Parish Council Summary Report by George Britton

A very busy quarter with the accent on developments affecting the roads towards and around St Ives. As well as Tesco and BP Garage, there are proposals at various stages to build flats, a Morrison Super store, drivethrough catering facilities and a long-term proposal for 1,900 dwellings. All these suggestions require use of the Compass Point roundabouts. The PC has made its views know because some are outside the parish. As expansion continues west and north, the problem grows. Safety considerations drove the design of the roundabouts. Stationary vehicles do not hurt people!

The crimes reports, taken from e-Cops notifications, show a steady level of burglaries. The police will hold a public meeting in the Pavilion at 7.00 pm on 30th March.

Two development presentations at the February meeting described detailed plans for 14 affordable dwellings on land adjacent to Victoria House. This is under the Rural Exceptions Policy for land that would not normally be allowed. They will be for people with close association with the parish. Four three bedroom and 10 two bedroom dwellings, with spaces for two cars and a large green space, are planned. This project is close to the planning application stage. The other is for a replacement of 'Churchside', Holywell, with a very modern, high quality two storey building.

Negotiations with the Colts over the practice of running a tea bar in Millfields are coming to fruition. A new, sophisticated alarm should reduce the chance of false call outs. but they must be paid for. Insurance has been agreed and when the other agreed routines are in place the bar can run again.

The Village Hall is doing well with more decoration planned. The Quiz and Music Festival will be held again. More Trustees are needed.

Footpath 2 is scheduled for diversion again. The route moves away from the industrial complex and is 1.25 km longer. It will need a new bridge over Parson's Drain to join Footpath 1 near the old crossing point. It was not possible to ascertain whether there were bats in the felled Willow Tree stump on the Front. Work has stopped and it will be left to nature now.

Options to improve the Parish Office are under discussion. A project to make the Bus Stop opposite the Queen's Head more attractive and usable has been agreed. Cost constraints may be an issue.

Expenditure for the quarter was £20,080.

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
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NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

The festive season has come and gone and I am glad to report that crime incidents in our village were few this year. During the

past 3 months, there have been 3 house burglaries, 3 incidents involving cars and 2 incidents involving antisocial behaviour. Needingworth is part of the Cambridgeshire Police Earith Ward that also includes Bluntisham and Colne. This Ward has seen a rise in crime in recent months, particularly; house burglaries (12), Criminal Damage (9), Violent Crime (9) and Anti-Social Behaviour (11). So we must not become complacent but continue to make this village a "No Go" area to criminals.

House burglaries in Needingworth-cum-Holywell follow a predictable pattern. Offenders gain access to the rear of the property, they then force or smash windows or patio doors to gain entry. An untidy search is conducted, mainly looking for iPhones, laptops, car keys, handbags containing credit/debit cards downstairs followed by a search of the master bedroom for jewellery and cash. In total 5 -10 minutes maximum. Tools used to gain entry are often taken from an unlocked shed or garage. So the message is clear, protect your property by ensuring outbuildings and rear gates are locked, lock windows and doors and do not leave your prized possessions on display. Jewellery that is valuable or of sentimental value should not be kept in bedroom drawers but stored somewhere safe that is not easily accessible. If you follow this advice, 2017 may be a good year!

Well enough of the lecture, but please remember to look after yourselves and your property. I am often asked how NHW and the police work together and do we make a difference? Anyone can reach the police quickly and easily in an emergency by dialling 999, or in a nonemergency 101. So why have NHW to liaise with them? The simple answer is that it helps you and your neighbours give your local police a much clearer sense of your current and emergent needs and local issues. NHW coordinators know their communities well and can develop an even deeper knowledge by talking to their neighbours and finding out what matters to them. Police and other organisations can then take action based on this knowledge. Government budget cuts have affected our local community policing support and the police need the support of NHW groups to help prevent crime and bring those responsible to account. Please support your local NHW street coordinator or consider becoming involved with NHW yourself, my contact details are below.

Finally, please remember to lock up your bikes when out and about as Spring arrives, there is a bustling trade in this area selling stolen bikes!!

Community Listener volunteers needed



This is Lizzie, she is one of our local Healthwatch Cambridgeshire volunteers and is helping us with a new project to look at how health and care services communicate with people who have a sensory loss.

Lizzie's told us "I am a service user myself and have disabilities so I rely on good healthcare and support, such as having a good relationship with the GP."

Our volunteers are people like you who live or work in Cambridgeshire. You know the place you live and the people in your community. We need your help to talk to more people about Healthwatch and find out what care is like for them.

