About Jill Calder

Jill Calder is an award-winning illustrator and calligrapher who loves drawing, ideas, colour, ink, typography, stories, books, dogs and deadlines. Jill blends traditional and digital image-making methods as seamlessly as possible resulting in whimsical illustrations with broad appeal. As a result, her work is commissioned for children's picture books, huge hospital murals, financial and scientific reports, branding Scotch beer and whisky and global advertising campaigns.

Jill studied at Edinburgh College of Art and later at Glasgow School of Art, graduating in 1992. Through her work, she has been invited to talk at various events and conferences and teach at schools and universities throughout the UK, USA and Hong Kong. Amongst other places, her work has been displayed at the V&A Museum, The National Museum of Scotland, The Royal Brompton Hospital, The Royal Scottish Academy.



Recently, Jill's work was on show around the world in **'Drawing Words'**, an exhibition of ten British children's book illustrators, curated by Lauren Child and organised by the British Council. As part of the tour, Jill was invited to Pakistan and Sri Lanka to open the exhibition and hold workshops, masterclasses and storytelling sessions in the British Council Libraries there.

From small acorns do mighty oaks grow. Tracing the roots of our local Community Gardening.

Meet Nicola MacFarlane Young: Volunteer, founder and driving force behind our gardening project.

Her story starts back in 2018 when a freak storm washed two boats ashore. Nicola put a call out on the local Facebook page to find the owners. Realising his boat was damaged beyond repair, local man Graham, gifted it to Nicola.

Ably assisted by two waiters from the Crusoe, Nicola then dragged her washedup treasure from the harbour to its now iconic location at the foot of Drummochy Road. With the wind behind her sails and support from family, Nicola bought soil, plants, and gravel. Passers-by stopped, gave donations, gifted plants, and offered help. Word of mouth grew, and before long, two old bikes had joined her fleet of up-cycled planters.

The seed of an idea may have started with Nicola, but it takes a village to grow a community garden. From donations of money, plants and time from family, friends, volunteers, primary schools, businesses, and charities, to support from the local and community councils, it's been an enormous team effort. Today, our community garden stretches across all three villages. We've five boats, three bikes, 25 planters, and 13 green-fingered volunteers. (We always need more volunteers please!)

Speaking about her journey from 2018 until today, Nicola said: "Without the donations and the amazing volunteers, it



couldn't have continued or progressed like it has, so thank you everyone!" As well as bulbs, Nicola and the team are busy planting big plans and are always looking for extra help. The wonder of a community garden is that we can all play a part:

- Keep an eye on the planters and top up with water if you think they're in need of a good drink.
- Hand in any donations at Largo Library and Community Hub.



previous experience is necessary. *Note:* You don't have to wear special footwear, any soft-soled shoe is fine.



for Largo Parish Church. You may have seen me around. I started at the end of October 2023.



My mission was to provide activities and develop opportunities for children and young people in the community. As a practising Christian, I am still growing in my own faith and learning every day. I hope to provide safe, nurturing environments where young people can explore their faith, just enjoy social interaction with other children and most importantly, have fun!

Messy Church runs every Thursday during term time from 3.30pm-5pm in the Durham Hall. Here children can play, create, build, design, make new friends and enjoy a meal together. We have lots of Lego, games, art & craft activities, playdoh, quizzes and toys. There's something for all ages and everyone is welcome, from ages 0-100! Children should be accompanied by an adult, but generally the children all play together while the adults chat and drink tea! We have food together and there is always a prayer.

As well as running the Messy Church, I work every week with children in Lundin Mill School and the Montrave Playgroup. In the school holidays I will run Holiday Clubs for children & young people. Memories: Kirkton of Largo School

I was immensely sad to hear of the closure of Kirkton of Largo Primary

School. Three generations of my family attended there from the 1920s to the 1970s, and my own attendance was 1947 to 1954. There were two classrooms – the 'Teacher's



(the local name for 'peevers') with a bootpolish tin filled with sand. In the Master's room, most of us took a pen knife to school – a dire crime nowadays, but then nobody

thought anything of it. We never

a quiet, kindly lady, and the 'Master's Room' where the teacher was William Smellie, the headmaster who taught the older pupils.

The toilets were round the back of the school, but the toilet roll was kept in the cloakroom, so we had to grab a square then run out, rain, hail, or snow, round to the toilet. I do not remember a wash basin in the toilets.

The pupils who did not go home for lunch had school meals in the dining room at the cemetery end of the building. Hand washing was in the deep ceramic sink of warm water shared by all with a slab of white Windsor soap and a roller towel. The headmaster had his meals at a card table in the dining room, so there was no misbehaviour. And we had a choice for meals – 'Take it or leave it'! Picky eaters soon learned to eat Fly Cemetery and Frogs Eggs. Playground games went through phases. One week, rounders dreamed of knifing each other – it was simply to sharpen our pencils. The school's wall-mounted sharpener always seemed to break the lead.

