



In a record-breaking year for the Green Flag Award, as the scheme marks its Silver Jubilee, Silloth Green is one of 2,127 celebrating.

Councillor Mark Orchard, Mayor of Silloth said: "Once again, we are proud to announce that Silloth-on-Solway has been awarded the Green Flag. This is the ninth consecutive year we have achieved this prestigious award and as a council are very proud. Lead by our very own

grounds maintenance team alongside the many volunteers that work tirelessly week in week out, together we have yet again maintained the high standard required to achieve the Green Flag Award.

To do this in a normal year is a great achievement but during the many lockdown months we have endured this is something special indeed.

We have had a huge increase in visitors this summer and this is testament to all and shows that we have made our hometown what it is. Our large manicured open spaces and seasonal floral displays along with our community garden and more to enjoy, really keep Silloth-on-Solway well and truly on the map.








Celebrities Read for Tim!

Local author Tim Stead has released another children's book, that deals with the issues of pier pressure and gang culture.

The new book aptly named Hanging with The KOOL SQUIDS shines a light on the pressure that children may find when approached by other influential naughty children.

As Tim explains: "the story itself takes a light look at the problem of gang pressure and bullying, which I experienced at school... and it wasn't very nice at all. I think most people in their lives have come across bullies or experienced of being bullied. It's a horrible thing and I wanted to show how it effects the people involved and how it also can damage and be hurtful on a lot of levels. I also wanted to highlight racism in the book. Not to go too deep into it because obviously it's a children's story's at the end of the day. But it does hint at it. For example - in the story line Olly the Octopus and Rab the Crab are best of friends, and one day they cross paths with a very naughty gang of Squids. (The KÓOL ŠQÚĬDS). The leader of The KOOL SQUIDS asks Olly the Octopus if he'd like to join their gang as he looks like them with tentacles and big eyes. But Rab the Crab can't because he's different looking with pencil stick eyeballs and a funny spiky shell for a body. And they ridicule him







for this and make fun of him at his expense".

So yes there are important issues covered says Tim but in a way children can relate and also very funny things that happen. Naughty but really good fun. I think we can all relate to that last statement.

So along with the publication of the book Tim called on a few well known TV celebrity friends to see whether they would help him with a reading from the book; ie a selfie video.



Christ Church is 150 Years Young and Is Now Modernised for the 21st Century and Beyond

Christ Church was designed by Cory & Ferguson architects and built with large split grey granite boulders brought as ballast in ships from Newry, Ireland by the North British Railway. The land on which the church was built was given by the Railway Company.

"...the foundation of the church was laid on 6th September 1869, and it was opened on 8th September 1870, and consecrated on 23rd November 1871. The Church is decorated in the 'decorated Gothic' style, and its facing of Irish granite gives a very clean and attractive appearance...."

"...In June 1878, the tower was commenced but only two stories were completed in January 1881. The third storey and spire were added later, the top stone being on the spire on 10th August 1883."

"A single bell from the Loughborough Foundry, dated 1871, was bought by subscription and erected on a frame in the churchyard on 27th June 1872, and was used until a set of bells

was installed in the completed tower in 1883. The peal of eight bells, presented to the Church chiefly by the munificence of Mr Banks of Wigton and friends, upon which the Westminster chimes were struck, were made by James Taylor & Co., Founders Loughborough." The bells were rung for the first time on 6th October 1883." "The clock, a memorial to a

George Moore, was fixed into the tower on 8th August 1884 at a cost of £220, it strikes on the tenor bell. In the belfry was a manual apparatus which enabled one person to play tunes on the bells.

"The total cost of the church, tower, spire, clock, bells and organ was approximately £7,200."

The church committee has been working with the architect Paul Grout to develop Christ Church so that it can better serve the community into the 21st century and beyond.

The plans have created a new kitchen, toilets and a storage area, pews have been removed

to create open areas in the nave and aisle to enable more flexible use of the building as a place of worship and hub where community and social activities can take place. A raised platform now extends the chancel into the nave and the communion table from St Paul's Church



Accidents Caused by 'Failing to Look'

Cumbria's Police and Crime Commissioner, Peter McCall, is warning drivers to drive safely and stay alert on Cumbria's roads after the biggest cause of accidents was revealed to be failing to look properly.

Between August 2020 and July 2021, 24.6% of road accidents in Cumbria were caused by motorists failing to look properly at junctions. Driving carelessly or 'in a hurry' was the second biggest cause at 15.9% and failing to judge another person's speed or path took third place at 13.8%.

Data revealed that between August 2020 and July 2021, 40 people have died as a result of a road accident in Cumbria with a further 314 suffering from serious injuries and 758 experiencing slight injuries.

