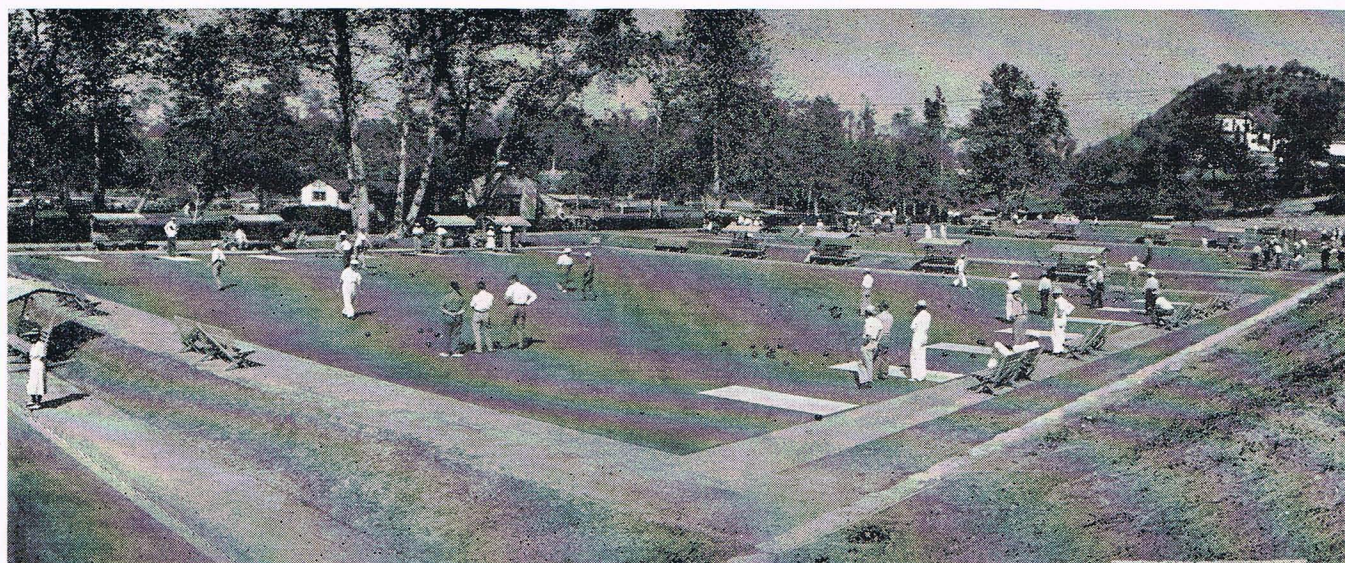


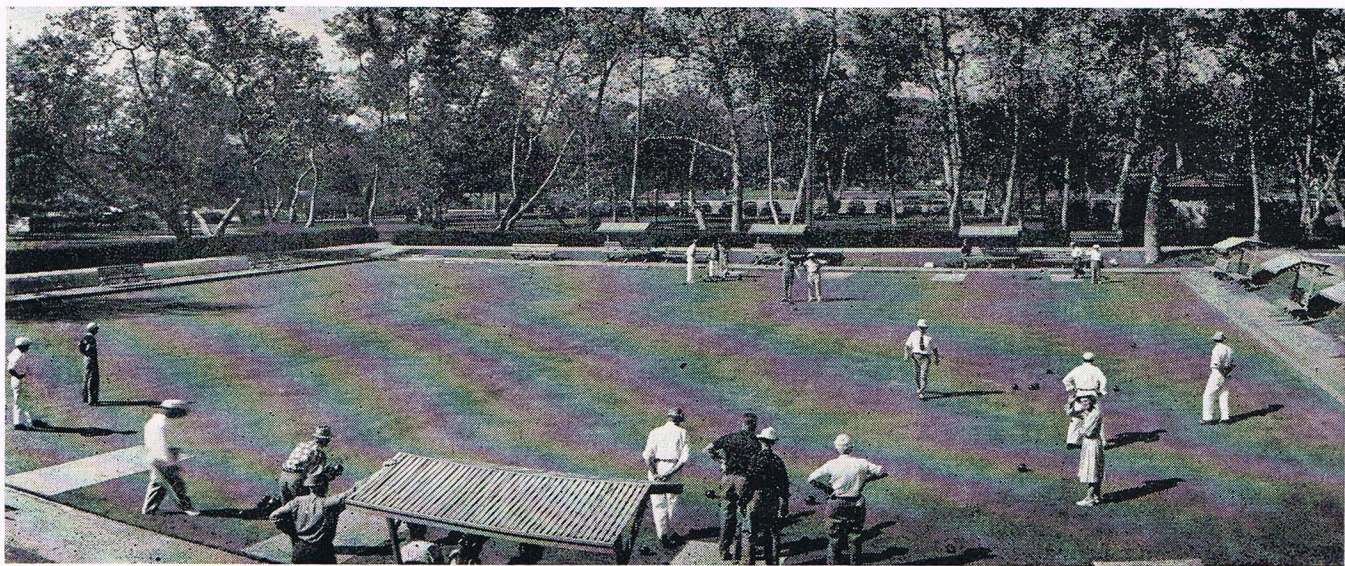

WHAT LAWN BOWLING OFFERS

Recreation might be defined as the coordination of mind and muscle, tempered with competitive incentive. For this reason, lawn bowling is well suited to serve all ages, and both sexes and every community, large or small, might well consider a small lawn bowling green or greens so that life could be made more abundant for all of its citizens.

Many of our larger cities have extensive bowling facilities as a phase of their public park and recreation programs. Most of the clubs currently in existence are located on public park properties. This is as it should be, but there is still room for a tremendous expansion of lawn bowling in cities throughout the country in the fifty thousand or better population class.

Individual lawn bowling equipment is in the lower cost bracket when compared to many of our other sports. A set of four bowls plus a pair of tennis or heelless rubber-soled shoes costs about one-fifth as much as a set of golf clubs with golf shoes; about equals the price of two tennis racquets and is slightly more than an indoor alley bowling ball with shoes.

While the big area for developing an interest in lawn bowling lies in the public park recreation field, there are other contemporary fields where promotion is under way. These include resort hotels throughout the country that offer their guests excellent lawn bowling facilities; also, at some golf and country clubs, bowling greens are maintained for the use of members. In addition, consideration, which might well open up an entirely new field for the game of bowls, is currently being given to the establishment of bowling greens at one of the country's leading universities and, finally, at some Army rehabilitation and veterans hospitals, greens have been made available as an excellent recuperative aid to patients. Industrial recreation programs should be another field of interest in the promotion of the game.

One of the outstanding points in favor of lawn bowling is that almost anyone, regardless of age or sex, can, if given the opportunity, learn to bowl and enjoy it. As is true with any other sport there are individuals who will acquire more skill than others but this has not proven detrimental to the enjoyment of the game by the average player.

Because the game is played mostly as a daylight sport, it has drawn most of its players from the age group that are retired from active occupations, thus mitigating against those younger employed individuals who, if the opportunity were made available, might well become devotees of the sport. Actually, daylight bowling is not a necessity and there are, at the present time, many clubs which have some or all of their rinks flood-lighted thus enabling their members to enjoy the game after dark.

