Parish Council Report

The official record of all meetings are the minutes which are available on the Parish Council website, www.holywell-cum-needingworthpc.org.uk.

Meeting on 6th September opened with members of the public raising their concerns regarding a planning application for a new dwelling in Chapel Close.

The accounts for payment as at 6th September 2022 totalling £25,582.39 were approved.

District Councillor J Neish reported that the Town Master Plan is out for consultation and urges the Council to review and comment. He also advised that the Greater Cambridgeshire Partnership is consulting on proposed congestion charging in Cambridge.

The submission of the Village Hall extension plans to HDC were approved.

One Stop shop have agreed to support fundraising for a defibrillator to be sited at One Stop and it was agreed that any deficit for the purchase of the defibrillator be covered by the Parish Council.

3 planning applications were considered with 1 being supported.

The October meeting opened with a two minute silence in memory of the late HM Queen Elizabeth II.

The accounts for payment as at 4th October 2022 totalling £29,510.99 were approved.

County Councillor Reynolds reported a road closure on 14 -16 December 2022 on Back Lane for works on a water main. He further reported that Stagecoach have proposed the cutting of all services except Cambridge City and South Cambridge. The Combined Authority are in negotiations with Stagecoach. Members agreed to lobby the Mayor with regards to the rural community needs and the green agenda.

The pod swing and the table tennis table have been successfully installed on Overcote Lane playing field. Please see adjacent report and photos.

Committee meetings were cancelled in September due to the period of mourning and all committees were called in October due to budget setting.

The accounts for payment as at 4th October 2022 totalling £29,510.99 were approved.

A contract for works to the improve the frontage of the Village Hall including cladding the front and side of the pavilion was accepted and agreed to be funded from CIL receipts.

The Unqualified report was noted for the completion of the limited assurance review for year ending 31st March 2022.

Members agreed to purchase 10 tonnes of gravel for the overflow car park at Overcote Lane playing field.

A working party was agreed for the Christmas Lights event which will take place on Friday 9th December 2022. (Please see advert later in the Villager page 30).

It was agreed that the Parish Council will take on the responsibility of future checking and upkeep of the proposed defibrillator in Holywell along with funding any shortfall in fundraising for the defibrillator.

Parish Update

Overcote Lane Playing Field Improvements

The Parish Council are pleased to advise that further additions of a pod swing and table tennis table have been made to Overcote Playing field. These have been funded from CIL receipts. A wheelchair access picnic bench has also been installed on the field.





It is hoped that these will be a welcome addition to our facilities at Overcote Lane playing field and will be enjoyed by many for years to come.



The Village Show is returning!!

Following the previous article in the Villager announcing that the Village Show was being suspended for the foreseeable future due to the pressures on the Gardening Club that the event created, I am absolutely delighted to announce that we have received a number of offers of help and we intend to run the Show again in 2023.

The most important offer was from Stephen York who was our Show Secretary for many years and created many of the systems that underpin the organisation. He had retired from the role some years ago but has now stepped up again to allow us to open up the Show again.

There will be some changes to simplify the entry and running of the show so we hope to see many more entries.






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NEEDINGWORTH OVER 60's CLUB.

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
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"A Great Big Thank You" from the Village Hall Trust as NFEST22 raises vital funds for a more sustainable future"



We would like to say a huge thank you to everyone that came to this year's Needingworth Music Festival. From the villagers and those from further afield who enjoyed the two days of music and community spirit, to the record-breaking numbers of partners and volunteers that got involved, it was certainly a fantastic year for NFEST!

Every surplus penny generated goes into maintaining and developing the Village Hall for the community to use all year round. It's also a weekend for our much-loved community partners

- Holywell Community Preschool, the Parish Church of St John the Baptist, the First Needingworth Scouts and Woodgreen Pets Charity – to raise vital funds for their own work whilst making a fantastic contribution to the Festival itself.

Musical Highlights. Every year we try to mix up NFEST a little and keep it fresh – 12 of our 15 acts this year were newcomers. Saturday's musical highlights included Peterborough's amazing *Latino Sound*, Buckden's hard rockers *Junkyard Preachers* and fantastic local tribute act *Totally Floyd*, who nearly caused a riot amongst the audience who wanted them to play on longer!

