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

1. Executive Summary

The Project

- 1.1 Strategic Leisure (SL) was commissioned in December 2009 by Northumberland County Council (NCC) to develop a Playing Pitch Strategy (PPS). The strategy is part of a wider suite of greenspace strategic planning documents which includes a Planning Policy Guidance Note 17 (PPG17) compliant assessment, a Green Infrastructure (GI) Strategy and long-term action plan for Northumberland and a separate Green Infrastructure Strategy and short-term action plan for the South East Northumberland Growth Point areas.
- 1.2 The Playing Pitch Strategy is based on an assessment of supply and demand for key pitch sports across the county, specifically: football, cricket, rugby union and hockey. It also considers identified minority sports, as agreed with NCC. It takes account of the quantity, quality and access of facilities, using an eight stage assessment method developed by Sport England and CCPR¹. This strategy supersedes earlier Playing Pitch Strategies developed across a number of the Districts prior to Council re-organisation.
- 1.3 Ensuring a strategic approach to the provision of high quality, accessible pitch provision is important in meeting the aims and objectives of several national and local strategies. These are summarised in the main report. Overall, the local Playing Pitch Strategy provides a framework for:
 - Making informed planning decisions;
 - Targeting financial support and investment in facilities;
 - Maximising the potential of managing NCC pitches in a way that will deliver best value and
 - Planning the delivery of sports development programmes.
- 1.4 The assessment findings reported and resulting issues, challenges and recommendations need to be considered alongside the outputs of other research and planning, in particular the PPG17 assessment report. The potential geographical imbalance across the County also needs to be considered i.e. the difference between areas with theoretical over supply/spare capacity, and areas of excess demand.

Approach to developing the Strategy

- 1.5 Developing the strategy has included a five month research programme comprising desk research, consultation, data analysis and scenario modelling. Research included visiting all playing pitch sites (some were inaccessible because of security/ownership issues), and rating facilities for quality and access. This included the completion of a non-technical visual assessment for each pitch facility identified, providing a classification of quality.
- 1.6 Overall the research to compile the strategy has involved:
 - Reviewing existing strategies and policies relating to sports pitch provision across Northumberland
 - Reviewing the Northumberland Sports Facilities Strategy (PMP 2009), to ensure that the PPS reflects and complements the findings, recommendations and aspirations of that strategy as appropriate

- Consultation with core stakeholders, including Council Officers, League Secretaries and National Governing Body of Sport representatives, whose views are incorporated throughout the analysis and assessment; in addition, and where relevant, information on trends in individual sports have been included, where changes will impact on future pitch provision
- Questionnaires administered to all schools across the County
- Questionnaires and telephone interviews with 203 sports clubs across the county; and
- Site visits to more than 175 playing pitch sites. Site visits were agreed to all identified
 playing pitches. Unfortunately some pitches could not be assessed e.g. on school/private
 sites due to accessibility issues. Similarly it was not possible to access some existing
 changing facilities for the same reasons. However it is recognised that generally changing
 facilities are not as good quality as they could be.
- 1.7 The Strategy is based on assessments of the current, and the future (estimated changes over the next 5 years) supply of, and demand for the sports identified in 1.2 above. It has also included more focused assessments based on the three service areas (North, West and South East). These three sub areas were agreed with NCC at the outset of the study as the 'common' planning areas on which the PPG17 and GI studies would also be based.
- 1.8 In addition to the research undertaken, an action planning workshop involving key stakeholders was held in July 2010 to further discuss the findings of this assessment and reach a consensus on priority action for addressing the issues and challenges highlighted.

Overview of Supply and Demand

1.9 In terms of pitches assessed, the following illustrates what is meant by each pitch type, together with its relevant dimensions and the age group for which it provides. Playing pitches come in various dimensions and surfaces depending on the sport for which they are used, and the ages of the participants. Playing pitches in this strategy reflect the categories set out in Table 1.1:

- 1.10 There are **367 formal playing pitches** (on 197 sites (Maps 2a, 2b and 2c) across Northumberland, the majority of which have secured community use (only 48 pitches do not currently have secured community use). Facilities are provided by NCC, Town and Parish Councils, schools, voluntary clubs and private providers. Nearly a third of all pitches identified are in non-council ownership and over a quarter of accessible pitch sites are on schools.
- 1.11 The research has identified a total of **279 pitch based sports clubs** generating **more than 1,000 sports teams requiring pitch facilities** to service league fixtures, cup games and training. As in most parts of the country, pitch sport participation is dominated by boys' and men's teams girls' and women's teams make up only 6% of the total number of teams identified (excluding mixed teams).
- 1.12 As expected, and in line with national trends, **football is the most popular sport in the County**, particularly for boys. For every thousand 10 to 15 year olds around 21 teams are generated. In contrast, there is a relatively low level of demand for hockey. There are only four Hockey clubs operating across the whole county; this is largely a consequence of a lack of facilities rather than low levels of interest.
- 1.13 An analysis of the Team Generation Rates (TGRS) in Northumberland demonstrates:
 - Higher levels of demand for football in the West area in comparison to TGRs County wide and across the North and South East Areas
 - Higher levels of demand for cricket and rugby union in the West area also, in comparison to County wide and across the other analysis areas
 - · Higher concentrations of demand for hockey in the North than the other areas
- 1.14 It is important to highlight that overall TGRs in the South East sub area are generally lower than in the West and higher than the North sub areas; this could change in the next few years given that this is a designated Growth Point and the population is set to increase significantly. An increase in future population means there is likely to be an increase in the demand even if based on the current TGRs. Further growth in team numbers could be realised if TGRs in the South East are increased in line with the county average. This effectively means that there is currently latent demand for playing pitches and it is therefore important to plan for potential increased demand for playing pitches in this area. Additional discussion of TGRs and their implications is in Section 4.
- 1.15 36 schools have community access agreements in force. For the following schools, secured community use is a planning requirement:
 - South Beach First School, Blyth, NE24 3PX
 - Ridley High School, Blyth, NE24 2SY
 - Malvins Close First School, Blvth, NE24 5BL

- 1.16 The following schools have received planning permission recently, so construction will not be complete, but community use is a planning requirement:
 - Newbiggin by the Sea School, NE64 6RS
 - Seaton Hirst County Middle School, NE63 9SA
- 1.17 It may well be that there are schools allowing community use of their playing pitches without a formal community use arrangement; the point is that the Playing Pitch Model (PPM)² only allows for assessment of pitches with a formal community use agreement, as any other arrangement is not secured and therefore can be withdrawn/changed at any time.
- 1.18 In terms of overall playing pitch provision, Northumberland has 1.69 pitches per 1000 population which is comparable to other similar rural areas e.g. Shropshire. In Northumberland it is interesting that whilst there is roughly the same level of land providing for outdoor sport, including playing pitches in each of the sub areas, there are more actual facilities in the North sub area.

Assessment findings: Sport by Sport headlines

- 1.19 A range of data has been collected, analysed and interpreted for each sport, taking account of quality, quantity and access to provide a number of conclusions summarised overleaf. These draw on an assessment of the adequacy of provision across the County as a whole, and the results of more focused local area assessments.
- 1.20 These local area assessments are based on 3 geographic sub-areas agreed with the Client at the outset of the study, although it is recognised that these are not based on pitch sport catchments.. The purpose of using these agreed sub areas is threefold. Firstly it will enable meaningful use of the PPS with the PPG17 studies, which also uses these three sub areas as the basis for analysis; secondly it enables recognised population data to be used which is crucial in modelling current and future playing pitch demand and team generation rates. Thirdly it has enabled comparative use of previous PPS data from the 6 former districts, which was a requirement of the study brief.
- 1.21 In using these agreed sub areas, it is however recognised that they are large scale areas in their own right, given the overall geographical spread of Northumberland, and that this may mean that additional locally based analysis is needed in relation to specific pitch sites. To address this as far as possible in relation to the resources and timescale available for this specific element of the overall greenspace work, an overall hierarchy of provision based on pitch typology has been developed, together with identified priority sites for future investment using both our own research and identified National Governing Body (NGB) priorities.
- 1.22 The overall PPS, its findings and recommendations also provides evidence to undertake further specific site analysis as required in relation to future planning applications/funding bids etc.

Football

- 1.23 In the last two decades the game of football has changed considerably with the development of mini soccer and the explosion of the female and disability versions of the game. The game is currently looking at further developments including a 9 v 9 version of the game to improve the experience and transition for players from mini soccer to 11 v 11; this in turn poses a number of challenges around facility provision for the game.
- 1.24 In addition, technology for all weather facilities has moved on significantly and the advent of the 3rd generation all weather artificial grass pitch provides not only a training base but an alternative match day venue; the FA is working with leagues, clubs and local authorities to educate them as to the benefits of these facilities. In turn this is making multi pitch venues key to the success of the delivery and growth of the game.

Summary of assessment findings: Football

- 1.25 Across the county there are 212 clubs generating 673 football teams. A total of 215 football pitches which are community accessible have been identified.
- 1.26 The football pitches identified are all in Northumberland, and have been assessed on both a countywide and sub area basis.
- 1.27 The main leagues in which the identified teams play are:

1.28 An assessment of quantity shows that while the number of senior pitches is adequate to meet demand, there is a shortfall in dedicated mini soccer and youth football pitches across all areas assessed. Demand for mini soccer is only accommodated currently because games are played across senior pitches, a practice common in the UK. The impact on pitch quality and carrying capacity in relation to senior use is minimal, providing pitches used in this way are of a good quality.

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- 1.29 Shortfalls in pitches are particularly prominent in the West sub area where less than half of clubs have capacity for new members. Demand, as measured by the number of residents required to generate a team, is also highest in this area.
- 1.30 In addition to quantitative deficiencies, there are challenges around access to changing provision.

 Pitch quality itself is high across half of all football pitch sites and based on acceptable travel distances reported by clubs there is access to quality playing pitch provision across most areas of the County.
- 1.31 However, there is a lack of quality changing facilities to serve many of these pitches which means that overall quality is an issue in relation to meeting league requirements—only around 4 in 10 pitch sites are served by any changing rooms at all.
- 1.32 There are deficiencies particularly in parts of the North (Berwick and Wooler) and West analysis areas (Haltwhistle).
- 1.33 Future modelling suggests demand for football will continue to grow, and this will continue to outstrip supply, and further exaggerate the challenges identified.

Cricket

- 1.34 Across the county there are 51 clubs generating 225 teams. A total of 48 pitches with community access have been identified. Many of these are privately owned and managed by clubs themselves.
- 1.35 There is a deficiency in the current available stock of pitches, and the vast majority of those available are single pitch sites. This will make it difficult to significantly increase capacity at most existing cricket venues.
- 1.36 Quality is also lacking at a number of sites. Around a third of sites were rated as average at best, and around 1 in 5 pitches are not served by changing rooms. Of the sites with changing provision, many are served by ageing building stock in need of refurbishment or repair in order to accommodate any further growth. An assessment of accessibility shows limited access to quality provision across the North (across some rural areas and key settlements of Berwick and Wooler) and West areas (particularly the settlements of Haydon Bridge, Haltwhistle and Bellingham).
- 1.37 Future modelling suggests demand will continue to grow, although at a slower rate than other sports assessed. Deficiencies will therefore worsen unless additional provision can be accessed. The percentage growth rates used to model future demand for cricket have been discussed and agreed with the NGB at 0.7. This figure takes into account the fact that cricket is played at both weekends and mid week ie more than 0.5 game played each week (based on a home and away basis), which is how the PPM model calculates demand. In calculating future demand and assessing surplus/deficiency of provision, an allowance of 10% has been made for resting pitches.

Rugby Union

- 1.38 12 clubs have been identified through the audit, generating 94 teams, and there is a total of 49 rugby union pitches with community access in the county. Not all of these are on rugby club sites, with many part of schools provision, available for use but not necessarily used by any community teams at the moment.
- 1.39 In theory there is a surplus in provision. However, many of the spare pitches are not in the right place to cater for any increased demand. In some cases, pitches on key club sites are at or are nearing capacity.

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1.40 Around two thirds of pitches rated were of a good quality; the views from local clubs backs this up. A mapping exercise to highlight deficiencies in access to good quality facilities suggests that the North (Berwick in particular), North Tyne, Haydon Bridge and Haltwhistle are areas most deficient in relation to the location of rugby clubs and the concentration of rugby opportunities, in relation to North Tyne there is no junior development at Bellingham, and Kielder is 17 miles away. A large area of the population in the West sub area in not within an accessible distance of a playing pitch. As with other sports there are some issues around access to good quality changing provision. A number of proposals are included within the Northumberland Rugby Facilities Plan to address this.

Hockey

- 1.41 There are 4 clubs across the County generating 24 teams in general. Demand for hockey appears to be low when comparing Team Generation Rates with other areas.
- 1.42 There are enough Synthetic Turf Pitches (AGPs Artificial Grass Pitches the new terminology used in Sport England guidance) in theory to cater for the volume of demand identified. However, these are not necessarily in the right place to provide an accessible network of hockey opportunities. Both Alnwick and Tynedale Clubs report issues with a lack of appropriate facilities.
- 1.43 Alnwick HC club currently share facilities with Morpeth and Tynedale HC is currently operating their club outside of the County. Mapping of access to facilities highlights these issues. Based on the acceptable travel distances reported by clubs there are significant deficiencies in most of the West area and in the North (particularly around Alnwick). In contrast there is a pitch suitable for hockey (Cramlington High School) in the South East which is not currently home to a hockey club.
- 1.44 Quality is less of an issue overall, where pitches are maintained and of the correct specification for hockey matches. However, as with other sports, some investment is required in the ancillary facilities that serve pitches. Additionally some issues with the quality of the Queen Elizabeth School pitch in Hexham has resulted in the Tynedale HC move.
- 1.45 Some growth is anticipated by local clubs. In theory the current supply is sufficient to meet this additional demand (in terms of capacity).

Rugby League

1.46 There is only one club operating in the County with 4 teams. Cramlington Rockets are based at Cramlington Sports Club (adjoining the school) and benefit from high quality facilities. There are plans to double the number of teams at the club over the next 5 years as part of the club's progress towards Clubmark Gold standard. It is likely that the two pitches available at the Sports Club will be adequate to meet this growth, subject to the quality being maintained and fixtures being programmed appropriately.

Synthetic Turf Pitches for other sports

- 1.47 A headline review of AGPs has been completed with a focus on whether there is an appropriate and accessible network of training facilities (principally for football and rugby). Aside from sand filled AGPs to accommodate hockey, there are 4 3G AGPs in the County. A number of previous Playing Pitch Strategies (those developed at District level) highlight deficiencies in pitches.
- 1.48 Some of these still exist and it is suggested that priorities for additional provision should be in the West (Hexham area) and North (currently only one 3G pitch at Westfield Park in Longhoughton), based on consultation feedback, and analysis.
- 1.49 Section 1.24 highlights the views of the FA in relation to synthetic pitch provision.

Local Standards of Provision

- 1.50 Standards of provision represent the minimum levels of provision to meet need across the County. They include a **quantity, quality and accessibility** element put simply a minimum standard for the number of pitches, quality of facilities and accessibility for residents. These standards need to feed into the PPG17 Assessment for Northumberland. It is important to stress that the Local Standards developed in a PPG17 are based on ha per 1000 population, whereas the PPS deals in pitch units, so the two sets of information are different. For ease of reference, the pitch dimensions are set out in paragraph 1.9 above, so that there is correlation between the different measures of area. In addition, it is important to be clear that PPG17 standards for outdoor sport includes ALL sports e.g. pitches, running tracks, greens and courts, whereas the PPS ONLY includes playing pitches, unless the scope of work explicitly states otherwise.
- 1.51 Therefore, it is the conclusions of the PPS in terms of need for increased number of pitches/improved quality and/or improved accessibility that should be taken as the definitive evidence to inform future need and investment in playing pitches alone.
- 1.52 It is these priorities i.e. Table 6.1 that should be used to inform the Local Development Framework (LDF)³, through application of the most appropriate of the policy options as set out in paragraph 1.56 below, and in more detail in Section 6.
- 1.53 Although the data in a PPS is time limited, and does need to be regularly updated, the principles set out in Section 6 in terms of applying policies to address deficiencies remain relevant; they just need to be applied to specific needs and situations appropriately in the context of the LDF.
- 1.54 For football and cricket, additional pitch provision is required to meet current and future need; these conclusions are the result of applying the Playing Pitch Model (PPM) to the data gathered through the supply and demand audit, assessment and analysis. Additional provision could mean new pitch developments, or alternatively bringing into use pitches which are currently unavailable for community use for whatever reason, or improving the carrying capacity of existing pitches so that each pitch can have more games played on it.
- 1.55 On the basis of the assessment findings (including those relating to future growth) it is recommended that the following levels of additional provision are sought at sub area level. More specific recommendations about the location of these pitches are discussed in the recommendations.
 - Mini Soccer: An additional 4 pitches in the North, 23 in the West and 19 in the South East;
 - Youth Football: An additional 10 pitches in the North, 22 in the West and 35 in the South East;
 - Senior Football: No additional pitches required:
 - Cricket: An additional 2 pitches in the North, 11 in the West and 9 in the South East
 - Rugby Union: Investment needed to improve current pitch stock and increase capacity; additional
 provision required to mitigate against impact of training demand, but this could be realised through
 opening up existing pitches e.g. on school sites;
 - AGPs for Hockey: 1 additional (none currently suitable) in the West; 1 in the North
 - AGPs (3G) for Football / Rugby Training: Potentially 2 additional pitches

North Area

- ▶ 12 mini soccer pitches an increase of 4 pitches on current levels
- 17 youth football pitches an increase of 10 pitches on current levels
- ➤ 16 senior pitches some 40 fewer pitches than current levels of provision, but re-designation wherever possible
- 23 cricket pitches an increase of 2 pitches on current levels
- 17 rugby pitches Investment needed to improve current pitch stock and increase capacity; additional provision required to mitigate against impact of training demand, but this could be realised through opening up existing pitches e.g. on school sites;
- 1 AGP for hockey increase in levels of provision as currently identified, to create a better spread of opportunities
- ≥ 2 3G pitches an increase of 1 pitch (currently only one 3G pitch in Longhoughton)

West Area

- > 33 mini soccer pitches an increase of 23 pitches on current levels
- 31 youth football pitches an increase of 22 pitches on current levels
- ➤ 23 senior pitches a reduction of 13 pitches when compared to current levels of provision, but re-designation wherever possible
- > 30 cricket pitches an increase of 11 pitches on current levels
- ▶ 18 rugby pitches –investment needed to improve current pitch stock and increase capacity; additional provision required to mitigate against impact of training demand, but this could be realised through opening up existing pitches e.g. on school sites;
- ➤ 1 AGP pitch for hockey an increase (or re-instatement) on current provision
- 2 3G pitches an increase of 1 pitch (currently a pitch at Prudhoe School)

South East Area

- > 33 mini soccer pitches an increase of 19 pitches on current levels
- 45 youth football pitches an increase of 35 pitches
- ➤ 50 senior football pitches a reduction of 14 pitches on current levels of provision but redesignation wherever possible
- ▶ 17 cricket pitches an increase of 9 pitches on current levels
- 13 rugby pitches investment needed to improve current pitch stock and increase capacity; additional provision required to mitigate against impact of training demand, but this could be realised through opening up existing pitches e.g. on school sites;
- 2 AGPs able to support hockey
- ≥ 2 3G pitches an increase of 1 pitch, but potential for this to be done through re-surfacing on of the existing facilities (the feasibility of this needs to be explored)

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- 1.56 It is important to emphasise that reducing the number of senior pitches (as stated above) relates predominantly to their re-designation as junior and mini to meet identified current and future deficiencies in these types of provision. Given that a significant amount of this current junior and mini demand will translate into senior players, pitch sites should be retained to enable flexibility to re-mark senior pitches in the future as demand requires. The reductions stated above do not imply loss of pitches, but re-designation as appropriate to meet current demand.
- 1.57 It is also critical to highlight that identified surpluses may not be in the right places to meet deficiencies in other pitch types; underused pitches may be the only piece of open space (accessible) in a village/community, and therefore have a value beyond sport.
- In addition to the quantitative standards of provision, recommendations are made on standards of quality. The proposed standard for quality is that all community accessible provision should be rated as 'Good' or above using the non-technical visual proforma⁴. This is developed further in the Northumberland PPG17, but is based on the fact that a 'good' pitch will have a reasonable carrying capacity and therefore be able to accommodate more games, and will also have appropriate run offs and infrastructure i.e. changing facilities appropriate to its level and nature of use.
- 1.59 Applying this standard across current facilities shows there are deficiencies:
 - In pitch quality at 44% of sites and poor ancillary facilities at 75% of sites in the North Area
 - In pitch quality at 33% of sites and poor ancillary facilities at 86% of sites in the West Area
 - In pitch quality at 41% of sites and poor ancillary facilities at 88% of sites in the South East Area
- In terms of acceptable access standards it is proposed that the average acceptable travel distances reported by clubs are adopted as initial catchment areas (the acceptable travel distances stated by clubs are detailed in Appendix 2; the average of these have been used for each sport in relation to playing pitches). Although the assessments completed show some deficiencies, in the case of most sports these can be overcome by quality improvements to existing sites. Although walking distance is important to consider in relation to pitch sports and accessible pitches for informal use, the majority of pitch sport participants travel to facilities by car, given that they need playing kit.
- 1.61 The PPM models formal use of pitches and therefore local standards recommended as a result of the model analysis need to reflect its focus.

Addressing the findings

- 1.62 Policy Options considered for addressing the findings of the assessments undertaken included:
 - Changing the use of existing pitches (from one sport to another);
 - Dual-use of facilities and greater use of education pitches;
 - Improving the quality of facilities to increase carrying capacity (i.e. the number of games which can be played on each pitch);
 - A range of management options including long term leasing of pitches to allow clubs to have more control over use, improvements etc; and
 - Development of new facilities on new sites.

Playing Pitch Strategy

- 1.63 No one clear policy option will provide the solutions to addressing pitch deficiencies and issues in Northumberland. A combination of some of the traditional options above, together with more innovative solutions is required.
- The following priority sites for investment have been identified; this table translates the identified sites in Table 5.5 (based on a quality/value assessment), plus identified NGB priorities (from their strategies), and other priorities identified through the consultation undertaken, into sport specific investments. Section 2 - Introduction and Background













Introduction and Background

- 2.1. Strategic Leisure (SL), part of the Scott Wilson Group, was commissioned by Northumberland County Council (NCC) in December 2009 to develop a county-wide Playing Pitch Strategy (PPS) for the new unitary authority area. This report details the findings of the research and assessment undertaken and the recommendations made on the basis of this. The recommendations within provide the strategy for the future provision of sports pitch provision, and guide management and operation and provide a framework for funding and investment decisions.
- 2.2. This Playing Pitch Strategy is part of a wider suite of greenspace strategic planning documents which includes a Planning Policy Guidance Note 17 (PPG17) compliant assessment, a Green Infrastructure Strategy and long-term action plan for Northumberland and a separate Green Infrastructure Strategy and short-term action plan for the South East Northumberland Growth Point areas.
- 2.3. The suite of documents have been commissioned to inform the Council's Local Development Framework, of which the first Development Plan Document to be produced is the Core Strategy. The Core Strategy is the key strategic planning document for the authority and is informed by high level policy guidance. The PPS provides this high level policy guidance in relation to future provision and delivery of playing pitch provision, as well as more detailed analysis of what is needed, where and why. The high level policy guidance relates specifically to the nature of pitches that should be considered as a priority for investment, the level of pitch provision needed to meet current and future demand, and options for addressing future demand.

