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elcome to this summer edition of *Hillingdon People*. Hopefully the summer months will bring warmer temperatures, which together with longer days will allow us to spend more time enjoying the great outdoors in Hillingdon. With our award-winning parks and open spaces (42 Green Flag Awards) we are well placed to do so. Some of you may have been subjected to a scaremongering campaign regarding the future use of Northolt Airport being used by aircraft carrying commercial passengers. There is no truth at all in this rumour, which is probably promoted by those interested in seeing an expanded Heathrow Airport which will require the use of the airspace currently used by Northolt. In essence the runway, which is about to be resurfaced is too short for use by large commercial aircraft, there are no baggage handling facilities and no passenger terminals at Northolt. Turning to the real threat to the health and wellbeing of Hillingdon residents, we remain confident that we will defeat in law the current proposal to build a third runway at Heathrow, which day by day is looking economically and environmentally impractical. In June, the Hillingdon Cabinet received the final income and expenditure figure for the financial year to 31 March 2017 showing a budget surplus of nearly £4 million, a remarkable achievement in the current economic climate, and I am grateful to my councillor colleagues and the council officers for the part that they played in delivering this result. With nearly £40 million in balances and our ability to manage our financial affairs, Hillingdon Council is well placed to both deal with the financial challenges ahead and continue to deliver the services that you value.

New Years Green Lane, Harefield was shortlisted in the Awards for Excellence in Recycling and Waste Management in May.

The council-owned waste facility was up against strong competition in the Civic Amenity Site of the Year category and narrowly missed out to a Suffolk household waste recycling centre at the ceremony at the Landmark Hotel, London.

The site was nominated for the award by one of the advisors to the judging panel, who felt that the council had achieved an impressive transformation of services, with a modern split level site enabling a greater level of recycling. They said that the site has bedded in well, with approachable and friendly staff, who encourage residents to maximise recycling levels. Residents can dispose

Northwood Secondary School shortlisted in building awards

Northwood Secondary School was shortlisted in the Local Authority Building Control Building Excellence Awards (London Region) in the Best Educational Building category. The £35 million school was rebuilt and expanded by the council as part of its £314 million school building and expansion programme, with the council investing £28 million and the Education Funding Agency contributing £7 million. The school was officially opened last year and is one of 10 local authority schools shortlisted in this category in the regional finals.

The awards look for outstanding craftsmanship, technical innovation, sustainability and high performance. Northwood School was nominated for the strong partnership work between Hunters South Architects, the council, Farrans Construction and the Education Funding Agency, who delivered the three storey, 9,800 square metre school in a challenging 15 months and within budget. Tests have shown that the building is highly efficient, sustainable

Recycled duvets make cosy beds for abandoned dogs

As students left Brunel University at the end of the academic year in May, the council picked up 1,500 discarded duvets and delivered them to the Dogs Trust, Harefield.

The council's waste and recycling team collected the duvets in lorries and unpacked them when they reached the centre.

This annual partnership work between the university, the Dogs Trust and the council diverts these items from going to landfill and ensures that they're instead recycled as animal bedding, giving dogs a cosy bed to sleep in.

Jo Lloyd, Assistant Manager of Harefield Dogs Trust, said: "We are very grateful for these kind and generous donations. The bedding helps us to provide our dogs with as much comfort as possible and enable them to snuggle down and keep warm throughout their time in kennels."

If you have duvets that you don't need and want to reduce what waste is sent to landfill, animal charities are often looking for duvets and pillows to use as bedding.

Are you a small business owner? Have you considered how you would manage in an emergency situation such as bad weather, a power failure or a fire? Have you put plans in place to ensure you can contact staff or keep offering your goods or services to your customers?

Business continuity is a core part of business strategy, and those who plan for potential emergencies will be the most resilient. Mitigation against many hazards can be planned. Those owners or stakeholders who have evaluated risks by completing a business impact analysis and are prepared by having a business continuity plan in place will, in turn be able to respond to an incident effectively.

