


Parish Council Report

The official record of all meetings are the minutes which are available on the Parish Council website

www.holywell-cum-needingworthpc.org.uk.

August meeting: CCC Reynolds spoke about the County Council change of policy in respect of weed spraying advising members he had made representation that this policy was false economy as the weeds are causing significant damage underground.

He was asked for an update on the roadworks Overcote Lane, the road safety audit for the new footpath Bluntisham Road and the rationale behind the proposal to install 7 new streetlights on Bluntisham Road.

The resolution of the Environment committee made on 18th July 2023 to amend the cemetery regulations was not ratified by Council and the committee was asked to look at the proposal again. However, the revised cemetery fees where approved effective from 18th July 2023.

Accounts for payment made for the period 29^{th} June 2023 – 1^{st} August 2023 totalling £28639.68 were approved.

Quotes for the supply and installation of a Zip wire in the play area Overcote Lane were considered and the contract awarded to Wicksteed (see separate article for the latest update)

The contract for the 3-year tree survey was awarded and also for the renovation of the village lock up (see separate article for the latest update)

2 planning applications were considered, and Council recommended support.

Mr Alan Holloway's application was successful in filling a vacancy on the Council by way of co-option.

There was some discussion about the litter bin outside of the village hall and Cllr Fountain advised that the village hall trust would be writing to the Parish Council on the matter.

At the September meeting CCC K Reynolds updated members on the weed spraying issue advising he has received lots of complaints regarding weeds in the village. This is county wide issue, and he has put forward a motion to the full County Council and raised a petition.

Cllr Reynolds further reported that with regards to reports in the news of schools shutting due to RAAC, all local schools except 3 have been surveyed in Cambridgeshire and there are no reported issues.

The accounts for payment made 2nd August 2023 – 5th September 2023 totalling £11753.56 were approved.

A new lease for Holywell-cum-Needingworth Tennis Club and a new licence for Needingworth United FC were duly approved.

A special motion was considered and the removal of the blue sail shelter on Overcote Lane playing field was halted with a decision taken to install a Coronation commemorative bench under the sail once the "arms" have been removed.

A replacement bench for Mill Way cemetery was approved with the condition that the commemorative plaque be transferred to the new bench.

3 planning applications were considered and all three were supported.

The common land working party made a presentation on the findings, and it was agreed to open a consultation with the residents of Holywell over the matter. A draft letter was approved for issue to each household asking for comments.

The Clerk reported that the training session for the defibrillator advertised for 15th September was cancelled on the day due to the trainer being unable to attend. The alternative date of 20th October 2023 was declined pending the installation of the unit at the One Stop shop.

Accounts for payments for the period 6^{th} September – 3^{rd} October totalling £26105.05 were approved.

The draft lease for Holywell-cum-Needingworth tennis club and licence for Needingworth United football club were approved for signing prior to issue to the respective clubs.

Three applications for co-option were considered for a vacancy on the Council and Mrs Susan Martin was co-opted by a majority vote.

A letter from St Johns PCC asking for the Parish Council to effect repairs to the Holy well was considered and a discussion held regarding the legalities of whether the well constituted part of the closed church yard and therefore within the Parish Councils responsibilities. The Council resolved that until proof is received from the Diocese that the Parish Council are responsible for the well and steps that no further action is taken.

An update was given on the responses to the consultations on Holywell Front. A decision was taken to revise the signs and their location.

Refurbishment of Village Lock Up

Did you know that historically the lock-up is also known as the Cage. It was used for the short-term imprisonment of local drunks or felons before they could be moved to larger accommodation. It was built in 1838 and is situated in the centre of the village near the War Memorial. There is an old, faded date-stone above the door together with a new plaque.

Following restoration in 2011 it was noted two years ago that the building was again in need of renovation with the door coming away from its frame and the mortar and plaster crumbling away. A report was commissioned from a structural engineer which highlighted the issues particularly relating to water ingression.

Being a Grade II listed building permission had to be granted from Huntingdonshire District Council before work could commence, a process that took a considerable length of time.

However, JH Building restoration Ltd. were finally able to start work at the beginning of September. The door has been repaired and along with a new frame re-hung. An additional course of bricks has been laid to allow for a lead flashing parapet to be placed on the roof with a gutter to the rear taking rainwater away from the brickwork which has been repointed with lime mortar.