Aim, Objectives and Scope

- 2.4. The aim of the study is to produce a five-year playing pitch strategy for the Northumberland County Council area which includes the development of policy options, an action plan and the establishment of local standards. In meeting this aim, the objectives of this study, as set out in the brief, were to:
 - Produce the strategy based on an assessment using the eight stage Playing Pitch Model (Towards a Level Playing Field);
 - Produce a full audit of all playing pitches in the local authority area, including those not available for community use;
 - Complete quality assessments on all pitches with secured community use sites;
 - Use an appropriate mix of consultation methods to base the strategy on full consultation with sports clubs, leagues, schools, county/regional governing bodies of sport, Local Authority officers, representatives from adjoining local authorities, County Sports Partnerships and other providers of sports pitches within the local authority boundary;
 - Undertake agreed sub-area analysis;
 - Include a modelling of scenarios for the current and future years;
 - Develop a range of policy options flowing from the modelling results and use qualitative data to interpret these;
 - Make clear recommendations for playing pitch provision, protection and enhancement;
 - Develop local provision standards reflecting both qualitative and quantitative issues; and
 - Produce an action plan for the next five years.

Playing Pitch Strategy

- 2.5. In accordance with the assessment methodology (detailed in "Toward a Level Playing Field") the scope of the strategy is restricted to pitch based sports where a 'team' forms the key demand unit. The assessment is based on pitch requirements to meet regular demand from teams playing in organised competitive leagues. In summary the strategy covers:
 - Football;
 - Cricket;
 - Rugby Union;
 - Hockey; and
 - Rugby League.
- 2.6. An overview of Synthetic Turf Pitches has also been provided. Other outdoor sports fall outside the scope of this strategy, but assessments have been completed as part of the wider PPG17 audit. Specifically an assessment of bowls and tennis facilities is included within the findings on Outdoor Sport in the PPG17 Audit and Assessment.

Specific Issues to be tackled by the strategy

- 2.7. The development of new residential areas, population growth and changing expectations of users of leisure facilities all have implications for the future provision of playing pitches. Specifically for the Council there is increasing pressure on existing pitch resources. A number of sports clubs may require improved facilities to meet the criteria for participation in local, regional and national leagues.
- 2.8. The strategy is necessary to:
 - Protect facilities against development pressures, and specifically residential proposals on land in, and around, urban areas;
 - Identify an appropriate facility mix to best meet predicted population growth and changes to demand levels;
 - Provide sufficient information to inform planning decisions for sites where there are applications for change of use pending;
 - Provide a framework identifying priorities for investment and prioritisation of support for funding applications;
 - Address 'demand' pressures created as a result of specific sports development pressures e.g. mini soccer, move to use of artificial pitches by hockey;
 - Inform future policies on the Council's role as a provider and enabler of pitch provision, and in particular provide a steer on leasing sites to established sports clubs;
 - Inform future policies to deliver the new priorities of the coalition government;
 - Address and assist in delivering the priorities of the NGBs for pitch sports; and
 - Demonstrate the contribution made by provision of playing pitches to the Sustainable Community Strategy.

Strategic context summary

2.9. There are a number of national, regional and local influences (See Table 2.1 below) on the Playing Pitch Strategy. A review of these is included in the following paragraphs. It is also important to highlight that the recent publication 'Selecting the right Artificial Surface' (Sport England 2010) will need to be referenced in implementing the recommendations of the PPS relating to facility development and refurbishment.

Sporting Context

2.10. Nationally and regionally there are a number of strategies driving the delivery of sport and physical activity related services in Northumberland. They are broadly concerned with increasing participation across the population. There is currently a national agenda for sport, leisure and physical activity, based on the Government's "Game Plan" strategy, numerous other studies and the current Sport England Strategy (2008-2011) which in part aims to get one million more people doing sport by 2012/2013. Some key documents are shown below in Table 2.1 below.

- 2.11. While these documents have not been summarised within this report, their main aims and objectives and relevance for this Strategy have been considered in undertaking the assessment. Overall the common themes relate to driving up sports participation and building an infrastructure capable of accommodating this. The Playing Pitch Strategy is key to this, in terms of providing a greater understanding of the demand for and supply of sports pitches and providing the evidence base on which to make informed decisions.
- 2.12. Reflecting and endorsing the priorities of the various NGBs for pitch sports, pitch development and improvement is also a key out come of this Strategy.

Planning context

National Policy

- 2.13. The planning context for the Northumberland PPS is summarised briefly below; more detailed planning context is provided in both the Northumberland GI and PPG17 studies.
- 2.14. The recent planning White Paper 'Planning for a Sustainable Future' identifies the need and importance of protecting parks and open space due to the contribution they make to the quality of life and health benefits they bring.
- 2.15. Future planning for the provision of playing pitches as part of overall open space will also need to reflect the principles and policies developed in response to the new Government 'Planning for a Healthy and Natural Environment' Planning Policy Statement, currently under development.

Planning Policy Guidance Note 17: Planning for Open Space Sport and Recreation (2002)

- 2.16 PPG 17 outlines the Government's policy objectives for open space, sport and recreational facilities, with the need to ensure that those elements are of a high quality, attractive to users, well-managed and well-maintained. In terms of delivery the long term aims are to:
 - Ensure the provision of networks of accessible, high quality open spaces and sport and recreation facilities in both urban and rural areas, which meet residents and visitors needs, are economically and environmentally sustainable and are fit for purpose;
 - Ensure an appropriate balance between new provision and the enhancement of existing provision;
 - Provide clarity and reasonable certainty for developers and landowners in relation to the requirements and expectations of the local planning authority in respect of open space and recreational provision.
- 2.16. A key aspect of PPG17 is that local authorities should undertake a local needs assessment and audit of existing provision. The objective is to move away from the use of national standards of provision and to establish local standards of provision that address quality, quantity and accessibility.
- 2.17. Moreover, PPG17 maintains that open spaces, sport and recreation all underpin people's quality of life. Well designed and implemented planning policies for open space, sport and recreation are therefore fundamental to delivering broader Government objectives.
- 2.18. The PPG17 Companion Guide sets out a five step logical process for undertaking a local assessment of open space. It involves identifying local needs, auditing local provision, setting provision standards and applying provision standards. The Northumberland PPG17 report, outlining the results of the Playing Pitch Assessment, forms part of the overall response to future planning for open space and recreational provision in the county, and has informed the recommendations for future provision of playing pitches in the county.
- 2.19. The PPG17 Study for Northumberland addresses the Government's requirement for the NCC to undertake a Planning Policy Guidance Note 17 (PPG17) 'assessment of local need' in relation to developing a comprehensive audit of local need and providing transparency in the Council's future planning policy.

Playing Pitch Strategy

2.20. It will help the council to plan positively, effectively and creatively to ensure that there is adequate provision of accessible, high quality open space, sport and recreation facilities that meets the needs and aspirations of local communities and people who work or visit the County, reflecting the important contribution made by playing pitches and other open space to the Sustainable Community Strategy's priorities and objectives.

The Health Agenda

- 2.21. In addition to current sport and planning agendas, there is a significant current drive on a national level to increase the health and wellbeing of the population. Achieving this through increased participation in sport and active leisure is a key objective as set out in the developing Physical Activity Strategy for Northumberland.
- 2.22. In preparation of this report, the general themes and direction of a number of other strategies, plans and research have been considered. These include health driven strategies to tackle rising obesity levels, and initiatives to improve awareness of health issues. Collectively these could result in more demand for pitch sports and a subsequent need for increases in the quantity and quality of pitch facilities to provide safe environments.

Regional Policy

Regional Spatial Strategy for the North East (2008)

- 2.23. The Regional Spatial Strategy for the North East of England, (which still forms part of the statutory development plan following the ruling quashing the revocation), sets out a sustainable long-term vision for the development of the region and provides the regional framework for the determination of planning applications and planning appeals. It includes an undertaking to ensure that an improved environment is a high priority. (The coalition Government still plans to abolish the RSS through the Localism Bill).
 - Policy 2: Sustainable Development-Planning proposals and Local Development Frameworks should support sustainable development. Sub-sections of this policy embrace environmental and social objectives.
 - Environmental Objectives include promoting the concept of green infrastructure, with a network of linked multi-functional green spaces in and around the Region's towns and cities.
 - Social Objectives include improving health and well being, and also ensuring good accessibility by walking and cycling as well as by public transport
 - Policy 8: Protecting and Enhancing the Environment Strategies, plans, programmes, and planning proposals should seek to maintain and enhance the quality, diversity and local distinctiveness of the environment throughout the North East by (inter alia):
 - Identifying and protecting existing woodland of amenity and nature conservation value, particularly ancient woodlands;
 - Encouraging and supporting the establishment of green infrastructure including strategic wildlife corridors.
 - Policy 9.6: Environment One component of this policy seeks to support the establishment of strategic networks of green infrastructure that link existing and proposed greenspace with green corridors running through urban, suburban and urban fringe areas to the countryside and coast.

Playing Pitch Strategy

- Policy 24: Delivering Sustainable Communities Proposals should assess the suitability of land for development in relation to the potential contribution to reducing health & social inequality through the provision of accessible health, sports, community & recreational facilities, including suitable provision for play space, in new development.
- 2.24. In addition to the above policies 11.3c and 16 are highlighted as relevant to this work, and should be considered as appropriate.

Local Planning Policy

Releasing the Strength of our Communities – A sustainable Community Strategy for Northumberland to 2021

Background

- 2.25. 'The Strength of our Communities' provides the context for the developing local planning policy. The Sustainable Community Strategy sets out two fundamental principles. The first is recognising the importance of place. To improve the local quality of life, there is a need to focus on improving whole areas rather than just individual services. The second is working together in partnership. To improve the local quality of life, there is a need to bring together and better align all activity to meet the needs of communities.
- 2.26. The Vision for the Sustainable Community Strategy is that by 2021, everyone in Northumberland will be able to:
 - Enjoy a good standard of living
 - Live safely and in comfort
 - · Lead healthier lifestyles
 - Readily access the things they need
 - Take part in cultural activity
 - Care about our environment
 - Get involved and bring about change
- 2.27. Future provision of good quality open space, including playing pitches has a clear contribution to make to delivery and achievement of the Sustainable Community Strategy.
- 2.28. The administration of the county of Northumberland has undergone transition from a county authority with six district councils to a single unitary authority. The dissolution of the former district councils in 2009 leaves the new unitary authority with a disparate range of policies from the extant local plans of each previous local planning authority, including the policies within the former County Council's own Structure Plan.
- 2.29. Whilst there is some commonality in the approach to green infrastructure there is also a lack of consistency, and some plans are more comprehensive than others. Moreover, only Blyth Valley had progressed the evolution of its own Local Development Framework (LDF) to a stage where development control policies have been through public consultation and the scrutiny / endorsement of an examining Inspector. The County Council, as the new unitary authority, is therefore in the process of bringing forward a comprehensive range of policies through its emerging Core Strategy and LDF.

Northumberland Consolidated Planning Policy Framework (April 2009)

- 2.30. The Consolidated Planning Policy Framework for Northumberland was adopted by Northumberland County Council on 4 February 2009 and identifies the need to consider relevant policies and strategies adopted by the former County Council and District Councils e.g. former Core Strategies and Local Plans when considering planning applications and other development proposals. Consolidated Planning Policy Framework comprises two sections:-
 - Section A : Schedule of Statutory Development Plan Documents
 - Section B : Schedule of Planning Policy Documents which do not form part of the Development Plan

Section A: Schedule of Statutory Development Plan Documents

2.31. This schedule includes Policy S5 of the adopted Structure Plan, adopted Local Development Framework documents which form part of the Statutory Development Plan, and local plan policies 'saved' either through regulation or Direction by the Secretary of State. Together with the North East of England Regional Spatial Strategy (RSS) these documents comprise the statutory Development Plan for Northumberland.

Section B : Schedule of Planning Policy Documents which do not form part of the Development Plan

- 2.32. This schedule is itself comprised of two parts. The first is concerned with those local development documents which are part of the Local Development Framework but do not form part of the statutory Development Plan and includes a number of Supplementary Planning Documents (SPDs). The second part comprises various planning policy documents which have been prepared by the seven former local planning authorities and which are used to provide guidance and advice in considering and determining planning applications. The documents in Part 2 are not individually identified in the policy framework in the Council's Constitution but are referred to as the 'Schedule of Planning Policy Documents which do not form part of the Development Plan'. The documents contained in Part 2, whilst prepared by predecessor councils, were also adopted by the Northumberland County Council on 4 February 2009.
- 2.33. As a precautionary note the Framework flags up that the documents contained within the Consolidated Planning Policy Framework need to be read in context. Where they were adopted some time ago, it is likely that material considerations, in particular the emergence of new national and regional policy- will be afforded considerable weight when determining planning applications. As a precautionary note the Framework flags up the fact that some policies were adopted some time ago, as a consequence of which it is likely that other material considerations in particular the emergence of new national and regional policy will be afforded considerable weight when determining planning applications. In addition, the document makes it clear that there will be a need from time to time to rely on existing evidence-based documents to assist in the due consideration of assessing development proposals. . These include:
 - Housing needs assessments
 - Retail capacity studies
 - Emerging evidence based studies
 - Open space and recreation assessments
 - Landscape character assessments

- Employment land reviews
- Wind capacity studies
- 2.34. In relation to playing pitch provision, there are a number of key issues resulting from the above context, and specifically the existing planning policies being applied. These are summarised below:

Growth Point Status

2.35. The Northumberland Growth Point (NGP) initiative for South East Northumberland was approved by government in 2008. The initiative is designed to accelerate growth in housing, regeneration and economic prosperity.

Playing Pitch Strategy

- 2.36. The Growth Point Area comprises the whole of Wansbeck and Blyth Valley and it extends westward to include the market town of Morpeth (The main settlements being Ashington, Blyth, Cramlington and Morpeth) and north to include the Rural Coalfield Area.
- 2.37. A key target identified is to realise an increase in housing by over 20% over the period 2008-2017, with the total new housing provision expected to be over 6,300. The submission for Growth Point status was on the back of new housing largely being achieved through increased residential development on Brownfield regeneration sites or through urban extension at Ellington, Lynemouth, East Ashington, Blyth Estuary, Cambois, North Morpeth and Cramlington South East Sector.
- 2.38. The initiative is also tasked with ensuring that the uplift in housing is complemented by an improvement to the residential neighbourhood and the quality of place. As a result, specific attention is drawn to the role and function of green infrastructure in the delivery of these aspirations.
- 2.39. Growth Point status represents a joint commitment between government and the new Growth Point Partnership to increase the level of housing provision in the sub region and accelerate its delivery. However it is not solely about housing numbers; it is also about:
 - Widening the opportunity of housing choice
 - Improving the liveability and quality of life for local people
 - Developing 'greener' housing provision in accordance with the Housing Green Paper
 - Improving the quality of the housing and the design of new development
- 2.40. The NGP proposal for the south east is based around six identified potential "growth areas": Future provision of playing pitches in the South East will need to reflect the planned population growth, which is likely to increase demand for provision.

Local Context

Northumberland Profile

- 2.41. Northumberland is England's most northerly county. A substantial part of the county's overall area is designated National Park and is managed by the Northumberland National Park under the remit of maintaining its cultural and physical heritage, with sustainable policies and creating a thriving community and economy. In broad terms:
 - The north of the county is open and sparse the principal towns of Alnwick, Berwick and Morpeth serve large catchments that are also partially influenced by both Edinburgh to the north and Tyneside to the south;
 - The west of the county is largely rural, but 'split' by major road and rail transport corridors running into Newcastle and Gateshead, with many of the communities characterised by an economic and cultural interdependence with the Tyneside conurbation; and
 - The south east corner of the county is a compact coastal lowland intersected by several river estuaries; which has been substantially changed by extensive mining activity. It is distinctly built up with the county's largest settlements of Ashington, Blyth and Cramlington sited in protected corridors on the northern fringe of Tyneside. Many of the communities living in this area are characterised by high levels of deprivation following the decline of coal mining industries.

Playing Pitch Strategy

- 2.42. Northumberland County Council is the new unitary authority for Northumberland which became effective from 1 April 2009. The new Northumberland County Council is made up of the six former District Councils Alnwick, Berwick-upon-Tweed, Blyth Valley, Tynedale, Castle Morpeth and Wansbeck.
- 2.43. South East Northumberland is a designated Growth Area with 6 distinct growth points identified around the main four towns and the former rural coalfields area where population is set to increase significantly. This is likely to increase local demand in these areas for playing pitch provision.

Population

2.44. A summary table of the population of the County, with estimates for future change is shown below in the table. Based on the projections used there is an estimated increase of around 1.8%. This level of increase has been used in the modelling for this strategy.

2.45. Further increases in population are projected beyond 2015 and these can be used to model the likely needs and levels of surplus and deficiency in pitch provision. However, as the audit compiled is based on a 'snapshot' in time, it is recommended that this is updated, and the playing pitch model re-run at least every five years.

Key Issues – Population

- 2.46. A number of key issues with regard to the population characteristics of Northumberland are shown below. Each has implications in terms of the current and future supply and demand for pitches and outdoor sports facilities.
- 2.47. **Ageing Population** In relation to population breakdown, Northumberland's population is weighted towards the older age groups as is the case nationwide. Northumberland's population is "greying" faster than that of England as a whole, and in some rural areas the balance has already shifted dramatically away from the pattern elsewhere for instance in the former Berwick district, it is estimated that over-50s will this year become the majority of the population. This may have implications for the type of sports played and subsequently the facilities demanded. By 2021, all (former) districts in the County will have a higher proportion of over-85s than the English average, including Wansbeck (3.1%) and Blyth Valley (3.0%), which is expected to have the lowest proportions within the County.
- 2.48. A large proportion of the population is approaching retirement and services/facilities will increasingly need to take account of these demographic changes when planning, delivering and financing future priorities. This trend will have implications in terms of the demand for specific types of outdoor sports facilities for example a decline in demand for pitch space for 'contact sports'.
- 2.49. **Falling numbers of Younger People** As is the case across many parts of the country, Northumberland has a falling proportion of younger people. However, this issue could be more significant because of the increasingly large older population. This has an impact on the type and level of need for future indoor and outdoor sport facilities, in addition to the levels of disposable income (retired people have greater disposable income than younger people) which can be spent within the local economy on services and use of facilities.

Playing Pitch Strategy

- 2.50. **Population Density and Distribution -** Northumberland has a very low population density, except in the urban areas. This population distribution together with a low population density makes delivering services effectively and efficiently more challenging in some cases.
- 2.51. It is therefore crucial that there is a good spread of pitch sites both in and around urban areas, in addition to the larger more rural areas throughout the county. Good quality, accessible provision covering a range of sports needs to be provided within rural areas, especially where poor transport services are available. It is also important to take into account the value of a pitch site over and above its use for formal sport; many playing pitches/sports clubs (private and community) are also used for informal recreation, because they are the only local accessible greenspace.
- 2.52. The impact of the Growth Point areas in the South East will need to be taken into account in planning for future playing pitch provision, as the demand around the identified 6 Growth Points will increase significantly more, and faster, than in other areas of the county, as a result of the planned population growth and residential developments.

Housing Need in Northumberland

- 2.53. It is understood that a Housing Strategy for 2011-2016 will be implemented. Before this is developed an Interim Housing Strategy for 2010 has been put forward. The guiding principles of this strategy (which are quite likely to be taken forward in the formal strategy from 2011) include the need to accommodate a changing market and the need for flexibility in terms of policies to best reflect the needs of the population.
- 2.54. While it can be anticipated that the housing needs will be consistent with the overall Core Strategy and Local Development Framework (which will identify major areas for development and growth) it will be necessary for pitch and sports facilities provision to take account of the nature of future proposed communities in terms of their likely demographic makeup.

Existing Strategic Planning for Sports Pitches: Key Review Findings

- 2.55. In the years leading up to the formation of the unitary authority, several of the constituent authorities developed relevant studies and strategies. We have reviewed these documents, with the key implications highlighted in the summary overleaf. A summary of the status of our review of key authorities' documents is shown in Table 2.4 below and overleaf.
- 2.56. Additional to existing Playing Pitch Strategies and Open Space Assessments, a number of County Wide Assessment and Strategy documents were reviewed.

Sports Participation in Northumberland

- 2.58. A study of data provided by the Active People surveys provides additional context and the County's current performance in terms of meeting Key Performance Indicators around participation and engagement.
- 2.59. The Active People survey conducted in 2005/6 by Ipsos MORI, on behalf of Sport England, is the largest ever survey of sport and active recreation to be undertaken in Europe. A telephone survey of 363,724 adults in England (aged 16 plus), it provides reliable statistics on participation in sport and active recreation for all 354 local authorities in England at a local level (a minimum of 1,000 interviews were completed in every local authority in England). The survey was updated in 2008/9 with a second set of interviews, to identify where any changes might be found, with a third survey (AP3) completed in 2009/10.
- 2.60. The data identifies how participation varies from place to place at a local authority level and between different groups in the population. The survey also measures the proportion of the adult population that volunteer in sport on a weekly basis, are club members, are involved in organised sport/competition and receive tuition or coaching, as well as overall satisfaction with levels of sporting provision in the local community.
- 2.61. The survey also allows the analysis of national data on a sport by sport basis. The results are shown below with the results from Northumberland (source AP3) shown for comparison:

- 2.62. The table shows that in terms of participation in the main pitch sports, participation rates are slightly lower in Northumberland for football and cricket than those recorded nationally. Around 6.84% of the adult population participate in football compared with 7.44% nationally. Cricket participation is around 0.3% less than national averages. In both cases, these results could suggest that there is 'latent' demand, or the potential to increase participation across these sports.
- 2.63. Conversely, participation rates recorded by AP3 suggest that there are higher levels of adult participation across Rugby Union and Hockey. However, as is highlighted later in the report, these statistics are not necessarily reflected in the Team Generation Rates for the area.

Playing Pitch Strategy

- 2.64. The Active People Survey also provides data on a range of other participation performance indicators. A brief review of these suggest that the culture of club sport in Northumberland is fairly strong, with 24.2% of adults being members of a club (compared with 22.8% across the region) and with 14.7% of the population having participated in competitive sport in the past 12 months (compared with 13.3% in the North East).
- 2.65. However, key local socio-economic factors such as unemployment, age, rate of home ownership, or ethnic minority population are known to be linked to rates of participation. Active People enables these factors to be taken into consideration with calculation of an expected participation rate for each local authority.
- 2.66. The Active People Diagnostic tool calculates expected participation rate (taken from the first Active People survey) for individual districts. A review of this data for the former districts which now constitute Northumberland has shown that in every authority area, the actual rate of participation was higher than would be anticipated. In the case of Alnwick, the rate of participation was 4% higher. This suggests that there is a generally good demand for sport and leisure activities, given the makeup of the area.

