Parish Council Summary Report

Due to the Covid-19 regulations Parish Council meetings continue to be held remotely via Zoom.

8 Councillors attended the September 2020 meetings. Accounts for payment totalling £9977.28 were approved.

The internal audit report for year ending 31st March 2020 was noted. The Chairman congratulated the Clerk and all involved on the very good internal audit report which was reiterated by District Councillor J Neish.

2 planning applications were approved.

The Community Gritting Scheme applications for Winter 2020 – 2021 were discussed, with Cllr C O'Reilly Mr I Armstrong and Mr G Fisher volunteering.

A verbal report on current Covid-19 matters was received. The Clerk advised members that information on the special conditions have been shared with the Colts and the Seniors and agreement has been reached to proceed with Colts matches returning to Millfields on 5^{th} September and the Seniors on 12^{th} September. Installation completed of the Outdoor gym equipment.

It was agreed that the Clerk would contact the company for a refreshed quote on the CCTV improvements and bring back to the Planning & Finance meeting.

Arrangements for Remembrance Day 2020 were discussed, and it was agreed that Cllr Williamson would work with representatives of the Church to arrange a revised event for this year.

October's meeting was held on Tuesday 6th when accounts for payment totalling £34,381.54 as at 29th September 2020 were approved. Figures from Inenco / Dual Energy relating to the electricity renewal at Millfields were discussed but the Clerk was asked to approach companies again to request a re-quote to improve the quoted rate.

1 planning application was approved.

Members received a written report on the meeting with the conservation officer HDC regarding repairs to the Lock-up.

A request from Needingworth Colts for permission to hold 3 matches on a Saturday was not granted on this occasion, however the Parish Council will consider the request providing the Colts give a plan to ensure no overlap in the car park and for the Colts to be finished prior to the Seniors arriving.

The revised quote for CCTV system of £6995 + VAT & Annual Maintenance Contract of £425 + VAT for the CCTV system for Overcote playing field area was accepted.

A lengthy debate took place over the request form Needingworth Tennis Club regarding a new clubhouse. Concerns were raised over the covenant on the land and the proximity of any clubhouse to the neighbouring properties.

Whilst members commented on the value of the Tennis Club to the Parish permission was not granted and the club were asked to enquire of the village hall trustees to see if any arrangement could be met for them to share facilities.

4 applications for the vacancy for Parish Councillor where considered and after a vote The Chairman declared that following the first ballot Mr S Mitcham was elected as a Councillor. (Please see 'Meet Your Parish Councillor' article)

If you need medical help fast, think you need to go to an Emergency Department (A&E) or you're not sure what to do, use NHS 111 first – online or by phone to get clinical advice or direction to the most appropriate services for treatment for you.

You can also help us to help you. If you are over 65, have a longterm health condition or are pregnant, it is more important than ever this year to ensure you have your free flu vaccination. Let's keep crushing food waste

During lockdown we wasted a third less food than we usually would. We saved leftovers, wrote shopping lists and baked a LOT of banana bread. In an emergency, we got organised and we crushed food waste. But we're still in an emergency – a long one, so we need to keep crushing it.

With 513 tonnes of edible food ending up in green bins, as well as 6,898 tonnes of edible food waste ending up in grey bins every year in Huntingdonshire, it's not just our bank accounts that are affected by food waste – it's our planet too.

The process of growing, making, transporting, storing and cooking our food uses lots of energy, water and fuel, which all goes to waste when it's thrown away. Global food waste generates 22 million tonnes of greenhouse gases each year – that's four times more than all aeroplanes put together! So really, it's a no-brainer to keep as much food out of the bin as possible, and to start wasting less and saving more – both money and the planet.

How you can help stop fly tipping

Check the company has a 'waste carriers' licence with the Environment Agency by phone or online.

If you choose a company, they should show you their Waste Carrier License on arrival, if not do not use them.

Take a picture of your waste and the vehicle that is going to take it away – Save it just in case!

If you communicate via Facebook, Messenger or Text, screen shot and save your messages. Get a quote (it costs £120 per ton to get rid of waste legally) so is it too good to be true?

Huntingdonshire

Find out where the waste is going for disposal before they load their van or trailer – Note it down

Once loaded the Carrier must give you a receipt which describes the waste they have taken and cost charged

If you see a fly tip, report it to us on our website or through our call centre for us to investigate



Fido Facts

Dogs are extraordinary animals on the one hand their uncompromising loyalty and affection can provide security and comfort to many people, on the other hand, however, they do have the potential to be a source of disease and can cause accidents and injury. Unfortunately, some people fail to understand their responsibilities and therefore, there is a great deal of legislation relating to dog

control, fouling, identification and noise from dogs. These matters are very serious and failure to comply can lead to prosecution, the impounding of the dog, charging of detention fees and sometimes even the destruction of the animal.