- You will listen to people within your local community who have used health or social care services. This may be your family, neighbours and friends, or people you meet within your local networks.
- You may visit local groups, chat with people and record what they have to say.
- You might talk to people about Healthwatch Cambridgeshire. This may involve giving a short presentation, or working with us on a display stand.

We will give you training and support, as well as paying agreed out of pocket expenses.

As a Community Listener, you could also train to take part in our 'Enter and View" visits to local health or care services. This is our legal right to visit places that provide publicly funded health or care services, to see and hear how people experience care. In the last year, we have visited Addenbrooke's and Hinchingbrooke Hospitals.

Recently a letter was sent with the Herald to all households about the problems of the massive development proposed for Gifford's Farm.

This is for around 2000 dwellings and other buildings, meaning an additional 4000 to 5000 people needing local amenities. Schools and GP surgeries are already overwhelmed and simply wouldn't cope with all the extra people, and the enormous increase in vehicles would mean that roads in all directions would become even more congested and at times gridlocked, especially those towards Huntingdon and the A14.

Community Champions encourage local residents to carry out fire safety checks in their homes, visit community groups and educate about fire safety and escape plans.

We will train you, give you a uniform and provide you with a wide range of activities to choose from, all of which will help to keep our communities safe from the risk of fire.

No previous qualifications or specific skills are needed to become a Community Champion as CFRS is always seeking people from diverse backgrounds. The scheme is run by the charity Groundwork on behalf of CFRS. ON-call firefighters

ON-call firefighters are a vital part of today's fire and rescue service, providing an efficient, effective service that gives emergency cover to more than 90 per cent of the UK.

In Cambridgeshire they make up 56 per cent of the workforce.

An on-call firefighter is not based at a fire station but carries a pager and responds to emergency incidents as and when they happen.

They receive an annual wage to reflect the time they commit to being available plus additional payments for attending incidents and drill nights (one evening a week for two hours).

On-call firefighters are men and women who may have other jobs and are able to provide evening, daytime or weekend cover. When they are on-call they may be at home, working for themselves or for a nearby company or out in their local community (staying within a five-minute travel time of the fire station) and are generally located in rural communities, small towns and villages.

Protecting older or more vulnerable residents in Needingworth



Do you know Needingworth has two No Cold Calling Zones (NCCZ) located in Bramley Avenue and Chapel Close?

These zones were set up to discourage cold callers and to give residents the confidence to say 'no' to uninvited sales people – helping to prevent people falling victim to distraction burglars and rogue traders.

Whilst the zones were originally introduced by Cambridgeshire Trading Standards, it is recognised that community-led action is much more effective in protecting local people from unscrupulous tradespeople. Indeed, the best prevention and support for residents comes from within their own community.

We can offer a range of materials for your residents including door stickers, advice on how to spot a rogue trader and tips to prevent unwanted mail and phone calls. We invite a local coordinator to disseminate this information and look after a NCCZ on behalf of its residents. This would preferably be someone living within the zone but could also be someone residing close by. Could that be you?

If you feel you can help, even if your time and ability is limited, we would love to hear from you. A NCCZ can really be reinvigorated with a little community action; just a good neighbour keeping an eye out makes all the difference.

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NEWS FROM THE COUNTY COUNCIL

At the time of writing this article we are about to enter the annual budget debate, which ultimately ends up setting the Council Tax precept for the ensuing year. I know in the past when I have tried to explain the process some readers were both perplexed and confused over what should be a reasonable straightforward exercise. I am sorry to say after last year's shambolic process, this year is not shaping up to be much better. Let me explain further. First and foremost the council has a legal responsibility to set a balanced budget regardless of any Council Tax rise or not, this has in the past been relatively uncomplicated with the ruling political group having the majority on the council, putting forward their plans and priorities and after some debate winning the day and their budget being adopted by all the council. Now, as I explained in a previous article we have five political groups with none in overall control, each trying to push their 'pet projects and budgets' through Therefore if not approached correctly, we end up with an enormous 'bun fight' and the potential for a fudged budget or even worse an unbalanced budget, which is both not acceptable and illegal. Last year's budget meeting went on for approximately 10 hours !! and unfortunately the signs for this year's debate do not appear to be much better with an even longer unproductive session anticipated.

You may recall in a previous article I explained that when I was the Chairman of The Council (2013-2015), I would make a point of getting the different groups together and to talk through their aspirations with each other, emphasise the need to be flexible and to adopt a 'give and take' approach as it was impossible for all five groups to have their own way in full. I did this in a firm and conciliatory manner, as a public debate of ideological views and an a intransigent approach would not be helpful to anyone, not least to the long suffering county wide tax payers who needed to understand the financial pressures we seem to be permanently under and to support the council in the widest possible sense.