Adventure in store for Hillingdon army cadets

The council has given funding to five local army cadets to go on a once in a lifetime adventure training camp in South Africa in August. Middlesex and North West London Army Cadet Force have organised for 20 cadets from north-west boroughs to go to Kwazulu Natal. Savanna Delacassa (15, Uxbridge), Samantha Osborne (14, Ickenham), Bethany Porter and Ellie Gasgoine (15, Hayes) and Aaron Burke (17, Ruislip) will meet local Zulu families, undergo bush survival training, trek and paddle in the foothills of Natal, build their own shelter and sleep out in the bush, carry out a census of endangered wildlife and visit the famous Zulu war sites of Rorke's Drift and Isandlwana. The trip will have a strong educational emphasis and they will learn leadership skills, the importance of wildlife preservation and get a historical knowledge of the formation of modern South Africa. They will also gain a greater understanding of cultures and values. Leader of the Council, Cllr Ray Puddifoot, said: "We are very supportive of our army cadets in Hillingdon and the council was pleased to provide them with the necessary funding for them to go on this educational training camp. We wish them every success in their adventure." **Aaron** said: "It will be a once in a lifetime experience for all of us. I'm really looking forward to learning about the Zulu wars and the Battle of Rorke's Drift. I'm also looking forward to seeing a Zulu village and how they live, as well as hopefully seeing animals such as elephants and giraffes in the wild."

Hillingdon libraries and children's centres are teaming up during the holidays to offer free Summer Reading Challenge themed orienteering sessions in some of the borough's parks. Families will be able to work together as part of the challenge's Animal Agents theme to unravel mysteries and locate hidden starborg cards. There are 20 cards,

Pond revitalised to enhance biodiversity

The pond at the Green Flag award-winning Norman Leddy Memorial Garden in Hayes has recently been restored.

The £30,000 work, funded by the council's Hillingdon Improvement Programme, has refreshed the overall look of the area and will enhance animal and plant biodiversity. Works carried out by Stillwater Management included draining down the original concrete pond, cleaning the area, repairing cracks, re-establishing the banks, moving and pruning feature plants such as gunnera, introducing new plants and landscaping.

A water feature was also installed, which will constantly cascade through the boulders and rockeries, keeping the pond clean.

The work took four weeks to complete and a wooden fence in keeping with the surrounding landscape has also been erected to ensure safety.

Cllr Jonathan Bianco, Cabinet Member for Finance, Property and Business Services, said: "The pond at the memorial garden had fallen into decline and our aim was to create a safe. pleasant and attractive water feature for visitors to enjoy. We also wanted the pond to offer a variety of habitats for wildlife, and special attention was made in catering for the existing invertebrates and amphibians." The council also has plans to carry out

path work and plant additional plants.

Golf facilities improved

The council has invested £190,000 in a new state-of-the-art irrigation system at Haste Hill Golf Course, Northwood.

Tees, approaches and greens need to be regularly watered to ensure the shorter grass is kept in the optimum condition for golfers to play on.

The irrigation system that had been in place at Haste Hill was more than 30 years old, beyond reasonable repair and it was more economical to replace it.

The new system, manufactured by Rain Bird and completed in May, uses water more efficiently. Éach sprinkler can be individually controlled and water programmed to where it needs to go at the touch of a button on a phone app by the greenkeepers. They can input how much water it should use and the computer controlled system will also make sure that if it rains for a long period that the irrigation system will not go on.

The course has also benefited from £40,000 of car park improvements to increase capacity. It now has 114 spaces, was completely resurfaced and protection netting was installed.

Cllr Richard Lewis, Cabinet Member for Culture, Heritage and Central Services, said: "The council is ensuring that Hillingdon has top quality sports facilities, and by investing nearly £250,000 in this golf course, we are providing budding golfers with the best possible surfaces to tee off, putt and park their cars in.

"The new irrigation system will also ensure that we are efficiently managing water resources. I hope our golfing community continue to enjoy all this site has to offer."

Changes to the Personal Budget Support Service

If you or someone you know receives a direct payment to meet their care and support needs, you will need to be aware of some changes to the current service.

Some people need support to manage their direct payment and prepaid card, and in the past, the council has used one organisation to directly provide this service.

From 1 July 2017, anyone with a direct payment can personally choose which provider they want to receive support from and the council has produced a list of providers.

Residents who are eligible for a direct payment receive money from the council on a prepaid card to purchase help with their care at home or support to get out and about in the community.

All care and support providers on the list will be approved by the council and the Clinical Commissioning Group to give reassurance when purchasing care. The list will be reviewed regularly to ensure that all providers are delivering high quality care, and this will also be published on the Connect to Support website. The council will check that everyone with a direct payment has the necessary funds on their prepaid cards to pay for the support services they require. Volunteer to clean up your local rivers

Parking improvements made at Ruislip Lido

This summer, the council is making improvements to car parking facilities at Ruislip Lido to create a better parking experience for Hillingdon residents.