Market Segmentation

2.67. Market Segmentation data is available for the 6 former districts that now comprise Northumberland. This is summarised below:

Playing Pitch Strategy

2.69. The above data highlights that given the ageing population in Northumberland there is a need to ensure appropriate activities are provided for older people. The future provision of playing pitches will need to reflect the high levels of activity and demand for pitch sports, particularly at junior level, at least some of which will feed through into senior participation in the future.

Latent demand

2.70. Based on the analysis of supply and demand across the county there is some latent demand as a result of a lack of specific pitch types and/or pitch capacity (quality). This is reflected in teams having to play out of their local area/out of Northumberland. The impact of the Growth Point is likely to increase latent demand unless appropriate levels of playing pitch provision are included in new residential areas, or existing facilities which do not currently provide for community use, are opened up.

Section 3 - Methodology













Methodology

Introduction

- 3.1. The Sport England and CCPR methodology for assessing playing pitches does not provide specific standards for pitch provision that can be universally applied. Its focus is on providing the means for deriving local standards, using local information, and developing policy to respond to local circumstances.
- 3.2. The overall aim of the assessment methodology is to determine the number of pitches required for each specific sport. In the case of Northumberland the methodology has been used to assess the adequacy of provision for:
 - Football;
 - Cricket;
 - Rugby Union;
 - · Hockey; and
 - Rugby League.
- 3.3. The method has been applied to show the adequacy of facilities to meet existing demand for these sports. Additionally the model can be used to assess provision against a predicted set of circumstances, for example, future population projections. For this strategy we have used the model to assess future demand across the next five years. Ascertaining accurate supply and demand information is therefore critical in producing a robust, accurate strategy, which is 'owned' by all stakeholders.

The Eight Stage Playing Pitch Model

- 3.4. The methodology comprises an eight-stage approach, as summarised overleaf in Table 3.1. This involves a number of specific research tasks to build a comprehensive audit. A series of toolkits are used to analyse the data collected with the resulting assessment figures interpreted in consideration to the local context and results of stakeholder consultation.
- 3.5. We have also used a number of data analysis tools which are additional to the core components of the 'Playing Pitch Model'. These include a Future Demand Estimator spreadsheet which we have developed to make use of a number of sources of information and primary research results. All toolkits, data modelling and audit data is included within the appendices to this report.

Auditing techniques and data gathering

Assessment of Supply

- 3.6. The current supply of pitches was established through undertaking a series of data review, research and consultation exercises. These consisted of:
 - Review of information held by Northumberland County Council, including existing Playing Pitch Strategies for the former districts where they exist;
 - Review of information published on relevant websites specifically Active Places, Active People;
 - Site visits to pitches and the completion of quality audits using the Sport England Non-Technical Visual Assessment proforma (see 3.11);
 - Consultation with key stakeholders (Governing Bodies of Sport, Council Officers, County Sports Partnership, Town and Parish Councils);
 - A postal survey of all schools within the County Council boundary, followed up with telephone consultation to attempt to boost the response rate; and
 - A postal survey to all identified sports clubs as agreed with Northumberland County Council.

Assessment of Demand

- 3.7. In establishing the current demand for pitches we completed a series of research and consultation exercises, specifically:
 - An initial sports club questionnaire sent to identified clubs within the authority area;
 - Additional telephone consultation with key sports clubs (focusing on non-respondents);
 - A review of booking information from pitch sites within the County where applicable;
 - Analysis of local league data (where publicly available); and
 - Consultation with governing bodies of sport.

Data Collection Issues

- 3.8. Establishing precisely how many pitches and teams there are within the study area was difficult for a number of reasons including:
 - The number of pitches at a given site can fluctuate over short periods of time for reasons relating to management and husbandry - this means the findings of a count conducted in one season may differ from results of similar exercise conducted previously or in future seasons.
 - The time at which site surveys are conducted will greatly influence the number of pitches identified through site investigation. This factor was not a major issue in relation to football, given that the site visits were conducted during the football season.

Playing Pitch Strategy

- Although the inspection programme helps to provide a consistent comparison across the County, it may be difficult to compare quality against other authorities if inspections have been undertaken at different times.
- Mini soccer matches often make use of portable goals. This can make pitches difficult to identify through a site visit. On some sites dedicated mini soccer facilities were not apparent and an assumption has been made that matches are played on part of Senior pitches.
- 3.9. For the reasons stated previously the assessment of playing pitch supply and demand within the study should be considered a "snapshot" in time. There is a need to ensure that the data used within the assessment is updated at appropriate intervals to ensure the ongoing validity of the recommendations made.

Data Analysis and Sub Analysis Structure

Defining community use

- 3.10. The key component of the analysis was an examination of the extent to which pitches identified were in "secured public use". This was undertaken in the context of the Sport England definition of community use, and broadly embraces:
 - All local authority pitches (Northumberland County, Town and Parish Councils)
 - Educational facilities where they are subject to formal dual use, community use agreements
 or similar formal hire arrangements with local teams (this was assessed through a specific
 question on the Schools Questionnaire);
 - Any other institutional facilities which are available to the public as a result of formal dual / community use agreements;
 - Any facilities owned, used or maintained by clubs/private individuals, which as a matter of
 policy or practice are available by large sections of the public through membership of a
 club or admission fees; and
 - Formal playing pitches that are marked out and in use for the relevant pitch sports have been included in the modelling and analysis.

Quality Audit and Assessment


- 3.11. We assessed the quality of pitches using a non-technical visual assessment proforma. This is included as part of the Toward a Level Playing Field toolkit and is included within the report appendices. The quality proforma collects a range of information about pitches based on a visual inspection. Specific criteria rated include:
 - Grass cover;
 - Length of grass;
 - Size of pitch (and suitability);
 - Slope;
 - Evenness:
 - Presence of common pitch problems; and
 - Availability of changing rooms.
- 3.12. Each pitch is scored out of a possible 100% and graded on a quality scale from 'Poor' through to 'Excellent'. A proforma is also used to provide a quality rating for the ancillary facilities serving the site and rates the quality of the changing accommodation, parking facilities and general site access. For Synthetic Pitches we designed our own proforma working on the same principles, rating different elements of the facility to arrive at an overall quality score.
- 3.13. In making recommendations and interpreting assessment results we have considered the pitch quality scores alongside sports club ratings of the facilities they use. A summary of the average scores for all pitch sites identified is included in the report appendices.

Assessing the impact of quality on pitch capacity

3.14. We have used our quality audits to demonstrate how quality might affect the capacity of current pitch provision. Put simply, we have used the assumptions below to measure the impact of quality on capacity. Higher quality pitches are assumed capable of accommodating three matches per week, and those pitches below average one match per week or less.



3.15. We used the above model to arrive at a number of conclusions about the adequacy of pitch provision. For example, if all pitches are rated as below average then the overall supply will be equivalent to roughly half the actual number of pitches. Findings are reported in the following section of the report in relation to each sport assessed.

Team Generation Rates


- 3.16. Team Generation Rates (TGR's) have also been considered in the assessment of future needs for playing pitch provision. A TGR is the ratio of the number of teams within a given area to the total population within a given age group from that same area. The groupings which have been used reflect age groups participating in the different sub-groups of each of the assessed sports (e.g. 6-9 year olds for Mini Soccer).
- 3.17. Identifying TGR's provides the means to:



- Compare participation in the assessed sports between the study area and other parts of the country where TGR's have formed part of Playing Pitch Strategy developments.
- Assist in modelling future demand for pitches.
- 3.18. The use of TGR's should to be treated with caution. It is important to make use of them as a guide only and not at the expense of using qualitative evidence gathered as part of the study. Essentially, TGR's reflect the current situation and are based on current demand information. They may not include potential / latent demand where teams may not be able to develop due to lack of a suitable facility.

Estimating future demand

3.19. Projecting changes to demand is not an exact science. It involves consideration to changes to population and the likely impact of any local plans or initiatives to increase participation and club membership. At the same time, arriving at a realistic estimate of future demand is critical in assessing the adequacy of current and planned provision to meet any growth or other changes to sports participation.




Playing Pitch Strategy

- 3.20. We have developed a Future Demand Estimator to assist in projecting changes to demand. This uses the findings of our consultation with clubs relating to future membership growth coupled with the use of Team Generation Rates and population projections to provide an estimated growth rate for the sports assessed.
- 3.21. We have used the Office of National Statistics (ONS) mid term estimates published in 2006 for current population figures to calculate Team Generation Rates. Some assumptions have been made for the population for some age sub-groups.
- 3.22. For population growth figures we have used the latest estimates available from the ONS which shows an overall projected increase in population of around 1.8% over the next five years. Some assumptions have been made regarding growth within individual age groups.

Quality Value matrix – establishing a hierarchy of provision

- 3.23. To provide a basis for general recommendations for the playing pitch sites assessed we use a Quality Value matrix. This uses the results of the quality audits undertaken and the assessment results in relation to the relative strategic importance of sites.
- 3.24. The matrix also considers the value of each site assessed in relation to the number of pitches available. It works on the assumption that multi-pitch sites are of greater value to local sport. The number of different sports that can be accommodated on each site (i.e. winter and summer sports) is also factored in.
- 3.25. Responses to a number of key questions about each site form part of the site score and its subsequent classification.



Inclusions, Exclusions and Exceptions - Sport on a Local Level

- 3.26. The **facilities not** covered by the assessment calculations can be identified as follows:
 - Educational establishment facilities, which have no formal community use agreement and are not available for hire by the public; these sites are identified in the supply table, Appendix 4
 - Professional or semi-professional stadia/pitches, which are reserved by a specific team for elite use only; and
 - · All other sports pitches which are not available for public use.
- 3.27. Pitches within these categories are in essence considered within the assessment as part of the overall audit of supply. They are included within the overall supply for the area, but not in the assessment of community accessible supply.

Sub Analysis Structure

- 3.28. To build a more accurate picture of issues relating to surplus and deficiencies across the sports assessed, we have used the data collected to carry out a number of 'sub-analysis area assessments'. Put simply this means focusing on a number of smaller defined geographic areas within the County to highlight particular hotspots of under or over supply of provision. These match those being used within the overarching PPG17 assessment to inform planning strategy and policy on a local service area basis.
- 3.29. We have used the consultation feedback from sports clubs (via a questionnaire/telephone discussion) to help inform analysis of identified sub-analysis areas. Sub analysis areas are based on an amalgamation of the former districts to form 3 sub-areas. We have not completed area assessments below this level, i.e. ward level. The three sub-analysis areas are summarised overleaf.
- 3.30. The **North Area** is the second largest of the three areas covering 240,685 hectares. It has a population of around 89,000. Compared with the county as a whole, the North Area has a lower proportion of children, a lower proportion of people of working age, and a higher proportion of people of retirement age and over. The main towns in the area are Amble, Berwick, Alnwick and Morpeth. Other key settlements are:
 - Belford
 - Hadston
 - Pegswood
 - Rothbury;
 - Wooler;
 - Widdrington Station;
 - Seahouses
- 3.31. The **South East Area** is the smallest of the three areas, covering 15,084 hectares. It has a population in the region of 147,500. Compared with the county as a whole, the South East Area has a higher proportion of children, a higher proportion of working age, and a lower proportion of retired people.
- 3.32. The main towns in the area are Ashington, Bedlington/Bedlington Station, Blyth and Cramlington. Other key settlements are:
 - Ellington
 - Lynemouth
 - Newbiggin-by-the-Sea
 - Seaton Delaval
- 3.33. The **West Area** is the largest of the three Areas geographically, covering an area of 246,757 hectares. It has a population of around 75,000. Compared with the county as a whole, the West Area has a lower proportion of people aged 16 to 29, a lower proportion of people of working age, and an equal proportion of children.

Playing Pitch Strategy

- 3.34. The main towns in the area are Hexham, Prudhoe, Ponteland and Haltwhistle. Other key settlements are:
 - Bellingham
 - Corbridge
 - Haydon Bridge
 - Allendale

Section 4 - Audit, Assessment and Analysis













4. Audit, Assessment and Analysis

Introduction

4.1 In this section of the report we provide the headline audit findings relating to the supply of, and demand for sports pitches. We also report our analysis results for individual sports and use consultation findings to interpret this. Drawing on this data we provide some conclusions for each sport which form the basis of the recommended local provision standards and our recommendations in the next section of the report.

County Overview

Demand for sports pitches

- 4.2 Drawing on our research we estimate (based on the number of teams identified) there are currently around 11,000 residents (around 3-4% of the County population) participating regularly in formal league competitions as members of **279** local football, cricket, rugby and hockey clubs. Collectively these clubs generate **1,024 teams**.
- 4.3 Team Generation Rates (TGRs) indicate how many people in a specified age group are required to generate one team. For example, '1:98' means one team is generated for every 98 residents (of that sport playing age group).
- The following figures are based on regular 'on season' teams only. Additional comment is made later in the report about the variances across the County in levels of demand shown by a comparison of TGRs. Highest levels of team generation are shaded in green.



- 4.5 TGRs for the County are shown in Table 4.1 above and provide a headline comparison of demand levels across different sports. The TGRs above show that 1 sports team is generated for every 225 residents of sport playing age (active age group).
- 4.6 An analysis of demand across the county shows:
 - Higher levels of demand for football in the West area in comparison to TGRs County wide and across the North and South East Areas
 - Higher levels of demand for cricket and rugby union in the West area also, in comparison to County wide and across the other analysis areas
 - Higher concentrations of demand for hockey in the North than the other areas
- 4.7 It is important to highlight that overall TGRs in the South East sub area are generally lower than in the West and higher than the North sub areas; this could change in the next few years given that this is a designated Growth Point and the population is set to increase significantly. A higher population will mean an increase in teams in line with current TGRs. Further growth could be realised if TGRs are increased so they are in line with the county average. As such there is potential latent demand in this area and it is therefore important to plan for this in this area.
- 4.8 Compared to nationally published TGRs (focussing on Football and Cricket as the largest participatory sports), demand in Northumberland appears to be particularly high. This may be a reflection of the tradition of community and village sports teams with both adult and junior sections, based from playing pitches serving relatively small populations.
- 4.9 However, it must be noted that nationally published TGRs (Sport England Website) are relatively old with most taken from studies completed in 2003-2004. It is expected, given the cycle of local playing pitch strategy development and high profile NGB led initiatives that the overall national 'average' TGRs may have increased significantly since this time.

Figure 4.1: Comparison of TGRs - Northumberland v National Averages



- 4.10 The graph above suggests double the amount of teams generated per 1,000 population in Mini Soccer and Junior Boys football, and significantly higher rates of team generation in Adult football, Junior Boys, and Adult cricket.
- 4.11 Comparison of Northumberland TGRs with a similar large rural area, with small market towns is also useful to illustrate patterns of participation.
- 4.12 Shropshire is compared to Northumberland below; the study in Shropshire was undertaken 2009 2010.

- 4.13 The comparator figures demonstrate close similarities across age groups for various sports; both Shropshire and Northumberland have high TGRs (i.e. where a smaller population is required to generate 1 team in that age group for that sport) in mini soccer, junior boys' and girls' football, junior boys' cricket and rugby. Both counties have lower TGRs generally for women's teams, and for senior men, except football where it is higher than the national average.
- 4.14 Specific differences in levels of TGRs reflect the variance in development work undertaken at a local level, specific sport initiatives and to some extent accessibility to facilities. Hockey and football exemplify this; Shropshire clearly has higher TGRs across hockey except in relation to junior girls, whereas Northumberland has very high TGRs for mini soccer, junior boys' and senior men's football.
- 4.15 Despite these high rates, overall participation across football and cricket as measured by the Active People survey were lower than national average figures for adult participation; this may possible reflect low levels of informal activity and the absence of commercial provision such as small sided soccer venues.

- 4.16 Our demand audit also shows:
 - The majority of current participants are male only around 5-6% of all identified teams are female (43 teams);
 - Football and cricket are by far the most popular pitch sports together they account for nearly 90% of all the teams identified; and
 - Demand for pitches is spread across the whole week overall this includes around 50 cricket games during midweek, and around 161 football matches every Sunday morning.
- 4.17 Key findings for the individual sports are reported throughout the remainder of this section.

Supply of sports pitches

4.18 Playing pitch supply in the County is via a number of providers as summarised in Table 4.3 below. This table includes all pitches identified. Overall we identified 319 pitches available for use across 173 sites. There are more sites in total (197) and up to 367 formally marked pitches at the time the audit was completed.

- 4.19 **Local Authority** sites include those that Northumberland County Council directly lets to local clubs. It is likely that some of the sites are also used as informal recreational space, and are available for use by any member of the public, including informal sports use and dog walking. This is an important context, as in some cases this will prevent improvements or development on the site. Local authority sites also include those owned/managed by Town/Parish Councils.
- 4.20 We have categorised a number of sites as **private sports club** facilities. These sites include those managed by local clubs that have a long term lease of Council facilities for their own exclusive use.
- 4.21 In many areas individual **schools** provide pitches for School Sport and PE and also make their facilities available for the local community. The local management of schools has meant that some schools make their facilities available to the local community and others do not. The figures included are those with secured community use, and also include a number of independent school facilities.
- 4.22 From the figures highlighted above it is clear that the provision of sports pitches is via a number of different providers. Local authority provision make up less than half of the overall stock currently in use.

Neighbouring Local Authority Provision

- 4.23 Given the geography of Northumberland, and the fact that the majority of the population live in and around the main market towns, the impact of playing pitch and AGP provision in neighbouring authorities is less than it would be in a more urban area. In other words, the population of Northumberland tend to make use of the pitches in their areas, as opposed to for example travelling into Scotland from Berwick, or over to Carlisle to the west of the county.
- 4.24 The one area where neighbouring provision does impact is in the South East, which is a more urban, close-knit area than the rest of the county. Here it is provision in North Tyneside that has most impact. The PPS for North Tyneside was updated in 2007 (by KKP); none of the other local authorities to the south of Northumberland have up to date PPSs.
- 4.25 The North Tyneside PPS (which only covers football) states the following as its key issues
 - There is a total provision of 79 senior pitches, 24 junior pitches and 28 mini-soccer pitches in the Borough.
 - Overplay currently stands at 64 matches. An improvement in pitch quality at the majority of the sites would reduce this overplay by 24 matches.
 - Pitch maintenance is restricted to basic cutting and lining and there is no capacity to ensure the long-term playing quality of the pitches through specialist work, such as rolling and levelling and measures to counteract compaction.
 - No specialist maintenance of pitches already upgraded, such as Lockey Park and Rising Sun.
 - All local leagues require teams to have access to changing provision for competitive matches. Many ancillary facilities at sites have been identified as poor quality.
 - The County FA supports the development of more third generation ATPs in the Borough.
 - There is a significant community use of school facilities and they are important to the overall pitch stock in the Borough.
- 4.26 Since the PPS was updated in 2007, a new full size AGP has been developed at Burnside College, Wallsend.
- 4.27 Based on the above key issues North Tyneside has very similar issues for football pitches as does Northumberland i.e. too few pitches for junior and mini play and poor quality pitches and changing rooms in some areas. It is this latter point that really impacts across the local authority boundaries given the geography of the SE area, as teams could travel to access better quality pitches, particularly for league games where specific criteria over pitch and changing room quality have to be met.
- 4.28 The lack of synthetic training facilities in the SE of Northumberland means that teams may try to access AGP facilities in North Tyneside for training.
- 4.29 Based on the consultation and research undertaken, no major facilities for cricket, rugby and hockey immediately adjacent to Northumberland's borders, which provide facilities which are regularly used by the local community. Any facilities which do impact have been identified and reflected in the sport by sport analysis that follows.

Playing Pitch Strategy

- 4.30 A suite of maps accompanies this report and are referred to throughout this section. These help illustrate the assessment findings more clearly. Map 1 shows the boundaries of the three sub-analysis areas used. Maps 2a, 2b and 2c provide an overview of the distribution of pitch sites across the County.
- 4.31 Maps 3a, 3b and 3c show the average pitch quality of sites as determined by the non-technical visual assessments of sites completed. Maps 4a, 4b and 4c show the quality ratings for ancillary facilities across sites by area.
- 4.32 The remainder of the suite of maps illustrate the findings of the audit, assessment and analysis of the individual sports included. They show the location of facilities, quality and findings relating to access for football, cricket, rugby union, hockey and Synthetic Turf Pitches (AGPs).
- 4.33 The remainder of this section of the report provides detail on our findings relating to each of the sports assessed.

Sport by Sport Assessment – Key Findings

4.34 Assessment using the Playing Pitch Model has been completed to provide an indication of the adequacy of provision for football, cricket, rugby union and hockey. These sports are reviewed in turn throughout the remainder of this section of the report. Modelling results have been interpreted using findings from consultation with sports clubs and other stakeholders.

Football Assessment

Demand

4.35 Our audit identified **212** football clubs generating **673** teams in total. The main leagues in which the identified teams play are:

4.36 Team numbers generated by each club vary significantly, from single team clubs to those with in excess of 10 teams. Consultation with football clubs (62% response rate) suggests that on average clubs have 60+ members.

Playing Pitch Strategy

4.37 The teams identified, and included within our assessment, are detailed by the number within each identified "type" of team in Table 4.5 below.

Supply

4.38 Our audit identified **215** football pitches which currently have secured public use and are included in the assessment calculation. A further 39 pitches have been identified which are marked and in use at the current time, but do not accommodate community sport. Additionally a significant number of unmarked and potential playing field sites were identified.

Assessment results - current year

Pitch Quantity

4.39 The supply and demand data collated was analysed to provide a quantitative assessment. Put simply the assessment provides an initial indication of the adequacy of provision to cater for estimated demand. A summary of the application of the eight stage model assessment for football is provided in the table below. Further details of how the following figures have been calculated are included within the appendices to this report.

4.40 The results show:

- A theoretical deficiency of dedicated mini soccer pitches our audit found relatively few
 dedicated facilities, with mini football being accommodated on senior pitches in some cases.
 Additionally, there is a deficiency in provision at other times during the week (Sunday
 morning) in addition to peak;
- A theoretical deficiency of youth football pitches;
- A theoretical surplus of senior soccer pitches to meet peak demand, but pitch rotation, maintenance, quality etc also needs to be factored in.
- 4.41 Given the above findings, we assessed whether the senior pitches available are sufficient to cater for mini and youth soccer. We found that due to the variance in peak demand times the senior soccer pitch stock **is sufficient** currently to cater for the demand generated, but only because of fixtures overall, and the peak time across mini, junior and senior football being spread across the week.

