THE BIRTH OF THE DOLPHIN INDOOR BOWLS CLUB + 35 YEARS

It all began on December 9th, 1982 when four enthusiastic outdoor bowlers (Jim King, Ron Porter, Ray Harmsworth and Cyril Taylor) got together and dreamt of building an Indoor facility to accommodate the people of Poole and the surrounding area. The nearest indoor green, at this time, was at Christchurch some 12 miles away. Owing to the size of the project planned the size of the Committee was increased and became known as the 'Steering Committee'.

The Steering Committee met regularly in the old pavilion at Wimborne Bowls Club, subsequently moving to the Railway Hotel, Broadstone. After outstaying their welcome they moved to the Coach and Horses in Wimborne.



A six-rink facility was planned, and the committee were determined that the speed of the green would be the same as a fast outdoor green and that adequate car parking space was important.

Officers of Poole Borough Council were very helpful in suggesting sites, which soon became very difficult and for various reasons four suggested sites were rejected. One of these being empty land opposite the Railway Hotel in Broadstone, which was not big enough for any expansion. Of course, today this site is occupied by Broadstone Sports Centre.

The lack of land became very depressing for the Steering Committee, as it looked then that no suitable sites were available. However, the Council Officers finally came up with the suggestion of a site at Fleetsbridge, which was then a field, but had been earmarked for a sports activity. This was quickly accepted, and various covenants had to be resolved before building commenced.

Estimates were established and it was estimated that the building would cost in the region of £275,000 plus £30,000 for carpet and furniture etc, and with no such thing as lottery grants in those days the question of finance became a very big issue.

Poole Council offered a loan of £100,000, together with a grant of £20,000 and various other smaller grants were available, but the main contribution had to come from bowlers themselves. It was decided by the Steering Committee that a total of 450 bowlers had to come forward before the project could go ahead. To raise the finance each prospective member had to provide an interest free loan of £150 or £250 for a couple, but there was no guarantee that their money would be returned to them if the project failed. Meetings at Outdoor Bowling Clubs were arranged to explain the situation and to encourage bowlers to support the project. Some 400 bowlers did so, but it soon became apparent that a number were sitting on the fence and would join as soon as the building commenced, so a rallying cry went out "Do not sit on the fence – become a Founder Member" In the end a benefactor came forward and guaranteed the extra money required. The 400 Members who gave their £150 & £250 became known as "FOUNDER MEMBERS".

The building works commenced in 1984.














Members joining after the building was completed were asked to pay a £100 Joining Fee, which is the current joining fee today.

All members loans were subsequently returned in the fullness of time.

The six-rink complex was completed in March 1985 and the Constitution and Limited Company was formed with a Management Committee being responsible for running the Company and with a Men's and Ladies Committee all being elected annually. The Club officially opened on the 30th March 1985 and the first friendly match was against West Cornwall Indoor Bowls Club, which took place the following day on the 31st March 1985. Although West Cornwall IBC no longer exists, they continued touring the Bournemouth area and only stopped a couple of years ago.

The membership quickly grew and soon reached 700 members and by 1994 a waiting list of 300 existed even though the six rinks had been turned into seven. So, it was decided that it was necessary to build an extension of four rinks to accommodate the members on the waiting list. The extension was completed in 1995, together with an additional viewing area, toilets etc, and the car parking spaces increased to 159 spaces. The membership was increased to between 950 and 1000.

In 1995 enough land was acquired from the Council to build an outdoor six rink facility at the rear of the Club. Planning permission was sought and remains in force today should the Club decide to have this facility in the future.

In 2008 it was decided that a revamp of the bowls area was necessary and a figure of £150,000 was set aside by the Management Committee for this, which consisted of all new lighting, dropped ceilings, replacement playing carpet, heating and air conditioning.



In 2017 a further revamp was authorised by the Management Committee whereupon the lower lounge, bar, restaurant and viewing areas were upgraded. The walls between the restaurant and lounge were demolished making a combined area which is now light and airy.

In 2019 the top lounge was completed complementing the lower lounge with its furniture and chairs.



In 2020 new 'Over-head' cameras were installed on Rinks 9 and 10 with two viewing monitors in the upper lounge. Spectators are now able to view 'the heads' at both ends of the rinks. We believe this to be a first in all UK indoor bowls clubs.

All these improvements have made the Dolphin Indoor Bowls Club a leading Club not only for the winter season but also for the ever-increasing number who now choose to bowl indoors in the summer.








A TRIBUTE TO RON PORTER

One of the main reasons why the Dolphin Indoor Bowls Club exists today is because of Ron Porter who served the Club with distinction from its inception in 1982 until his death in February 2016 at the age of 87. He served the Club in many official roles but mainly as Club Secretary and League Secretary. He was extremely proud of our Club and would always remind members of the following statement:

I CONSIDER THAT THE SUCCESS OF ANY CLUB IS WITH ITS VERY STRONG VOLUNTEER CONTINGENT, WHO WILL WILLINGLY GIVE THEIR TIME AND EXPERIENCE FOR THE BENEFIT OF OTHERS".

In March 2010, in the 25th Anniversary edition booklet my father, Ron Porter wrote:

"It has been a great honour for me to be involved in the organisation and the running of the Dolphin over these 25 years. Above all I shall always be very grateful for all those Members and Friends who have given their time and experience in helping me with my duties as Chairman, Secretary and League Secretary. I hope that I have been able to repay some of the great times and enjoyment that I have had from playing this wonderful sport of ours over some 47 years".

A wonderful sentiment for us all to follow.

As we move into the next era of the Dolphin Indoor Bowls Club, I am convinced the next generation of bowlers will continue to serve the Club and respect all those that have served before them.

MEMBERSHIP

We are very proud of our membership and this is mainly due to the "OPEN DAYS" which have been held since 2001. These are held in September and January of each year, and prospective members who have not played bowls before, are encouraged to join the five-week coaching course. After this, the players are given the opportunity of joining as full members if they are sure the game of bowls is for them. The Joining Fee of £100 is payable at this point

together with the appropriate annual subscription. However, there is an option to split the £100 joining fee into $4 \times £25$ amounts, this is payable with their annual subscription in September of each year.

Since the introduction of "OPEN DAYS" in 2001, literally hundreds if not thousands have successfully joined the Club and have been fully integrated into all the various activities of the Club and some are now on Committees and many are now volunteering to do duties.