Over a third of drivers stopped by Police suspected of driving under the influence of drugs tested positive for narcotics, while just over 10% were found over the legal alcohol limit. Men accounted for over 73% of the casualties of road accidents with the highest age group being involved in accidents being 18 years old.

Speaking on these findings, PCC Peter McCall, said: "Many of us assume that most road accidents are a result of speeding, drink or drug driving etc. and although these factors do cause serious accidents, they are not the most common cause. Simply not paying enough attention when joining traffic is the most common so it really is important that we give the road and other drivers our upmost attention when behind the wheel. Forty families have had to face the devastation of losing a loved one in some cases, multiple loved ones - and no family should ever have to deal with that heartbreak.

This is far too high a number and we do need to work together so that no family ever has to receive that type of distressing news. It's appalling that over a third of people tested for drugs tested positive and this is only the number that were caught. I want to make it really clear to anyone who thinks it is okay to take illegal drugs and then drive, such activity is selfish, anti-social and totally unacceptable, it is moreover illegal and I can assure you that the police will continue to pursue and prosecute anyone drives under the influence of either alcohol or drugs. There is never any excuse to place the lives of other road users at risk because of your selfish activity.

I am urging all residents to remember to drive safely, legally and to the conditions of the road as we head in to winter – we all want to get home safe to our families so let's work together to make sure this is the case. Report any dangerous driving to 999 in an emergency or 101 in a nonemergency."

Silloth RNLI Lifeboat Reports

Casualty Stuck in Mud at Bowness

Casualties Rescued from Flooded Road at Silloth Marsh



A casualty stuck in mud up to their knees near Bowness on Solway, was rescued on Tuesday 12th October, by Silloth RNLI lifeboat

The lifeboat was launched at 1:58pm and reached the casualty at approx. 2:20pm, although due to the lack of water it could not get close to him. Two crew got off the lifeboat and made their way through the mud to aid the casualty.

The tide was coming in rapidly and the casualty was very vulnerable.

The rescue helicopter from Prestwick was involved along with Burgh by Sands and Maryport Coastguards and Cumbria Fire and Rescue.

Silloth RNLI lifeboat crew accompanied the casualty back to the boat as it was impossible to get him safely onto the beach. The lifeboat then made its way back to Silloth with the casualty on board, arriving at 3:15pm.

An excellent outcome to a very difficult situation.



Silloth RNLI were called out on 30th October 2021 to a car that had got stuck in the flood water along the Marsh Road, in between Skinburness and Calvo. The BMW had five passengers in it, who were advised to remain in the car until help arrived, as it was impossible to see the edges of the road and the sides of the dyke.

The RNLI took their County Tractor up to the scene along with



the L200, lifeboat crew in dry suits and shore crew.

The lifeboat crew evacuated the BMW by carrying the casualties to the L200 and the tractor was able to then pull the car through the flood towards a recovery vehicle from Egertons which was waiting on the Calvo side of the flood.

Also in attendance were Cumbria Fire and Rescue,

Maryport Coastguard and Paramedics.

The five people, all of whom are here on $\bar{h}oliday\!,$ were all safely taken to dry land by the RNLI, where three of them were picked up and taken to Carlisle to catch a train and two were taken to the beleaguered car to await recovery.

The RNLI tractor was taken back to the lifeboat station, where it was made ready for service again.

At our meeting on 13th October we were pleased to welcome a new member Joanne and a visitor Margaret.

on Cotton at Cummersdale, the Stead McAlpin Story.

This is the fabric printers known by workers as Steads.

The origins of the firm stem back to the 1780's but was not known by the Stead McAlpin name until 1835 when members of the Stead and McAlpin families took over. Although bought in 1965 by the John Lewis Group they and subsequent owners have kept this name because of its high regard across the world.

The original block printing has now been overtaken by computerised methods. The original processes were very laborious with one yard an hour being printed by hand to 1,000 yards an hour by roller. The hand process involved only one colour at a time whereas under modern methods up to 25 colours can be used.

Materials printed by the company have been displayed at the great Exhibitions in the 19th century in Paris and at Crystal Palace. Special designs were made for Queen Victoria's coronation.

The company has used designs by famous designers such as William Morris and Charles Voysey. One design in the 1960's by Pat Albeck was John Lewis's best selling design for 15 years with over 2.5 million metres being printed.

such as Bonfire Night and Christmas. But with candle fires resulting in around 300 casualties each year, Cumbria Fire and Rescue Service is asking people to take extra care with candles this winter - around a third (32 per cent) of all fires started by candles attended by fire and rescue services result in a death or injury. The most important step you can take to keep yourself

and your loved ones safe is to ensure your home has working smoke alarms. To prevent candle fires from starting in your home, you should

make sure your candles are kept away from flammable materials like curtains and ensure candles are put out when you leave the room, even for a moment.