Sunday's line up was bigger than ever, starting with some wonderful bluegrass before the gorgeous indie folk of *Elizabeth and Jameson* and acoustic hip hop stylings of *Uncle Arthur and the Alleycat.* And of course, we paid tribute

to our friend and long-time NFEST organiser Mick Carpenter through the creation of a new 'Mick Carpenter Legends' slot, his old band *Split Whiskers*' amazing headline set on Saturday night and a special Mickinspired jam session on Sunday.

Our Climate Declaration – reporting back on year 1. You might have noticed that this year we worked hard to bring an extra dimension to NFEST as we focused on ways to make the Festival more sustainable and reduce our environmental footprint. Starting with some of the key elements of our Climate Declaration, we managed to

eliminate a huge amount of single use plastic through new reusable pint glasses and installing a water fountain, by scaling up our recycling points and waste sorting activities and by adding vegetarian and vegan options to our on-site catering. We were thrilled that so many Festival-goers embraced and applauded these changes.

Looking to the future – the Village Hall's environmental plans. Next year we will continue to implement the ambitions of our Declaration - and we're delighted that The Trust is getting involved, using some of the funds generated by NFEST this year to invest in its own environmental improvements. Trustees are currently exploring the installation of solar panels on the Hall's roof and wider energy storage options, amongst other ideas.



NFEST23 - As you would expect, plans for NFEST23 are already well underway. We are acting on your feedback and planning to implement a number of further changes, including extending catering options, improving the layout of the marquee to make watching the music more enjoyable and diversifying the line-up of performers. We hope to be able to announce next year's festival dates very soon.

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Remembering your Faithful Friend this Christmas

Christmas may be a time to remember family and friends - but Dogs Trust Snetterton is also asking local dog owners to remember their four-legged friends this festive time, with a *Canine Care Card*.

The *Canine Care Card* is a free service, which helps to ensure your dog's future, in the event of you either passing away, receiving a life-changing diagnosis or moving into a care home. This can often be a great concern to some people, who perhaps do not have a family member or friend in a position to look after their dog, should the worst happen. Therefore, by signing up to the service, Dogs Trust can offer peace of mind, reassuring you that your faithful friend will be well cared for by the charity.

It is easy to sign up to the service, which simply asks for some information on your dog, including their likes and dislikes, as well as your dog's medical history and your vet details. It also asks for you to confirm who you would like as your Dog Guardian. This should be someone you trust, like a friend, family member, solicitor, neighbour or vet, who can sign over ownership of your dog to Dogs Trust on your behalf, should you become seriously ill or pass away.

You can register online by going to www.dogstrust.org.uk and searching for 'Canine Care Card' - or if you do not have access to the internet, you can request a paper version of the application form. Once the form is submitted, Dogs Trust will then write to you, to confirm when your application has been processed.

Once signed up, should your card ever need to be activated, Dogs Trust will then arrange with your Dog Guardian for your dog to come into the rehoming centre or into foster care. With a team of vets, trainers and behaviourists on hand if needed, your dog will then be welcomed, loved and well cared for by the charity, who will work tirelessly to find a loving new home for your much-loved canine companion.

The 12 days of Christmas

On the first day of Christmas my true love sent to me A **partridge** in a **pear tree**

On the 2nd day of Christmas my true love sent to me Two **turtle doves**, and a partridge in a pear tree

On the 3rd day of Christmas my true love sent to me Three **French hens**, two turtle doves, and a partridge in a pear tree

On the 4th day of Christmas my true love sent to me Four **calling birds**, three French hens, two turtle doves, and a partridge in a pear tree

On the 5th day of Christmas my true love sent to me Five **gold rings**, four **calling birds**, three French hens, two turtle doves, and a partridge in a pear tree

On the 5th day of Christmas my true love sent to me Six **geese** a-**laying**, five gold rings, four calling birds, etc. etc.

Seven swans a-swimming

Eight maids a-milking

Nine ladies dancing

Ten lords a-leaping

Eleven pipers piping

Twelve drummers drumming

This traditional English carol certainly dates back to the 18th century and the first known printed version was published in a children's book in 1780. Small variations in wording have taken place since then, however the most popular version quoted here was published in 1909 by Frederic Austin who also popularised the tune which is now standard. Austin was a baritone singer and composer and also a producer of operatic works. His 1909 version of the carol only differs in minor ways from the 1780 version; the word "on" is added to the first line of each round, and in the original carol the present on the 4th say was 'Four colly birds', the word "colly" meaning coal black in certain regions of England.