The school garden was where the present schoolhouse stands. Mr Smellie used to take the boys there for gardening while the girls had sewing and knitting. Heating was fuelled by a large stove in the Master's room. Mr Smellie was often heard muttering something about not being a stoker as he fed coal into its jowls with a grumpy expression. It did keep us cosy though and the older you got the nearer you were moved to the stove. The big pipes around the room were fine for drying wet gloves.

I look back with nostalgia at these days, but I expect that today's children will do the same when they are pensioners, though their memories will perhaps not be of Kirkton of Largo Primary.

How to make Easter bunnies bark!

This simple three ingredient, three-step recipe is sure to have mouths watering. Remember to send in a picture if you give it a go!

Ingredients:

3 x 200g milk chocolate

2 x 90g packs mini chocolate eggs 1 teaspoon of freeze-dried raspberry pieces – or you could use rainbow sprinkles.

Steps

- Break the chocolate into a large heatproof bowl. Bring a pan of water to a simmer, then sit the bowl on top. The water must not touch the bottom of the bowl. Let the chocolate slowly melt.
- 2. Lightly grease then line a roasting tin or baking tray with parchment. Put three-quarters of the mini eggs into a food bag and bash them with a rolling pin until broken up a little.
- 3. When the chocolate is melted and smooth, pour it into the tin. Tip the tin from side to side to let the chocolate find the corners and level out. Scatter with the smashed and whole mini eggs, followed by the freeze-dried raspberry pieces or sprinkles. Leave to set, then snap into pieces, ready to share with family and friends.



Largo Area Twins with Villennes-sur-Seine

On 23 September last year, a twinning ceremony was held in the town hall of Villennes-sur Seine near Paris.

Largo Area was represented by Peter Aitken and Matt Allan, Chair and Vice-Chair of Largo Area Community Council, Keziah Scott-Bell of Waid Academy and Evangeline Scott-Bell of Lundin Mill Primary. The Scottish Government was represented by François Zavier Dutrieux.

Before the ceremony, the Fox

Pipe Band led the French and Scottish representatives through the village and round the town hall square.

During the ceremony, the national anthems of both nations were played, and all the speeches were made in French. Gifts were exchanged and a painting by local artist William Hoggan was presented to the French mayor. The artist has requested that the value of his painting be donated to a charity supporting the children of Ukraine.

An informal lunch was held followed by the unveiling of the twinning sign at the entrance to the village, visits to the local museum, library and church, and an official dinner in the evening.

The following day the Scottish representatives were taken on a trip down the river Seine followed by a buffet lunch in the town hall, a game of





pétanque (French bowls) and watching Scotland play Tonga at rugby in the afternoon. Keziah and Evangeline met students at the local school and members of the local youth group.

Peter, chair of LACC said:

<< Un jour historique >> "This is a historic day for our two communities. We hope that this twinning will lead to regular exchanges and collaborations in order to perfect the mastery of English and French languages for our

students. Your constitution advocates freedom, equality and fraternity. There are no better principles to advance our two communities."

François, representing Scotland said: << L'Ecosse, un pays ouvert à l'international >>

"I am very honoured to celebrate this new relationship within The Auld Alliance, the treaty of mutual protection between Scotland and France signed in 1295. My Scottish Government colleagues are very proud of this project and particularly attached to the exchanges between the youth of the two countries. This new twinning will bring a fresh dynamic and demonstrate that Scotland is not just a kilt, a bagpipe or a tartan but also an internationally recognized country, ready to support young people and share its culture."

Largo in Spring

The Largo of old awoke from its slumber to prepare for the arrival of visitors looking to enjoy its coastal delights. Early spring saw chimneys swept, external walls white-washed, paintwork touched up and curtains washed then hung out to dry on back greens, as prospective house-letters readied themselves for the coming season. Despite the unpredictable weather, the spring holidays would bring an early influx of visitors from Edinburgh and Glasgow, while many locals would in turn take day trips to these cities. Newspapers tell us that this combined movement of people resulted in record breaking numbers of bookings at Lundin Links and Largo train stations in April 1929.

Fishermen and pleasure-boat owners could be seen '*reddin' up*' their vessels, preparing to get them back in the water, with the promise of more favourable weather and sea conditions. It was also a time for renewed activity in the fields and gardens of the district. Over the decades much was made of the daffodil season. In the 1920s and early 1930s, the Rintoul family would throw the gardens of Lahill House open to the public and raise funds for various local causes. The picturesque grounds there turned into a 'field of gold' according to newspaper reports. Many a Daffodil Fete was run by the W.R.I. while the Women's Guild offered daffodil teas.