The main car park has been resurfaced; entrances and exits are being improved for better traffic flow; and new signage, lighting and waste bins have been installed. A designated parking area has also been made for customers of The Water's Edge restaurant, which will be managed by its proprietors. Following a consultation in May, the council has also decided to introduce car parking charges for non-residents. The main car park will be free for residents with their Hillingdon First card and the Willow Lawn car park will be exclusively and free of charge for Hillingdon *First* card and Blue Badge holders only. Parking at Ruislip Lido is limited and it can get very congested. We have worked in partnership with Transport for London and London Buses to ensure there are excellent public transport options for visitors, so they do not need to travel by car and the frequency of the H13 bus service has also been increased. Cllr Keith Burrows, Cabinet Member for Planning, Transportation and Recycling, said: "Ruislip Lido is one of our treasured green spaces, offering first class facilities for both residents and visitors. We want people to continue to visit this beautiful site but ensure they are aware of the limited parking and encourage visitors to consider using alternative forms of transport to get there. These ongoing improvements will prioritise parking for residents and we will also be considering introducing on-street parking controls to alleviate parking issues for residents in neighbouring streets." Warning over dangers of illegal laughing gas

Hillingdon residents are being warned about the serious dangers of nitrous oxide, with reports of usage increasing in the borough.



Although nitrous oxide has been legal in the past, since the Psychoactive Substances Act came into effect on 26 May 2016, it is now illegal to supply or import nitrous oxide for human consumption.

Nitrous oxide is a colourless gas that can make people feel dizzy, hallucinate and experience difficulty in thinking straight. It can also make them feel euphoric, relaxed and giggly, which has led to its nickname 'laughing gas.' It is a depressant-type drug which slows down the brain and body's responses.

Dangers include unconsciousness or death through lack of oxygen, and the risk of this is greater if it is consumed in an enclosed space or if a lot is consumed rapidly. Nitrous oxide can affect your judgement, creating a risk of accidents. Heavy regular use can also lead to a deficiency of vitamin B12 and to a form of anaemia. Severe deficiency can lead to serious nerve damage, causing tingling and numbness in fingers, toes and other extremities.

General election results

The UK parliamentary general election took place on Thursday 8 June, with residents voting to choose an MP to represent their constituency in the House of Commons.

Boris Johnson was re-elected as MP for Uxbridge and South Ruislip; John McDonnell was re-elected as MP for Hayes and Harlington and Nick Hurd was re-elected for Ruislip, Northwood and Pinner.

Legal orders extended to tackle anti-social behaviour

The council has updated its boroughwide Public Space Protection Order (PSPO) for all parks and public spaces to prohibit a wider range of anti-social behaviours.

Under the new regulations, which came into force in April, those who are verbally abusive and intimidating; under the influence of drugs; make unwanted and persistent approaches asking for personal bank details causing harassment, alarm or distress to another

person; solicit cash or money causing harassment, alarm or distress to another person; light fireworks without the consent of the council; urinate or



defecate in public; or leave parked cars with their engines running will be fined £80. Non-compliance could result in a fine of up to £1,000 in a magistrates' court. Street drinking, spitting, dog

fouling, camping, lighting fires, driving vehicles off-road and leaving food out for animals were already prohibited under the terms of the boroughwide PSPO established in 2015.

PSPOs are legal orders introduced by the government in 2014. They give local authorities the power to restrict specific anti-social behaviour in designated areas, where they are having a detrimental impact on residents' quality of life.

Cllr Douglas Mills, Cabinet Member for Community, Commerce and Regeneration, said: "Residents were consulted on these proposals in March and 80 per cent of respondents agreed with the variation. By broadening the scope of this PSPO, the council will have greater powers to address anti-social behaviour and ensure that

In May, the council worked in partnership with the Alzheimer's Society to host a range of dementiafriendly events for Dementia Awareness Week.

he week is part of a national campaign to make communities dementia friendly and provide people with a greater understanding of the condition. The council's events aimed to raise awareness; and inform what local services are available to enable people with dementia to live well and how residents can become Dementia Friends.