Will Richardson, Group Manager responsible for Community Safety said: "Left unattended, an open flame

scenting your home could leave a trail of devastation. Place your lit candles with extra care, away from curtains, pets and children and always remember to put them out when you leave the room, even for a moment. Working smoke alarms can give you the vital time you need to get out, stay out and call 999. Keep yourself and your loved ones safe by testing your alarm regularly and by practicing your escape routes."

Take Care with Candles!

Please always follow our advice to help keep you and your family

> candles unattended. Put burning candles out when you leave the room, and make completely at night. Place your candles carefully. Make sure they are on a stable

surface, out of the reach of pets and children, and keep them away from flammable objects like curtains, furniture, bedding and books.

Don't move candles once they are lit. Do not burn several candles close together as this might cause the flame to flare.

Burn candles in a well ventilated room, out of drafts, vents or air currents. This will help prevent rapid or uneven burning, soot, and dripping. Always put scented candles in a heat resistant holder. These candles are designed to liquefy when heated to maximise fragrance.







Peter Gilmore Steps Down as Leader

Peter Gilmore said: "After over twenty years, I have had the Honour and have been proud to be a small part of such a great team that is "Silloth First Responders"

It was back in November 2000 when a small group of us had our first open meeting and we agreed to set the team-up.

The team started training in January 2001 with the help of Andy Dalton and Steve Cremin (who helped with the team's training in our early years) and after everyone passed their assessment's, the team went live at the start of February and their very first call out not long after.

In the team's first year on call, they had attended 74 call out's and with the help of the Automatic External Defibrillator (AED) and skills gained we had two very good outcomes for two patients.

I have been the team's Chairman/team coordinator from the start and was to be on call for the first ten years or so. This was alongside some very special people who gave up their time to volunteer and to be on call 24 hours a day 7 days a week or whenever they could help and give cover to the people and visitors to Silloth and the surrounding area

I would like to say a "MASSIVE THANK YOU" to everyone that has played a part in the team from day one to now. Be it large or small you have all played such an important part in the team.

In our second year, the number of calls started to go up and now the team can have anything from one call-out in a few days, to having four or five call outs in an hour. One after the other and can have well over 300 call-outs a year and have attended well over 2,500 since going live.

Since 2001 the team has used



the AED and all the skills gained through the team's training and all of the advanced skills of the excellent Paramedics and the Technicians that we have worked alongside to help thousands of patients and their families

The team has been a very large and important part of my life from when we set the team up to now.

I cannot thank everyone enough that's on-call now or has been oncall, also everyone that's played a part in the team and it's setting up, also thank you to everyone that's raised or donated money to help keep the team running.

Sadly, due to my health. I had to stop responding on call outs around ten years ago and was a proud dad when my son Paul became a First Responder but gutted that I never got to respond on call out with

him, but I'm pleased to say he's still Responding now when he's home and not working away.

I cannot believe it's nearly 21 years since we set the team up and went live. Also, that I have had the honour to be part of such a great team and its members and to be its Team Leader.

My time in the team has been made easier due to the help of my wife Lorna who has just retired from the team after twenty years on call

and has put up with me using our home as the team stores room and my family Iannah for their help

Again thank you to everyone that's been a Responder or part of the committee, you have all played a massive part in such a great team.

I would like to thank Owen Martin for taking over as Team Leader. He's done a great job since the start of Covid in covering and responding to call-outs when possible, and he's made my decision to finish as Team Leader all the easier as I know he will do a great

Thanks to Nicola and Angus for all their help over the last few years as Secretary and Treasurer. Thank you all past and present and all the very best of luck and stay safe to all of the team now and in the future.

Owen Martin said: It's a very sad day for the team as we lose Peter as Team Leader. Without him Silloth wouldn't have any Responders and their 21 years of dedication to the people of Silloth and surrounding areas.

We all have so much to thank him for, over the years he has helped save countless lives and helped so many others. We will now carry on his legacy and continue to support the community.

With a quiet start to autumn at the dock, a chance to look back at some visitors from the busier summer months. August saw the arrival of two ships from Germany. Both had begun their sailing along rivers, one bringing potash from a major port, and the other salt from a minor one. The ships had both been built to the same design and begun life as part of the same fleet.

RMS TWISTEDEN had set off from Hamburg along the busy River Elbe towards the North Sea before heading west along the Channel to the Irish Sea. The ship arrived off Silloth a few minutes before high water and was able to make a direct approach to the dock without waiting for greater depth. It was a well-executed manoeuvre as the ship passed the outer pier towards New Dock. The logo of operator 'Rhenus Maritime Services' was prominent along the hull. The German company has been in business for more than seventy years, and it seemed appropriate for their motto 'Together with Passion' to be painted on the wheelhouse. TWISTEDEN has been a long-serving member of the 'RMS' fleet of eleven.