Playing Pitch Strategy

4.42 Quantity is also only sufficient if pitches are of sufficient quality, particularly where some senior pitches are used to accommodate mini and junior matches in addition to senior fixtures. Some pitches currently need to accommodate Mini Soccer games on a Saturday morning, Adult football on a Sunday morning and Youth Football on Sunday afternoons. This is potentially leading to overplaying on some facilities and could be causing deterioration in quality.

Pitch Quality

- 4.43 The results of the quantitative assessment need to be considered alongside quality issues, as quality will affect the capacity of pitches to accommodate games. Given the findings of the quantitative assessment it is important pitches are of sufficient quality to accommodate at least two matches per week throughout the season.
- 4.44 We assessed the quality of more than 145 community accessible pitch sites across the County. These are shown on Map 5b, and are listed by area in Appendix 4. Appendix 4 can also be filtered to highlight specific site details e.g. address, quality, provision on site etc. A guide to using Appendix 4 is included at Appendix 10.
- 4.45 We also identified a number of grass playing fields at numerous schools in addition to these. No quality audits have been completed at these sites, as playing fields are generally unmarked.
- 4.46 A summary of the pitch scores is provided in the Table below. Details of the scores for each pitch, and the rating for each quality criteria is included in the appendices.

- 4.47 Almost half of the pitch sites are rated as 'Good' using the Non-Technical Visual Inspection proforma. However, nearly one in three sites are rated as average or below average. The figures suggest there is a variance in quality generally across the county, although a high proportion of the average sites were located in the North of the County. There is no clear quality 'divide', or notable difference between those managed by the Council and other providers. .
- Integral to the quality of facilities, and the access and suitability for a range of users is the existence of changing rooms. Almost half of the 171 sites identified are not served by changing room facilities. As highlighted later in the report in our commentary on access, there are particular shortfalls in relation to changing provision in the North sub area. Specific sites where quality is poor/there is potential to improve changing include Berwick Community High School, Alnwick West Recreation Ground Flagstaff Park, Morpeth Common and Longhoughton (if developed as a centre for mini soccer).

4.49 Local clubs were also asked to rate the quality of the pitches they use. A summary of the ratings is provided below and provide additional information on which to draw conclusions about quality.

- 4.50 It is important to assess the potential impact of quality of pitches on capacity. If pitches are particularly poor then they may not be able to accommodate the number of games required to meet demand and this could increase any deficiency recorded or reduce surpluses. We have used the results of the quality inspections to show how quality might affect capacity. The Table below identifies assumptions that we have made regarding capacity.
- 4.51 We used the model outlined (taken from Toward a Level Playing Field) in the Table below and detailed in the Methodology appendix. This provides an indicative guide only of how quality could affect quantity.

4.52 The analysis above suggests that the 186 pitches currently available and rated for quality could, given the high quality of some of them, be equivalent to more pitches in terms of the number of fixtures they can accommodate. Over half of the pitches can in theory accommodate 3 games per week. However, a number are also unlikely to meet the demands placed on them.

Playing Pitch Strategy

4.53 Ancillary facilities (specifically changing rooms) greatly affect the quality (and access) of facilities. In terms of our assessment, the lack of changing facilities reduces a potential pitch quality score by 15%. We found that half of all football pitch sites are served by no or below average provision. This is a much higher proportion of facilities than other sports and clearly a high priority for addressing.

Pitch Access

- 4.54 For the purposes of the assessment we have looked at access from two perspectives. Specifically, access to affordable facilities (i.e. cost of hire) and geographical access (i.e. proximity to quality facilities and average travel distances). We also considered access from a demand perspective, taking account of the capacity for new members at the clubs identified.
- 4.55 We found:
 - More than 1 in 3 clubs (38%) report a 'lack of appropriate facilities' as a key issue; and
 - 81% of clubs consulted have capacity for new members additionally more than a third of these clubs are projecting an increase in their membership over the next 5 years.
- 4.56 In terms of geographical access to facilities, we used the findings of the club consultation to determine appropriate catchment areas for football facilities. We asked clubs about their membership, in terms of where they 'draw' members from and what distance represents an acceptable distance to travel to access local facilities.
- 4.57 The clubs consulted did not present an overall consensus on acceptable travel distances, or whether close proximity of facilities to local catchments was more important than high quality facilities.

 Acceptable distances for the majority of club members to travel to local facilities ranged from 0.5 miles through to 30 miles.
- 4.58 This is clearly affected by the level of league play teams are engaged in, and the overarching vision for the club (i.e. playing at a high level, providing participatory opportunities for the local community, or both).
- 4.59 The average acceptable distance for participants to travel to access facilities reported by clubs is around 6.6 miles. We used this as an indicative catchment for existing provision where it has been rated as high quality (Excellent or Good via the non-technical visual assessment and club rating), and this forms the basis of the Access element of the recommended standards of provision outlined in Section 5. The catchment area drawn is a rough buffer only and does not necessarily take account of variable travel times. It is intended as an indication of any significant access issues that need to be explored in more detail.
- 4.60 Maps 5a, 5b and 5c show the location of current football facilities and Map 10 shows the theoretical catchment of this provision where it is of a good quality (as rated by the non-technical visual assessment). It highlights potential deficiencies in terms of access for the local population to quality facilities, although these are minimal in relation to the key settlement areas and where population density is greatest. Map 10 excludes a number of sites where quality was below average.
- 4.61 The results of the mapping show few access deficiencies to football facilities currently viewed as high quality. As mentioned previously, there are some potential deficiencies in parts of the North analysis area. But based on the average of the acceptable travel distances reported by clubs, it appears that most areas are within this. It must be noted that this overall average acceptable travel distance may mask area differences particularly differences across urban and rural areas. Any significant differences are highlighted below in the sub area analysis.
- 4.62 However, when access to sites with good quality pitches **and** ancillary provision is factored in, deficiencies are potentially more pronounced. Map 11 shows the impact of this. Significant areas of the North (including the key towns and settlements of Berwick and Wooler) are theoretically deficient i.e. no access to sites with good quality facilities within the catchment area mapped.

Playing Pitch Strategy

4.63 There are also deficiencies in some parts of the West analysis area, including Ponteland, Haydon Bridge, Haltwhistle and Bellingham.

Sub Area analysis

- We completed area based assessments for football based on the sub-area analysis areas described in Section 3. Overall we found most football demand, in terms of numbers of teams is generated in the South East area of the County. Nearly half (46%) of the total area demand is this area. This area also has the highest proportion of playing field stock in community use, 41% of all the football pitches identified. However, in terms of team generation, these are highest (in terms of the greater number of teams per 1,000 population) in the West area.
- 4.65 In undertaking the sub-area analysis we have looked more closely at the specific demand and supply factors and specific issues raised by local clubs. We used the temporal demand patterns for the local area, rather than applying the county wide profile. This is important in reflecting area differences across the county and ensuring sub-area analyses are relevant.
- This is particularly important in Northumberland as the peak demand for certain age groups varies significantly across the three sub-analysis areas. For example, 79% of Mini Soccer in the West area takes place on a Saturday morning. In contrast, 70% of Mini Soccer games in the South East are played on a Sunday morning. The sub-area modelling also used local area Team Generation Rates rather than those calculated on a county wide basis. These also differ significantly across the three areas, reflecting specific demand 'hot spots'. For example, 1 Junior Boys team is generated per 51 boys (10-15 year olds) in the South East. This compares to 1 team for every 31 boys in the West area. As a result, the deficiency/surplus figures recorded may not reflect the patterns of temporal / peak demand recorded for the county as a whole.
- 4.67 There are some specific characteristics in Northumberland that need to be factored into the consideration of the results summarised below. These include modelling results for Mini Soccer which show a deficiency county wide, and within each individual area. There are some central venue leagues in place for Under 8's, 9's and 10's. This helps in planning pitch use, and it is largely recognised that good quality mini soccer pitches can accommodate back to back fixtures.

4.68 The table above provides a summary of the position for football; more detailed recommendations on the need for additional pitches and the locations for these are in Section 6. It is important to stress that the identified need for additional pitches does not necessarily mean that new pitches have to be developed; opening up access for the community to existing pitches would also address this need. The identified need for additional pitches relates to the situation in 2010 in terms of demand v supply. Table 4.12 sets out the identified additional level of playing pitch provision needed in the county in the next 5 years.

Playing Pitch Strategy

North Area

- 4.69 There are some supply and demand issues in the North area, broadly reflecting those identified county wide. There is a theoretically sufficient senior pitch provision to meet demand, with a significant surplus at peak time. However, this is off-set against deficiencies in mini and junior facilities. In the case of mini soccer, peak demand is split evenly across the weekend, and there is a shortage of dedicated facilities on both Saturday and Sunday mornings.
- 4.70 Although the assessment has not 'drilled' down beneath the broad analysis areas, there are some factors that need to be considered. Often there is a likely surplus in pitches across many rural areas. In many smaller settlements and villages there is often a playing field (not always exclusively used for sport), even if levels of demand are low. This in some respects exaggerates the overall supply in relation to demand. It is however important to highlight the fact that a single pitch in a village will be used for far more than football, cricket or rugby; it is likely to be the only locally accessible greenspace and therefore has visual amenity and also recreational value. This type of pitch is part of the community fabric and should not be considered as surplus simply because it is only played on once a fortnight.
- 4.71 Although it is not conclusive from the analysis completed, it is likely that the overall results for the area masks the potentially greater deficiencies in some cases within the urban areas i.e. the North and West of the North area.
- 4.72 As an example, around half of all the Youth football teams identified are from the 3 key towns (Alnwick, Berwick and Morpeth). The remainder is generated predominantly from the other key settlements, although within a number of these there are no, or very few teams (e.g. Rothbury and Widdrington).
- 4.73 Quality, as measured by the non-technical visual proforma is of a Good standard across half the sites, although access to quality changing provision and ancillary facilities is an issue. Although the pitch facilities, on average are of a good standard on just over half the sites rated, ancillary facilities are lacking on around two thirds. Although the issues with quality broadly mirror those across the County, generally ratings were lower on average in the North than for other areas.
- 4.74 The results of consultation with local clubs suggest that most have capacity for new members, suggesting there are few issues with latent demand and opportunities for new participants to play football. The acceptable travel distance reported by clubs in the North is more than the average for the county. This is expected given the rural nature (and size) of the analysis area. There is mixed opinion on future priorities between access to better quality facilities (even if it means travelling further) and facilities close to where most members live. This potentially reflects significant travel distances for some players already to access quality facilities.

West Area

- 4.75 The assessment highlights significant deficiencies in pitch provision across the West area. There are significant shortages of dedicated mini and youth football pitches. Compounding this is a relatively modest surplus in senior pitches. Even if re-designated, this surplus of senior pitches is insufficient to meet the shortfalls in mini and junior provision. The audit has identified some supply not currently in community use, and this amounts to around 15 pitches in total (of those marked). However, the PPG17 audit has identified significant recreational land which has the potential to be used for pitch provision in the future. As in the North area it is likely that some of the deficiencies recorded may be even greater among the key urban settlements. In the West the bulk of demand is generated from the key settlements along the A69.
- 4.76 Quality overall across the West analysis area appears to be better on average than the other analysis areas. This is on the basis of two thirds of sites rated being classified as 'good' or 'excellent'. This is important given the high levels of demand placed on pitches. However, issues in other areas relating to access to appropriate ancillary facilities are evident in the West of the County also. Nearly two thirds of sites are not served by quality facilities. There are either no facilities or they are of a poor quality.

Playing Pitch Strategy

- 4.77 In relation to access, less than half of clubs consulted report capacity for new members. This suggests that there are potentially some issues relating to latent demand. Although the consultation has not identified any widespread issues with waiting lists or stifled demand, the inability of clubs to take on new members does reflect the quantitative assessment findings and a general perception that there are insufficient facilities. The role of artificial grass pitches to accommodate both training and mini and junior matches does need to be considered e.g. the 3G AGP at Prudhoe is nearly empty at the weekend but cannot meet demand the rest of the week.
- 4.78 Of the three analysis areas, clubs on the whole in the West appear more willing to travel. This probably reflects both the geographic nature of the area and the fact that some clubs may already be travelling significant distances to access facilities. As with results in other areas, clubs were divided over future priorities in terms of quality over proximity of facilities.

South East Area

- 4.79 There are deficiencies in football pitch quantity in the South East area, specifically in the supply of mini and junior facilities. Although there is a modest surplus in Senior football provision, this is off set against deficiencies. The surplus in senior pitches is not sufficient, if re-designated, to accommodate deficiencies in junior facilities. There is also little formal provision not currently in community use that could be considered for future access. The audit identified only 5 additional pitches which do not currently have community use.
- 4.80 However, as commented earlier, this is in relation to currently marked and usable facilities. The wider PPG17 audit of recreational land has identified lots of potential sites which could be developed into pitch provision.
- 4.81 The quality of facilities is broadly in line with the non-technical visual assessment results in the other two areas assessed. Around half of sites rated were on average of a sufficient quality (rated as 'good' or above). However, ancillary facility quality generally is lower in the South East. Over 70% of sites rated were not served by good quality facilities.
- 4.82 Nearly three out of four clubs consulted report capacity for new members suggesting good levels of access for new participants. However, 1 in 3 also report issues with access to appropriate facilities. It is suggested that capacity of clubs will reduce if the quantitative assessment results and findings relating to quality are not addressed.
- 4.83 Of the three areas assessed, the average acceptable travel distance reported by clubs is less in this area. This reflects the geographic nature of the South East area which is more urban than the other analysis areas. As in the North and West areas, there does not appear to be a clear consensus from clubs on broad priorities for the future. Views were evenly split between access to higher qualities (which might be located further a field) and those close (but of a lower quality) to where the playing membership is drawn from.

Assessment results - future

- 4.84 We assessed the adequacy of football provision in the future through estimating levels of future demand based on population growth and the development plans and aspirations of clubs. Our own Future Team Estimator (Appendix 6) has been used to do this. The outputs of this have been used to inform the supply and demand modelling to identify changes to surplus and deficiencies in provision over the next five years.
- The team generation rates (reported at the start of this Section) show significant levels of demand for male football, particularly at the Youth and Mini Soccer age groups. Although there is no up to date national database available, comparison with other studies completed shows relatively high levels of demand. This could suggest that levels of demand are at a 'peak' or that there is little growth potential. However, a number of clubs, particularly the larger Charter Clubs are planning for more growth.

- 4.86 Additional to this, a review of results from the Active People survey suggests that the percentage of adults participating regularly in football is below the national average.
- 4.87 This coupled with future adult team generating resulting from the progression of youth players suggests that there is still potential for increased demand. It is also worth noting that in many other areas of the country demand for football is being increasingly met by 5-a-side developments and the use of commercial pitch developments (such as Goals Soccer etc). This is less likely in many parts of Northumberland given the geography of the area and the location of such developments (which tend to be located in areas of high population density).
- 4.88 Planned changes to the structure of age group football by the Football Association, the potential to utilise 3rd Generation pitches and recent trends across local leagues all need to be factored in to findings relating to future need also. Despite some decline in adult football recently, and the membership of local junior leagues remaining relatively static in recent years, local clubs project sizeable growth in their membership.
- 4.89 One third of clubs locally project an increase in their membership, including some significant growth across clubs with junior sections of 5 teams or more in some cases. The use of the Future Team Estimator which factors this estimated growth alongside natural growth likely to occur as a result of population increases (even if TGRs remain static) suggests growth could be as high as 20%. This figure has been used in the future PPM.
- 4.90 We are not aware of any significant changes to supply pending, other than a Football Foundation funded project (Dukeshouse Wood project) in the West area and the potential for additional pitch developments at the Westfield Park site in the North area. The Dukeshouse project will see the development of 1 senior and 1 junior pitch; however these facilities are unlikely to totally meet the demand for pitches in Hexham, due to the growth of Hexham FC. It is likely that additional school facilities will be accessible to the community. Quality will also increase as new facilities come on stream. However, at the time of writing the exact facility mix and what will potentially be available to local clubs is not known. It is therefore important that the results of this assessment are used to inform this facility planning where there is still potential to do so. This is highlighted further in the recommendations at the end of this report.
- 4.91 The results of our future supply and demand modelling are summarised in Table 4.12 below. Current temporal demand patterns have been used for this i.e. it has assumed that current peak demand periods across the three areas will remain the same. This could of course change according to developments in local league and competitions. As a result the sub-area analysis figures will not total that for a County Wide assessment. The County wide senior pitch equivalent is provided as a total of the individual area deficiencies, rather than the outcome of applying the model for the whole county.

4.92 The results show there is likely to be a significant deficiency in provision in all areas across the county (except senior pitches) if estimated growth is realised and there are no significant changes to supply. Significant changes to supply refer to additional pitches being accessible. This does not necessarily refer to new pitches, but could be partly addressed through access to those pitches without community use currently.

Playing Pitch Strategy

- 4.93 The main issue is that apparent surpluses in the North and West are more to do with the fact that existing senior playing pitches are not in the appropriate location, to meet the identified demand for mini and youth football games, even if they were re-designated e.g. the pitch at Otterburn is not used to capacity at all; however this pitch is over an hour's drive from Tyne Valley where pitches are inadequate to meet demand.
- 4.94 Our audit also highlights little 'spare' supply in relation to pitches without secured community use where future community access could be explored e.g. Prudhoe Hospital site. Most of those identified are on education sites. However, the PPG17 audit results show some significant provision of other recreational land and playing field sites that are currently unmarked. Bringing these into play needs to be considered as part of the action to address deficiencies. This is highlighted in more detail within the recommendations made at the end of this report.

Summary of assessment findings: Football

The following headline findings are drawn from the assessment:

- TGRs The highest demand for pitches is in the South East sub area (46%), where there is also the highest level of pitches in the county (41%) of the overall pitch stock. The highest number of teams is in the West sub area. However generally TGRs are lower in the South East, which reflects the significantly larger population e.g. 1 mini soccer team generated for every 94 children of the participation age for this form of football, compared to 1 team for 51 children in the West sub area.
- Quantity Assessed on a county wide basis, there is a significant deficiency in dedicated
 mini soccer and youth football facilities, off set against a significant surplus in senior
 provision, although not all in the locations needed. There is also significant variation in
 peak times of demand in each sub area e.g. times mini soccer is played
- Supply and Demand Analysis More detailed sub-area analysis highlights a significant variance in the current adequacy of facilities across the County. Based on an overall 20% growth in football participation, provision in the North is theoretically adequate subject to some re-designation of senior facilities (- 4 mini soccer pitches, 10 youth football pitches; surplus of +41 adult pitches). In the West (- 23 mini soccer pitches, 22 youth football pitches; surplus of +13 senior pitches) and South East (- 19 mini soccer pitches, 35 youth football pitches; +14 senior pitches) areas facilities overall are deficient. In the West this contributes to limited capacity across clubs to accommodate new members. There is also evidence of teams in the West travelling further to access adequate facilities. Deficiencies in provision are particularly acute in the North and West around the main urban centres e.g. Alnwick, Berwick, Morpeth, Hexham.
- Future supply and demand modelling illustrates a worsening of deficiencies across the County. Issues are particularly prominent in the West and South East. In particular Sunday is the peak demand period for all forms of football in the South East which puts additional pressure on the overall pitch stock in the area
- Quality Quality of pitches is generally reasonable across the County over half of sites
 rated were deemed to provide Good quality pitches and this potentially helps improve the
 capacity overall (assuming higher quality pitches can accommodate more games per
 week). This view is shared by Clubs where more than 1 in 3 report accessing high quality
 facilities and most of the remainder rating facilities used as 'average'.

- There are issues with the quality of ancillary facilities more than 40% of sites are not served by changing rooms and nearly half of those sites that are served by changing rooms, provision was rated as 'below average' or 'poor'. Access to quality changing provision is a particular issue in the North area around both Berwick and Morpeth e.g. Specific sites where quality is poor/there is potential to improve changing include Berwick Community High School, Alnwick West Recreation Ground Flagstaff Park, Morpeth Common and Longhoughton (if developed as a centre for mini soccer).
- Training and Coaching access to training facilities has not been identified as a major
 issue, although given the specific lack of pitches in the urban areas in the North and West
 sub areas, it is likely to be challenging for many teams. The need to retain volunteers in
 the game as coaches and officials is critical, given the continuing growth in participation.
- Priority Sites The highest priority sites for investment include (based on consultation, site assessment and consultation with the NGB):
 - North Alnwick West Recreation Ground, Amble Track, Flagstaff Park, Berwick Community High School, Rock AGS, Morpeth Common, Rock AGS, Dukes Middle School, Shilbottle Welfare, Bamburgh Sports Ground, Glendale Middle School, Longridge Towers School, Chantry Middle School
 - West- Corbridge Middle School, Kimberly Park Football Ground, Hexham Parks, Haydon Community High School, Haydon Bridge AFC, Prudhoe Community High, Riding Dene, Broomhaugh Sports Field, Bardon Mill Playing Fields, Wark Sports Ground, Close House Country, Stamfordham Playing Field, Coronation Playing Field, Haltwhistle Football Pitches, Prudhoe Hospital field
 - South East Broadway, New Hartley Recreation ground, Isabella Field, Alexandra Park, Cramlington High School AGP, Eastfield Lea Playing Field, Cowpen Recreation Ground, Lynemouth Recreation Ground, Bomarsund CC, Meadowdale Middle School, Hirst Park, Hirst Welfare Centre, South Beach, Eastfield Lea, Blyth Community College, Ann Welfare, Astley High School, Bates Welfare, Bede Academy, People's Park, Ashington Football Club, Northburn Sports and Community Centre, Newbiggin Middle School
- The audit reveals that the majority of existing formal pitch supply (pitches currently marked and in use) is in full community use. However, the PPG17 audit suggests a relatively plentiful supply of recreational land that could be brought into use as playing pitch provision. Equally there is potential to open up existing pitches currently without community use e.g. 15 pitches in the West sub area and 5 in the South East sub area.

Cricket Assessment

Demand

- 4.95 Cricket, like football is changing in format at national level. This strategy focuses on the current and traditional format of the game, but future planning for provision will need to take into account the possible changes resulting from e.g. 20/20 matches, if this format is introduced at local level as it grows in popularity nationally.
- 4.96 Our audit identified 50 cricket clubs generating 225 teams in total. Team numbers generated by each club vary significantly, from single team clubs to those with in excess of 10 teams. Consultation with cricket clubs (76% response rate) suggests that on average clubs have 60+ members. The teams identified, and included within our assessment, are detailed by the number within each identified "type" of team in Table 4.13 below.

Supply

4.97 Our audit identified **48** cricket pitches which currently have secured public use and are included in the assessment calculation. Only one further pitch has been identified which is marked and in use at the current time, but does not accommodate community sport.

Assessment results - current year

Pitch Quantity

4.98 The supply and demand data collated was analysed to provide a quantitative assessment. Put simply the assessment provides an initial indication of the adequacy of provision to cater for estimated demand. A summary of the application of the eight stage model assessment for cricket is provided in the table below. Further details of how the following figures have been calculated are included within the appendices to this report.