Some work still remains to be completed inside but Council is pleased with the work carried out and hope that it will preserve this building for the community for many years to come.

Zip wire – Coming Soon!

The Parish Council has approved the supply and installation of a 30m zip wire at the playing field on Overcote Lane. The order has been placed and installation started on 30th October 2023. Councillors hope that this equipment will be a welcome addition to the play area and enjoyed by all.



Holywell Front consultation result

The Parish Council had been contacted on numerous occasions with residents of Holywell expressing concerns over the use of the common land outside of the Ferry Boat for car parking and recreational use resulting in litter, noise and also a general erosion of the level of the common land.

In order to look into the matter Council established a working party of 3 Councillors who looked at the concerns expressed and then made a proposal to Council that measures could be put into place to restrict parking in this location therefore helping to conserve the ground levels which act as a flood defence.

As this was a concern raised by residents a consultation was undertaken with each home in Holywell being contacted with an outline of the proposal asking for comments and suggestions.

24 residents responded but there was no overall consensus of opinion as to a workable solution.

As a result, Council resolved to improve signage in the area outlining the rules relating to the common land, but no further action will be taken at this time.

Cemetery Regulations

At the 3rd October Council meeting members resolved to ratify the resolution of the Environment committee amending the Mill Way



cemetery regulations.

Council continues to receive increasing numbers of requests for burials from people who reside outside of the Parish. With the increasing population of this Parish who, after all, do pay for the ongoing maintenance of the cemetery, along with the reduction in available space it was resolved that the cemetery is now to be closed to non-residents.

The pre purchase of graves was also stopped although spouses or partners can buy an adjacent plot on the death of their partner.

Council does understand the sensitivity of this matter but consider it to be the fairest way to deal with the increase in demand by giving preference to those who live in the Parish.

proposal and a special motion was taken back to Council to ask that they reconsider the strategy by investing in a Blue commemorative Coronation bench to sit under the sail so providing much needed shelter on the field from the elements.

We are pleased to say that the revised plan was given approval, and the bench is now in situ awaiting use.

Village Hall Report

The Village Hall Trust aims to see the Hall available for all Villagers to use and we hope that there are enough events on at the hall for your pleasure. Groups that book the hall on a regular basis (typically weekly) include the Cubs, Brownies, Scouts and Guides. The hall is also booked for Music, Art, Indoor Bowls, Pilates, Tai Chi, Yoga and a Scribblers Writing Group. Chatters have a weekly café every Thursday. The Gardening Club book the hall for several events during the year, the Wellworth Players put on at least two shows every year and the Village Hall Trust organises Band nights with Let There B/DC (an AČ/DC tribute band) in November). News from Ouse Fen nature reserve

The RSPB have been working in partnership with Heidelberg Materials on the transformational wetland-project at Needingworth Quarry for more than two decades. Turning their aggregates quarry into the largest reedbed in the UK creates a wetland that will support birds of

huge conservation importance like Bittern - along with many other wildlife species - and a great place to visit to boot!

Summer Wildlife Highlights

The spring and summer season just past is the key season for us when we hope to see breeding birds and other wildlife making hay from our work over the previous year. This year there were several notable events, representing mixed fortunes for our native wildlife.

Very positively the number of male Bitterns returned to the second highest record since the project began, with 11 booming birds this year. Notably two birds returned to Cuckoo Fen, which has received intensive management work in recent years. A similar record was achieved with seven Marsh Harriers nests. Our regular Crane pair returned but have again failed to fledge any young and we are trying to establish if this might be due to infertility. We don't survey our Bearded Tits very widely, but they can be seen throughout the reedbeds. Whilst we did not record any Turtle Dove breeding on Ouse Fen this year there still appears to be good numbers dotted around the wider project area and at our nearby Fen Drayton Lakes reserve. The population of breeding Lapwing and Redshank on Berry Fen is guite stable year-on-year, but we are working hard to encourage more young to fledge inside the electric antipredator fencing there. The Heronry there faced another hard year with freezing March weather sealing the fate of many youngsters. However, later nesting heron species including Little and Cattle Egrets fared much better.