There is another point dealing with the older age group that should be of interest to recreation executives. In planning recreation programs have these executives given due consideration to the one-tenth of our entire population, the seventeen million who have reached the age of sixty-five or over? Many of them would enjoy lawn bowling if facilities were made available.

DO YOU KNOW THAT

There seems to be no evidence of the exact beginning or origin of the game of Lawn Bowls. The Southampton Old Bowling Green is the oldest Bowling Green in the world. It was old when Sir Frances Drake played the famous game on Plymouth Hoe in July 1588.

The Southampton Green was established prior to 1299 A.D. This Green was partially destroyed in the last War and has recently been reconstructed and preserved by funds from all over the world, the contributors receiving Honorary Life Membership in the Club as a reward.

The History of Lawn Bowling in the United States is not quite clear. Many Historians believe that in 1615 the game was active in Massachusetts and Connecticut. It is definitely known that there was a Bowling Green on the Estate of George Washington at Mount Vernon. At about this time Bowling on the Green was active in New York City and Williamsburg, Virginia. The game was non-existent for about 100 years following the Revolutionary War.

The American Lawn Bowling Association was organized in Buffalo, N. Y. on July 27th, 1915. The first National Tournament was held at Boston, Mass., At Franklin Field on Labor Day 1918. The first Lawn Bowling Club was formed in Florida in 1916 at St. Petersburg and is still in existence and very active, probably the largest Lawn Bowling Club in the world consisting of all male members. The A.L.B.A. was admitted

to the International Bowling Board in 1938. First U. S. Singles Championship was held in 1957 at Spalding Inn, N. H. First U. S. Doubles Championship in 1958 at Buck Hill Falls Inn, Penna.

For the promotion and administrative purposes the American Lawn Bowling Association has grouped the Clubs in the United States into five territorial Divisions as follows: Eastern Division, Southeast Division, Central Division, Northwest Division and Southwest Division.

The above article taken from the handbook on Lawn Bowling published by the Southeast Division of the American Lawn Bowling Association and submitted by Charles P. Middleton has just come to the editor's office and he wishes to extend congratulations to all who were responsible for the beauty, make up and overall excellence as well as the information material contained in the book. Again orchids to you all.