4.99 The results show:

- A theoretical deficiency of cricket pitches during Midweek this is based on the peak for all games (adult and junior demand added together) and an assumption that all Midweek games are played on the same day (i.e. worst case scenario). In reality deficiency is managed midweek by playing games across a range of days
- A theoretical deficiency of cricket pitches on a Saturday afternoon this is the peak time for adult cricket.
- 4.100 Quantity deficiencies could be further exaggerated if pitches are not of sufficient quality, particularly where some pitches are used to accommodate a number of matches during the week. Some pitches currently need to accommodate games at several times during the week.

Pitch Quality

- 4.101 The results of the quantitative assessment therefore need to be considered alongside quality issues, as quality will affect the capacity of pitches to accommodate games. Given the findings of the quantitative assessment it is important pitches are of sufficient quality to accommodate at least two or more matches per week throughout the season.
- 4.102 We assessed the quality of 48 community accessible pitch sites across the County. We also identified a number of grass playing fields at numerous schools in addition to these. No quality audits have been completed at these sites, as playing fields are generally unmarked.
- 4.103 A summary of the pitch scores is provided in the Table below. Details of the scores for each pitch, and the rating for each quality criteria is included in the appendices.

- 4.104 Over two thirds of the pitch sites are rated as 'Good' using the Non-Technical Visual Inspection proforma. However, nearly one in three sites are rated as average or below average. The figures suggest there is a variance in quality generally across the County, although a high proportion of the average sites were located in the North of the County. There is no clear quality 'divide', or notable difference between those managed by the Council and other providers.
- 4.105 Integral to the quality of facilities, and the access and suitability for a range of users is the existence of changing rooms. Around 1 in 5 sites audited are not served by changing rooms. This is significantly less than the proportion of football sites.
- 4.106 However, there is an overall issue across the County of 'ageing stock'. While most clubs do have access to changing rooms, many are of an old design or in need of some investment. As an example, in a number of cases, clubs do not have facilities served by mains electricity and are reliant on generators for power.
- 4.107 Local clubs were also asked to rate the quality of the pitches they use. Despite the above comment, a significant number of clubs hold positive views about their ancillary facilities. A summary of the ratings is provided below and provide additional information on which to draw conclusions about quality. Despite positive ratings by more than half of the clubs, 1 in 3 perceive facilities they use as 'average' at best.

- 4.108 It is important to assess the potential impact of quality of pitches on capacity. If pitches are particularly poor then they may not be able to accommodate the number of games required to meet demand and this could increase any deficiency recorded or reduce surpluses. We have used the results of the quality inspections to show how quality might affect capacity.
- 4.109 The Table below identifies assumptions that we have made regarding capacity. As in our assessment of football, we used the model outlined (taken from Toward a Level Playing Field) in the Table below and detailed in the Methodology appendix.

- 4.110 The analysis above suggests that the 40 pitches currently available and rated for quality could, given the high quality of some of them, be equivalent to more pitches in terms of the number of fixtures they can accommodate. Over half of the pitches can in theory accommodate 3 games per week, and in many cases this happens with peak periods during midweek and weekend games all played on the same pitch.
- 4.111 Ancillary facilities (specifically changing rooms) greatly affect the quality (and access) of facilities. In terms of our assessment, the lack of changing facilities reduces a potential pitch quality score by 15%. We found that most sites are served by some form of changing provision. This is a much higher proportion of facilities than other sports. However, the quality of these, as highlighted is a key issue.

Pitch Access

- 4.112 For the purposes of the assessment we have looked at access from two perspectives i.e. access to affordable facilities (i.e. cost of hire), and geographical access (i.e. proximity to quality facilities and average travel distances). We also considered access from a demand perspective, taking account of the capacity for new members at the clubs identified. We found:
 - Less than 1 in 5 clubs report a 'lack of appropriate facilities' as a key issue suggesting that
 in the main there are no major facility issues and that current provision copes with demand.
 This is supported by the relatively positive quality ratings reported by clubs; and
 - 89% of clubs consulted have capacity for new members and more than a third of these clubs are projecting an increase in their membership over the next 5 years.
- 4.113 As for the other sports assessed, in terms of geographical access to cricket facilities, we used the findings of the club consultation to determine appropriate catchment areas for facilities. We asked clubs about their membership, in terms of where they 'draw' members from and what distance represents an acceptable distance to travel to access local facilities.
- 4.114 The clubs consulted did not present an overall consensus on acceptable travel distances, or whether close proximity of facilities to local catchments was more important than high quality facilities. Acceptable distances for the majority of club members to travel to local facilities ranged from 1 mile through to 50 miles. This is clearly affected by the level of league play teams are engaged in, and the overarching vision for the club (i.e. playing at a high level, providing participatory opportunities for the local community, or both).
- 4.115 The average acceptable distance for participants to travel to access facilities reported by clubs is around 10 miles. This reflects fewer facilities overall than for football for example and that cricket is much more focussed on a number of key multi-team clubs in towns and villages. We used the average acceptable travel distance as a catchment for existing provision where it has been rated as high quality (Excellent or Good via the non-technical visual assessment and club rating), and this forms the basis of the access element of the recommended standards of provision outlined in Section 5.
- 4.116 Maps 6a, 6b and 6c show the location of current cricket facilities and Map 12 shows the theoretical catchment of this provision where it is of a good quality (based on pitch quality only). It highlights potential deficiencies in terms of access for the local population to quality facilities in the North area (specifically Berwick).
- 4.117 Most of the County other than this appears to be roughly within 10 miles of a quality pitch. Map 13 illustrates a 10 mile radius around good pitch sites which are also served by good quality ancillary facilities. This highlights a number of areas not served by high quality provision. Key areas of the North, including Berwick, Wooler, Beadnell and parts of Rothbury are not within a 10 mile catchment of high quality cricket facilities. In the West a number of settlements fall outside this catchment area, including Bellingham, Haydon Bridge and Haltwhistle.
- 4.118 This obviously has implications for the future development and promotion of cricket opportunities and initiatives to stimulate demand, in addition to addressing current issues around supply.

Sub Area analysis

4.119 As for football, we completed an area based assessment for cricket based on the sub-area analysis areas described in Section 3. Overall we found most cricket demand, in terms of numbers of teams is generated in the West area of the County. Around 40% of the total area demand is this area. This contrasts with results for football in particular, where the South East generated the highest numbers of teams. This West area does not though have the highest proportion of playing field stock in community use, suggesting a mismatch between demand and supply on a more local level. This is explored in more detailed within this section of the report.

Playing Pitch Strategy

- 4.120 In undertaking the sub-area analysis we have looked more closely at the specific demand and supply factors and specific issues raised by local clubs. As for football, we used the temporal demand patterns for the local area, rather than applying the County wide profile. This is important in reflecting area differences across the county and ensuring sub-area analyses are relevant. This is particularly important in Northumberland as the peak demand for certain age groups varies across the three sub-analysis areas. Although not as varied as the results for football (cricket peak demand is across the same periods for all three areas), there is some variance. For example, the percentage of junior fixtures played during midweek ranges from just over half (53%) in the South East to more than three quarters (78%) in the North analysis area. As a result the deficiency/surplus figures recorded do not reflect the patterns of temporal / peak demand recorded for the County as a whole.
- 4.121 A key factor to bear in mind in relation to the assessment figures for cricket is the importance of the key clubs, and the large number of single pitch sites.
- 4.122 Of the 49 pitches identified, 45 are on separate sites. A lot of clubs own and manage their own facilities and run a large number of teams. This obviously raises issues with accommodating future growth i.e. there may be little potential in some cases to develop additional provision on existing club sites.

Quality based on average site score ranges

North Area

- 4.123 There is a theoretical deficiency in pitches, equivalent to 1 pitch. This is based on the collective peak (i.e. time of the week when most games, both senior and junior are played) during midweek. The deficiency is based on a scenario of all midweek matches being played on the same day. In reality this is not the case with many fixtures being spread across a number of days.
- 4.124 The model has also been applied based on a demand factor of 0.7, i.e. an assumption that teams are playing more than one game per week on average. The deficiency recorded is therefore very much a worse case scenario.
- 4.125 There are some deficiencies in quality with only just over half of pitches rated being classified as 'good' or better. However, most pitches are served by changing rooms and nearly two thirds of clubs from the North area report access to good quality facilities overall. Tillside CC are currently in the process of developing a new pavilion and changing facilities.
- 4.126 In relation to access, most clubs have capacity for new members. However, the consultation findings suggest players are travelling significant distances to access facilities, although reducing this (i.e. creating a larger network of local facilities) is viewed by clubs as a lower priority than improving the stock of high quality facilities. There may be a different view held on this by current non-participants; in the Yorkshire Dales there has been a significant growth in participation in 'informal' cricket, using 'farmers' fields pitches' i.e. locally based, but low quality.

West Area

4.127 There is a deficiency in supply based on requirements to meet demand at several periods during the week. There is a deficiency of 10 pitches to meet demand on a Saturday afternoon (peak time for adults, but also 1 junior game at this time). Additionally, if all of the Midweek demand is played on a single midweek day, then there is a deficiency of up to 13 pitches to accommodate the 32 matches estimated.

Playing Pitch Strategy

- 4.128 In reality matches are spread across a number of days, and providing they are split across at least two week days, facilities are adequate.
- 4.129 However, this does require some pitches to accommodate more than 2 games per week. No additional facilities for cricket were identified (i.e. those with no community use currently) in the West area.
- 4.130 In terms of quality, around two thirds of pitches were rated as good or better. This is higher than in the North and on par with the overall County averages. However, nearly half the clubs rate the facilities they use as average or poor. Additionally, although the majority of pitches are served by changing rooms, ratings for ancillary facilities were low across the area.
- 4.131 All clubs consulted report capacity for new members, suggesting that there are no major issues with access to opportunities to play cricket. There was no consensus across the clubs consulted in relation to future priorities (in relation to more local facilities versus a more regional network of high quality facilities).

South East Area

- 4.132 There are deficiencies in cricket pitch quantity in the South East area. The extent of this, as within the West depends on some of the modelling assumptions applied, particularly in relation to the relative split of midweek games. However, there is a deficiency of at least 7 pitches to meet peak adult demand on a Saturday afternoon. Deficiency in provision to cater for midweek fixtures could be as great as -9 pitches if all matches are played on the same week day.
- 4.133 Quality is generally high across the area, with the majority of facilities rated positively. Despite high ratings generally, ancillary provision is generally poor across the area and half the clubs consulted support this finding. Some proposals are in place to improve quality.
- 4.134 Ashington Cricket Club for example is working with the ECB to proceed proposals for a changing room extension.
- 4.135 All clubs consulted report capacity for new members suggesting good levels of access for new participants. However, 1 in 3 also report issues with access to appropriate facilities.
- 4.136 Of the three areas assessed, the average acceptable travel distance reported by clubs is less in the South East area. This reflects the geographic nature of the South East area which is more urban than the other analysis areas. As in other areas, there does not appear to be a clear consensus from clubs on broad priorities for the future.
- 4.137 Views were broadly evenly split between access to higher qualities (which might be located further a field) and those close to where the playing membership is drawn from.

Assessment results – future

- 4.138 As with football, we assessed the adequacy of cricket provision to meet future demand through estimating levels of future demand based on population growth and the development plans and aspirations of clubs. Our own Future Team Estimator has been used to do this. The outputs of this have been used to inform the supply and demand modelling to identify changes to surplus and deficiencies in provision over the next five years.
- 4.139 One third of clubs locally project an increase in their membership, including some significant growth across clubs with junior sections of 5 teams or more in some cases. The use of the Future Team Estimator, which factors this estimated growth alongside natural growth likely to occur as a result of population increases (even if TGRs remain static), suggests growth could be around 13%.

Playing Pitch Strategy

4.140 Future supply changes (i.e. planned new facilities), where known have also been factored into the modelling. The results of our future supply and demand modelling are summarised in the Table below. Current temporal demand patterns have been used for this – i.e. it has assumed that current peak demand periods across the three areas will remain the same. This could of course change according to developments in local league and competitions. As a result the sub-area analysis figures will not total that for a County Wide assessment. The County wide senior pitch equivalent is provided as a total of the individual area deficiencies, rather than the outcome of applying the model for the whole county.

4.141 The results show there is likely to be a significant deficiency in provision in all areas across the County if estimated growth is realised and there are no significant changes to supply. Significant changes to supply refer to additional pitches being accessible as well as new pitches. However, the audit has revealed little 'spare' provision in relation to cricket, or few planned additions to the number of pitches.

Summary of assessment findings: Cricket

The following headline findings are drawn from the assessment:

- TGRs The highest TGRs are in the West sub area; these are higher than the national average. Junior girls' cricket is only played in the North sub area.
- Quantity Assessed on a county wide basis, there is a deficiency in cricket facilities
 equivalent to at least 12 pitches. This could be greater depending on the assumptions
 made about midweek games
- More detailed sub-area analysis highlights a variance in the adequacy of facilities across
 the County, although a general picture of deficiency. Provision in the North is potentially
 adequate subject to bringing into play spare capacity and on the basis of midweek
 demand being spread across a number of days. In the West and South East areas
 facilities overall are deficient, potentially across a number of days.
- Supply and Demand Analysis Future supply and demand modelling illustrates a
 worsening of deficiencies across the County and in each of the three analysis areas.
 Issues are particularly prominent in the West (-11—16 pitches) and the South East (-9—

 Club, Blyth Cricket and Rugby Club

Rugby Union Assessment

Demand

4.142 Our audit identified **12** rugby clubs generating **94** teams in total. Team numbers generated by each club vary significantly, from single team clubs to those with in excess of 10 teams (Tynedale RUFC for example runs 19 teams). Consultation with rugby clubs (92% response rate) suggests that on average clubs have 190 members. The teams identified, and included within our assessment, are detailed by the number within each identified "type" of team in Table 4.21 below.

Supply

4.143 Our audit identified **49** rugby pitches which currently have secured public use and are included in the assessment calculation. A significant number of sites have multiple rugby pitches with several sites accommodating more than 3 pitches.

Assessment results – current year

Pitch Quantity

4.144 The supply and demand data collated was analysed to provide a quantitative assessment. Put simply the assessment provides an initial indication of the adequacy of provision to cater for estimated demand. A summary of the application of the eight stage model assessment for rugby union is provided in the Table below. For rugby union we have reviewed demand as a collective total of all mini, junior and senior games, given that all demand is accommodated by the same pitches. Further details of how the following figures have been calculated are included within the appendices to this report.

Playing Pitch Strategy

- 4.145 The results show:
 - A theoretical surplus of rugby pitches to meet peak time.
 - Even though collective demand is split relatively evenly across several days/times, pitch supply is adequate to meet all current demand in theory if all matches were played at the same time – however, this is made on an assumption that pitches are in the right place i.e. where the demand originates
- 4.146 Quantity is only sufficient if pitches are of sufficient quality, particularly where some pitches are used to accommodate a number of matches during the week. Some pitches currently need to accommodate games at several times during the week.

Pitch Quality

- 4.147 The results of the quantitative assessment need to be considered alongside quality issues, as quality will affect the capacity of pitches to accommodate games.
- 4.148 We assessed the quality of 48 community accessible pitch sites across the County. We also identified a number of grass playing fields at numerous schools in addition to these. No quality audits have been completed at these sites, as playing fields are generally unmarked.
- 4.149 A summary of the pitch scores is provided in Table 4.24 below. Details of the scores for each pitch, and the rating for each quality criteria is included in the appendices.

- 4.150 Almost two thirds of pitches rated were classified as 'Good' using the Non-Technical Visual Inspection proforma. However, more than one in three sites are rated as average or below average. The figures suggest there is a variance in quality generally across the city.
- 4.151 Integral to the quality of facilities, and the access and suitability for a range of users is the existence of changing rooms. Over half of the sites audited are not served by changing rooms.
- 4.152 Local clubs were also asked to rate the quality of the pitches they use. A summary of the ratings is provided below and provide additional information on which to draw conclusions about quality.

- 4.154 The analysis above suggests that the 45 pitches currently available and rated for quality could, given the high quality of some of them, be equivalent to more pitches in terms of the number of fixtures they can accommodate. AGPs could help to reduce the demands put on grass pitches by training). Over half of the pitches can in theory accommodate 3 games per week, and in many cases this happens with peak periods during midweek and weekend games all played on the same pitch.
- 4.155 Ancillary facilities (specifically changing rooms) greatly affect the quality (and access) of facilities. In terms of our assessment, the lack of changing facilities reduces a potential pitch quality score by 15%. We found that only around half of sites are served by some form of changing provision. This is a much lower proportion of facilities than some other sports, notably cricket.

Pitch Access

- 4.156 For the purposes of the assessment we have looked at access from two perspectives specifically access to affordable facilities (i.e. cost of hire), and geographical access (i.e. proximity to quality facilities and average travel distances). We also considered access from a demand perspective, taking account of the capacity for new members at the clubs identified. We found:
 - Just less than half of clubs report a 'lack of appropriate facilities' as a key issue suggesting
 that in some cases there are issues with facilities, although quality ratings were generally
 high. Most issues could relate to specific developments and pending projects planned with
 the RFU
 - All but one of the clubs consulted have capacity for new members and almost two thirds of these clubs are projecting an increase in their membership over the next 5 years. This suggests that where there are current issues with facilities these are likely to be overcome
- 4.157 As for the other sports assessed, in terms of geographical access to facilities, we used the findings of the club consultation to determine appropriate catchment areas for football facilities. We asked clubs about their membership, in terms of where they 'draw' members from and what distance represents an acceptable distance to travel to access local facilities.
- 4.158 The clubs consulted did not present an overall consensus on acceptable travel distances, or whether close proximity of facilities to local catchments was more important than high quality facilities. Acceptable distances for the majority of club members to travel to local facilities ranged from 1.5 miles through to 30 miles. This is clearly affected by the level of league play teams are engaged in, and the overarching vision for the club (i.e. playing at a high level, providing participatory opportunities for the local community, or both).
- 4.159 The average acceptable distance for participants to travel to access facilities reported by clubs is around 11 miles. This reflects fewer facilities overall than for football for example and that rugby is much more focussed on a number of key multi-team clubs in towns and villages.
- 4.160 We used the average acceptable travel distance as a catchment for existing provision where it has been rated as high quality (Excellent or Good via the non-technical visual assessment and club rating), and this forms the basis of the Access element of the recommended standards of provision outlined in Section 5.
- 4.161 Map 14 shows the location of current rugby facilities with a theoretical catchment around this provision where it is of a high quality. It highlights potential deficiencies in terms of access for the local population to quality facilities. Map 15 excludes a number of sites where ancillary facility quality was below average. On this basis there are deficiencies in Berwick and other areas within the North analysis area, and in the West around the settlements of Haydon Bridge and Haltwhistle. Improvements to changing accommodation at Berwick Rugby Club are identified in the Northumberland Rugby Facilities Plan.
- 4.162 Addressing theoretical deficiencies in the West area are potentially difficult to address given that the issues concerning pitch provision are more to do with the fact that there is one large club Tynedale RFC in Corbridge, and smaller clubs at Ponteland, Haydon Bridge, Stocksfield (the Prudhoe club), and Kielder. This does mean that there is actually a large population without access to a rugby pitch, which is a specific issue for juniors and beginners rather than established adult players

Sub Area analysis

4.163 We completed an area based assessment for rugby based on the sub-area analysis areas described in Section 3. Overall we found most demand, nearly half, in terms of numbers of teams is generated in the North area of the County. This contrasts with results for football and cricket in particular, where the South East and West respectively generated the highest numbers of teams.

Playing Pitch Strategy

- 4.164 In undertaking the sub-area analysis we have looked more closely at the specific demand and supply factors and specific issues raised by local clubs. As for football and cricket, we used the temporal demand patterns for the local area, rather than applying the County wide profile. This is important in reflecting area differences across the county and ensuring sub-area analyses are relevant. In Northumberland as the peak demand for certain age groups varies across the three sub-analysis areas. Although not as evident as the results for football, there is some variation in the actual percentage of games at peak time, particularly where demand is viewed collectively (i.e. across age groups).
- 4.165 A key factor to bear in mind in relation to the assessment figures for rugby is the importance of the key clubs. Most have their own facilities and run a large number of teams. This contrasts significantly with football where in addition to some key Charter Clubs there are a significant amount of one team clubs heavily reliant on public provision. The results summarised below consider all facilities identified. In reality, clubs require facilities at their own premises (rather than accessing a range of public facilities potentially scattered around the County) and in some cases these are at or nearing capacity.
- 4.166 A significant amount of work has been undertaken by the RFU and local clubs to develop a robust process to audit and identify priorities and these are reflected in the Northumberland Rugby Facilities Plan. Where additional provision is planned or proposed, reference has been made relation to these within the commentary on future analyses.

North Area

- 4.167 There is a modest surplus in pitches in the North area, based on the collective peak (i.e. time of the week when most games, both senior and junior are played) of Sunday morning. Peak demands for adult rugby in isolation is on a Saturday afternoon, but the most games overall (i.e. when most pitches are needed) are played on Sunday mornings. The modelling has not taken account of less wear and tear from mini rugby in comparison to adult games. If this was factored in (including the fact that mini rugby used half an senior pitch are) then the surplus is likely to increase. The results therefore represent a worse case scenario.
- 4.168 There are some deficiencies in quality with only half of pitch sites rated being classified as 'good' or better. Improvements are potentially pending at Morpeth RFC with proposals to improve the drainage of the 1st team pitch. There are also a significant proportion of sites which are not served by adequate or good quality changing rooms. These have largely been flagged by clubs to the RFU and in most cases are identified in the Northumberland Rugby Facilities Plan as priorities for 2010-2011. Specifically new changing rooms at Alnwick RFC and improvements to changing accommodation at Berwick RFC are referenced.
- 4.169 In relation to access, all clubs have capacity for new members. However, the consultation findings suggest players are travelling significant distances to access facilities. Reducing this (i.e. creating a larger network of local facilities) is viewed by clubs as a lesser priority than improving the stock of high quality facilities at existing venues.

West Area

- 4.170 As in the North Area, there is a modest surplus in pitch provision to meet peak demand (Sunday mornings, where it is estimated that there are 10 regular games per week). The results reflect a worst case scenario or least surplus. Given that quality is generally higher and that a significant amount of the demand is generated by Junior and Mini teams, the actual surplus could be larger.
- 4.171 In the west sub area there is a need to consider rugby provision on a site basis rather than pitch by pitch. This is because there is one large club Tynedale RFC in Corbridge, and smaller clubs at Ponteland, Haydon Bridge, Stocksfield (the Prudhoe club), and Kielder.

Playing Pitch Strategy

- 4.172 This does mean that there is actually a large population without access to a rugby pitch, which is a specific issue for juniors and beginners rather than established adult players.
- 4.173 There appear to be fewer issues relating to quality than in the other two analysis areas. Despite some low quality ratings, clubs views are generally positive in relation to quality in respect of both pitches and ancillary facilities.
- 4.174 All clubs consulted report capacity for new members, suggesting that there are no major issues with access to opportunities to play rugby. Acceptable distances for accessing quality facilities are still high in comparison to other sports. The average acceptable travel distance for clubs is around 13 miles, although two clubs report a distance of 5-10 as representing the maximum. There was no consensus across the clubs consulted in relation to future priorities (in relation to more local facilities versus a more regional network of high quality facilities), although anecdotally we understand clubs prefer larger, better quality sites, given that it is the established clubs that generate demand for rugby.