The A to Z of Responsible Dog Ownership

FOULING: It is an offence not to remove faeces deposited by a dog for which you are responsible from any public place in towns and villages throughout Huntingdonshire that are within the 40mph speed limit. "On the spot" penalty notices may be issued or prosecutions taken. 'Public place' includes footpaths, open spaces, parks, school playing fields and cemeteries, etc.

DOGS ON LEADS: In addition there is a 'Dogs on Leads'

Order, which applies to all footpaths next to roads, in towns and larger villages, There are still plenty of open spaces out of town for a good run, but please prevent livestockworrying and remove dog faeces from fields and, for the sake of safety, use a dog lead on country and trunk roads.

FICTION: "He doesn't need a lead he's well trained".

FACT: "Even Obedience Champions can and will respond to other stimuli".

DOG EXCLUSION: There are enclosed ornamental parks and enclosed children's play equipment sites where dogs are not allowed. There are such places in all the towns and some villages - Make sure you read the signs! In our Parish this includes Overcote playing field and Millfields.

DOGS ON LEADS IN PARKS: There are some parks and open spaces where dogs must be on a lead. Again, look for the signs!

REMOVAL OF FAECES: Responsible dog owners carry 'poop-scoops' or polythene bags to pick up "unavoidables". **Not to pick up is an offence**. Most waste bins may be used in the streets and parks, or the deposit may be disposed of at home.

limited numbers. We have also now started to plan for our music festival at the weekend of 26/27th June 2021.

The management team will be assiduous in ensuring cleanliness and appropriate sanitisation, but it will be incumbent upon the users to clean and sanitise all equipment used before leaving. 

RECIPE

GINGERBREAD LOAF

Ingredients

- 8 oz plain flour
- 3½ oz sugar
- 4 oz sultanas
- 1 tablespoon golden syrup
- 2 tablespoons black treacle
- 2 oz margarine
- 1 cup milk
- 1 teaspoon mixed spice
- $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon ground ginger
- 1 egg

1 teaspoon bicarbonate of soda mixed with 1 tablespoon boiling water

Method

Pre-heat oven to 175°C (160°C fan).

Line and grease a one lb loaf tin.

Mix flour, sugar, spices and sultanas in a large bowl. Melt syrup, treacle, margarine and milk in a pan over a gentle heat, stirring to combine. Combine melted mixture with dry ingredients a little at a time. Drop in beaten egg and lastly bicarb. and water. Bake for an hour to an hour and a quarter.

When cold, serve sliced with butter.





Getting ready for winter

As the colder months draw in, we begin using our fires, burners and chimneys once again to warm our homes. Chimney Fires continue to be a common occurrence in home fires in the winter months.

To ensure you keep your home safe from fire, follow our top tips below:

- Whatever fire you have or fuel you burn it is vitally important to have your chimney swept to avoid a build-up of ash and soot
- Avoid burning resinous woods (that quickly build up soot)
- Only burn fuels suitable for your burner (eg. never burn anything other than wood in a wood burner)
- Do not overload the grate/ appliance
- Do not bank fires too high and remember to let them burn out well before you go to bed
- Check the hearth, floor and furnishings near the fire for hot sparks/embers
- Do not place objects on or over the mantelpiece which cause you to stand too close to the fire in order to reach them
- Use a fire/spark guard to prevent accidental fires and make sure it has the kite mark or conforms to British/ European standards
- Inspect your chimney breast, particularly the roof space. Make sure it is sound and sparks/fumes cannot escape through cracks or broken bricks.

Most importantly, always fit a smoke alarm and test your alarm weekly, and ensure a Carbon Monoxide (CO) alarm is installed in the room where the burner is.

On-call firefighters are a vital part of our Service and community. They respond to a wide range of incidents, from fighting fires, attending road traffic collisions, animal rescues to supporting other emergency services. In addition to responding to emergency incidents, our on-call firefighters support their communities by providing information and advice on a range of community safety topics. They receive an annual wage to reflect the time they commit to being available plus additional payments for attending incidents and drill nights (one evening a week for two hours).

It's a hugely rewarding role, and we hope to encourage members of the community from all backgrounds to get in touch and find out more about becoming an on-call firefighter. Visit www.cambsfire.gov.uk/oncall for more information.



CHURCH SERVICES

The Covid-19 pandemic and changes in the regulations for gatherings, both from the government and the Church of England, have presented us with a few challenges, though perhaps not as many as for the many businesses that have been drastically affected. Before the announcement of a new general lockdown (1 November) we were planning the following pattern of services:

Just one monthly service at our church: Holy Communion using the Book of Common Prayer, at 3 pm on the third Sunday of each month. We can accommodate a maximum of 18 worshippers to comply with distancing regulations; seats will be marked and face masks must be worn throughout the service.