Easter was of course an important date in the calendar for the local churches. Sometimes Easter was celebrated in the open air. On Easter Sunday 1973 for example a "Dawn Service" was held at the top of Largo Law. Starting at 6am, around 100 people were met at the summit with bagpipe playing and a bonfire, assembling around a wooden cross. According to the East Fife Mail of 25 April 1973, the Rev. Douglas Lister, as part of his Easter message, told the gathering:

"For centuries on the headlands of Britain like this, our ancestors, Druids and Norsemen among them, gathered to celebrate the return of Spring and, by bonfires, to send their messages across the land - warnings of danger, signals of victory."

All this activity happened against the backdrop of nature springing back to life. Ornithologists Evelyn Baxter and Leonora Rintoul would have been kept busy every spring recording the local bird life, while wildflowers would have brought a welcome splash of colour to the parish. The Largo Village Book, compiled in 1932 by Rintoul, includes extensive information on local wildlife. In one interesting observation, on the house martins which typically arrive in April, the book states: *"We wonder if the "tarmac" roads which make it so difficult for them to find mud for their nests may have something to do with the decrease in their numbers"*. The book also mentions that *"primroses carpet the ground in Keil's Den in spring"* and that overall *"the parish is lucky in having some very lovely wildflowers"*. Whether your spring highlight is bluebells along the Serpentine or wildflowers along the old railway track, the new season is a great time to experience the natural colours of Largo. However, with the still changeable weather you will likely want to wrap up warm and heed the old saying, *"ne'er cast a clout, till May be oot"*. Purple sprouting broccoli (PSB) and salsify with caper butter

Whilst I am all for seasonal cooking, I also like to promote unusual vegetables which historically have been grown in this country, and salsify is one such. We used to have it at the Savoy Hotel from tins! It has a lovely nutty flavour. It would be good if someone local might grow it. PSB is in season right now and is a wonderful versatile vegetable.

Ingredients

- 2 lemons cut in half, juice one and set the juice aside
- 4 salsify roots
- 400g purple sprouting broccoli, trimmed weight
- 100g cold butter
- 2 tblsp small capers
- 2 tblsp chopped chives
- 2 tblsp flat leaf parsley
- 2 tblsp chopped tarragon
- 2 tblsp chopped dill
- Salt and pepper



<u>Method</u>

- Bring a pan of water to the boil, add salt and the remaining lemon halves, squeezing the juice out as you do.
- Peel the salsify and cut into 3 batons, put straight into the boiling water and cook until al dente, about 10 minutes; drain and allow to dry.
- **3.** Cook the broccoli in the same water, drain and set aside in a large bowl.
- **4.** Cut the cooked salsify batons into quarters lengthwise.
- 5. Heat half the butter and, as it foams, add the salsify and cook quickly until golden brown, pour onto the broccoli, mix together and season. You can either leave them in the bowl or dress them in a clean warm one.
- 6. Return the pan to the heat and add the remaining butter, allow it to go nut brown and then away from the heat add the remaining lemon juice, capers and herbs, season and sprinkle over the prepared vegetables.

Note: don't worry if you don't have all of the herbs, just use what you have!

Largo Beach Wheelchairs

Recent successful fund-raising activities show that disabled people are keen to access Largo beach.

In September 2022 a steering group was set up to look at improving access for disabled people to the Temple car park toilet facilities. Draft plans were drawn up for a modular building containing a Changing Places Toilet*, an accessible toilet, and storage space for beach wheelchairs. The existing toilets will also receive a makeover.

*A 'Changing Places Toilet' is a room large enough with a hoist to help a wheelchair user to transfer, accommodating an adult-sized changing table, a specialist toilet, a privacy screen, waste disposal bins, and a wash-hand basin. Many more people will thus be able to visit our beautiful beach, knowing their needs will be met.





Funding to assist with the project has already been pledged - £100,000 from Regional Tourism Infrastructure Fund, working in partnership with Fife Council and Fife Coast and Countryside Trust.

Funding of over £1,400 has been secured from St Andrews University Community Fund for a beach walker.

Various local fundraising initiatives have raised over £3,000; a recent bid to 'Our River Leven Community Fund' was successful and we are now close to being able to buy 2 beach wheelchairs.

From the Fife Herald 31 March, 1842

NEW GILSTON – Theft

A few days ago one of the workmen employed at Teasses Colliery and who lodged in a respectable house in this place, when looking into his chest found the sum of £9.7s.6d amissing. The money was locked in his chest, and he usually carried the key in his pocket, which was generally left in the house during the early part of the day when he was at work. There is very little appearance of any clue to lead to the discovery of the depredator. The above circumstances is much to be regretted as the unfortunate and deserving individual had part of it appropriated to a humane and benevolent object – to support his father and mother in their old age.



Temporary Access Road/Restoration of Verge

Mr Allan met with the farmer who stated that to restore the field fit for agricultural use would require removal of rubbish, replacement of topsoil and levelling at a cost of £80,000. Neither Council nor the developer are willing to restore the field and there was a suggestion that in this instance the landowners should be responsible for carrying out the work. 