South East Area

- 4.175 There are surpluses in rugby pitch quantity in the South East area. The extent of this, as within the West and North depends on some of the modelling assumptions applied, particularly in relation to the relative split of junior, mini and adult games and how these are accounted for in terms of space required and intensity of use. However, there is a surplus of at least 8 pitches to meet peak demand on a Sunday morning, based on overall supply. In reality, there are some pinch points related to the earlier general points raised about the concentration of demand for rugby being within key clubs, and not necessarily matching the available supply i.e. there may be a surplus of pitches but they are not necessarily in the right area.
- 4.176 An example is at Blyth RFC where facilities are inadequate to meet projected growth in junior rugby. Plans are proposed (and feature within the Northumberland Rugby Facilities Plan) to create a second rugby pitch at this club to support additional matches and provide improved training facilities.
- 4.177 Quality is generally high across the area, with the majority of facilities rated positively. Despite high ratings generally, ancillary provision is lacking on some sites and ratings relating to this from clubs varied (from one club rating facilities as excellent, to one rating provision as poor). In the case of Ashington RFC plans are in progress to refurbish changing rooms in addition to pitch improvements, subject to available funding. Seghill RFC is also currently in discussions around changing room upgrades and the provision of lighting to improve access to training facilities.
- 4.178 Two of the three clubs consulted report capacity for new members suggesting relatively good levels of access for new participants. However, this needs to be considered in the context of the large area and modest number of clubs providing opportunities. One club from 4 with capacity issues could have a significant impact on access for new members if it serves a particular geographical area.
- 4.179 Of the three areas assessed, the average acceptable travel distance reported by clubs is less in this area. This reflects the geographic nature of the South East area which is more urban than the other analysis areas. As in other areas, there does not appear to be a clear consensus from clubs on broad priorities for the future. Views were broadly evenly split between access to higher quality facilities (which might be located further a field) and provision (of a lower quality) close to where the playing membership is drawn from.

Impact of Training and Education Use

4.180 The impact of demand for rugby training is also a critical factor to take into account in terms of the results of the supply and demand assessment. Rugby Union has a strong culture of training on floodlit grass pitches during the week, which are also used for matches at the weekend. Based on advice from the RFU Funding and Facilities Manager, North, demand for training has been assessed on the basis of 2 teams i.e. 30 players training for 1.5 hours per night. Therefore a typical pitch could be used 3 times per week, and would generate 3 team equivalents.

Playing Pitch Strategy

- 4.181 However, because training takes place every week and not on a home and away basis, unlike matches, the actual impact per pitch is more realistically 6 team equivalents. If this level of demand is factored into the supply and demand assessment it is clear that the marginal pitch surpluses are insufficient to cater for the demand from additional team equivalents.
- 4.182 Therefore the outcomes of the PPM which show a surplus of +31 rugby pitches across Northumberland need to considered as theoretical only. At area level the apparent surpluses of +4 (North), +8 (West) and +8 (South East) rugby pitches also need to be seen in this context; factoring in the demand for training means that there are actually deficits in current levels of pitch provision in all three sub areas. This deficit increases in relation to projected future demand. Education usage also has an impact on demand for, and capacity of rugby pitches on school sites that are also used by local teams. Although school use impacts less in terms of demand given that the majority of education use is mid week, the fact that pitches are used does affect their carrying capacity, and particularly those that are of poor or average quality.

Assessment results - future

- 4.183 As with football and cricket, we assessed the adequacy of rugby provision to meet future demand through estimating levels of future demand based on population growth and the development plans and aspirations of clubs. Our own Future Team Estimator has been used to do this. The outputs of this have been used to inform the supply and demand modelling to identify changes to surplus and deficiencies in provision over the next five years.
- 4.184 All but one of clubs locally project an increase in their membership, including some significant growth across clubs with junior sections of 5 teams or more in some cases. Specific examples include Alnwick RUFC who project growth of 100 players over the next few years. The use of the Future Team Estimator which factors this estimated growth alongside natural growth likely to occur as a result of population increases (even if TGRs remain static) suggests growth could be as much as 20%.
- 4.185 Future supply changes (i.e. planned new facilities), where known have also been factored into the modelling. In the case of Rugby we are not aware of any significant number of additional pitches, although the Northumberland Rugby Facilities Plan identifies a number of potential facility improvement projects involving local clubs.
- 4.186 This includes a potential second pitch at Blyth RFC and improvements to the quality of the 1st team pitch at Morpeth RFC. A number of clubs (Alnwick, Ashington, Berwick, Blyth, Ponteland and Prudhoe) are in discussions with the RFU relating to changing room improvement projects.
- 4.187 The results of our future supply and demand modelling are summarised in the Table below. Current temporal demand patterns have been used for this i.e. it has assumed that current peak demand periods across the three areas will remain the same. This could of course change according to developments in local league and competitions. As a result the sub-area analysis figures will not total that for a County Wide assessment. The County wide senior pitch equivalent is provided as a total of the individual area deficiencies, rather than the outcome of applying the model for the whole county.

4.188 The results show there is likely to be sufficient provision in all areas across the County if estimated growth is realised and there are no significant changes to supply. This needs to be considered carefully, as it is important for supply to be in areas where the demand is generated i.e. at club sites.

Summary of assessment findings: Rugby

The following headline findings are drawn from the assessment:

- TGRs There is high TGR for junior boys' rugby in the North sub area.
- Quantity Assessed on a county wide basis, there is a theoretical surplus in rugby facilities equivalent to at least +31 pitches. This reduces significantly when assessments are undertaken using local area demand profiles and TGRs, and key other demand sources e.g. training and education use is factored in to the supply and demand analysis. The impact of training demand alone means that there is not actually a surplus of provision, but a current and therefore also future deficit of rugby pitches to meet demand. It is also important to consider this figure in the context of rugby demand, most of which is generated by a small number of key clubs with their own facilities in many cases these are at capacity
- Supply and Demand Analysis Future supply and demand modelling illustrates a
 reduction in current surpluses across the County and in each of the three analysis areas.
 Although theoretically facilities (from a quantity only) perspective are sufficient to meet a
 20% growth in the number of peak time games, the impact of training demand means that
 in reality there is a current and future deficit in provision. This needs to be addressed
 through a combination of additional pitch provision (new/opening up existing facilities
 e.g. on school sites), plus improving the quality and therefore capacity of existing
 pitches.

- More detailed sub-area analysis highlights some variance in the adequacy of facilities across the County, although a general picture of theoretical surplus. Given the very small apparent future surplus of +1 pitch in the North future actual deficiencies could occur, particularly if projected growth is realised.
- Quality Quality of pitches is relatively high across the County nearly two thirds of
 sites rated were deemed to provide Good quality pitches and this potentially helps
 improve the capacity overall (assuming higher quality pitches can accommodate more
 games per week). This view is shared by Clubs where more than half report accessing
 high quality facilities and most of the remainder rating facilities used as 'average'. Few
 pitches rated below average
- As with assessments of other sports, there are issues with the quality of ancillary facilities. A number of these are already flagged in the Northumberland Rugby Facilities Plan e.g. Alnwick, Ashington, Blyth, Berwick, Ponteland, Prudhoe.
- Coaching/Training there is significant demand for training facilities; the impact of this
 on existing grass pitch stock is significant, turning apparent surpluses into deficiencies
 across the county. Increased/improved access to AGPs suitable for rugby training could
 help to address this impact.
- Priority Sites Priority sites for investment include (based on consultation, site assessment and consultation with the NGB): Ashington Rugby Club, Blyth Rugby Club, Morpeth Cricket and Hockey Club, Morpeth RUFC 1st team pitch, Border Park Rugby Club, Tynedale RUFC and Seghill RFC – changing facilities.

Hockey Assessment

Demand

- 4.189 Our audit identified 4 hockey clubs generating 24 teams in total. These four clubs Alnwick HC, Berwick HC, Morpeth HC and Tynedale HC, are England Hockey accredited clubs and are seen as focus clubs.
- 4.190 Tynedale HC currently plays and train out of the county at Walbottle Campus (which is in Newcastle). The pitch at Hexham Queen Elizabeth High School is not floodlit and the local league has condemned the playing surface. Possibility of a new sand filled pitch at the school, which would include floodlights, this would greatly help the club who are currently struggling to meet the cost to play outside the county.
- 4.191 Alnwick HC currently plays and train at Morpeth HC. England Hockey has identified Alnwick as needing a pitch. Between the clubs, there are 16 teams (juniors/seniors/vets) who require access to the pitch, along with a comprehensive county development programme and there are insufficient time slots to meet demand.
- 4.192 Alnwick HC is part of Alnwick Sporting Club, a multi sports club and they would be looking to use the funding they have received from the National Hockey Foundation to build a flood lit sand filled pitch at the Greensfield site in Alnwick. This project needs to tie in with the Football Foundation and their plan for Alnwick juniors
- 4.193 Team numbers generated by each club vary from 4-team clubs to Morpeth Hockey Club which runs 10 teams. Consultation with hockey clubs (100% response rate) suggests that on average clubs have 60 members. The teams identified, and included within our assessment, are detailed by the number within each identified "type" of team in Table 4.29 below.

Supply

4.194 Our audit identified **7** synthetic turf pitches in total which currently have secured public use. 4 of these are sand-filled and floodlight and are approved for league hockey. They are included in the assessment calculation below. There are no hockey pitches in the West sub area.

4.195 It is critical to highlight the fact that the key pitches are located at Berwick High School (N), and Morpeth Hockey Club (N). The 2 pitches in the SE sub area at Bede Academy and Cramlington are located in an area where there are no hockey clubs and virtually no hockey is played.

Assessment results - current year

Pitch Quantity

- 4.196 The supply and demand data collated was analysed to provide a quantitative assessment. Put simply the assessment provides an initial indication of the adequacy of provision to cater for estimated demand. A summary of the application of the eight stage model assessment for hockey is provided in the Table below. For hockey we have made an assumption that 4 fixtures can be played on an Artificial Grass Pitch (AGP) on any one day, although we recognise that for some matches in some leagues this is not possible, given travelling distances.
- 4.197 This makes the assumption that access is adequate and hockey is prioritised on the facilities in use. Further details of how the following figures have been calculated are included within the appendices to this report.

4.198 The results show:

- Demand is modest overall and is also split across the week, resulting in a relatively low overall peak in demand on a Saturday – 50% of all identified games are played on this day, 6 games in total
- On the basis of this demand profile there is a theoretical surplus at peak time of 2 full size AGPs
- 4.199 Quantity is only sufficient if pitches are of sufficient quality, particularly where some pitches are used to accommodate a number of matches during the week. Some pitches currently need to accommodate games at several times during the week.
- 4.200 There may be a perceived surplus of two hockey pitches in the county, but this relates to the pitches in south east Northumberland where no hockey is played. Neither Alnwick HC nor Tynedale HC would seek to use the pitch at Bede Academy as rather than reducing the travelling time for teams, players and parents, this would increase it. Northumberland County Hockey Association is also unlikely to use the Bede Academy pitch as it simply increases travelling time as opposed to reducing it. The apparent surplus is not a reality.

Pitch Quality

4.201 Four pitches have been included in the assessment, and these were rated as follows:

Playing Pitch Strategy

4.202 The audit also highlighted a condemned facility at Hexham Queen Elizabeth High School. This has been used by Tynedale Hockey Club in the past. It has no floodlights, and Tynedale Hockey Club currently play out of area at Walbbottle Campus (facilities in Newcastle City Council area).

Pitch Access

- 4.203 For the purposes of the assessment we have looked at access from two perspectives; specifically access to affordable facilities (i.e. cost of hire), and geographical access (i.e. proximity to quality facilities and average travel distances). We also considered access from a demand perspective, taking account of the capacity for new members at the clubs identified. We found:
 - All the clubs with the exception of Berwick Hockey Club have capacity for new members.
 - Alnwick and Tynedale Hockey Clubs both report 'lack of appropriate facilities' as a key issue
 Alnwick, although able to accommodate new participants states the need for improved changing facilities for this to happen
- 4.204 As for the other sports assessed, in terms of geographical access to facilities, we used the findings of the club consultation to determine appropriate catchment areas for hockey facilities. We asked clubs about their membership, in terms of where they 'draw' members from and what distance represents an acceptable distance to travel to access local facilities.
- 4.205 The clubs consulted did not present an overall consensus on acceptable travel distances, or whether close proximity of facilities to local catchments was more important than high quality facilities.

 Acceptable distances for the majority of club members to travel to local facilities ranged, but generally average 12-15 miles. This is clearly affected by the level of league play teams are engaged in, and the overarching vision for the club (i.e. playing at a high level, providing participatory opportunities for the local community, or both).
- 4.206 This travel distance reflects fewer facilities overall than for football for example and that hockey is much more focussed on a number of key multi-team clubs in towns and villages. However, given the facility sharing at Morpeth, and the fact that Tynedale now play just outside the County, hockey clubs actually only play at two venues within Northumberland (Morpeth and Berwick). We used the average acceptable travel distance as a catchment for existing provision where it has been rated as high quality (Excellent or Good via the non-technical visual assessment and club rating), and this forms the basis of the Access element of the recommended standards of provision outlined in Section 5.
- 4.207 Map 16 shows the location of current AGP facilities suitable for hockey and the theoretical catchment of this provision based on a 10 mile catchment (the average acceptable travel distance reported by clubs). The results of the mapping show little access to hockey in many parts of the County. In particular, there is no club and no suitable AGP for hockey (given the condition of the facility at Queen Elizabeth School) in the West. With both North based clubs sharing facilities at Morpeth Hockey Club there is a lack of coverage across many parts of the North, including Alnwick. In the South East of the County there is an AGP suitable for hockey, but currently no club use. So although the map suggests there is access to a facility, there is no club based there (and therefore no opportunities for competitive hockey).
- 4.208 Other demand and access issues to take into account are training, use of pitches by schools and development centres, Northumberland Schoolgirls Hockey Association who organise all the school leagues and Northumberland County Hockey Association who run the development programme. England Hockey Board has identified Alnwick as a primary location for Single System delivery (Junior Development Centres) which take place primarily on Sundays and is a full programme for U13- U17 boys and girls.
- 4.209 Use of AGPs for competitive matches is a particular factor in Northumberland because of distance; it is not possible to have four match slots at a weekend due to league rules. In addition, two clubs play in regional leagues, and because their opposition is travelling much greater distances they are only able to play matches at certain times.

Sub Area analysis

- 4.210 We completed an area based assessment for hockey based on the sub-area analysis areas described in Section 3. All of the demand is in theory generated in the North and West areas, with no clubs identified in the South East. In practice clubs are likely to draw from areas outside of their area boundary, and in the South East the likelihood is that some hockey participants from Northumberland County will gravitate towards clubs in the Newcastle area.
- 4.211 As in the assessment of other sports, there are some more local issues masked by analysis completed on relatively large sub-analysis areas. For example in the North, there is a theoretical surplus of facilities. This is based on the demand generated by Alnwick and Morpeth Hockey Clubs (who share facilities at Morpeth).
- 4.212 This masks the fact that participants from the Alnwick area are travelling 30+ miles to access provision. The alternative for potential participants in the Alnwick area is to travel to Berwick (even further). Clearly in the medium and long term this will impact on hockey development.

Assessment results - future

- 4.213 All but one of clubs locally project an increase in their membership, including some significant growth across clubs with junior sections of 3 teams or more in some cases. Specific examples include Morpeth HC project growth of 40 players over the next few years. The use of the Future Team Estimator which factors this estimated growth alongside natural growth likely to occur as a result of population increases (even if TGRs remain static) suggests growth could be around 23%. There is potential for this, given that the comparison of TGRs with those on the national data base suggests they are lower significantly lower than the national average. That said, the Active People data (adults only) indicates that demand (based on those playing regularly) is potentially higher than the national average already. For the purposes of making future projections we have based growth rates on the results of club consultation and current TGRs.
- 4.214 Providing there is ample supply of provision suitable for hockey then a focus on 3rd generation provision in the future should not be seen as threat tot the future of hockey development. It is therefore important that the results of this assessment are used to inform this facility planning where there is still potential to do so. This is highlighted further in the following section of this report. However, it is clear that there are issues currently with the distribution of facilities and the potential impact this has on opportunities to play hockey across the County.
- 4.215 The results of our future supply and demand modelling are summarised in the Table below. Current temporal demand patterns have been used for this i.e. it has assumed that current peak demand periods across the three areas will remain the same. This could of course change according to developments in local league and competitions. As a result the sub-area analysis figures will not total that for a County Wide assessment. The County wide senior pitch equivalent is provided as a total of the individual area deficiencies, rather than the outcome of applying the model for the whole county.

4.216 The results show there is likely to be a significant deficiency in provision in all areas across the County if estimated growth is realised and there are no significant changes to supply. Significant changes to supply refer to additional pitches being accessible as well as new pitches. However, the audit has revealed little 'spare' provision in relation to hockey.

Summary of assessment findings: Hockey

The following headline findings are drawn from the assessment:

- TGRs Low demand overall as indicated by the total number of clubs and current TGRs so potential or latent demand could exist. There are no hockey clubs at all in the West
 sub area, and no junior hockey teams in the South East area. The majority of hockey
 demand is generated in the North sub area, principally around Alnwick and Morpeth.
- Poor 'coverage' of the County potential access issues for new hockey participants as
 the sport is played at few venues there are notable gaps in the West area (no AGPs
 suitable for hockey) and parts of the North (no provision between Berwick and Morpeth
- Quantity Assessed on a county wide basis, there is a current (-0.5) and future (-1) deficit in synthetic turf pitches suitable for hockey.
- Supply and Demand Future supply and demand modelling illustrates an increase in deficiencies across the County and specifically in the North and West areas. Existing facilities (from a quantity) perspective are insufficient to meet current demand, let alone a 23% growth in the number of peak time games
- In the North, where 20 of the 24 existing teams are based there is a future deficit in provision of -1.7 synthetic pitches. This is particularly acute in Alnwick. In the West there is also a future deficit of -1.7 pitches (based on peak time demand).
- One of the clubs (Tynedale HC) currently plays outside of the County and away from its home town

Playing Pitch Strategy

- Quality Quality of pitches is relatively high across the County but some investment is needed in ancillary facilities at key sites to help facilitate further growth
- Priority Sites (based on consultation, site assessment and consultation with the NGB) –
 Cramlington AGP; Greensfield, Alnwick (joint project with Alnwick Juniors), development
 of an additional site, potentially Hexham, in the West sub area. Securing improved
 community access at Bede Academy is also a priority.

Rugby League Assessment

- 4.217 Our audit has identified 1 rugby league club (Cramlington Rockets) operating teams. The club is currently based at Cramlington Sporting Club (Cramlington High School). No consultation response was received from the club.
- 4.218 There are potential plans across regions to move the amateur season to the summer. This will have implications for rugby league in some areas where teams ground share with summer sports. However, it is not anticipated to be a problem in Northumberland. There is plentiful rugby pitch supply and as far as is known the Cramlington Sports Club pitch currently used by the club would remain accessible.

Artificial Grass Pitches for Non-Hockey use

- 4.219 The audit has identified a further 4 Artificial Grass Pitches across the County which are not currently providing facilities for hockey use. Given the need for training facilities for clubs to access and potential trends for some sports, (such as the potential for some football to be played on 3G pitches) it is important that there is a sufficient supply of pitches to meet various demands. A network of accessible AGP provision is seen as vital to supporting provision to support formal games. In planning and delivering this consideration should be given to the Sport England guide, Selecting the Right Artificial Surface.
- The consultation with clubs has identified a number of key findings relating to training facilities, in terms 4.220 of current use, access and quality. Previous research, including those Playing Pitch Strategies developed on a local District level prior to the formation of the new Unitary County authority has also identified needs and priorities to be addressed.

- 4.221 On the basis of the audit data above, and the aspiration to develop a network of AGPs to support training across football, rugby and hockey it is suggested that the following should be considered as a minimum. This is in addition to addressing the gaps in provision identified in the Hockey assessment summary (i.e. potential for additional provision in the West and North areas).
- 4.222 Club consultation suggests that around a quarter of football clubs do not use training facilities. While some of this will be reflective of the standard they play at, others are likely to lack access to appropriate facilities. The facilities detailed in the table above all feature on the list of facilities used by clubs. Of those using facilities one in 5 clubs rate facilities as only average at best. However, few clubs explicitly cited a lack of AGP provision as a key issue. We are not sure whether this is because other issues (such as a lack of quality changing room facilities) take precedent or if expectations about accessible AGP facilities are low. That said, a number of pre-existing strategies highlight the need for additional facilities. The need for new AGPs in Alnwick, Blyth Valley and Wansbeck is highlighted in the Northumberland Sub-Regional Facilities Strategy. The Open Space Sport and Recreation Study for the former districts of Alnwick and Berwick also identifies a need for AGPs highlighted by 47% of clubs.
- 4.223 It is suggested, that in order to create an accessible network of facilities, an additional 3G pitch in the North Area is required currently there is only one 3G pitch catering predominantly for football located at Westfield Park in the West of the analysis area (Longhoughton). This pitch is not a full size football/hockey pitch and could not accommodate a senior match. It is therefore suggested that an additional pitch is located within the North of the area to provide a large a catchment area for both pitches as possible.
- 4.224 The West area has no facility suitable for local league hockey with the facility at Queen Elizabeth School condemned by the local league committee. Without floodlighting this facility is also unable to accommodate much peak time use from local sports clubs.
- 4.225 The only pitch in the West Area currently is the facility at Prudhoe School, close to the border of the County and potentially overlapping with the catchment of some facilities in the Newcastle City boundary.
- 4.226 It is suggested that an additional pitch, given the condition and usability of the facility at Queen Elizabeth School in Hexham should be considered in this area of the County. The West area is also in some regards the 'hotspot' regarding demand this is the area with the highest team generation rates for football and most forms of Rugby. The need for additional AGP provision has also been highlighted in previous studies The Tynedale Open Space, Sport and Recreation Study concludes there is a need for full size AGPs in Hexham and Prudhoe (now one at Prudhoe School) and advocates support for an AGP at Tynedale Rugby Club (based in Corbridge).
- 4.227 There are a number of options that could help address this, depending on a review of their current status and more detailed research. Much also depends on the need or aspiration of Tynedale Hockey Club to relocate back to Hexham or other home within the County as this will affect surface requirements for pitches. The feasibility of upgrading (including floodlighting) the facilities at Queen Elizabeth School should be explored.

