Parish Council Summary Report

By Parish Clerk

Full Council meetings were held in February, March and April 2018.

The Annual Parish meeting was held on 17th April 2018 and was attended by 9 residents.

In total 12 planning applications were considered over the 3 months covered by this report.

Expenditure for the period was £61,778.56

New contract for electricity supply to Millfields signed. Parish Council agreed to purchase some equipment to loan to environmental groups, please see separate article

A sub committee was formed to explore all options for a new standalone Parish Office.

The bus shelter has been painted and a seat purchased to be installed.

Speed data was reviewed from the mobile sign in Church Street 20mph zone outside of the school, it was noted that the highest speed recorded had been 73mph.

The average speed of vehicles is 24.2mph.

85% of vehicles are recorded as travelling up to or slower than 31mph.

The speed sign was turned around to face oncoming traffic from Church Street to Holywell.

Clarity was sought from HDC that the rural exemption site will offer 1st priority to applicants with a village connection. Great British Spring Clean event held on Friday 9th March 2018, please see separate article.

At the February meeting a presentation was received by a resident on ANPR. Please see separate article.

At the March meeting a presentation was received by representatives for Gifford's Park to share updated plans.

<u>Automatic Number Plate Recognition</u> (ANPR) Report

The Parish Council received a presentation on ANPR at the February 2018 meeting following this the Council made further enquiries into the feasibility of an ANPR/CCTV system for the village.

Having carried out extensive enquiries, spoken with a local Parish who operate a CCTV scheme and also obtained further quotes for supply of a system in line with the Parish Council's financial regulations the Parish Council considered all of the findings at a meeting held on 3rd April 2018.

A summary of these findings is listed below:

- Any system would have to be operated by and controlled by the Parish Council.
- Cambridgeshire County Council (CCC) who are responsible for the highways whilst not having an official stance on the matter have advised that ANPR can only be used for traffic management tool not to monitor vehicles entering or egressing the village.
- CCC further confirmed that they would not give permission for a camera to be placed onto a lamp post nor for an alternative post to be erected on the highway or footpath.
- CCTV as the alternative option to ANPR still requires a camera to be placed at specific locations within site of the road and using a private residential property would not conform to data protection regulations and requires the transfer of data back to the Parish Council office. The Council have been advised that supplying power for this purpose would cost in the region of £3000 per location.

 Enquires have shown that CCTV cannot be used as a village security system. All incidents or crimes need to be reported to the Police who, if they have details of a vehicle registration relating to the incident, would be able to approach the Council to view any CCTV footage that may be on file. This does not tend to happen in isolated cases.

The unquantifiable factor in our research is how much of a deterrent to crimes installation of a system would be.

Based on the information the Parish Council resolved it would not be progressing with a system at this time.

Neighbourhood Watch

Spring arrived, we thought at the beginning of April with warmer and dryer weather. As I write this article, we have returned to the gloom of grey skies, cold and rain! In that brief warmer spell we saw the criminal fraternity up to their usual activities for this

time of year; cycle thefts have started to increase and shed burglaries are on the rise. Please remember never to leave cycles unattended on your front lawn or driveway and always keep your shed and garage locked when not in use. A good idea is to security mark valuable items like mowers, power tools and bicycles with your postcode using a UV marker pen. Vehicle content theft is also on the increase, particularly vans. Remove valuable items and personal belongings from your vehicle out of sight of a potential thief. Even non-valuable items such as empty carrier bags, if left on view, can be enough for a thief to break in, just to see what's inside. You are then left with the problem and cost of repairing the smashed window or broken lock. Even though it may be a hot day, close your windows and sunroof whenever you leave your vehicle unattended, even if it's only for a few minutes.

There have been a variety of telephone "scams" doing the rounds. Just be aware of any unusual telephone calls, never ring back premium rate lines unless you know the number and never give bank details over the phone.

Finally we have had reports of cold calling canvassers arriving on doorsteps to carry out a survey supposedly for a particular utility company. Whilst the householder answers the front door the canvasser's accomplice tries to enter the property via the rear entrance. Before you open the front door to any visitor, please check who they are, use a chain on the front door and keep your back door locked. Not an ideal situation in the warmer weather of summer but better than having an uninvited person in your home.

Please continue to report any non-urgent incident to the police on 101 and keep your street NHW Coordinator advised of any concerns. Let's hope the warmer weather returns soon!



