


Valleyfield Community Action Plan 2016-2021

Coalfields Community Futures

The Coalfields Community Futures Programme is an approach to local community planning and sustainable community development that aims to encourage active citizenship and build local democracy. It enables communities to devise a community action plan which makes a case for the things that the community thinks are important and wishes to make happen.

The process builds on existing processes of community action research to identify local needs and priorities, using residents as co-researchers. We work with local residents and groups to develop a common sense of purpose and assist them to produce a deliverable community action plan.

To support the action planning process the community receive a Participatory Budget which is available to local constituted community or voluntary groups.

This budget enables the community to fund small projects that are identified by the community through the results of the household surveys, stakeholder interviews and the Open Event. These funded projects are aimed at being soon, seen and successful.

Our Community Now

Background

This Profile has been produced to give an insight into the Valleyfield area. It is part of a wider Community Futures process being delivered by the Coalfields Regeneration Trust across Scotland's coalfield communities to assist them reflect on what is good and what could be improved and how.

Valleyfield, overlooking the Forth, is split by the B9037 which links to Dunfermline. Low Valleyfield was built on the shore of the old hamlet of Valleyfield, which between 1663 and 1760 was a Burgh of Barony.

During the period in which the Valleyfield Estate was owned by Sir Robert Preston, the acclaimed landscape gardener Humphry Repton was employed to design a number of features on the estate. The famous Repton Garden was one of his projects and there is still evidence of the Repton artifacts, along with some rare and invaluable natural habitats in Valleyfield Wood.

To the north of the wood, Riding for the Disabled provides an important amenity. Preston also dabbled in mining, and he sank three pits on Preston Island, just off Torry Bay. These were later to be abandoned following a fatal explosion in 1811.

Preston Island was a conspicuous landmark relied upon by navigators. Today it is an important industrial archaeological site where visitors can see mediaeval mining and salt industry buildings. It can be accessed via Scottish Power's ash lagoons. Other former Valleyfield industries include brick, tile and pottery works, along with weaving of cotton goods for Glasgow manufacturers and table linen for the Dunfermline market.

High Valleyfield came into being in the early 1900s with the expansion of the local coal mining industry. The Valleyfield pit disaster of 1939 claimed the lives of 35 miners. In July 1978 the Valleyfield pit closed, the site today being marked by a monument. High Valleyfield has a number of businesses, along with a community centre, miners' welfare club, council offices and health centre.

Low Valleyfield offers visitors fine walks through the ash lagoons with their thriving wildlife. The whole area around this site is designated as a Site of Special Scientific Interest with protected species such as red squirrels and wild orchids to be seen.



Population

The population resident in the area is 1,810 with just over 1,100 of working age. The population by age breakdown broadly follows that of Scotland as a whole although the population of those aged 0-15 is higher at almost 21% as against just over 17% in Scotland as a whole. Housing

The spread of household size broadly reflects the picture for Scotland as a whole with the highest being married households at almost 28%. When it comes to lone parent families there is an increase in the % which is almost twice as high as the Scottish average at 13% (Scotland 7.2%) Source: Census 2011

Health

The number of people living with a limiting long term illness is markedly higher in Valleyfield at 28.2% than Scotland as a whole at 19.6%. Source Census 2011

Valleyfield has a doctors' surgery with 3 doctors, a practice nurse as well as district nurses. There is also access to ante-natal and child assessment care. Other services include access to a podiatrist and dentist. There is a crèche running in the Valleyfield Community Centre.

Employment and the Economy

More people are economically active (57.6%) than inactive (42.4%).

The number economically active is much lower in Scotland as a whole (69%), partly as a result of the high numbers of people with limiting long-term illness. In relation to self employed figures Valleyfield has 2.9%, much lower than Scotland as a whole at 7.5%.

Education and Training

The % of households where no one aged 16-74 has qualifications is significantly higher than Scotland as a whole, with Valleyfield figures of almost 45% and Scotland at almost 27%. Source: Census 2011

West Fife Enterprise supports local people, especially young people with training and development towards becoming work ready, as well as organising work placements for local employers.