Our second ship, AMADEUS AMETHIST, started life as a sister ship to TWISTEDEN named LAGONA. Both were built in Romania and fitted out in the Netherlands. With a change of owner and new name, AMETHIST now looks very different in her green livery.

AMETHIST had loaded her cargo at the small Rhineland town of Wessel which serves the Borth Salt Mine, the last active mine on the Lower Rhine. On departure, the ship was faced with an eleven-hour sailing along the twisting river before reaching the sea at the Hook of Holland. Three days later she was making her approach to Silloth after picking up the pilot off Workington. Photos of the evening arrival were a little different from usual with the ship illuminated by the setting sun. The owner of the ship, 'De Bock Maritime', is a company in its infancy specialising in seariver operations. The names of its small fleet all include precious materials such as emerald, sapphire and gold. It was a short stay at Silloth with AMETHIST outbound for Coleraine the following day.



September and October Shipping at the Port of Silloth

Silloth had a poor September, only two vessel calls, our old faithful, Zapadnyy and the Anja with CAN Fert for Origin fertilisers.

The port seems to be very quiet now that we are coming out of lockdowns, isolations and various other restraints placed upon us.

October was a poor month for Silloth when we were expecting a good series of fertiliser vessels and possibly some grain too. We are looking forward to a few vessels in November and with the weather picking up and winds and rain driving hard, we have been experiencing some build-up of sand in the entrance again. This will limit the access to the port for vessels with any decent draft until such time as we can obtain permission from the licensing authorities to remove the sand and allow full access once again. **September** 8th Zapadnyy with a cargo of Molasses from Amsterdam then on to sea for orders.

26th Anja with a cargo of Fertiliser from Vyborg the on to Belfast. October

During the month of October, only one vessel entered the port, The Camm Alert, a small trawler owned by TN Trawlers of Annan. No cargo arrived.

New Cycles at Watchtree



The cycling industry is enjoying a boom in enthusiasm recently as people dusted off their trusty old steeds for something to do during lockdown. At Watchtree, cycling has been high on the agenda since the launch of the Watchtree Wheelers project in 2009. The project has recently secured funding to replace and improve a large selection of their varied cycle fleet.

The Watchtree Wheelers specialise in providing adapted equipment for people with disabilities; their fleet boasts bikes of all imaginable shapes and sizes. Project Leader Matt Wind recognised the need to increase and improve the equipment and used the downtime enforced by Covid 19 to define the project and appeal for charitable grants;

Matt said: "most of our existing fleet have been part of the project since we launched in 2009, some of the bikes were second hand then. The popularity of the project and the uniqueness of our service means that all of those bikes have been really well used. We regularly service and maintain all of our bikes but we were undoubtedly due a refresh!

We started identifying which bikes we would like to replace and looking at new cycle technology which might benefit our riders in 2019, but it wasn't until lockdown 2020 that we really had time to focus on the project and make it happen."

The Watchtree Wheelers have been awarded a total of £33,500 toward the project from Allerdale Sports Fund (£10,000), Reece Foundation (£5,000) and British Cycling (£18,500).

The money will be used to improve the projects range of companion cycles where two riders can pedal side by side, recumbent cycles and hand propelled trikes.

Matt added: "We are really grateful to our funders for the opportunity to make these improvements. The companion cycles are a new addition for us, they are great fun for any rider but are particularly useful for accompanying less able or mobile riders who require assistance or support while they ride. The recumbent cycles will replace our popular fleet of KMX karts, these are trikes with very low centres of gravity making them ideal for any rider with balance or confidence issues. The new hand-cycles are much lighter and more adaptable for different sizes than our current models, these will allow a great range of users to benefit."

The team continue to work on future improvements and are currently hosting the Solway Cycle Challenge to raise funds for an additional wheelchair carrying bike called a Veloplus. The existing Veloplus in their fleet is very popular and demand often outweighs availability.


The Watchtree Wheelers Project is part of Watchtree Nature Reserve, visitors can hire cycles to explore the reserve which features a network of *s*pecially constructed trails weaving through meadows, wetlands and woodlands. The reserve also has a café and visitors centre as well as offering education and wellbeing services.

Ryan Dobson, manager of the reserve added: "Watchtree is a wonderful, unique place for all ages and abilities to enjoy. We pride ourselves on our accessibility and these upgrades to our Wheelers project will allow even more people to enjoy nature by bike! 2020 was a terrible year for many including us, but through focusing on what we can do and not what we can't, we have been able to make some huge improvements which help to secure our future."