During Dementia Awareness Week there were free art workshops at the Civic Centre and Botwell Green Library, led by artist Patricia Ogundero. The borough's new mobile library visited the Dementia Café at the United Reformed Church of Eastcote and Northwood Hills and there was a talk about the council's Home Library Service. Information stalls were also held at Botwell Green Library and the Pavilions shopping centre.

Dancing took place at Uxbridge and Botwell Green Libraries. Libraries boroughwide hosted coffee mornings to spread awareness. The council holds regular drop-in Friends' Coffee Mornings for people living with






dementia and their family at Uxbridge Library on Tuesdays between 10am and 11.30am and Botwell Green Library on Thursdays between 11am and 12.30pm. They include activities such as singing, reading and reminiscence, and information on support services is available.

There was also a Dementia Action Alliance (DAA) meeting on Wednesday 17 May at the Civic Centre, featuring a special presentation by a leading scientist working at the forefront of research into a cure, Dr. Tammaryn Lashley PhD from University College London.

The Hillingdon DAA was set up by the council and Hillingdon Alzheimer's Society to create a dementiafriendly community in Hillingdon, where there is a greater awareness and understanding of dementia.

Helping our older residents to keep safe at home

The council's burglar alarm scheme for over-65s has seen more than 8,000 alarms installed across the borough since it was introduced in 2009.

esidents over 65 can apply to have an alarm installed free Nof charge in their home to help them to feel safe and secure.

An experienced specialist contractor, Response Electronics professionally fits the alarms. The systems have a solar-powered wireless siren alarm box fitted to the front of the property, and an alarm box to the rear, both have flashing lights that indicate the alarm is real, working and will sound if an intrusion occurs. The system is easily operated by a remote control (similar to a car alarm keyfob) so that you can arm or disarm your home from your bedside at night, from the garden or even after you have left the house.

Improvements have recently been made to the alarms we offer, and all new systems fitted will have a door contact sensor with an entry and exit delay, which allows an amount of time for the security system to wait before triggering the alarm when the door is opened. Other new aspects include, a pet friendly movement sensor and an improved solar powered siren design.

You will also receive a crime prevention pack with information about personal and home security when your alarm is installed. Suitable alarms can also be provided for people with hearing impairments.

After 12 to 18 months operation, a single free service is also offered to ensure the system is working properly and to replace batteries.

Michael Brady, 74 from Hillingdon East received one of the new systems in May. He applied for an alarm after a family member had been burgled. One of his neighbours, who lives on her own, had already had an alarm fitted and she told him about the council scheme and how safe she now feels in her own home.

Michael said: "It's a great scheme. The alarm was quickly and easily installed and is compact. There were no wires which I had been worried



about. The company were friendly, helpful and fully explained how to use it. It's really easy to operate. The new pet sensor also means that my cat Marley won't set it off. I'm going to make switching it on part of my daily routine. I now feel more reassured having it and knowing that the flashing light on the box on the front and the back of the house during the night will also deter any criminals.

"Hillingdon Council offers a fantastic range of services for older people, including free swimming, frozen council tax and special collections. I'm very grateful for all that they do."

Tips to ensure you protect yourself and say no to rogue traders

Every year people lose money to fraudsters who carry out a range of scams across the UK. Scams can often be difficult to investigate, so it's important for you to be aware of how you can protect yourself from becoming a victim of crime.

Door-to-door scams



Some legitimate businesses sell products door-to-door, companies visit to read meters and charities call to ask for donations. Sometimes people turn up unannounced and with the intention of tricking people by high pressure selling, gaining entry to steal, using false IDs or profit by posing as charities to collect donations.

Hillingdon Council is investing considerable amounts of money in improving the borough's town centres to make them better places for people to live, work and visit; encourage people to shop locally; and deliver economic growth and employment opportunities.



Update on the major Hayes town improvements

Work is drawing to a close this summer on the £6 million Hayes town centre improvements, funded by the council and Transport for London.

The council hopes that the work, which started in 2015 will make the centre more attractive for shoppers and visitors, allow traffic to flow freely and improve access to public transport.

On Friday 16 June, a new landmark feature, reflecting the rich musical heritage of Hayes and the historic Old Vinyl Factory site was opened. In collaboration with architects, The Decorators, the council has replaced the bandstand with a modern golden disc-shaped canopy, which will act as a recreational area, with seating for the Hayes community and visitors. Uplighters set within the pavement will also create a warm glow and highlight the canopy's decorative features at night.

