve.

Mr Forrester of The Daily Telegraph goes for the short forms (e.g. 'West led ♥5 against 4\(\delta'\), and thus creates more space for his words of wisdom. Mr Robson of The Times prefers longer forms. He too has lots of good advice to impart and solves the space problem by making the font size as small as possible.

Next is the matter of the bidding table. In olden days the dealer was always shown first in the table (as above), but now the

vast majority of publications have West on the left, as it is on a map. Only The Bridge World (where space is at a premium because of their small page size), still puts the dealer on the left, to minimise the number of lines needed for the table. Thus, if South opens 4 and plays there, the bidding will only take one line.

Have you noticed how South is always declarer? It used to be common to see the words Rotated for convenience attached to three-quarters of the real-life deals that appeared in print. Nowadays the phrase is generally omitted; the sophisticated modern reader is fully aware that the original declarer may well not have been South.

Capitalisation is another thorny issue. All agree on IMPs rather than I.M.P.s (never imps and never-ever IMP's). Conventions like Stayman and Blackwood, named after people, are not a problem. Lebensohl, the purists tell me, is not named after a real person and should be written lebensohl (as it was when first described in 1970). But Negative Double or negative double? Forcing Pass or forcing pass? And similarly with Unassuming Cue Bid, Fourth Suit Forcing, and so on.

Did you spot the Ts instead of 10s in the hand diagram? Popular in some quarters.

English Bridge uses single quotes for speech and the editor prefers Vu-graph to VuGraph, trick two to Trick 2, underruff to under-ruff and no-trumps to no trumps or notrumps. She will usually change the oldfashioned knave to jack and her auctions always finish with All Pass rather than Pass Pass Pass or End. Another seven black marks for me.

Finally, when all the rules have been followed and the guidelines observed, Elena likes the article to be the right size. If it is a line or two too long, then it can be tweaked by the judicious use of hyphenation and/or the removal of a redundant or superfluous word so that the piece fits th \square

The Magic of Bridge

The Early Days of Bridge

Introduction


I MUST ADMIT to a certain amusement when the Editor asked me to contribute a series on exotic bridge hands. As I have long contended that most players spend too much time in trying to play complex conventions and looking for obscure plays, it is a bit like asking Sir Alex Ferguson (who for the sake of those who don't follow football, was until recently the manager of Manchester United) to write enthusiastically on the beauty of the football that is played by Manchester City. However, I will enjoy writing this series. Although I believe that most players would greatly improve their bridge results by concentrating on doing the simple tasks well, it is undeniably true that part of the fascination of bridge is its ability to produce hands of beauty and elegance. My approach is to look at hands that have actually been played or slight variations that could be played at the table. I will try to analyse the thought processes that led (or in some cases should have led) to success at the table

In this series you will meet many exotic and beautiful plays. How should you approach analysing the hands? Before I played bridge, I was a chess player with lots of enthusiasm but no great technique. The endgame (i.e. the part of the game with relatively few pieces left) was a closed book to me. My approach was: 'If I do that, he does that, then I do ... etc.' A stronger player could look at the board and know that if he could reach a known position it was a win for him. So he knew what he was aiming at, whereas I didn't. This is called technique. The same is true at bridge: when considering a wide variety of potentially clever plays (e.g. endplays and squeezes), the expert is aiming for a known position and working back to see how he could get there. Many of my hands will feature this approach.


Some 'Coups' Were just Good Plays

The early days of bridge abounded with

stories of brilliancies and magical plays by the experts. New ideas were surfacing. Many of these were called 'Coups'. It is an indication of how much the general standard of card play has improved that some of these would hardly raise an eyebrow nowadays. In Layout A South is in 7NT; West leads the *J:




South has twelve easy tricks. A 3-3 spade break would give him a thirteenth but any good county player would realise that if the same defender has four spades and the king of diamonds he can be squeezed without giving up the chances of a 3-3 spade break. The secret of planning squeeze play is to work back from the desired ending, in this case Layout B with South on lead:



Declarer wins the king of hearts, cashes dummy's clubs and crucially, the ace of diamonds, before returning to his hand with the ace of hearts, reaching Layout B. Now when the queen of hearts is cashed, dummy throwing the six of diamonds, East cannot retain the king of diamonds and four spades. Of course if declarer fails to cash the ace of diamonds, East could safely discard the king of diamonds because declarer could not use the diamond queen. Hardly earth shattering but the cashing of the ace of diamonds was originally considered sufficiently difficult to merit the name 'Vienna Coup' an unblocking manoeuvre made in preparation for a squeeze play.

Some 'Coups' Featured Bad Plays!

Coups didn't necessarily have to feature good bridge! Have you ever heard a bridge player claiming he had been 'Grosvenored'? The 'Grosvenor Gambit' is named after a fictitious literary character called Philip Grosvenor who discovered by accident the psychological merits of making an absurd defensive play which gave opponents a chance of making an impossible contract, but was so grotesque that opponents could never believe what had happened and so could not take advantage. For example, South bids to 7 and the trump suit is shown in Layout C:




Declarer runs the jack of spades and East . . . ducks! With the sight of all four hands declarer could drop the king of spades, but of course he will do no such thing. He will lose a second finesse and be irritated that

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East was not made to pay for his absurdity. East's plan is that this will demoralize declarer and will lead to bad play as he blames himself and broods over it. Accordingly, Grosvenor developed this approach and perfected it to a fine art, although he was sometimes frustrated by opponents who were not good enough to fall for his tricks. Do I recommend it? According to the story, Grosvenor's lifeless body was eventually found bludgeoned to death, shortly after a bridge tournament in which he used his gambit against the wrong opponents.

I remember reading about the deal in Layout D from a European championship many years ago:



West	North	East	South
	1♣	1♠	2♥
Pass	2NT	Pass	4♣
Pass	4♥	Pass	4♠
Pass	5♥	All Pass	

In one room England comfortably made 3NT by South. In the other room Austria somewhat overbid to 5♥. West led spades and East cashed ♠ A-K. Now East (Ben Franks) had a problem. If he led a third spade South could not afford to ruff with the ace of hearts or the king of hearts, and

would have to ruff with a lower trump. When West could not overruff declarer would realise that East had the queen and jack of hearts, and would make his contract by finessing trumps twice against East. Franks tried to avoid this by switching to a club, but of course declarer should have got the trumps right anyway by asking himself why East had turned down the obvious third spade for a trump promotion. Luckily for England, the Austrian declarer was not up to the task!

Note the hideous bidding. This theme will reoccur during my series. If South had played in 4♥ then the deal would never have seen the light of day. North's 1♠ followed by 2NT showed a weak no-trump; 4♠ was inexplicable. Perhaps the reason why bridge players of yesteryear had so many opportunities for headline-catching coups was that their bidding got them into so many dreadful contracts!

Anyhow, some time later I found myself playing a similar trump suit. The defenders cashed their winners but East didn't aim for a trump promotion when I knew he could have done so. Aha! My chance to show flair! I crossed to dummy and led the ten of hearts, running it when East played low. And here was the layout (give or take the small cards, which I cannot fully recall!):



I had been well and truly Grosvenored. The defenders had not meant to fool me, and were very kind as they explained that the best percentage play was to hope for a 2-2 break! I narrowly resisted the temptation to bludgeon East to death.