Holy Communion (Common Worship) to be held at St Mary's Church, Bluntisham-cum-Earith, on the first Sunday of the month at 3 pm, and on the second and fourth Sundays of the month at 11 am. All-Age services, also at St Mary's Church, to take place at 11 am on the first and third Sundays. On 31 January, being a fifth Sunday, there will be a Family Communion at 11 am at St Mary's Church. Face masks and distancing also apply to all these services.

It is sad that we can't hold more services at St John the Baptist Church at the moment, but the church at Bluntisham-cum-Earith is larger than our own parish church, and now has chairs instead of pews, which means seating is more flexible and can accommodate larger congregations. Our overriding consideration is not to put any of our congregations at risk of Covid-19.

If and when the general lockdown regulations change, we will probably put the above pattern of services into effect. Look out for announcements on the Meridian Benefice website, in The Herald and via village Facebook pages.

CHRISTMAS SERVICES

Regulations permitting, our intention is to hold two services at St John the Baptist Church: a Holy Communion at 9 pm on Christmas Eve and another at 9.30 am on Christmas morning. Numbers will obviously be limited and we may have to introduce a booking system. We are also planning to hold our popular Crib Service for families at the Village Hall on Christmas Eve at 3 pm, and hope to make it also available online by Zoom. Finally, we are looking into the possibility of hosting a Christmas Carol Service with a difference in the week before Christmas – more details to come. For updates on Christmas arrangements, please see the Herald, the Benefice website and village Facebook pages.

What will be missing at Christmas?

As I write this in late October, it seems certain that Christmas this year will be different from usual. Many of the things we take as a normal part of Christmas will be missing. Probably no parties. No family get-togethers. Grandparents may only get to see their grandchildren on a screen. The normal Christmas dinner might not be possible. In some households the breadwinner may be unemployed, and with tight finances, the children may be getting fewer presents this year. Christmas may seem more like a season of misery than of joy, because the essential elements of Christmas are missing.

COLOURFENCE WILL STAND STRONG THIS

Dear Resident

While not wishing our time away, I think we will all be pleased when this year draws to a close even though the fallout from recent events will be with us and our children / grandchildren for many years to come. When writing this column it is always difficult to judge what will still be relevant when the magazine is printed and circulated. Therefore, even though I have masses of current statistics regarding Covid in Cambridgeshire and how we are dealing with the problem along with data from our Health providers along with countless other Public Health statistics and due to the fast moving and ever changing scene the publication of these would be extremely dated by the time you read them. If anyone has a particular question or query, please email me and I will then be able to give you a 'real time' update on the area relevant to your question.

As always this time of the year is budget preparation time for the following year (2021-2022) and this exercise is proving particularly difficult for a number of reason,

1) the final outcome on expenditure for all Covid related issues is not immediately clear,

2) further expenditure for Covid for the remainder of the year (end of March 2021) requires a Chrystal Ball as we have no idea what will be coming our way with regards to this awful pandemic

and finally the Central Government grant for our key services is not only unclear but early signs suggest will be particularly painful with regard to local services. Not a scenario, any of us savour or can see any immediate way to be optimistic at this stage (sorry).

That said, Cambridgeshire has a history of providing quality services on a shoe string compared to other areas and while we are determined to make that happen in the future, it will be a bumpy ride.

I try to walk all the streets of the village on a regular basis in order to ensure footpaths and roads etc are being maintained to a reasonable standard. That said, I do rely on residents letting me know of any areas that are of concern to them as I cannot cover everywhere including St Ives South. Traffic and Silvaco / Aldi roundabout are still a cause for concern and while queuing has reduced significantly in recent months, I fear this is only temporary respite as commuter traffic has decreased since March, which may only be short lived. Therefore, the St Ives County Councillor Ryan Fuller and I have been persuading highways to carry out various studies along the main roads including HGV movements in order to have some hard facts when decisions are being made. However, we are mindful any traffic counts / surveys carried out are not truly representative of what things can be like, as those of you who commute with affirm from your pre March 2020 journeys.

Apologises for a shorter than normal update but I need to save myself from disappearing under an avalanche of statistics as we prepare to budget set.

As always if anyone would like me to publish a more in-depth report about any item within the County Councils remit, I am more than happy to do so. As you may know the County Council is responsible for many areas from Adult Social Care to Highways, so if there is something you would like explaining in greater detail and you feel it would interest other readers, please get in touch and I will do my best to publish a concise but interesting overview of the subject requested. Please remember your rep-



resentatives at all levels County, District and of course your excellent Parish Council work very hard behind the scenes to ensure Needingworth and Holywell remains 'a special place'.

Please enjoy your Christmas as much as you can and keep your eye open for others who may need your support even if it is only a short chat and/or welfare call.