The rules have slightly changed this year, where central government has allowed councils with a responsibility for Adult and Social Care to levy an addition precept, which must be for that use only (ring fenced). The usual rule of 2% being the upper limit for any Council Tax Rise still applies, therefore it is perfectly possible for a council to levy a 2% rise and an additional 2% for Adult Social Care, making 4% rise in total. I know many members are of the view that there should be no council tax rise and a 2% precept levied for Adult Social Care. My personal view is that if there is a consensus of a 2% Adult Social Care rise, why don't we just put this 2% on Council Tax (ring fenced for the Adult Social Care Budget) and not levy anything under the Adult Social Care heading, either way there will need to be a 2% rise to deal with the Adult

Social care crisis, but by putting it on the Council Tax base, we are in stronger position in the future when the government works out our funding formulae using the Council Tax base as a starting point. Unfortunately, as ever I do not see common sense prevailing (you will know by the time you read this). As I eluded to earlier, there is a lot to be said for one party having a clear majority and being accountable to the public, you can help address that in May when the County Council Elections take place!

Before I close, the May election this year will be different you will no longer be represented by two councillors, Paul Bullen and myself, but just one, as St Ives in being split in two with St Ives South and Needingworth & Holywell, while St Ives North merges in with Wyton on the Hill. It is my view this is a shame as both Paul and I had a productive working relationship, which was of benefit to all as we were both able to agree on most things.

As the next edition of the Villager is due to be published 1st June, close to the County Council elections, I will not ask for further topics for this column until my future as your representative has been established one way or another. Should the worse come to the worse, I will just say it has been a privilege to represent you for the last 12 years as your County Councillor.

the Friends Study Group, exploring faith and the Bible; **BENCH** for secondary-school age youngsters;


our **Men's Group**, meeting on Tuesday evenings;

- 1. Fire safety in the home including cooking, general safety and escape
- 2. Falls prevention including simple remedial action such as replacing lightbulbs or taping down loose carpet. 3. Alcohol use - Alcohol related illness in the over 65s is on the increase. We can provide you with helpful information.

- 4. Stay well and warm Can you afford Always use a proper ashtray and to heat your home? Do you have access to a hot meal? Do you have access to all the services available to you?
- 5. Crime reduction We can provide advice on making your home more secure in addition to advice to make vou less vulnerable to scams or fraud.

You are under no obligation to answer any questions that you do not want to, but the more information you provide us with, the better we will be able to support you. We can also provide advice in relation to promoting the health and safety of individuals with hoarding concerns, as well as providing valuable information to care providers.

During March, we will also be raising awareness of the fire risks associated with smoking, with national No Smoking Day on the 8th.

We often find smoking is one of many factors making someone more at risk of fire, for example, when combined with poor mobility, health problems or being elderly, it increases someone's chance of having a fire.

 Never leave a lit cigarette or pipe unattended.

Your chance to bag up to £5,000 for local community projects


TESCO is inviting local community groups, green space projects and other organisations to apply for their share of a £12MILLION carrier bag charge fund.



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

BLETCHLEY PARK

Rare Alan Turing notebook goes on display

Mathematician's hand-written commentary on notation can



be viewed at Bletchley Park

A hand-written notebook featuring Alan Turing's thoughts on mathematical notation has gone on public display for the first time, at Bletchley Park. The manuscript, which was sold at auction in 2016. has been loaned to the

museum for one year and is on display alongside other personal effects belonging to Turing.

Dermot Turing, Bletchley Park Trustee and nephew of Alan Turing, said: "When Alan was at Bletchley Park everyone knows he was breaking the Enigma code. But less well known is that he was also spending a lot of time working on problems in mathematics. He wrote this notebook probably quite early on in World War Two when he was thinking about the way in which we write mathematical formulae. It's a commentary on what's wrong with notation."

The notebook is on display alongside 16 of Turing's 18 published papers, which have been described as 'an unparalleled collection of the writings of the founder of modern computing science'. The collection, originally compiled by another Bletchley Park codebreaking giant, Max Newman, contains several specimens of Turing's signature.

Peronel Craddock, Head of Collections and Exhibitions at Bletchley Park, said: "It is wonderful to have the opportunity to display this notebook for the first time and we are very grateful to the lender. It really adds to our understanding of Turing, as his personality comes through in his critique of others' theories."

Bletchley Park is open daily and tickets cost just £16 when booked in advance online at www.bletchleypark.org.uk and give unlimited access for one year.