On a more sombre note, Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (HPAI) killed dozens of breeding Black-headed Gulls and Common Terns at Ouse Fen and Fen Drayton Lakes this year. The full impact on wild bird populations across the country still has to be fully assessed but conservation concern only increases.

Whether as a result of climate change or natural range change, we saw another reminder of how rapidly distribution is changing for some species when, for a couple of weeks this summer Norfolk Hawkers dragonflies, formerly absent from Cambridgeshire, were probably the easiest species to see on the reserve. But our final and most remarkable wildlife news dates back to last year as it has only now been confirmed that a pair of Glossy Ibis bred successfully for the first time in the UK in 2022 within our local 'Ouse Valley' reserves. Reserve & Other Hanson-RSPB Wetland Project News

Habitat management work takes a bit of a backseat over the summer except for the beneficial grazing of livestock on grassland margins. Working closely with one of our local cattle graziers we have been experimenting with 'Nofence' technology to focus grazing on key areas we want to graze more intensively. The location of 'virtual' fences lines are learnt by the collared animals, under audio and electric stimuli, all managed remotely via a phone app – amazing!

Meanwhile the project partnership has been focussing on the design of the river water abstraction facilities to ensure that the wetland is permanently supplied with the water it needs and will support the migration to and from the river of what is a threatened population of European Eels. Restoration also continues to create the eleventh wetland mere and the extension of the perimeter canal.

Winter prospects – take a look!

Expected highlights coming up over winter include the chance of seeing of wintering birds of prey from the reserve trails such as a Merlin or Short-Eared Owls, both seen already this October. Otherwise, you might like to simply soak up the wide open vistas, enjoy a healthy walk or plan a longer hike via public rights of way to one of our neighbouring reserves and the wider countryside beyond.

The reserve is open during daylight hours via our visitor entrance between Earith and Willingham but to plan a trip in more detail go to

After months of waiting we finally have official notices from the Commonwealth War Graves Commission at each church gate for the one war grave in Holywell churchyard – Pte William Turner, 3rd Bn the Buffs (East Kent Regt), died 1917 aged 19.

Christmas visitors

Are you expecting visitors this Christmas? Or perhaps it is you who will be visiting.

In the Christmas story, in the Bible, there are many visitors. There's a lot of visiting. An angel visited Mary to tell her of the child she would bear. An angel visited Joseph in a dream to explain why his fiancée was expecting a child. Mary and Joseph visited Bethlehem because of the government census. Angels visited shepherds on the night that Jesus was born and the shepherds then went to visit the baby Jesus in the stable. Wise men came from afar to visit the new born King.

But there is one person in the story who does not visit. He is not a visitor. It is Jesus. He did not come to visit – He came to stay. He came to be one of us – a human being. He is the eternal God, the second person of the Holy Trinity. But He was born into our world as a baby on the first Christmas Day. He came to stay with <u>us</u>. Seven hundred years beforehand, the prophet Isaiah wrote: "The virgin will be with child and will give birth to a son and will call him Immanuel." Why the name Immanuel? Because Immanuel means "God with us." God had come to stay with us in the person of Jesus.

He became one of us, and came to stay with us, because he came to rescue us. The angel told Joseph that the baby was to be given the name Jesus (which means Saviour) "because he will save his people from their sins." He would do this by giving his life on the cross as the perfect sacrifice for our sins.

Will you be content with singing a couple of carols and sending cards with pictures of the baby Jesus and the shepherds and wise men? Or are you willing for Jesus to come and stay with you? 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From our County Councillor

Autumn is always a good time to reflect upon the year and look forward to what the future has in store for us, I for one have never seen so much turbulence on the national scene and unrest in the world; we tend to focus on issues that have an impact on our day to day lives, we should think of others across the world, as we count our blessings and appreciate all the good things in life and yes the grass was greener and the birds sang more frequently and we were happy with our lot not so many years ago, but did we really relish the outside WC's, the frozen ice inside bedroom windows, the long walk to school in all weathers or the exciting prospect of a chicken on our table sometime in the future, I think not. Times change and often we have little choice but to embrace the way out future is being shaped by others.

