

From the Rectory

Dear Parishioners,

This letter has been inspired and contains some content from an Article by Kimberly Winston from the National Catholic Reporter.

I guess the biggest event this month that no one can totally ignore is the Olympic games. Did you know that The Olympics - both the ancient version and the modern version have religious and spiritual roots and athletics of Greece were also used by St Paul in his teaching.

The Olympics began in the fifth century BC, and like many things the ancient Greeks did, they were connected to their worship of the gods. Athletes paraded into the stadium past a line of religious officials and often dedicated their performances to a patron god. Even the prizes were religious, with crowns of olive leaves made from trees in a sacred grove dedicated to Zeus. And the winners, were apparently revered in a religious way. When they were crowned, a procession headed to the temple of Zeus. The ancient Olympics carried on until the fourth century AD, and even its disappearance had a religious reason. In 393AD, the Emperor Theodosius I, a Christian, cancelled the games when he banned all pagan religious rituals.

For 1,500 years, there were no Olympic Games, until another Christian reintroduced them. Pierre de Coubertin, a French aristocrat educated by Jesuits, he was raised in war torn 19th-century France. He admired the ancient Greeks for the way they held a peace every four years to stage the Olympiad. In 1889, as a means of promoting peace between nations and remaking French athleticism, de Coubertin got the idea to revive the games. On a trip to England, he encountered the work of Thomas Arnold, a Church of England deacon and a promoter of "muscular Christianity" -- the idea that the pairing of physical strength with true religion creates well-rounded, moral and ethical men.

That belief under girds the International Olympic Committee, which de Coubertin founded in 1894. The first modern international games were held two years later, in Athens, and included many of the religious trappings of the ancient games, including olive-leaf crowns and sacred fire in the form of the Olympic flame.

Today the games are still religious in nature, though it is a different kind of religion. Civic religion is primarily on display in the opening ceremonies and their rituals we have all come to expect - the ceremonial raising of the flag, the playing of the Olympic anthem (originally titled "The Olympic Hymn") and the reverential lighting of the Olympic torch. There is also an Olympic oath which the athletes and coaches make during the opening ceremonies – an oath to respect and abide by the rules, to play fair and not cheat.

When the Olympics are over, the site on which they were held, the stadiums the arenas and pools, become something of a sacred site, with people making visits like pilgrimages to see where this wonderful event happened.

St Paul wrote in the Bible using imagery from these ancient Greek races: "Don't you realise that the runners in the Stadium, all of them run, but only one gets the medal? You are to run in such a way as to win". As with St Paul, whatever our nationality in the race that we are all participants in, we can all be winners of a glorious prize much more glorious than the Olympic games can offer either in gold or prestige and a prize that does not 'fade away'. All this will be ours if our coach is the Lord Jesus Christ.

"I have come that you might have life in all its fullness" Jesus in St John's Gospel chapter 10v10.

Greenwash – What is it?

Greenwash (Noun) "Disinformation disseminated by an organization so as to present an environmentally responsible public image," and we are often surrounded by it.

The obvious examples are the supermarkets 'fake farms.' Tesco's Redmere Farms' have a green label that show a historic type of tractor on bumpy land with the words 'Fresh' and 'Quality' alongside, and in marketing, this is called a Virtual Nature Experience. But closer inspection shows that Redmere Farm Sweet Potatoes can be the Produce of Egypt, USA, Brazil, South Africa, and Honduras, and Garlic can be from Spain or China, and so it goes on. M&S market their Salmon under the Scottish sounding name 'Lochmuir.' Lochmuir doesn't exist, the name was invented by marketing experts at M&S, as was their 'Oakham Chicken.' The town of Oakham (Rutland) exists, but the birds are farmed in Norfolk and Suffolk.