The canopy was created by The Whitewall Company, who work with a range of artists and public art collections. However, part of the manufacturing process took place locally in Hayes, with Coyle Owen Anodising Ltd anodising the aluminium disc (increasing the resistance to corrosion and wear, making it more durable and giving it an appealing finish).

The company has been supplying high quality anodising for nearly 50 years, and Managing Director, Graeme Longman, said: "The final finish for the panels was a glossy light gold colour. Supplying employment to local people and building networks with local businesses is paramount and Owen Coyle Anodising Ltd were proud to be a part of enhancing the look of a local landmark"

The road layout and pavement works in Coldharbour Lane. Station Road and Crown Close will improve traffic flow and make the area more accessible. Work has also included the introduction of separate cycle lanes, new parking spaces, 30 minute free stop and shop parking and countdown timers on pedestrian crossings. Brighter new street lights, furniture and trees have also improved the look and feel of the area.



Uxbridge Change of Heart

Uxbridge is currently benefitting from multi-million pound private sector investment, with improved housing and commercial and retail growth, which is in turn providing employment opportunities for local people

The council will also be investing £2 million (with £800,000 from the Mayor of London) in public realm improvements and shop front grants to enhance Uxbridge town centre for residents, businesses and visitors.

The scheme proposes to reconfigure the existing footway and landscaping between Tesco, connecting the High Street to Fassnidge Park, in the autumn.



Cllr Douglas Mills, Cabinet Member for Community, Commerce and Regeneration, said: "Over the last six years, the council has been, and continues to be committed to major investment in the borough's town centres. Our current focus is making distinct and useful improvements in Hayes and Uxbridge. We want these town centres to be economically successful and our hope is that this work will revitalise their look, making them more attractive for shoppers and visitors."

Additional exciting improvements planned for Hayes town

The council will be installing a boardwalk extension for Botwell Bridge as part of ongoing Hayes town centre improvements.

With the arrival of Crossrail services from December 2018 and significant regeneration underway in the town, such as the Old Vinyl Factory development, connecting the station area to the town centre is

vital in attracting residents, workers and visitors to the services on offer.

The boardwalk pedestrian bridge will create a cycle lane and an attractive walkway with open views of the Grand Union canal to the east.

The council will also carry out public realm enhancements to the area around the new station building, making a distinctive gateway to

Ghost signage, landscaping and pedestrian lighting will improve this route to the Green Flag park. There will also be new screening for the trade waste bins in Baker's Yard and unifying street furniture throughout the town centre. Shop front grants were launched for Windsor Street at the end of last year to enhance the frontage of independent businesses on this historic road. The council is working with shop branding specialists, Designed by Good People on proposals, with these soon progressing to planning consent and work due to be completed by March 2018.



Hayes. The work will complement the major Hayes town improvement works and the new station building, providing a more welcoming and contemporary environment.

Work will focus on pedestrian and transport access, landscaping, lighting, signage and street furniture. The subway connecting the station to Blyth Road will also be revitalised. The Decorators have also been commissioned to create this statement entrance. The subway will build on the Sound of Hayes concept created by the canopy feature, recognising the historic role of EMI in terms of music and their notable inventions.

Cranford Park


features important monuments and remains of 14th century wall paintings. There will be a display about the history of the park and Cranford Park Friends will offer informal tours of the stable and parden.


Battle of Britain Bunker

The Battle of Britain Bunker, Uxbridge will be open on both days between 10am and 5pm for guided tours. Book your place in advance by calling 01895 238154 or emailing *ngpenquiries@btconnect.com*. Tours are on a first come, first served basis on the day. The Bunker was instrumental in

directing RAF operations during World War Two, particularly in the Battle of Britain (July to September 1940).

The Operations Room is reached via 76 steps and the plotting room with its large map table, squadron display boards, balloon and weather states, is exactly how it was when Winston Churchill visited on 15 September 1940.







Ruislip's Manor Farm site Manor Farm is one of Hillingdon's flagship heritage sites. It houses a unique collection of historic buildings. archaeological remains, landscape features and community spaces all set in 22 acres of beautiful grounds.

The site will be open between 10am and 5pm. You'll be able to visit the buildings and visitor centre (including special access to the upstairs of the Manor Farm House) free of charge. There will be guided tours of both the Grade II listed Farm House and Great Barn.

