From the Headmaster



When Sir Thomas More, sometime Chancellor of England under Henry VIII, died at the age of 57 he had been a husband and parent, a diplomat, a Member of Parliament, a lawyer, a philosopher and a theologian. He had written comedies and important historical works and had studied Greek and Latin literature in the original languages. He spoke French, could play the flute and the viol, and was a decent mathematician. I suspect that, if he had been born a few centuries later, he would have played fly-half for England and then founded Oxfam. Admittedly, he was also executed for treason, but then no one's perfect. He is the very model of the Renaissance Man - a term which has come to mean someone who achieves, and who derives fulfilment and enjoyment, across a field of activities - academics, languages, the arts and music, professional life and public service.

But More's level of achievement, and that breadth and intensity of the enjoyment of life, couldn't have been achieved without an education that stimulated just about every fibre of his being. That's the holy grail of education, what every teacher and parent wants to give their children, and what every child should strive after, the enrichment of every single one of their abilities. It's also the idea that gives rise to an exciting new initiative here at the School - the establishment of an Annual Fund that can be used to boost the quality of our pupils' experience beyond the classroom. Ski Trip to Austria

A group of 38 pupils from Year 7 to Year 10 departed for a week's ski course in the Stubai Valley near Innsbruck, Austria, during the Christmas break.

The party enjoyed superb snow conditions and empty pistes throughout the week; the weather was however, consistently cold (-17°C) and the wind the coldest encountered.

Pupils received four hours of instruction from members of the local ski school each day as well as supervised skiing with staff. The group visited the small ski resort of Schlick 2000m above the picturesque village of Fulpmes and spent two days at the Stubai Glacier ski resort (voted the world's best glacial ski area), which boasts a run of 13km.

During the evenings there were a variety of activities, including a visit to the wonderful Christmas fair in Innsbruck, and swimming, shooting, bowling and a quiz night arranged by Mr Rae. The group returned to School in time to recover for Christmas, tired but full of wonderful memories of an action-packed week.