How about "100% recyclable plastic bottles?" Technically true but not eco-friendly. Virtually all plastic bottles are made of PET, (Polyethylene terephthalate) which is recyclable, but most won't be recycled into new plastic bottles because there's not enough demand for recycled plastic. For the recycling loop to work we need 100% recycled plastic bottles, not recyclable, but even then, plastic bottles can only be recycled 2-3 times as the properties of the plastic degrade each time.

Zero-waste-to-landfill sounds great but can be just greenwashing. McDonald's UK pledged to achieve zero-waste-to-landfill, but their recycling target is only 50% of total waste, the other 50% is sent to an incineration "waste-to-energy" plant. Incineration plants are not zero waste or eco-friendly. Just like burning fossil fuels, burning rubbish emits greenhouse gases. It also leaves toxic "bottom ash" amounting to around 17% of the incinerated material, which can end in landfill. The latest Greenwash buzzword regarding packaging is 'Omnidegradable.' But checking up revealed that Omnidegradable packaging is 'compostable in an Industrial Compost Facility using windrows and with no time constraints'.

So, yes Omnidegradable packaging is eventually compostable but only in industrial facilities and is not suitable for home composting. Biodegradable doesn't mean compostable. Biodegradable means the material will break down and decompose in the environment, a flimsy, and unaccountable term as almost everything will biodegrade eventually.

Words that can be true, but also can be meaningless are words such as Eco Friendly, Bio, Sustainable, Earth friendly, etc. Any genuine producer making such claims will be backing them up on the product. If concerned about the future, then we all need to be careful when we buy and consume.

Walking Between Parishes

If you travelled by road between the Parish churches of Herstmonceux and Wartling you may think that they are quite a few miles apart and that a walk between the two would be long and arduous. It wasn't long before we spotted the newly shingled spire of the church and arrived at the churchyard ready for a rest and a drink before our return journey.

Famous Hymns

Stand Up, Stand Up for Jesus – George Duffield, Jr (1818 – 1888) *with thanks to Tim Challies and fortduffield.com*

George was an American Presbyterian Minister and Hymnodist. His father and grandfather (both George Duffield) were also Presbyterian ministers, so the hymnodist George was known as George Duffield Junior.

In spring 1858, a major revival was taking place in Philadelphia. It grew out of midday prayer meetings coordinated by the Young Men's Christian Association (YMCA). Rev. Dudley A. Tyng, a young Episcopalian minister, soon came to be recognized as its leader. Though there was some controversy over his anti-slavery preaching, Tyng was known and loved for his zeal for the work of God. Among the interdenominational leaders who gathered around him was George Duffield, Jr.

On 30 March, 1858, over 5,000 men gathered to hear young Tyng preach from Exodus 10:11 - "Go now ye that are men and serve the Lord." Over 1,000 men responded by committing their hearts and lives to Christ; the sermon was one of the most successful of the times. During the sermon the Tyng remarked, "I must tell my Master's errand, and I would rather that this right arm were amputated at the trunk than that I should come short of my duty to you in delivering God's message." The next week, while visiting in the country and watching a corn thresher in a barn, he accidentally caught his loose sleeve between the cogs; his arm was very severely injured. Four days later infection developed. Dudley Tyng died as a result, on 19 April, 1858.

Before he died, however, he was asked by friends if there were any messages he would have them give to those who had participated with him in the revival work. Tyng responded briefly, beginning "Tell them, 'Let us all stand up for Jesus."

In the next few days, these final words were frequently invoked and became a resounding exhortation to all who had been affected by his ministry. When George Duffield, Jr. preached to his own congregation the next week, in tribute to Dudley Tyng, he focused on Ephesians 6:14 ("Stand therefore, having fastened on the belt of truth..."). He ended by reading six stanzas of a poem he had just written, inspired by his friend's dying words. Duffield's Sunday School superintendent was so impressed that he had the verses printed for distribution throughout the Sunday School. The editor of a Baptist periodical happened to receive one of these pamphlets and promptly gave it wider circulation. The hymn quickly became an established work, set to music by George J. Webb.