On the site there are the remains of a Norman motte thought to have hosted a bailey castle. For the weekend there will be a Norman settlement with a living history tent, crafts, archery and combat demonstrations, with the reenactments bringing its history to life.

Other special events, include historical dance performances and workshops, accompanied by live period music; a pop-up cinema showing historic footage of the area; children can experience special crafts and storytelling; and the council's Autumn Show will take place on the Saturday, with exhibits open for the public to view from 1.30pm.

You will also be able to visit the 19th century Cow Byre Tea Room and temporary exhibition at the Art Gallery and The Pram Shed Museum, which exhibits a variety of farming tools.

Improving your community bowling facilities

Three local bowling clubs received upgraded facilities for the 2017 lawn bowls season thanks to substantial council funding.

elebration events were held at Ladygate Bowls Club, Ruislip; Fassnidge Bowls Club, Uxbridge and Harefield Hospital Bowls Club in April and May, where the revamped buildings were revealed to club members.

Leader of the Council, Cllr Ray Puddifoot cut the ribbons on plaques at each site, accompanied by the former Mayor of Hillingdon, Cllr John Hensley.

Óne of the council's key aims is promoting sports and activities for all ages and ensuring that amenities allow residents to be able to participate, improve fitness and boost their wellbeing. Lawn bowls is a lowintensity sport for all ages and abilities. It can improve muscle strength, flexibility, endurance, coordination mental health. It also involves problem solving, concentration, competition and social interaction.

The social side of bowls can be as important as playing. Many clubs allow time for refreshments and catch-ups after games or practices. During the winter months some offer short mat indoor bowls. They may even offer other activities and club nights. Having the best facilities to do this entertaining in is just as crucial as the playing facilities.

All three buildings have also been adapted to allow disabled access.

Leader of the Council, Cllr Ray Puddifoot, said: "Hillingdon Council recognises the importance of investing in community facilities for residents of all ages. We set aside £600,000 funding for improvements at these three clubs this year. Our bowling clubs, like our parks and libraries, are helping people to keep active and social and by rebuilding and renovating these venues across the borough, we are enabling them to continue doing this."

Ladygate Bowls Club

Ladygate Bowls Club needed a new building for their changing rooms. Their previous prefabricated building, which was originally constructed in the 1980s had become dated and it was not economically viable to keep it maintained. The council demolished it and constructed a new, bigger and more modern wooden cladded building, which includes men's and women's changing facilities, and an office. There is also an outdoor building-connecting

canopy, to allow members to make their way to their social club in bad weather. Chairman of Ladygate Bowls Club, Chris Seaman, said: "The facility

before was dilapidated and we had problems with water - it had weathered badly. Thanks to the council, we've now got a wonderful building. It really does look good - everything from the office, to the changing rooms and the

foyer in front of it with its patio. It's been marvellous and a pleasure to work with the council."

Fassnidge Bowls Club

Fassnidge Bowls Club received a brand new clubhouse. The previous building was built in 1929, was small and dated, and in disrepair. The bar and domestic kitchen were too small to provide the facilities the club needed. The council demolished the existing clubhouse and a concrete shed adjacent to it, and a new larger and more modern building has replaced it. The new prefabricated building, which is made from reused steel shipping containers and is timber cladded offers more rooms and facilities, including a communal room that can seat up to 50 people or be used for short mat bowls, a large kitchen, bar and a store room. Brian Lawes, Chairman of Fassnidge Bowls Club said that all

the members are thrilled with the new clubhouse. He said: "For bowls matches, when we had 40 people there, we had a job to fit everyone into the old clubhouse. We also used to bring blow heaters down to warm it up a bit. The new clubhouse is absolutely superb - top notch. We can do everything we want to do in it and more. We're hoping in the winter months to have short mat bowls, we will have card nights and themed evenings and we're going to be open 12 months of the year."

Harefield Hospital Bowls Club

Harefield Hospital Bowls Club received a new kitchen extension. The previous

extension was constructed in the 1950s and the kitchen facilities didn't allow them to cater to their needs. The new build, which is traditional in style to fit in with the clubhouse building next door, has a fully equipped kitchen and a hatch, and glass-fronted doors were also introduced to allow light into the clubhouse. Jim Gayler, Treasurer of Harefield Hospital Bowling Club said that the upgraded facilities will make a tremendous difference. He said: "We have had as many as 60 people here with either visiting clubs for competition games or hosting Middlesex matches as a neutral ground. Our members used to have to bring in the prepared food from home, as we only had a kettle and a sink and no means to prepare catering on-site. Now we can offer a wider range of food, including hot meals, which will make all the difference to the experience of members and visitors. We hope to build on the club's success with new members and more social events for the community. We are extremely grateful for the new facilities thanks to the council's support."