Holywell cum Needingworth Over 60s Club

In March we had the Annual General Meeting and we presented a cheque to the representatives of the Parkinson Society, who were our last year's charity. We discussed the increasing difficulty for the Over 60s Club to use the big hall because of our difficulty in putting up and putting away the heavy tables and we have too many regular members to fit comfortably in the Pavilion. However we are 'soldiering on' at the moment. The new committee has organised a programme for the year starting in April with two representatives from Emmaus, who talked about their own problem of homelessness and about the work of the charity. Emmaus is our charity for this year. In May Nicola showed us exercises to get fit for the summer. BEES

I would like to tell you a little about the bees you will see in your garden. We have three different categories. We have one honey bee, 24 different bumblebees and about 230 different solitary bees in this country.

The **Honey bees** we beekeepers look after in hives. These are

the bees that make honey which is their food. As long as the nectar is flowing they will make honey, much more than they need and we take their surplus. The honey bees are awake all winter clustering around their queen so

need to store honey to get them through until the spring. In each hive there is usually one queen, about 30,000 female workers and maybe 300 male drones. The queen can live for up to five years though they are usually replaced after about 2 years, the drones could live for a summer and the workers live for six weeks wearing out their wings foraging.

By the end of April the queen will be laying around 2,000 eggs a day so it doesn't take long for the hive to get overpopulated. This is when they create a new queen to take over the hive while the old gueen takes off with half of the workers to find a new home and start again. This is called swarming and is how we get new colonies so if you see any swarms give me a ring and I will come and collect them. I have a list of beekeepers old and new who will be in need of bees so there is always a home for them.

Bumblebees also have a queen who lays the eggs. In the spring

the new queens come out of hibernation and begin to make a home. She makes cups in which she lays eggs. The first litter will be tiny as she has to look after them herself. Successive litters get bigger throughout the season as there are more bees to go out foraging for them. The final litter of the year is the queens for next year and the

drones to mate with them. These new queens hibernate over winter while the rest of the colony die. There are between 50 and 200 in a colony of bumblebees. Bumblebees make their homes in bird boxes, holes in the ground and under paving slabs and in the eaves of houses.

Solitary bees live in small groups. The females are fertile and lay

the eggs. These are the bees that will use beehouses - the blocks of wood with holes in or collections of bamboo canes. They also use holes in walls i.e. the masonry bees and those that use holes in the ground are called mining bees. They will lay a row of eggs with walls between them leaving food for the larvae to eat until thev hatch. There will the ground in Millfields. probably be one male



A tawny mining bee coming out of its hole in

egg and up to 6 female eggs. The males hatch first.

What you can do to help bees is grow the right sort of flowers in your garden so that the bees have access to nectar and pollen throughout the summer season.

Bees have different lengths of tongues so that those flowers with long tubes are no good for those with short tongues like the honev bees. If you look at lavender you will see that bumblebees will be on it early in the day as the nectar starts to flow then by lunchtime when the nectar has come further out of the flower you will get the honey bees and then as the nectar goes back into the flower at the end of the day it will be the bumbles with the longer tongues that will be there. Bees love herbs and flowers that are open so it is easy for them to get to the nectar and pollen. Consider the difference between a wild rose and a cultivated one. The wild rose is open and very easy for the bees to access whereas the cultivated one has so many petals it is not easy to access.

We have a forage gap in June where the bees struggle. It is guite often necessary for us beekeepers to feed them as the hedgerows have finished flowering as have the fruit trees and vegetables in the gardens so there is a lack of nectar. It is this period in particular that it is necessary for us to make sure our gardens are blooming.





The train drew into the station. It was King's Cross, but not asked: as I remembered it. Large metal pillars lay fallen, stretched across the tracks. Broken girders, bricks and boulders piled up like mountains formed a new landscape, now covered in a layer of dust. People crawling around it, with ash in their hair, over faces and clothes, made them look prematurely aged. Every expression was gaunt or shocked. Blankly, they responded to questions, prompted by police and emergency teams attending.

I would not look at the epicentre of the devastation. Diverting my sight, I made for the furthest group of passengers on the lowest platform by the doors to the lifts.

"No, Madam, not down there, please! This way ..."

I conducted the frightened group through the underpass. Others noticing our movement quickly joined us. Soon I was fronting a large exodus.

I turned round to check for any stragglers amongst these apparent survivors ... yes, among them an injured woman was attempting to walk with us. Still in shock, she was unaware she was gripping her wounded arm tightly to her, her face crushed and blood-stained, blonde tinted hair hidden under the grey ash. Pain hadn't registered. I gestured to a paramedics team up ahead and they surrounded diately turned to the others, checking for any more waiting.

"This is my sister, Mummy is back there." He points towards the booking office. "We can't move her."