Similar to "Onward Christian Soldiers", it became popular among soldiers of the Civil War, most likely because of its militaristic imagery and language. But the connection to worldly battles was not the author's intent; Christians have often sung soldier songs, because, as God tells us in Ephesians 6 and elsewhere, our lives in Christ are a fight for faith in the midst of spiritual enemies. A lovely sunny day and the pleasure of seeing so many old friends over a newly plotted walk ended at the Merrie Harriers for more socialising and refreshments. It was voted a top way to spend a Sunday. The event raised (by donations) a further £390 for our Good Causes Fund.

Recollections of Living in Wartling

So much has changed in Wartling since the 1930's and yet in many ways it seems the same. Most people will know Wartling Hill with its church, pub, farm and a few houses but there is also Boreham Street and parts of Windmill Hill in the parish.

The church seems unaltered but, in the churchyard as you walk up the path, it was once lined with red roses instead of the more formal plants of today. The Garden of Remembrance nearby dates from about 1973. Sadly, the Cedar of Lebanon at the west end fell in the 1987 storm and attempts to take cuttings were unsuccessful. However, the yew planted for the new millennium in 2000 seems to flourish. Inside, the Heron Lectern is a memorial to Revd Harry Osbon, and the Shillito window is in memory of a local doctor. The south porch has had several changes from choir vestry to boiler room, and now a toilet. The church choir once wore black robes and a mortar-board cap before red robes were introduced. The organist was hidden from view behind a curtain, and the organ-blower sat in the front pew. There were some pews in the chapel. The old choir stalls were replaced with modern ones, though one old one is the seat below the west window.

Next door to the church is the Lamb Inn which has had several owners. Opposite the church is the former vicarage and a private school. The later vicarage was a modern house on the A271 near Wartling road junction, but that changed when Wartling and Herstmonceux were in the care of one priest. In past years Wartling has been linked to Hooe and Bodle Street.

Wartling School between Boreham Lane and the Horsewalk was built in about 1850 but all traces of it have gone (except for the school bell which hangs in the Reid Hall) and a modern house is on the site. It was quite small with a schoolhouse and had a schoolroom and a small playground where the children could play rounders. Stoolball was played at Herstmonceux where the children transferred at 11 years. The numbers dwindled to 11 (there had been 55 when it opened) and all were moved to Herstmonceux School in about 1942. The last teacher was Mrs Duke. A taxi was provided to take the children to Boreham Street where they could catch a bus to Herstmonceux. The taxi was provided by the County Education Dept.

Nearer the Castle there were several cottages: Hoads Hill Cottage was part of the castle estate, and there was a thatched cottage be the entrance where the gatekeeper lived, and a small cottage opposite. Coopers Cottage was built in 1939.

The water supply to the village came from wells or was sometimes pumped from springs. There was no sewer system but cottages had cesspools in the garden. From 1938 there was electric lighting but before that it was oil-lamps and candles. All very dark outside at night! Gas has never got to the village. Telephones came later, though these were only afforded for those needing them for work. The local policeman lived in Police House at Windmill Hill.

There were quite a lot of tradespeople called: milkman, fishmonger, butcher, grocer, baker, and greengrocer. Other shops were at Herstmonceux where there was a baker

and bread could also be got from the windmill. The post lady cycled from Pevensey to do her round in the area. There was a Post Office at Wartling on the corner of Boreham Lane but just the phone box remains. They also sold a few small things. If you needed clothing, there was a Menswear shop in Herstmonceux and a Drapery at Windmill Stores.

So how did you get to these other places? It was either walk or cycle, at least until you reached the main road where there was a bus. Harris's Garage did have a coach for hire. However, in WW2 to reach the main road meant cycling between Wartling Wood and Plantation Wood in both of which RAF Wartling was based. They used the road for marching and exercises which made it rather hazardous when you had to get by them. The war made quite a difference to life in the village with the radar system of RAF Pevensey on the marshes and the encampment of RAF Wartling at the foot of Wartling Hill. Both were open to attack and the only shelter on that open road to Pevensey was to crouch behind the banks of the dykes. At least the roads were better maintained for military vehicles. For a time, the church had an organist from the RAF.