Prominent Northwest Bowler Passes

Peter B. Solberg of the Tacoma Lawn Bowling Club, one of the top Northwest lawn bowlers, died of cancer at the Tacoma General Hospital on February 4th, 1964 at the age of 64. He was one of the leading Handball players of the Northwest before switching to bowls. He won the NW Singles Championship several times, the last time in 1963 over a big field of NW and British Columbia contestants. He was the Northwest representative at the U.S. Single Championship at The Spalding Inn, New Hampshire in 1958. For the past several years he has teamed with Charles Middleton in NW Doubles competition; the pair won the

NW Doubles in 1961, and competed in the U.S. Double Championship at Buck Hill Falls, winning two of their four round-robin matches. Last year they were the NW Division runner-up team in the Doubles. Peter was a member of the ALBA Touring Team which visited Australia in the Spring of 1963, and while losing weight, did not appear to be suffering, but thought he might have a stomach ulcer. In September, he and Middleton played in the SW Division Tournament in Oakland, capturing First Place in the Third Flight of the Triples (with Jos. Arnesch of Oakland). An operation for possible ulcers on January 16th revealed far-advanced cancer (sarcoma) of the stomach—a second emergency operation failed to save his life. His loss will be keenly felt by many—Lodge No. 197, F & AM, Lodge No. 244, Scandinavian Fraternity of America, Tacoma Elks Lodge No. 174, Carpenters Union No. 470, and most of all by his many friends in lawn bowling clubs across the country as well as in Australia, and his wife Carla and his fine family. He was still active in business, being owner and operator of the Timber Fabrication Company of Tacoma, specialists in the manufacture of building trusses. He was an active member of the First Methodist Church.

Winners, first flight; Biggs & Frisbie. Runners-up; Wm. Turner & Cianfarani.

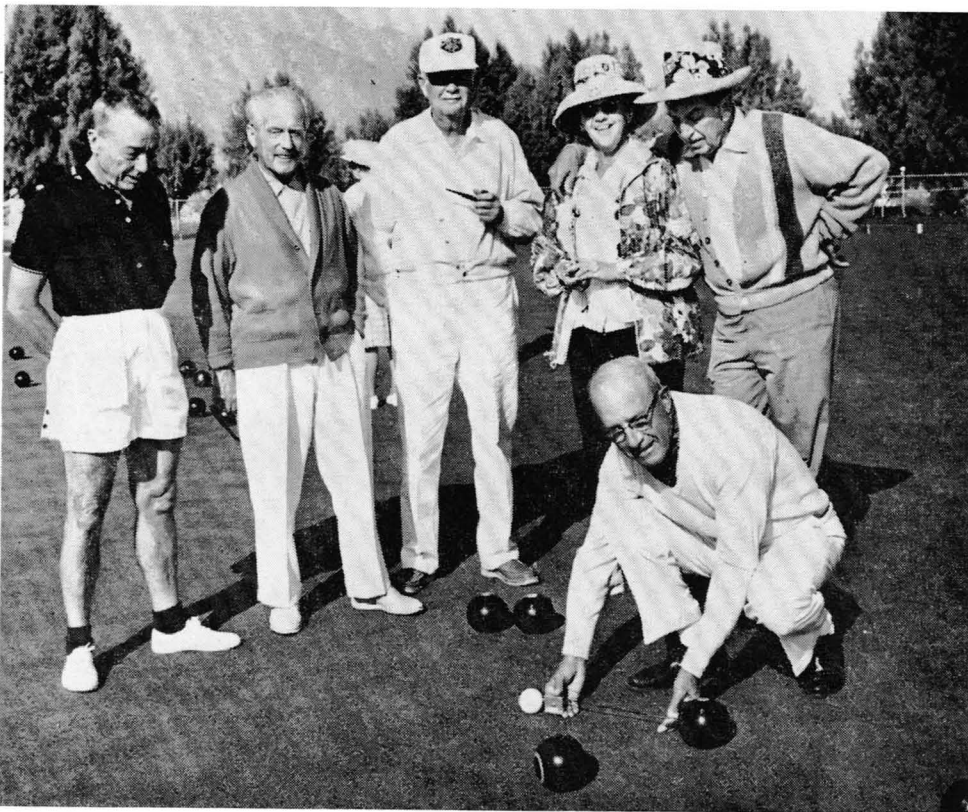
Winners, second flight; Kelley & Matt Turner. Runners-up; Grayston & D. Graham.

This is the 56th year of these Inter-City Lawn Bowling matches.

The second round of the above matches were played Saturday, March 7 and the results are such that one can almost predict the winner before the final three games are played as Berkeley has won their first two games with a total plus score of 114 points. However, upsets are common in Lawn Bowling, so unless you are a real gambler you best not place any bets until the final games on Saturday, March 28, 1964.