A number of variants of the song exist including regional variations within the British Isles and even some in other languages, including French versions which are believed to be based on the original traditional English carol. Popular singers have also parodied the carol; for example Andy Williams in 1963 recorded a version that began with "On the first day of Christmas my good friends brought to me A song for the Christmas tree, On the 2nd day of Christmas my good friends brought to me Two candy canes and a song for the Christmas tree," etc.

Although some people have tried to attach religious meaning to the presents included in the song, the consensus of opinion seems to be that, as well as simply being an enjoyable repeating song to sing, it was used to encourage children to develop their ability to memorise a list of items.

From our County Councillor

Dear Resident

My last contribution to the Villager was a little arduous with some extracts from the last National Census quoting all sorts of figures that sent many of you asleep! So hopefully this will be a lot lighter.

At the time of writing, our wonderful summer seems a distant memory but in fairness our autumn has been one of the best for many years. I am reasonably certain that the drainage issues within the village have now all been resolved and I thank Anglia Water for the amount of resources they put in, even though we all thought it took longer than we all would have liked to resolve. The footpath issues along Bluntisham Road outside the new developments are still not fully resolved with the developers and the County Council playing 'pass the parcel' making myself, District Councillor Jon Neish and the Parish Council both giddy and frustrated in the process and of course the unfortunate residents who have to negotiate the muddy verge if they wish to walk into the village, who are feeling forgotten, understandably so. Maddening as it is, be assured we are doing all we can to get the matter resolved as quickly as possible.

Buses are another vexing issue within the village and indeed of concern wider afield throughout the county. While bus services and associated subsidies previously came within the remint of the County Council, in recent years the strategic side of bus services came under the direct control of the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Combined Authority (CPCA). It seems the subsidies to the bus operators who service the various routes were either not renewed in time or certain government grants were not applied for in a timely manner and consequently notice was given on certain routes being withdrawn across the county including some key local ones.

When you hear the term the 'council' what does it actually mean? To most and understandably so, it means the organisation that delivers local public services, which over recent years has evolved into a generic body that is responsible for just about everything but does not seem to deliver what the public expects. Among the many we look to for local public services (not including the Health Service) we have a relatively new body called the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Combined Authority headed up by the elected Mayor who is currently Dr Nic Johnson and has the Leaders of all the District and Unitary Authorities on its board. Who along with Cambridgeshire County Council which is made up of 62 elected County Councillors across

the whole of the County (not including Peterborough) of which I am one, Huntingdonshire District Council and of course your ever dependable Parish Council, along with the Fire Authority and Police Service. Schools are virtually stand alone with the County Council being responsible for some ancillary items such as Transport, Allocations and Special Needs. Each one is charged with delivering specific services, although in many instances they are inextricably linked with another authority discharging their responsibility such as the schools example above and waste collection (district councils) and waste disposal (county council), some aspects of planning (district council and county council in some instances). Confused, I am not surprised, as I still have difficulty in finding my way around an ever changing system, hence what seems to be often unreasonable delays when looking at things from a common sense perspective? It seems this is a commodity (common sense) that is often in short supply, that said I have to say 4 layers of local government is too much and we could easily manage with one layer being removed, like we used to, just a thought !

This is the time of year when councils normally start to prepare their budgets for the following year and invariably we have some idea on what may be proposed. However, at the time of writing there seems to be a lot of uncertainty from central government with regard to public sector pay rises, which play a significant part in any proposed local tax rise and as things stand, I have no idea what will be happening, sorry.

As always if anyone would like me to publish a more indepth report about any item within the County Council's remit, I am more than happy to do so. As you may know the County Council is responsible for many areas from Adult Social Care to Highways, so if there is something you would like explaining in greater detail and you feel it would interest other readers, please get in touch and I will do my

best to publish a concise but interesting overview of the subject requested. Please remember your representatives at all levels County, District and of course your excellent Parish Council work very hard behind the scenes to ensure Needingworth and Holywell remain 'a special place'.

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