You may recall I mentioned a long while ago that there is a time delay between when I write my county update and the time it is actually published and distributed, consequently the information can be dated when you read it. Well, the last edition of the Villager was a classic example of this. As I wrote about everyday things, our streets, pavements, kerbs and verges were being overrun with something that resembled 'The Day of the Triffids' (showing my age). Unbeknown to myself and many other councillors the County, council changed its policy on controlling weed growth and stopped the annual cycle of weed spraying in the springtime, I am told somewhat belatedly that it was to assist the environment by reducing chemicals being used. Although many myself included think this is some wheeze dreamt up by the current administration to save money, which it did of course. There was no discussion (that I recall) or consultation before this decision was reached and implemented, thus resulting in what only I can describe as chaos as councillors inboxes across the county were swamped by irate house holders demanding to know what was happening and at this point I would add your Parish Council were more than a little perplexed (annoyed, rightly so) as at that time I had no idea what was happening. Since then, the Conservative group who are the opposition party organised a lobby petition, which many of you signed and submitted a motion to full council calling on a reversal of this disastrous policy. Disastrous, a strong term I hear you say, as surely it must be good to help the environment and yes that has some merit. You will have noticed these weeds some taller than a child, have infiltrated almost every crack in the road and pavements growing in some cases to carrot size in the root, damaging the surface and subsurface. Setting us on a path of huge expenditure in these austere times with the future from a footpath and road maintenance perspective looking very bleak indeed.

While talking about roads, we have been made aware (not that we did not know) that many of our roads with a Peat soil base are becoming very dangerous due to the collapse of the subbase and the same is now applying to those who have a heavy Clay base, as the soil expands and contracts due to the weather. At the moment it is estimated that 36% of our road network is affected. And an estimated £300 million is required with a further £5 million per year to address this, but sadly I suspect this will rise significantly particularly if we have a bad winter !

By the time you read this, it may well be old news, but I have just been informed that central government have notified the Dolphin Hotel that it must start the removal of asylum seekers in November with the process being completed by the end of the month. Unfortunately, I cannot add to that as information is sparse, but you will recall when this first happened I explained that no consultation at all took place between government and the local community including councillors at all levels. If you are interested in further details, they can be found at **Asylum hotel summary and FAQ - GOV.UK (www.gov.uk)**

I have just received a huge amount of data regarding Health inequalities in Cambridgeshire, which also makes comparisons with other parts of the country. This includes age profiles, cause of death and all sorts of other health related data, which suggests to me on my first read through that Huntingdonshire is a good place to live from a health perspective. I will attempt to pen an article for the Villager on this subject in the near future.

I was asked to explain what a councillor's role is with regard to budget setting each year. I will try to explain. Put simply, it is to consider the Council's finance and funding as a central part of all decision making and to ensure that the Council provides value for

money, or best value, in all its services. There is unlikely to be sufficient money to do everything the Council would wish to provide due to its budget gap (what comes in and what goes out). Therefore, Councillors need to consider their priorities and objectives and ensure that these drive the budget process. In addition, it is essential that the Council consider how efficient it is in supplying services and obtaining the appropriate service outcome for all its services. The councils Strategy, Resources and Performance Committee is responsible for leading the process through the democratic cycle. The other Policy and Service Committees have a vital role in scrutinising the proposals on their own areas of service and making any recommendations to Strategy, Resources and Performance Committee that are then considered in the context of the wider budget. Strategy, Resources and Performance then consider those recommendations, consultation responses, advice and making a recommendation to Full Council who ultimately approve the final budget in February each year.

Cambridgeshire County Council is doing its bit to prepare residents of the county for the winter, in their Be Winter Wise campaign including:

- Work being carried out on the county's road network including gritting, gulley and drain clearance in preparation of the impact of bad weather.
- Road safety activities and advice, encouraging pedestrians, cyclists and motorist to wear reflective clothing, check lights and brakes and always travel to prevailing road conditions.
- Information to help residents to stay warm and well through the colder months, with an emphasis on activities to reduce loneliness and support mental as well as physical health.
- Further work to promote the councils household support fund, open to eligible residents who are most affected by the cost of living.
- Supporting NHS by promoting Flu, Covid and MMR jabs to eligible groups.