Playing Pitch Strategy

- 4.228 Although Tynedale RUFC are highlighted in the previous Open Space Strategy, the project is not featured in the latest Northumberland Rugby Facility Plan. An all weather pitch at Ponteland RFC is though highlighted as a potential priority project (although still at discussion stage). It is suggested that further discussions explore the potential for any development to accommodate football training in addition to rugby, and tests the feasibility of the location in relation to where most of the demand lies.
- 4.229 There is also potential for some of the above to be developed on school sites as part of new developments. This will require additional investment to ensure surfaces in tune with local need are provided, and facilities are floodlit. As a general policy moving forward, it is suggested that new AGP provision be developed as part of new Schools or existing complexes. This is to ensure assets are protected, well managed and are well utilised. It is also stressed that AGPs need to meet the needs of as many sports as possible in particular 3G facilities need to be suitable to meet the needs of both football and rugby training.
- 4.230 It is unlikely that an accessible network of AGPs, particularly where this will involve new developments at schools will be delivered within the lifespan of this strategy. However, feasibility work, and joint planning needs to commence and progress over the course of this strategy, with action required to deliver this aspiration.
- 4.231 It is critical to highlight the value and role of small AGPs as venues for coaching, training and small sided competitive games, particularly where grass pitches are not of very good quality and in the more rural areas. Using small AGPs fro training can reduce impact on grass pitches which can then be used primarily for competitive matches. Small STPs in rural areas can provide accessible and operationally cost effective facilities for a range of sports; existing examples are those in Stocksfield and Haydon Bridge which are very heavily used.

Section 5 - Local Standards of Provision













Local Standards of Provision

Introduction

5.1 In this section we make a number of recommendations for local standards of provision. We draw on the assessment findings to recommend the levels of provision required to meet anticipated future demand in terms of quantity, quality and access.

Recommended Local Standards of Provision

- 5.2 Standards are set on the basis of required provision to meet both current needs and where estimations have been possible, future demand and growth anticipated within specific sports. Local standards have been set in relation to quantity and quality, based on:
 - Assessment results and the adequacy of current provision to meet known and estimated demand;
 - Anticipated changes to demand based on current participation rates;
 - Current and desired quality of facilities.
- 5.3 These standards need to feed into the PPG17 Assessment for Northumberland. It is important to stress that the Local Standards developed in a PPG17 are based on ha per 1000 population, whereas the PPS deals in pitch units, so the two sets of information are different. For ease of reference, the pitch dimensions are set out in paragraph 1.9, so that there is correlation between the different measures of area. In addition, it is important to be clear that PPG17 standards for outdoor sport includes ALL sports eg pitches, running tracks, greens and courts, whereas the PPS ONLY includes playing pitches, unless the scope of work explicitly states otherwise.
- Therefore it is the conclusions of the PPS in terms of need for increase number of pitches/improved quality and/or improved accessibility that should be taken as the definitive evidence to inform future need and investment in playing pitches alone. It is these priorities ie Table 6.1 that should be used to inform the LDF, through application of the most appropriate of the policy options as set out in Section 6. Although the data in a PPS is time limited, and does need to be regularly updated, the principles set out in Section 6 in terms of applying policies to address deficiencies remain relevant; they just need to be applied to specific needs and situations appropriately in the context of the LDF.

Quantity Standards

- Quantity standards have been set on the basis of the assessment results and estimations of future demand. The proposed standards reflect the assessment results and findings of local consultation. Standards have been set to reflect pitch requirements to meet peak demand and are proposed for all types of natural turf pitches assessed. For the purpose of setting standards, the assessment has been undertaken for each pitch sport and appropriate sub-categories where different types or specification of pitch are required. This specifically concerns soccer where mini teams and youth teams require appropriately sized pitches.
- 5.6 The local standards recommended (and reflected in Table 5.2: Application of Quantity Standard) are based on the actual number of pitches required to meet estimated future demand. It is also prudent to ensure that there is an adequate surplus to enable pitches to be taken out of use periodically for major renovation works. Advice from Sport and Landscape Development (a specialist natural turf consultancy) indicates that spare supply equating to 10% of the total required number of pitches would be prudent. This effectively allows every pitch to be taken out of use for a season once every ten years. This allows time for any essential renovation and re-instatement of drainage works. A number of recommendations are made later in the report in consideration to meeting local standards of provision.

Quantity Standards

- 5.7 Quality standards have been set on the basis of the quality assessment results and the categorisation of scored pitches using the electronic toolkit accompanying "Toward a Level Playing Field". The quality standard is based on all pitches being rated within the "Good" classification. In simple terms, the standard for playing pitch provision is "all pitches available for the community to use will be of a good standard". The identified ratings for pitches fall into the categories shown in table 5.1 below. The quality of all pitches and ancillary provision is included in Appendix 4.
- Provision standards should be set and applied to identify deficiencies on provision. This has been done through the completion of quality assessments on pitches. A number of maps have been produced to show quality across the county. These provide an indication of the quality of each playing field (which is obviously affected by the extent of its usage and the quality of its original construction), site based on the average quality score.

Access Standards

- Access standards are arguably more difficult to set for playing pitch provision than other types of green space facility. For example, provision standards for formal parks ordinarily take the form of a number of hectares of provision per 1,000 of the general population, with quality often linked to national standards (e.g. Green flag). The access element of a provision standard is normally comprised of a distance threshold based on all residents residing within a set distance of a facility. Setting standards relating to access to playing pitches is difficult for a number of key reasons, including:
 - Access can be affected directly by quality some teams will play at higher standards than others and as a result may require higher specifications of facility provision;
 - The presence of ancillary facilities also has a significant bearing on access some leagues will not permit teams to play at venues not adequately served by changing rooms; and
 - Opinions on acceptable distance thresholds vary significantly, as identified through the consultation process. In many cases close proximity to a facility for home games is less relevant given that teams travel on alternate weeks for away games.

Applying the Standards

5.10 In the following Tables we show the deficiencies in provision when the standards are applied. A summary of the findings (in terms of where provision is deficient) is provided at the end of this section.

Playing Pitch Strategy

- It is important to note that the PPM is a theoretical model. Although it adopts a logical and tried and tested approach to assessing the number of pitches required the figures represents a theoretical requirement. There are key issues masked by the apparent surpluses in the North and West for example these are more to do with the fact that existing senior playing pitches are not in the appropriate location, to meet the identified demand for mini and youth football games, even if they were re-designated. Additionally, given the shortage of youth pitches, many youth teams are using adult pitches. It should also be noted that in some cases sports pitches are located on openly accessible areas of open space and therefore support a range of other uses. So even where there is no demand for a formal pitch, the site may still be required.
- It is important to highlight that application of the Local Standards suggests that the number of rugby pitches in the West and South East sub areas could be reduced; this is not recommended given that the calculated surpluses are only theoretical, given the significant demand for, and impact of training. Factoring in this impact actually results in deficiencies in current and future levels of rugby pitch provision. Table 5.3 shows significant deficiencies in provision when the recommended qualitative standards are applied.

Over a third of pitch sites (those with community use) in all three analysis areas have quality scores below the quality standard threshold i.e. do not meet the quality standard. This increases to nearly half of all available pitch sites in the North area. In terms of ancillary facilities, there are substantial quality deficiencies in all areas with the most prominent in the South East where almost 9 out of 10 sites have sub-standard facilities.

Applying Quantity standards

- Table 5.2 highlights a number of deficiencies in the quantity of provision. These are based on the assessment findings previously recorded in Section 4. We recommend the levels of required provision are adopted as local provision standards. However, they represent a significant increase in current levels. They therefore cannot be met fully in the short term, or by NCC alone. It is also important to note that this additional provision represents what is projected to be needed some of this need could be met through changing the type of some existing pitches, securing community use on existing pitches where this is currently unavailable and the use of other recreational land. Potential options to meet future need are explored in Section 6 of the report. In summary, to meet the required standards the following minimum additional provision is required:
 - Mini Soccer: An additional 4 pitches in the North, 23 in the West and 19 in the South East;
 - Youth Football: An additional 10 pitches in the North, 22 in the West and 35 in the South East;
 - Senior Football: No additional pitches required;
 - Cricket: An additional 2 pitches in the North, 11 in the West and 9 in the South East
 - Rugby Union: Investment needed to improve current pitch stock and increase capacity; additional
 provision required to mitigate against impact of training demand, but this could be realised through
 opening up existing pitches e.g. on school sites;
 - AGPs for Hockey: 1 additional (none currently suitable) in the West;
 - AGPs (3G) for Football / Rugby Training: Potentially 2 additional pitches

Facilities Hierarchy

Site Improvement - Prioritisation

5.14 We have used a 'Quality / Value' matrix to help prioritise sites for improvement. This uses the results of the assessment to establish the current quality of the facilities, and their value in terms of providing for local sporting opportunities. Sites with more than one pitch, catering for more than one sport and located in areas of deficiency are viewed as being higher value sites. So in essence the Quality/Value matrix identifies the sites of strategic importance (see Table 5.5). Low value sites are typically single pitch sites with no changing facilities, underutilised and located in areas where there is a significant surplus of pitch provision. An overview of the site description and potential position in the hierarchy / importance is show below.

- 5.15 Additional provision could be delivered through opening up community access to existing facilities as a priority, and improving the quality of pitches which have the potential for more use i.e. capacity; the development of new pitches is not the only way to address identified future provision needs.
- 5.16 The priority sites for investment, based solely on a quality/value assessment evidence base are identified in the table that follows. This list does not include sites identified as priorities by key stakeholders, particularly NGBs where sites have been identified as priorities using different criteria and planning tools. These sites, together with the ones in the table below are listed in table 6.1 later in this report.

Playing Pitch Strategy

- 5.17 The above sites are shown on Map 17.
- 5.18 We outline a number of recommendations in the Section 6 of the report to seek to address the deficiencies. A number of Policy Options are considered. Additional pitch provision can be secured through a number of policies.

Developing and applying Quality and Access standards

- A number of maps have been produced to illustrate the findings of the study in relation to some elements of access. These also take account of the quality deficiencies illustrated in the table 5.3 above. Maps 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15 and 16 show accessible, good quality provision for each of the sports assessed with a buffer around each site. The buffer distance has been based on the consultation findings (sports club survey) which sought to establish the acceptable travel distance for participants in each sport. We have previously commented on some of the access issues and the gaps identified by the analysis undertaken in Section 4. The buffers themselves provide a 'rough' catchment area for facilities they are based on an average of the consultation results and they do not take account of the local road network.
- 5.20 These maps effectively illustrate that access is less of an issue than quantity and quality, but that there are still a number of gaps in provision that need to be addressed. Based on including facilities that meet the qualitative standard, and using the average (mean) acceptable travel distances, there appears to be some areas of deficiency within some sports as previously reported. Specifically:
 - <u>Football</u>: (Maps 10 and 11): relatively good access to high quality football across the County but access deficiencies relating to ancillary facilities in large areas of the North gaps could be addressed through improvements to quality of existing sites
 - <u>Cricket</u>: (Maps 12 and 13): some areas of deficiency in the North area in terms of both pitches and ancillary provision areas of the west are also deficient in terms of access to high quality ancillary facilities
 - <u>Rugby</u>: (Maps 14 and 15): relatively good access to high quality pitch facilities across most of the County – some deficiencies in relation to access to high quality ancillary facilities in the North and areas of the West. Deficiencies in the North could be addressed partly through improvements to facilities at Berwick Rugby Club. Those in the West are more difficult to address due to the location of existing clubs
 - Artificial Pitch Training Facilities for hockey and other use: (Map 16): access deficiencies in the West and North for AGPs suitable for Hockey. In addition, poor access to 3G facilities in the North (Berwick area) and West (Hexham area).

Playing Pitch Strategy

5.21 The Northumberland PPG17 study (2010) recommends an accessibility standard of:

Outdoor Sports Facility Standards

Quantity

To ensure accessible provision does not fall below the current level of 1.69 ha per 1,000 population (but the nature of provision needs to change to reduce number of senior pitches and replace with junior and mini pitches (re-marked pitches/opening up existing provision where community use is not currently available, or developing new provision).

Quality

To achieve a minimum standard of 61% for each playing pitch and related infrastructure (enhancement and improvement to existing pitches and facilities being the key priority)

Accessibility

All households to be within 1200m or 15 minutes travel time (this is based on feedback from clubs plus calculation of travelling times by car)

- In terms of the above standard, 84% of the current population are within 15 minutes travel time of a playing pitch. The issue is whether the pitch is of a good quality. It has already been identified through the Playing Pitch assessment that there is a need to improve the quality of both playing pitches and ancillary facilities across the county, and specifically at the identified sites (see Table 5.5).
- 5.23 Whilst the quantitative and qualitative standard can be applied to Northumberland in terms of playing pitch and outdoor sport provision, specifically in relation to playing pitches it may also be worth considering the development and application of a hierarchy of provision, related to the settlement pattern across the county. Similar levels of provision have been suggested in areas with large rural areas and more sparsely distributed populations, given that accessibility in the more rural areas is more difficult to achieve than in urban areas.
- Adopting a standard of provision based on settlements i.e. main urban centres, market towns and large villages/village clusters, can also assist in the organisation of specific sports e.g. multi-sport sites providing for a number of pitch sports across the seasons, or a mini soccer centre to which all teams travel. One pitch sites in the more rural areas are also important as this may be the only readily accessible formal sports provision/amenity greenspace in a village; as sports sites they facilitate and support local participation.
- 5.25 The type of provision levels reflecting a facility hierarchy could be as follows, and could be reflected in future planning documents:

6. Policy Options and Recommendations

Introduction

In this section of the report we provide a brief summary of the main issues and challenges arising from the assessment and outline the Policy Options considered for addressing the findings of the assessment undertaken for each sport. We provide an overview of the options and their appropriateness for Northumberland County Council. Drawing on this we provide a set of recommendations to address gaps and deficiencies highlighted in the application of the recommended local standards of provision.

Key conclusions: Summary of the main issues and challenges

6.2 The following bullet points summarise the key issues and challenges arising from the assessment that need to be addressed.

Quantitative Deficiencies

- There are significant current and future deficiencies in provision for mini and youth football
 and cricket across the County generally but this is more prominent in a number of areas in
 the case of football the West (highest levels of demand) and South East (least number of
 pitches per head of population)
- It is suggested that these deficiencies will not be met through re-designation (or re-marking) of pitches i.e. changing pitches from one type to another or by bringing into use pitches not currently community accessible (there is relatively little provision not currently in use)
- There is some evidence that where there is a spare capacity on pitches (i.e. perhaps pitches in areas of lower population which are not used as intensively as those in more densely populated areas; this situation however does not necessarily imply a surplus, particularly where the pitch is the only accessible green space in e.g. a village/hamlet) this is not always in the right place to meet demand there are indications that potential oversupply in some rural areas could mask higher levels of deficiency in urban areas.
- Additional to this, the assessment results on a sub-area basis can mask the characteristics
 of some sports. In particular, rugby demand is generated from a relatively small number of
 clubs and is not necessarily met by all the available supply identified. There are a large
 number of single cricket pitch sites with limited capacity for significant facility development
- There is also a current and future deficiency in real terms of rugby pitches when training demand is factored in.
- There is a current and future deficiency in hockey appropriate AGPs, particularly in the North (Alnwick) and West areas (no AGPs suitable for hockey; Tynedale Hockey Club has to play out of the area).
- Although not explicit from the assessment results, there is a perceived deficiency of AGP
 facilities to facilitate an accessible network of hockey opportunities, for accommodating
 football and rugby training and to provide for potential future developments in some sports
 (e.g. use of 3G surfaces for football matches).

Quality Deficiencies

- The application of proposed quality standards (based on the non-technical visual assessment proforma) identifies deficiencies across the County across the sub-analysis areas 33% 44% of sites audited are poor quality pitches
- The more pronounced deficiency relates to the quality of ancillary facilities football as a sport appears to be the most poorly served by appropriate facilities, but there are shortfalls across all sports in all areas. Overall only around 1 in 5 sites visited are served by good quality accessible facilities suitable to cater for multi-team / age group / gender specific sport

Accessibility Deficiencies

- Wide-spread deficiencies across all sports in relation to access to quality ancillary facilities (see Maps 11, 13 and 15)
- A number of deficiencies in terms of access to opportunities and access to appropriate facilities result directly from the points above (see Maps 11,12 and 15)
- Access to AGP provision, both for hockey and 3G provision to support football and rugby varies significantly across the County;
- Based on the above, the following priority sites for investment have been identified; this table translates the identified sites in Table 5.5 (based on a quality/value assessment), plus identified NGB priorities (from their strategies), and other priorities identified through the consultation undertaken, into sport specific investments. Table 6.1 represents the key priority sites for investment, based on all analysis undertaken to inform this study; it amalgamates table 5.5, consultation feedback, and NGB strategic priorities:

- In considering priorities for investment, it is important to highlight a specific number of sites which have the potential to be multi-pitch sites e.g.
 - Greensfield, Alnwick Alnwick Town Juniors development hampered by lack of facilities
 - Options possible Football Foundation application to drain and landscape Greenfields site and changing facilities. Site adjacent to proposed new high school site with potential to include Hockey Club and tennis facilities (proposed location of sand-filled AGP for Hockey Club).
 - Amble Schools plus Welfare possible drainage of Amble Welfare site
 - Tynedale Rugby Club
 - Ponteland Leisure Centre Possible development of new pitches at Ponteland Leisure Centre, with Phase 2 to include an AGP and changing facilities
- 6.5 Specific development priorities identified by the FA, which also provide more detail on some of those highlighted above, include:
 - Berwick (North) several single pitch sites, some with no changing/toilet facilities
 - Berwick Rangers cannot expand because there are inadequate facilities
 - > Options develop upper level of high school site with changing and junior pitches/possible development of Berwick Rugby Union Club site
 - Lowick (North) FA Chartered Club with limited facilities. Need new/refurbished changing facilities and additional pitches
 - Seahouses (North) Senior Club North Sunderland play on an undersized middle school pitch
 - > Options possible development linked to Seahouses caravan park

- Amble (North) Ellington Juniors (South East) play at a number of venues no home base
 - Options Development on site of old Ellington Colliery with possible British Coal support
- Bedlington (South East) Three junior clubs in Bedlington (four including Guide Post Juniors) – shortage of junior pitches and developed multi-pitch sites
 - Options Bedlington Forum has already commissioned an options appraisal for Bedlington no single site supported. Possible development of Gallagher Park but access issues, development of Meadowdale Middle School Site, development of Bedlington High School site BSF proposal recently withdrawn.
- Morpeth (North) junior club with potential to become FA CS Community Club is lacking a base.
 - Options Development of changing facilities and pitch drainage at Morpeth Common/Development of football hub at King Edward VI Morpeth site if possible Morpeth Harriers running track
- Blyth (South East) submission of application for 3G AGP at Blyth Community High School
- Cramlington (South East) possibility of changing AGP surface at Cramlington Sporting Club to 3G
- Seghill (South East) Large junior club with limited access to junior pitches possibility to re-designate adult pitches to provide for junior
- Haltwhistle FC needs pitches and changing accommodation
- 3G AGP in Hexham
- The priority sites identified for investment in Table 6.1 reflect the findings of the playing pitch audit and assessment; there are also other football specific sites/projects identified by the Northumberland FA which are highlighted above to provide an overall picture of the development needs at local level.

Policy Options

We have considered a number of policy options for addressing the findings of the assessment undertaken. These are summarised overleaf, together with a brief evaluation of their relevance for Northumberland.

6.8 It is clear from a review of the assessment findings that no one policy option will sufficiently address the deficiencies and issues highlighted. As a result our recommendations draw on a variety of these options.

Recommendations

- 6.9 The following recommendations are made on the basis of the research completed and the assessment findings reported. The recommendations cover 3 main themes around:
 - Managing the ongoing update and maintenance of the audit and assessment as a relevant and key evidence base to inform decision making
 - Partnership working and adopting a collaborative approach to delivering future improvements
 - Improving access and quality of facilities

M1	Explore with the relevant Governing Bodies and clubs the potential to play some fixtures on Synthetic Pitches – particularly mini and youth football. This recommendation is dependent on the future development of appropriate 3G AGP facilities. Greater use of AGPs could reduce the demand for natural turf pitches and help address future deficiencies. It may also release some football only sites which could be explored for development as cricket facilities. Use of MUGAs should be optimised for training. Appropriate management arrangements with schools would need to be implemented to effect the development of community use – preferably a formal dual-use arrangement.		
M2	Community use agreements, to an agreed specification should be required from future school redevelopment schemes (this is also an objective of the Northumberland Facilities Strategy). Key schools that do not currently facilitate community use and have substantial provision include: Bedlingtonshire Community School (4 pitches) King Edward VI School (8 pitches)

The Northumberland PPG17 Study (2010) should be used to inform identification of potential sites at a local level, given that it highlights the availability of existing recreational land which could be developed as pitches, if appropriate.

- 6.10 In considering more detailed actions to deliver these recommendations, it is important to consider the scale of improvements and development needed to address deficiencies. Addressing all of the issues and challenges raised will not be achievable within the next 5 years. It is therefore important that action under each of the recommendations is prioritised. This will include undertaking detailed technical assessments as appropriate to inform the development/improvement of each site.
- 6.11 The recommendations above effectively also provide the framework for the Action Plan, given that in the current economic climate it is inappropriate to identify specific timeframes for implementation of the recommendations, or indeed specific delivery partners. Implementation of the recommendations by NCC, partners and other stakeholders over the next 10 years will address the identified quantity and quality deficiencies in Northumberland's playing pitch provision.

Summary of Existing Planning Policy

Prologue

9.1 The Planning and Compulsory Act 2004 introduced major changes to the planning system. The new framework consists of Planning Policy Statements, Regional Spatial Strategies and Local Development Frameworks. Under Section 38 (3) of the Planning and Compulsory Purchase Act 2004, the statutory Development Plan in generic terms, now comprises the relevant Regional Spatial Strategy (RSS) and Development Plan Documents (DPDs) contained in the Local Development Framework (LDF).

Planning Policy Framework

The Development Plan Context

- 9.2 Until new DPDs have been prepared, the existing Structure Plan and Local Plans continue to form part of the Development Plan.
- 9.3 Decisions on planning applications and other development proposals must be considered against the statutory development plan, together with national planning guidance. Other specific planning policy documents which do not form part of the statutory development plan, such as Supplementary Planning Documents and Development Briefs, may also be given due consideration in assessing development proposals.

National Government Policy

9.4 Legislative statutes and implementing regulations are supported by Government planning guidance and advice disseminated via a number of sources; these include Planning Policy Statements (PPS) - which are gradually replacing Planning Policy Guidance (PPG) - circulars and other government agency publications. These are addressed in chronological order and briefly summarised below.

Planning Policy Guidance Note 17: Planning for Open Space Sport and Recreation (2002)

- 9.5 PPG 17 outlines the Government's policy objectives for open space, sport and recreational facilities, with the need to ensure that those elements are of a high quality, attractive to users, well-managed and well-maintained. In terms of delivery the long term aims are to:
 - Ensure the provision of networks of accessible, high quality open spaces and sport and recreation facilities in both urban and rural areas, which meet residents and visitors needs, are economically and environmentally sustainable and are fit for purpose;
 - Ensure an appropriate balance between new provision and the enhancement of existing provision;
 - Provide clarity and reasonable certainty for developers and landowners in relation to the requirements and expectations of the local planning authority in respect of open space and recreational provision.
- 9.6 A key aspect of PPG17 is that local authorities should undertake a local needs assessment and audit of existing provision. The objective is to move away from the use of national standards of provision and to establish local standards of provision that address quality, quantity and accessibility.