Grow your own produce and recycle

Hillingdon People looks at the environmental circle of growing your own fruit and vegetables and then recycling your food and garden waste for composting, which can be reused for your growing.

Grow your own fruit and vegetables and enter the Autumn Show

or most people, the idea of growing your own produce can seem daunting but it is actually quite easy with a few square feet of outdoor space, water and time.

There are also a range of benefits. Health benefits include eating more fruit and vegetables: When you're growing them you won't be able to resist eating and when they're straight from the garden vitamin levels will be high. They may also taste better! You will also be exercising and getting physical activity, and additionally it can be a relaxing and de-stressing activity that can improve your mental wellbeing, particularly with that sense of pride and achievement you get when you see what you've created.

You will also save money on your weekly shop and seed prices are good value. You're also reducing your environmental impact: By growing



food organically without pesticides or herbicides, you're reducing air and water pollution and the fossil fuel pollution that comes from transporting produce from all over the world to your supermarket.

If you don't have a garden, you can always use pots or rent an allotment from the council. For more information visit www.hillingdon.gov.uk/allotments.

This year's produce will be exhibited for judging at a new venue The Great Barn, Manor Farm, Ruislip and residents can come for free and see what has been grown and celebrate the horticultural excellence on offer in Hillingdon. Judging will take place at 11am and general public entry will be from 1.30pm.

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Recycling your food and garden waste

Hillingdon was one of the first London councils to start a free garden waste collection service from households in 2003.

Residents are provided with canvas garden waste bags (which you can order online). In 2013, in response to the amount of waste (particularly during the summer months), the council increased the frequency of collections to weekly.

Also in autumn 2013, the council gave residents the option to recycle food waste by providing you with free food caddies (that have a lid and sit in your kitchen) and free biodegradable starch bags to line them with.

You can put bread, cakes, fruit and vegetables, peelings, cereals, rice, pasta, tea bags, coffee grounds, dairy products, raw and cooked fish and meat (including skin and bones) in your caddy.

When your bag is full, just put it into the external food storage bin that the council will also provide you with, and this waste will be collected at the same time as your garden waste, when you leave it by your property boundary. You can also order replacement bags for free online and sign up to receive automatic deliveries four times a year.

34,000 homes in Hillingdon now have a caddy, however that is less than half of the households in the borough and the council would like to encourage more residents to take part in this easy form of recycling to help the environment.

Karen Newbold from Harefield, said: "I love gardening and the weekly compost collection is fabulous. It means we can clear the garden at the weekend knowing the bags will be empty again for our next weekend in the garden.

"We have never had a problem recycling our food and have been doing it for a few years. It's second nature now. We have the

The local composting journey

Last year the council collected 15,600 tonnes of garden and food waste, which equates to one and a half times the weight of HMS Belfast. So, the question is what happens next to all of this compostable material?

The collected waste is taken directly to the West London Composting facility at Harefield. The materials are firstly shredded, before being moved into long concrete tunnels for the beginning of the composting process. The pipes in the tunnels blow air onto the waste to make it compost faster. Each of the tunnels has a roof, which is kept closed for seven to 10 days to retain odour and harmful particles and stop animals from scavenging.

The compost will reach 60 degrees centigrade, and this heat will kill seeds and any germs present. The compost is then transferred to an identical set of tunnels for another seven to 10 days to conform to animal by-products regulations and kill more germs. The final stage in the cycle sees the compost enter the maturation plant for four weeks to ensure it is good quality to be sold as soil blender so you can reuse it in your garden.

I would encourage you to try out this service if you aren't already and help to make a difference to our natural environment."

Alongside the course teaching, Taz has been absorbing himself in French books, articles and cinema in his free time, which has further improved his understanding and knowledge of the language.

He said: "I have thoroughly enjoyed learning French; it has increased my intellectual skills, as well as my social skills.

"I have gained confidence by expressing myself in class and in a French speaking country. I recommend learning French (or a new language) to others."