The footpath issues along Bluntisham Road outside the new developments are still not fully resolved with the developers and the County Council playing 'pass the parcel' making myself, District Councillor Jon Neish, the Parish Council and residents both frustrated and infuriated as repeated promises of completion have been broken. We are ever hopeful Christmas will see the end of it all but past experience has taught us not to hold our breath!

No doubt many of you will have seen that I made national news (Daily Mail) with regard to the 'car traps' in Station Road S Ives. Each week I am inundated with emails regarding the merits for and against the car traps. My answer has always been consistent, is that they were installed as a safety feature to prevent motorist taking a short cut to enter the busy by pass, with the potential to cause a serious accident. There has been numerous safety audits and a whole proliferation of signs warning people of the hazard, yet some still insist on driving into the hole ! My quote was, if motorist cannot see a well signed and large hole in the ground then what chance does a small child stand and should these people be driving at all. There is no truth in the rumour we are going to fill it with water and borrow some crocodiles from Johnsons.

Efforts are still continuing to make the footpath along Conger Lane Holywell towards the bridge less difficult to use with over hanging branches and ivy causing problems to the walkers. While not a high priority, it will get cleared eventually.

As always if anyone would like me to publish a more in-depth report about any item within the County Councils remit, I am more than happy to do so. As you may know the County Council is responsible for many areas from Adult Social Care to Highways, so if there is something you would like explaining in greater detail and you feel it would interest other readers, please get in touch and I will do my best to publish a concise but hopefully interesting overview of the subject requested. Please remember your representatives at all levels County, District and of course your excellent Parish Council work very hard behind the scenes to ensure Needingworth and Holywell remains 'a special place' to live.

<u>Stay steady on your</u> feet with new fall risk checking tool

Cambridgeshire County Council has launched an online fall risk checking tool to help you understand your risk of falling and simple steps you can take to stay active and independent.

From the age of 65, the risk of having a fall increases but many are avoidable. The new tool, Steady on your Feet, is



aimed at those who haven't previously had a fall but would like to understand what they can do to prevent this happening.

Steady on Your Feet is easy to use, asking a short series of questions to help understand any individual risks you might have and providing an action plan to keep you active and independent while increasing your confidence and reducing the risk of falling. You can fill it in yourself or ask a family member or friend if you need extra help.

Suggested steps to prevent a fall might include arranging an eye or hearing test, increasing your activity levels and eating a balanced diet, or even looking after your feet and making sure you wear supportive footwear with non-slip soles.

Two Defibrillators in Holywell

As there have been a number of defibrillators now fitted in Needingworth which are maintained and supported by the Parish Council, it became obvious that similar potentially life saving machines should be made available to the residents of Holywell.

Towards the end of 2022 an appeal was organised by a resident of the Village to hopefully raise the money for a defibrillator to be fitted in a convenient place in the village.

The appeal was extremely well supported by approx 85% of the village residents to such an extent that it was possible to buy \underline{TWO} machines which was ideal given the unusual circular layout of Holywell.

The Parish Council was extremely helpful in procuring the machine to match others in the parish to help with consistent maintenance and parts etc.

Greene King were approached to see if one could be fitted at The Old Ferry Boat to cover that end of the village. Obviously, in such a large company, obtaining permission took a long time but in the end they not only agreed to have one fitted on their property but offered to install the machine free of charge and also bear the cost of future electricity costs.

This machine was fitted in July on the fencing at the side of the pub as the main building is obviously listed which would have complicated the process considerably.

It was decided to try and see if the second machine could be fitted at St John the Baptist Church at the other end of the village so ALL residents had convenient access. Once again the church building is Grade 1 listed so installing a defibrillator on this would be very complicated.

However, it was pointed out by Stephen York the Church Warden that the church porch was not subject to this restriction as it was added much later. He approached the diocese and obtained permission to fit the machine just inside the porch.

Local electrician Neil Craig fitted the machine in October and both machines are now fully operational to provide cover for all of the residents of Holywell.





The machines were handed over to the Parish Council in view of their future commitment to maintain and service them. The small residue of the appeal was split between the church to cover the future electrical costs and the British Heart Foundation