So, on to the rest of Wartling; Boreham Street. This is where the local doctor lived at The Limes. He also made up prescriptions: there was no chemist. The present Reid Hall replaced the tin church (corrugated iron) which blew down in the road and had no car park. Some church services had been held in the old hall especially in WW2, and there were often two morning Holy Communion services: at 7.00 am at the hall and 8.00 am at the church.

Whitefriars had changed much in appearance. It had formerly become a hotel and restaurant where the church's Annual Gathering usually took place. A clockmaker had his workshop there too, but it has now been much added to and become a residential complex. The Bull's Head is a bit further on, and then the site of Harris's Garage follows. Petrol could be got here and it was one of the last places where an attendant filled the petrol tank for you. They also had a coach for hire as well as a cattle truck business. The Smuggler's Hotel, a former farmhouse, was a popular restaurant. Further along was Ticehurst the butchers which once had its own abattoir. Later it became a fancy goods shop. At the end of the road was Dragonfield where there may have been an inn formerly.

On the opposite side of was the doctor's surgery, and further along a blacksmiths and a joinery (Lewes Building Works) and The Chestnuts (a small cafe). Then the building which became Scolfe's restaurant but was once the Post Office and General Store. Boreham Mill Nursery next, where, although the windmill has gone, you can still see where it stood. Mill Barn Lodge nearby.

At Windmill Hill there was the Old Horseshoe Inn which had a small hall where dances and parties were held, and also the annual Flower Show. On the corner of Joes Lane was Eddie Simmon's Garage. Further along was the Monkey Puzzle, a local attraction on the corner of Victoria Road and next to it a Grocers, still there in 1980. This had a meeting Hall with weekly dances, a swimming pool and a cafe. They sold petrol too. There were several clubs: Wartling WI, Young Wives Group, The Dance Club and an Art Club. So there was plenty going on even if you had to make an effort to do it.

I am with You Always

I wonder if your life has been the one that you envisaged for yourself when you were younger or if like me your life hasn't turned out quite the way you expected. I am sure that we could all share stories about how we thought our lives might be. I imagined myself leading a comfortable way of life, with few worries. I would have a successful career and well as being a wife and Mother to a large brood of children.

I was a very shy and introverted child, and I grew up in the early 1960s. I was the eldest child of 2. My brother was born with Spina Bifida at a time when attitudes about disability were not quite so tolerant. My parents struggled to access the right sort of help for him, and they came under considerable pressure not to raise him in our family home. I experienced the impact that this had upon my family and therefore disability was certainly not part of the life I envisaged for myself. How wrong could I be!

I was in my thirties when I was diagnosed with Multiple Sclerosis but 10 further years before I became reliant upon a wheelchair. I experienced some difficult years as I came to terms with the limitations of my health and sometimes my faith in God waivered. One day, when I was feeling particularly low and thinking "Why me" I picked up my bible and it fell open at the Gospel of St Matthew, Chapter 28. I read the chapter but the words to which my eyes were drawn was the last phrase of Matthews Gospel: "And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age".

It reminded me that Jesus never promised us that life would be easy but that he would always be with us whatever difficulties we might be facing and however hard the road ahead might feel he won't ever leave us. He feels our pain because it is his own pain. He knows when we are suffering because he suffers too. We have a loving God who cares for each one of us. He is alongside us through every difficulty we face and whatever challenge the world might throw at us. He is always there. He is always with us even when we are doubting him. God has shown me through his word that my life needn't be worse because I am a wheelchair user it is just very different than the life, I envisaged for myself. This is the life that has been given to me by God and it is good. Fiona Bower