- 9.7 Moreover, PPG17 maintains that open spaces, sport and recreation all underpin people's quality of life. Well designed and implemented planning policies for open space, sport and recreation are therefore fundamental to delivering broader Government objectives.
- 9.8 PPG17 also states that open space and sports and recreational facilities that are of high quality, or of particular value to a local community, should be recognised and given protection by local authorities through appropriate policies in plans. Areas of particular quality may include small areas of open space in urban areas that provide an important local amenity and offer recreational and play opportunities.
- 9.9 In addition, PPG17 has a number of wider objectives set out in its Companion Guide. These are:
 - Supporting an urban renaissance local networks of high quality and well managed and
 maintained open spaces, sports and recreational facilities help create urban environments
 that are attractive, clean and safe. Green spaces in urban areas perform vital functions as
 areas for nature conservation and biodiversity and by acting as 'green lungs' can assist in
 meeting objectives to improve air quality.
 - Supporting a rural renewal the countryside can provide opportunities for recreation and
 visitors can play an important role in the regeneration of the economies of rural areas. Open
 spaces within rural settlements and accessibility to local sports and recreational facilities
 contribute to the quality of life and well being of people who live in rural areas.
 - Promotion of social inclusion and community cohesion; well planned and maintained open spaces and good quality sports and recreational facilities can play a major part in improving people's sense of well being in the place they live. As a focal point for community activities, they can bring together members of deprived communities and provide opportunities for people for social interaction.
 - Health and well being open spaces, sports and recreational facilities have a vital role to
 play in promoting healthy living and preventing illness, and in the social development of
 children of all ages through play, sporting activities and interaction with others.
 - Promoting more sustainable development by ensuring that open space, sports and recreational facilities (particularly in urban areas) are easily accessible by walking and cycling and that more heavily used or intensive sports and recreational facilities are planned for locations well served by public transport.

(Source ODPM Assessing Needs and Opportunities –A Companion Guide to PPG17 2002)

Planning Policy Statement 1: Delivering Sustainable Development (2005)

- 9.10 The protection and improvement of the environment is a keystone of the government's sustainable development principles. PPS1 thus has sustainable development as the core principle for planning policy nationally. It recognises that the condition of our surroundings has a direct impact on the quality of life, and that the improvement of the natural and built environment brings social and economic benefit for local communities. PPS1 states that planning should seek to maintain and improve the local environment and help to mitigate the effects of declining environmental quality through positive policies on issues such as design, conservation and the provision of public space. Sustainable development aims to:
 - Provide high quality developments of mixed use and sustainable communities
 - Reduce the need to travel by car

- Use land in an efficient manner, including re-using sites that have previously been developed.
- 9.11 A Green Infrastructure Strategy would contribute in a positive way to such sustainable principles and desirable environmental enhancements.

Planning Policy Statement 9: Biodiversity and Geological Conservation (2005)

- 9.12 PPS 9 seeks to ensure that enhancement and conservation of biological and geological diversity are an integral part of sustainable development and that they contribute towards urban renewal and the wider urban renaissance.
- 9.13 Conservation and enhancement are crucial. PPS 9 re-affirms the Government's position on the conservation of the natural environment. It outlines the need to protect sites that are both designated and undesignated and to manage wisely and promote the creation of new habitats. The guidance advocates the integration of measures to promote and protect nature across all aspects of the Council's work.
- 9.14 PPS 9 also refers to the role of networks of habitats that can link sites of biodiversity importance and provide routes for migration and dispersal of different species. As part of a wider strategy for the protection and extension of open space such networks should be protected from development. A robust Green Infrastructure Strategy presents a mechanism for achieving this, as well as contributing to biodiversity objectives.

Planning Policy Statement 3: Housing (2006)

- 9.15 This states that new residential environments should provide or enable good access to community space including green space, open amenity and recreational space (including play space), and that emphasis should be given to the needs of children and young people. The guidance advocates the need for well-designed, safe and secure stimulating areas with safe pedestrian access.
- 9.16 Nationally the Government has encouraged local authorities to develop a Green Space Strategy as part of a national drive to create cleaner, greener, safer, sustainable communities.
- 9.17 Green spaces are important to the health and everyday well being of the people of Northumberland.

 Therefore well designed and implemented planning policies are fundamental, and it is essential that the
 Council provides sufficient facilities of the right type in the right places and that these facilities are
 correctly resourced, well managed and maintained both now and in the future.
- 9.18 A Green Space Strategy will help to meet the need for accessible good quality green spaces that meet local needs through the creation of networks of provision that are sustainable and valued by the communities they are designed to serve. It will ensure that the Council provides an appropriate balance and equal access to a network of good quality provision through enhancement, refurbishment or new provision where necessary. It will provide a clear framework for investment and management action.

Planning Policy Statement 12: Local Development Frameworks (2008)

9.19 PPS 12 outlines the Government's objectives for the preparation of locally derived spatial planning policies. The LDF is intended to streamline planning processes and to promote a positive and proactive approach to delivering change and managing development. Moreover, the LDF process will enable planning authorities to take a fresh look at their areas and to develop a strategic approach to spatial planning that reflects local need and aspirations whilst delivering sustainable development.

- 9.20 Six principles can be identified in relation to local development frameworks which enable an approach to spatial planning that is:
 - Visionary setting out a clear vision that is realistic and achievable as to how an area will develop and change;
 - Wide-ranging to provide a mechanism that is broader than the usual narrow land use focus
 to enable delivery of sustainable development objectives by addressing social, economic
 and environmental issues and relating them to the use of land;
 - Participative to consider the needs, issues and aspirations of communities and stakeholders within an area, to provide a basis for making difficult choices and to build commitment to delivery;
 - Integrating adopting an integrated approach helps deliver other strategies and takes account of and informs policy;
 - Responsive taking a flexible approach, informed by monitoring, that can respond to developments in wider policy, development pressures and changes on the ground.
 - Deliverable setting out delivery mechanisms, including development control, and identifying how the plan will be delivered with and through other organisations with the powers and resources to make a difference.
- 9.21 PPS 12 notes that it will be for each local planning authority to determine how best to apply these principles in their local context.

Circular 05/2005 Planning Obligations

- 9.22 This Circular provides revised guidance for local authorities on the use of planning obligation funding such as section 106 agreements made under the provisions of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990. It clarifies the policy terms and outlines appropriate processes for securing planning obligations.
- 9.23 The Circular defines planning obligations as 'Private Agreements' negotiated by the local authority and private developers or people who wish to develop a piece of land. The purpose is to limit the impact of development or to allow development in circumstances that would otherwise be unacceptable from a planning perspective. It means developers may have to commit to a recreational provision or contribute to improvement off site. This can be either a required new provision, a provision off site or a financial contribution.
- 9.24 However, a number of limitations on the use of planning obligations under S106 provisions will be introduced by the **Community Infrastructure Levy** coming into force on 6th April 2010. The CIL enables local authorities to introduce a levy that would apply to new buildings above a certain size. Importantly, the revenue from the levy must be applied to infrastructure needed to support the development of the area. The new regulations also provide for the reform of the current system of developer contributions towards infrastructure ('planning obligations') so that the two regimes will operate effectively alongside each other.

Other National Guidance

Planning for Open Space - Sport England (2002)

- 9.25 The key messages advocated by Sport England in this publication are:
 - Policy on planning applications for the development of playing fields provides 5 exceptions to the opposition normally raised by Sport England to the loss of facilities

- Any development affecting playing fields has to have been considered by Sport England as a key consultee
- Planning Inspectors will no longer accept the traditional 6 Acre standard approach in emerging development plans within local authorities; they will expect to see the development of local standards of provision
- Local authorities will need to consider the 'Towards a Level Playing Field Methodology' (guidance on the production of playing pitch strategies) when undertaking open space assessments.

CABE Space (2003)

- 9.26 CABE Space is a part of The Commission for Architecture and the Built Environment (CABE), and was set up in early 2003. It has a primary role to champion excellence in the design and management of parks, streets and squares in towns and cities.
- 9.27 CABE Space receives its funding through central government and its work is to encourage a more holistic approach to open space. A primary objective for CABE Space is to ensure people have access to good quality, well designed, and well managed public open spaces. It is raising the profile and importance of open space in the wider agenda of regeneration, health and well being of local communities.
- 9.28 The key document relevant to this strategy is the Good Practice Guide for Developing Greenspace Strategies (2004).

'Sustainable Communities: Building for the Future' (ODPM) (2003)

9.29 This national plan marked a key change in building and maintaining sustainable communities throughout the UK. A daughter document 'Sustainable Communities in the North East' (ODPM 2003) developed the theme of creating a well designed, accessible and pleasant living and working environment, and recognised the priority that needed to be given to improving the quality of the local environment, especially in deprived areas.

Greenspace Strategies - A Good Practice Guide (2004)

- 9.30 This document was developed to support the guiding messages in PPG17 and to contribute to the wider agenda of improving greenspace through a more strategic approach. The document outlines the importance of good strategic planning in relation to open space and the benefits a Greenspace Strategy can bring. These include:
 - Improving the physical character of an area and reinforcing its local identity, and shaping future development
 - Increasing the attractiveness of an area by creating a sense of civic pride
 - Focusing capital and revenue expenditure and securing external funding
 - Increasing accessibility through physical improvements and social inclusion particularly for people with disabilities, young people and the elderly
 - Protecting habitats and biodiversity.
- 9.31 The guidance outlines 3 stages to developing a Greenspace Strategy:
 - Stage 1 Preliminary Activities includes the importance of robust consultation, reviewing core documents and policies from national to local level

- Stage 2 Information Gathering advocates a robust quality assessment of sites, development of local typologies and the use of digital mapping to establish quantity, quality and accessibility of greenspace. The gathering of evidence is crucial to providing a robust assessment and to enabling informed management decisions
- Stage 3 Strategy Production pulling together the key themes and strands into a clear and concise framework, establishing standard of provision and preparing a final strategy.

Is the Grass Greener? (CABE Space 2004)

- 9.32 Using international examples of both good and bad practice to demonstrate issues common in many local authorities that have been encountered abroad, the guide focuses on maintenance and management practices to provide challenging solutions to common issues, such as:
 - Poor maintenance
 - Hostile environments
 - Lack of a strategic coherent approach to the management of greenspace
 - Poor design
 - Lack of facilities to engage users
- 9.33 CABE Space has produced a wealth of similar publications including 'A Manifesto for Better Public Spaces' (2003) and 'The Value of Public Space (2004)', which promote and advise on the value and benefit that good quality, well managed open space can provide. Key messages from all the documents include:
 - High quality public environment is a vital part of any regeneration strategy and can have a
 positive impact on the value of property
 - Good quality accessible greenspace is important to our mental well being and research shows that well maintained spaces can help reduce stress and encourage more people to become active
 - Open spaces that are well designed, well used and intrinsic to a community can reduce crime or the fear of crime, they benefit young people and encourage children to play freely outdoors - experiencing the natural environment
 - Well designed and well maintained spaces can bring people together and foster social ties
 - Open space brings people closer to the natural environment, biodiversity and wildlife.

The Northern Way's Business Plan (Moving Forward: Northern Way Steering Group June 2005)

9.34 This report echoes the theme of creating sustainable communities, and makes it implicit that a key activity in achieving economic success is to raise the quality of the region's places. The role and importance of green infrastructure in city regions is further highlighted in the Northern Way report 'City Region Green Infrastructure Planning' (produced by Ecotec). More recently a Northern Way report – 'Shaping the North's Cities for Growth: An Agenda for the Next Decade' – again recognised the role of green infrastructure in determining the quality of place.

The Regional Economic Strategy (Leading the Way - One NorthEast (2006)

9.35 This overarching economic review recognised that priority must be given to providing high quality natural, heritage and cultural environments that have the capacity to retain, attract and develop skilled workers, entrepreneurs, graduates and visitors. The Strategy states:

"The region's green spaces are a vital asset, particularly in the context of increasing development pressures. As well as being crucial in maintaining our biodiversity and ecosystems, green spaces have been termed the 'green lungs' of our towns and cities, contributing to improving people's physical and mental health by providing places for informal recreation and 'breathing spaces' to take time out from the stresses of modern life. Our green infrastructure is increasingly recognised as being a key component of sustainable communities. It is critical that the benefits of these public assets are maximised through sound planning and management."

Standards for Accessible Natural Greenspace - ANGSt Natural England

9.36 This document provides a set of benchmarks for the provision of greenspace and its accessibility by local residents and the wider community. Although setting and implementing standards is principally a role for the local authorities in local development frameworks and other strategies, it is widely acknowledged that a Green Infrastructure Strategy would complement such standards and help towards their implementation.

The Countryside in and Around Towns: Natural England (CA207)

9.37 This document supports the concept of green infrastructure through a vision for connecting town and country in the pursuit of sustainable development. It outlines a vision of networks of new and improved parks, woodlands and other green spaces that are linked to urban centres and the wider countryside by footpaths, bridleways and cycle ways. Urban parks, country parks and other green spaces could be joined up to form continuous green corridors between town and country.

Urban Greenspaces Task Force "Greenspaces, Better Places" (2006)

9.38 The report highlights principles and recommendations to support the renaissance of sustainable parks and green spaces, and rekindle the relationship between people and the places in which they live. It recognises that parks and open spaces have the potential to make a significant contribution to urban regeneration by making places more liveable and sustainable whilst also enriching the quality of people's lives.

The Green Flag Award - The National Standard for Parks and Open Spaces

- 9.39 This is a national award scheme (established in 1996) for parks and open space in England, Wales and more recently Scotland. The Civic Trust manages the award on behalf of central government and is backed by Natural England, English Heritage, the Countryside Commission for Wales, the Heritage Lottery and other similar organisations.
- 9.40 The scheme encourages the provision of good quality parks and open spaces that are well managed and sustainable. The award encourages community involvement and stipulates that sites must have a management plan in order to be considered.
- 9.41 The award is increasingly raising expectations as to what public open spaces can offer and gives reassurance to people that the value they place on their local space is not mis-directed.

Regional Spatial Strategy for the North East (2008)

9.42 The Regional Spatial Strategy for the North East of England was issued by the Secretary of State in July 2008. It provides a sustainable long-term vision for the development of the region and provides the regional framework for the determination of planning applications and planning appeals. It also sets the framework for new Local Development Plan policies. As the most up-to-date part of the strategic development plan framework it supersedes advice previously set out in earlier structure plans and Regional Planning Guidance. Accordingly the RSS provides over-arching guidance reflecting the Government's intentions regarding open space and green space, as set out in PPG17 and subsequent strategies. It provides the strategic regional context for local planning authorities to develop Local Development Frameworks. Policies relevant for this study include:

Policy 2: Sustainable Development

- 9.43 Planning proposals and Local Development Frameworks should support sustainable development. Sub-sections of this policy embrace environmental and social objectives.
 - Environmental Objectives include promoting the concept of green infrastructure, with a network of linked multi-functional green spaces in and around the Region's towns and cities.
 - Social Objectives include improving health and well being, and also ensuring good accessibility by walking and cycling as well as by public transport

Policy 8: Protecting and Enhancing the Environment

- 9.44 Strategies, plans, programmes, and planning proposals should seek to maintain and enhance the quality, diversity and local distinctiveness of the environment throughout the North East by (inter alia):
 - Identifying and protecting existing woodland of amenity and nature conservation value, particularly ancient woodlands;
 - Encouraging and supporting the establishment of green infrastructure including strategic wildlife corridors.

Policy 9.6: Environment

9.45 One component of this policy seeks to support the establishment of strategic networks of green infrastructure that link existing and proposed greenspace with green corridors running through urban, suburban and urban fringe areas to the countryside and coast.

Policy 24: Delivering Sustainable Communities

9.46 Proposals should assess the suitability of land for development in relation to the potential contribution to reducing health & social inequality through the provision of accessible health, sports, community & recreational facilities, including suitable provision for play space, in new development.

Policy 31: Landscape Character

9.47 Strategies, plans & proposals should promote integrated initiatives to sustain locally valued landscapes.

Policy 33: Biodiversity

9.48 Strategies, plans & proposals should ensure that the region's ecological resources are protected and enhanced by (inter alia):

- Reversing habitat fragmentation & species isolation in biodiversity target zones
- Developing habitat creation/restoration projects, particularly in priority areas.

Policy 36: Trees, Woodlands and Forests

9.49 Strategies, plans and programmes, and planning proposals should (inter alia) facilitate the expansion of tree cover, particularly in urban centres and the rural urban fringe, to provide accessible leisure, recreation and environmental education opportunities;

Local Planning Policy

Background

- 9.50 Within the past year the administration of the county of Northumberland has undergone transition from a county authority with six district councils to a single unitary authority. The dissolution of the former district councils in 2009 leaves the new unitary authority with a disparate range of policies from the extant local plans of each previous local planning authority. Added to this are the policies within the former County Council's own Structure Plan.
- 9.51 Whilst there is some commonality in the approach to local land use planning there is also a lack of consistency, and some plans are more comprehensive than others. Moreover, only Blyth Valley had progressed the evolution of its own Local Development Framework (LDF) to a stage where development control policies have been through public consultation and the scrutiny / endorsement of an examining Inspector. The County Council, as the new unitary authority, is therefore in the process of bringing forward a comprehensive range of policies through its emerging Core Strategy and LDF.

Northumberland Consolidated Planning Policy Framework (April 2009)

- 9.52 Appendix A reproduces the County Council's 'Northumberland Consolidated Planning Policy Framework'. This includes the saved policies of the former District Local Plans, and the 3 Core Strategies for Alnwick, Blyth Valley and Tynedale. This document will inform the preparation of the new Northumberland LDF and will set out the framework of strategies, policies and proposals against which planning applications will be assessed and determined. It will effectively be a blueprint for transformation of the County, helping to implement the aims and objectives from the Council's Core Strategy.
- 9.53 The Consolidated Planning Policy Framework for Northumberland was adopted by Northumberland County Council on 4 February 2009 and comprises two sections:

Section A - Schedule of Statutory Development Plan Documents

9.54 This schedule includes Policy S5 of the adopted Structure Plan, adopted Local Development Framework documents which form part of the Statutory Development Plan, and local plan policies 'saved' either through regulation or Direction by the Secretary of State. Together with the North East of England Regional Spatial Strategy (RSS) these documents comprise the statutory Development Plan for Northumberland.

Section B - Schedule of Planning Policy Documents which do not form part of the Development Plan

9.55 This schedule is itself comprised of two parts. The first is concerned with those local development documents which are part of the Local Development Framework but do not form part of the statutory Development Plan and includes a number of Supplementary Planning Documents (SPDs).

- 9.56 The second part comprises various planning policy documents which have been prepared by the seven former local planning authorities and which are used to provide guidance and advice in considering and determining planning applications. The documents in Part 2 are not individually identified in the policy framework in the Council's Constitution but are referred to as the 'Schedule of Planning Policy Documents which do not form part of the Development Plan'. The documents contained in Part 2, whilst prepared by predecessor councils, were also adopted by the Northumberland County Council on 4 February 2009.
- 9.57 As a precautionary note the schedule flags up the fact that some policies were adopted some time ago, as a consequence of which it is likely that other material considerations in particular the emergence of new national and regional policy will be afforded considerable weight when determining planning applications. In addition, the Appendix documentation makes it clear that there will be a need from time to time to rely on existing evidence-based documents to assist in the due consideration of assessing development proposals. These include:
 - Housing needs assessments;
 - Retail capacity studies;
 - Open space and recreation assessments;
 - Landscape character assessments;
 - Employment land reviews; and
 - Wind capacity studies
- 9.58 The schedules also include a bibliography of the policy documents, including date of approval by the preparing authorities and an indication of their relevance by geographical coverage and spatial theme coverage.
- 9.59 The information in the Appendix also sets out considerations to be taken into account in relation to "Spatial Theme Definitions".
 - For 'Recreation & Open Space' these may include parks and gardens, provision of new open space, sport and recreational facilities, children's play, strategic open spaces, golf courses, countryside activities, recreational footpaths, cycleways and bridleways.
 - For 'Natural Environment', these may include sites of international and national importance for nature conservation, sites of local or regional nature conservation significance, protection of species, biodiversity and geodiversity sites, wildlife networks, landscape character, areas of high landscape value, best and most versatile agricultural, trees and hedgerows.
- 9.60 Finally, the Consolidated Planning Policy Framework for Northumberland is a 'living' document and the Council has signaled its intention to update the Framework when new planning policy documents are adopted.








10. Playing Pitch Supply Spreadsheet - Directions for Use

10.1. Open the Excel spreadsheet titled 'APPENDIX 4 – Pitch Supply DATA.xls'





- 10.2. There are five tabs at the bottom of the spreadsheet which are labelled as follows:
 - 'North'
 - 'South east'
 - 'West'
 - · 'Community Use Only'
 - 'NCC Pitch Supply'
- 10.3. The first **three** tabs ('north', 'southeast' and 'west') provide detailed information about sports pitch sites with community use by neighbourhood area.
- 10.4. The **fourth** tab ('Community Use Only') lists information on all pitch sites in the County with community use.
- 10.5. The **fifth** tab ('NCC Pitch Supply') provides information about all pitch sites in the County regardless of community use or non-community use.
- 10.6. It is the **fifth** tab which will be of most use in order to find the information required.

- 10.7. On opening the fifth tab the row numbers on the far left of the screen (before column 'A') will be black. These will change to blue once a filter is applied in order that it is simple to check if a filter is on or off.
- 10.8. To filter the list by ward, click on the down arrow in the top cell of column 'G', this column is labelled 'WARD'.
- 10.9. Select the required Ward from the drop-down list. For example if 'Bamburgh' is selected from the list it will filter the data so that only sites in Bamburgh will appear on the screen (in this case there are 4 sites and therefore all other sites are hidden). At this point the numbers at the far left of the screen will be blue, indicating that there is a filter on and some data is hidden.
- 10.10. Column 'S', which is labelled 'COMMUNITY USE', indicates which sites have community use and which do not. The drop-down arrow can be selected and this will filter the information initially by ward and then by community use. More than one column can be filtered at any one time however it is crucial to ensure that the correct filters are on.


Example:

10.11. Select the arrow for the list you wish to filter e.g. Ward - Bamburgh (this leaves 4 sites).





10.12. Select another filter arrow if necessary e.g. 'Y' in the 'COMMUNITY USE' column (leaving 3 sites).



- 10.13. When these filters are applied the spreadsheet shows that in Bamburgh there are 3 pitch sites with community use, these contain 2 senior football pitches and 2 cricket pitches.
 - N.B. Ensure that all filters are off and all number at the far left are black before conducting a new search. Custom filters can also be used, for example to filter all sites containing rugby pitches filter Column P and select custom, then select 'is greater than' 0.