Doloris Kwayke, 34, has mental health problems and lives in supported housing.

She joined the four-week cookery course at Rosedale College, where all the recipes were based around their five-a-day fruit and vegetables.

Doloris was nervous at first, but soon enjoyed herself. With 100 per cent attendance, she and the other

learners loved every minute of it.

She said: "I have learnt how to cook for myself and have made some lovely food. I feel more confident now in coming out of my flat and mixing with others. I would like to come back and do a sewing course."

Sheila Kamya, 39, used to volunteer in schools and nurseries

when she was a full-time mum. After becoming a nanny, she decided she wanted a school-based

role working with more children and decided to study again at Brookfield Learning Centre.

Although initially nervous, her tutor and classmates helped her relax. Sheila gained new skills and knowledge through the Level 2 Certificate in Supporting Teaching and Learning, which also improved her communication and strategies for working with children.

Sheila now has a job working as a learning support assistant in the school she volunteered at. She said: "I'm loving my job; it is my dream job. If you want something, just go for it."

Updates from the Borough Commander

The other day I was putting together my regular update to staff, imaginatively titled 'Colin's Catch Up,' which highlights the teams and individuals who have achieved some great results and often gone the extra mile to keep residents safe, look after those who need us, and lock up criminals.

In my update I mentioned the work we have been doing to tackle the increase in knife crime we have seen across London, but also with the serious incidents locally in May We saw some excellent teamwork by Hillingdon officers responding to and investigating these (with court cases now pending), and compassion and support to victims not only by police officers and PCSOs but also the local community.

Our teams met local people, and talked about the officers who go into schools to educate and inform young people; the patrols everyday using our stop and search powers; and arresting those found

with knives. We also encouraged ways residents and businesses can help, making sure for example that children are not taking sharp scissors or kitchen knives into school, and that shops ensure they are not selling knives to children, (as our cadets do test shops). All of this helps keep Hillingdon a safe place to live and work.

I have mentioned also in my previous columns how we have increased our Dedicated Ward Officers to two per ward and local feedback so far is that there has been an increase in patrols and more visibility. In July and August we also have additional patrols with our council-funded police teams to deal with the seasonal increase in antisocial behaviour and violent crimes during the long hot summer days.

Look out for details of where you can meet the officers on our Facebook or your ward's Twitter pages. On *met.police.uk* you will see more information about your local area just by entering your street or postcode. You can report more things online using a mobile or tablet computer – but always call 999 in an emergency.

I hope you all have an enjoyable summer, Hillingdon remains one of the safest borough's in London and we can all play our part in making it safer still. So if you are going away, make sure you lock everything up, clear your garden of any tools or equipment, and consider a timer switch for a light at night. Check out our website for more crime prevention advice, and when you see us out there say hello as we go about being the best we can, keeping you safe and secure.

Mother knows best NHS makes big push to hear mums' views

Volunteer to help support people with drug or alcohol issues

Build on Belief Hillingdon (BoB) is a charity, which in partnership with the Central and North West London NHS offers a range of socially based services for people who have, or have had alcohol and drug addiction issues.



Icohol and drug addiction can be lonely and difficult when you are in recovery. BoB gives people somewhere to go when mainstream drug and alcohol services are closed and cannot help. The drop-in services they run help people to move forward in their lives by making new friends and building up a strong support network.

Services are designed to complement the existing treatment system, offering support, social interaction and a range of activities, including fishing, gardening, creative writing, film watching, beauty, and games.

The organisation is mainly run by volunteers and relies on their support to help service users. BoB particularly welcomes volunteers who have had substance use issues and have no requirements how long you have to be substance free before volunteering. But there is no barrier to volunteering, as long as you are stable, passionate and committed.

Volunteering with BoB couldn't be easier – all you have to do is look at the range of services they provide and drop into their sessions at

choose how much time to commit. You can also draw on your own skills or help with specific groups or activities. The most important part of the role is being a listening ear and taking time to support others.

In return for volunteering, you will receive travel expenses and lunch; the opportunity to attend training workshops; regular supervision from their managers; and support for those who need it in their individual recoveries and personal journeys.

A volunteer said: "Volunteering was a very important part of maintaining my recovery. I regained my self belief and felt valued as a person, which was a wonderful feeling after years of feeling worthless as an addict. I am now in full-time employment and have been clean for almost five years."