Out of the first 55 years, Oakland has won 34 times, San Francisco 18, Berkeley 1 and Richmond 1. No game was played in 1916.

Berkeley won their first two games with a plus score of 114, 43 plus against San Francisco and 71 against Palo Alto in the second game. Lakeside Club of Oakland has also won two games with a plus score of 28, 8 plus against Oakland and 20 plus against Richmond in the second game.

San Francisco has won 1 and lost 1 with a *minus score of 2, so is still in the running.* Richmond has won 1 and lost 1 with a *minus score of 4, so also is still in the running.*

Oakland and Palo Alto have each lost both games. Oakland minus score is 49 and Palo Alto minus 87, so it would take a couple of miracles for either of these teams to win now.

These matches are played with two or more teams of 4 men each from each club. San Francisco, Oakland, Berkeley and Richmond can each field 6 teams while Palo Alto can only manage 5 from their small club and Lakeside only 3.

Saturday, March 14, the third of the games will be played as follows:

Lakeside plays Berkeley on the Oak-

land greens—Oakland plays Richmond at Richmond and Palo Alto plays San Francisco in San Francisco. Games start at 12:30 p.m.

Spectators are invited.

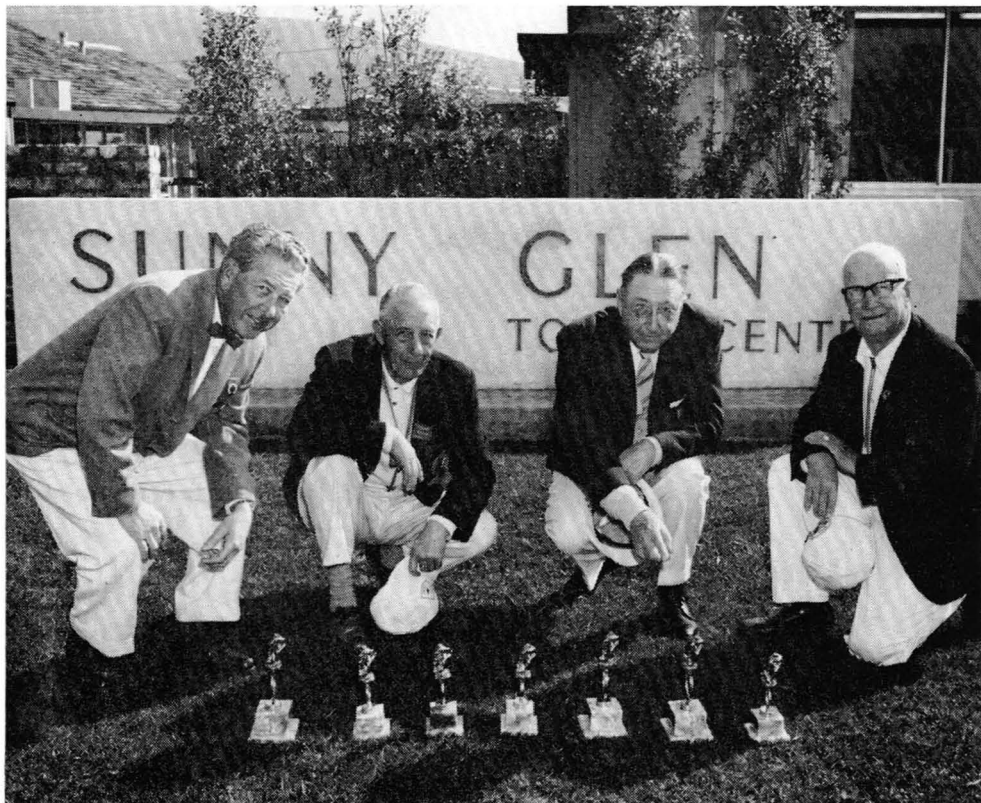

Motion made and seconded that amendment 1B be removed from table. Mr. Andersen then gave an explanation of the amendment in detail. Moved by Pilcher and seconded by Andersen that the words Non-Bowler be eliminated—Motion carried.

A.L.B.A. BOWLS - MAGAZINE

Moved by Leinbach, seconded by H. Esch that the Magazine be published four times a year—Namely Jan. 15, April 15, July 15 and Oct. 15 with the first issue on Jan. 15, 1964. Carried unanimously.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Motion by D. MacKenzie, seconded by A. Andersen, that the present officers be re-elected. No further nominations being made, the Secretary was instructed to cast a unanimous ballot for their re-election. Secretary acted

and the Officers were duly elected.

Motion by D. MacKenzie, seconded by A. Andersen that present Secretary-Treasurer be re-elected. No other nominations were presented. President Hennings cast the vote for K. G. Landgraf's re-election.

Motion by D. MacKenzie, and seconded by W. G. Hay that present staff of Magazine continue to serve. Motion carried.
