Ede Clendinnen

Mr. Reginald Ede Clendinnen was a significant person in Australian Badminton. He was born in New Zealand before moving to Tasmania where he became the President in 1930 and 1931. Ede Clendinnen was awarded life membership of the Tasmanian Badminton association in 1933.

In 1935 Ede became the founding president of the Australian Badminton Association who we now know today as Badminton Australia

The Teams Trophy is named after Ede Clendinnen!

Over 300,000 play badminton in Australia

There are over 300 badminton clubs in Australia

Badminton Australia was established in 1935 and the first official National Championships were held in 1935

Cliff Cutt

Mr. Clifton R. Cutt, better known as Cliff Cutt, was the Australian Men's Doubles Champion in 1954 and 1963, and the Australian Mixed Doubles Champion in 1950 and 1952. He captained Australia in the Thomas Cup and Whyte Trophy competitions and made ten international appearances as a player. Cliff served as a Victorian Selector, Captain and Manager of State Teams, as well as being on the Council of Badminton Victoria for many years. Cliff also served as an Australian Selector.

In 1970 Cliff's family donated a permanent trophy that recognised all the attributes of sportsmanship to be awarded at the annual national senior interstate carnival. The winners hold the trophy for 12 months and each receives a replica trophy.

History of the Australian National Championships competing for the Ede Clendinnen Shield

The Ede Clendinnen Shield Event is Australia's premier badminton national event. The event has a maximum of 8 states/territories and has significant history in Australian Badminton. Reginald Ede Clendinnen, with support of Victorian's Harold Wray and Alf Lennart, decided to start an official interstate series in 1929, then following that the Australian Badminton Association was formed in 1935 and a National Championships formally commenced.

Ede Clendinnen donated the shield for the teams competition with three states contesting the inaugural event in 1935; Victoria, Tasmania & South Australia. When the original shield was completely filled with the winners names, the Hon. Roy Ward donated a second shield.

The original format consisted of nine matches (Three Men's Doubles, Women's Doubles & Mixed Doubles), in 1935 the format changed to include Four Men's Singles, Women's Singles & Mixed Doubles and Two Men's Doubles & Women's Doubles – A total of 16 matches. In 1994 the format was changed again to Three Men's Singles & Women's Singles and Two Men's Doubles, Women's Doubles & Mixed Doubles – 12 Matches in total. This is the first year of the event under a new format of 5 matches 1 Women's Singles, 1 Men's Doubles, Women's Doubles, Men's Doubles and Mixed Doubles to align with international BWF competition.