Social and Community

Valleyfield is made up of High Valleyfield and Low Valleyfield, each with their own Community Council. There are a wide range of activities held locally including Valleyfield Heritage Project, karate, football, boxing, bingo on Friday and Monday night, Support Group, Lunch Club, Citizens Club (monthly), Never in Club, Ladies Club, Angling Club, Gala committee who organise a Fun Day in summer and a Xmas party for the kids, Bowling Club and Breakfast Club. The area has several shops including a Co op, several children's play areas and the local St Serf's Church. The Valleyfield Community Centre hosts many of the local clubs activities as well as the Library and Local Office. There are also annual guided walks through Valleyfield Woods that are very popular and draw people from outside the community. There is also a Riding for the Disabled stables operating locally.

Environment

Valleyfield is well located for access to nature through an extensive path network. Valleyfield Woods is a popular area for local people as well as visitors to the area. The natural environment has strong links to the rich cultural and industrial heritage that can be found in and around Valleyfield.

Transport

Public transport is good with bus services to Queen Margaret Hospital in Dunfermline and to Kelty. There is also a service to Stirling and to Kincardine which links to a limited stop Glasgow service.

Car parking is said to be terrible with many cars parking on pavements.

Community Action Plan: Considerations

From stakeholder interviews, it is clear that the community spirit is strong, with local people working hard to support itself and its environment. There is a feeling that an increase in Police presence would help and there are real concerns over incidents of underage drinking and the negative impact this is having on the village as a whole.



A shared vision for the future

Valleyfield thrives on its community spirit. We will continue to encourage all residents, local groups and businesses alike to work together to create a clean, safe and vibrant community that cares for it's residents from the very young to the very old.


There are activities to enrich the lives of everyone in the village.





THEME 1: An Inclusive Community

This theme is an essential aspect of building social capital in a community. It's the glue that holds communities together and there are some fundamentals that require to be in place for it to grow and develop. There is a need to ensure that there is good, clear and effective communication between people, organisations and service providers to make sure that people are being listened to and that their needs are being met. Inclusive communities also require good, open and honest relationships between people and groups. We will do this through ongoing engagement and activities with an enthusiasm for partnership working at all levels.

Priorities	Actions required to take priorities forward
Support for our annual community events	 Make sure annual events are well publicised. Secure funding to continue our annual events. Set up an events committee to encourage groups to work together.
A community noticeboard for Valleyfield	 Source funding for noticeboard. Identify best location for the siting of a community noticeboard. Work with Fife Council to agree planning permission and install the noticeboard.
Improve our path network	• Carry out a mapping exercise to identify where path repairs are needed and where new paths could be created.
More activities for families	Seek support from Fife Council Community Learning Team.Find out about other successful family initiatives.
More activities for older folk	 Seek support from Fife Council Community Learning Team.
Improve communication between groups	 Make sure best use is being made of all social media and web links between community groups. Set up a community calendar for groups to use to promote community activities. Newsletter for Valleyfield.
Potential partners	User Groups, Community Councils, Fife Council, Valleyfield Old Folks.



THEME 2: Enterprise and Energy

We need to work closely with Fife Council and other service providers to ensure that the issues raised by people throughout this process are not forgotten but duly considered, prioritised and acted upon. Progress may be made more readily where there is an opportunity for the community and the service providers to take their full share of responsibility for making our community cleaner, greener, more enterprising and better connected.

Priorities	Actions required to take priorities forward	
A passenger rail connection to Alloa, Dunfermline and beyond	 Contact SESTrans/Network Rail to find out about the possibility of having a passenger rail link in Valleyfield. Work with neighbouring communities to lobby for this. 	
More training and access to job opportunities	 Work with West Fife Enterprises to research opportunities for more training and jobs. Work with Fife Council regarding opportunities for young apprenticeships. 	
Halt plans for Underground Coal Gasification (UCG)	 Work with local environmental groups to lobby against the use of UCG. Research opportunities for renewable energy initiatives, especially hydro. Source funding to carry out a feasibility study for a local renewables initiative. 	
Promote new Credit Union	 Use communication links through social media sites, community noticeboards and newsletters to promote the Credit Union. Work with Fife Council to use its website and other communication routes to promote the Credit Union to the community. 	
Housing developments	 Investigate potential for affordable, social housing development sites within the village and surrounding areas. Investigate opportunities for self-build by the community.

Our young people are the future. We need to provide them with safe, secure opportunities to grow and learn so they can become responsible citizens, caring for, and being a key part of our community. Thanks also go to members of the steering group who contributed the images in this Community Action Plan.


