

HEADMASTER'S MESSAGE

I have been hugely impressed with the resilience and creativity of the school community this term as staff and pupils have found new ways to develop their skills despite the coronavirus restrictions. Events have moved on-line with socially distanced Remembrance and Carol Services and Music and Drama performances all filmed, edited and linked to allow talents to be showcased and wider participation. Whilst the videos are pale imitations of the experience of being physically present, they have sustained the sense of community that underpins SGS. Teachers have had to innovate in their lessons, trialling new methods to support and engage their pupils whilst still remaining at a suitable distance or behind a Perspex screen. Sport has continued to flourish.

We have not been able to offer fixtures against other schools but this has driven a fresh focus on mass participation and on skill development, the fruits of which will be seen in the post covid era. Many academic clubs have been offered through Google Meet to allow pupils from different year group bubbles to join in, actually increasing the number of participants. Building work has continued with the fantastic new Sixth Form facility now completed and occupied. A new Pre-Reception building just awaits the finishing touches to the external landscaping scheme. Whilst we all hope for a quick return to normal social interactions and an end to the coronavirus difficulties, the school community has certainly risen to the challenges of 2020.

ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT

Congratulations to our A Level and GCSE pupils on their outstanding academic success. At A Level, 86% of grades were at A* to B and at GCSE over 27% of the grades were at the top mark of 9, with 76% at 9, 8 and 7.

Headmaster Dr Paul Owen said:

"I am delighted by the success of our GCSE and A Level candidates. Their hard work over many years has enabled them to move on confidently to the next stage of their lives with excellent examination grades as well as a wide range of interests. I am so proud of the resilience and adaptability that our students have shown through this unprecedented year, qualities that will stand them in good stead for their future studies."

For the A Level students, their success takes them on to the next exciting stage in their education with courses at prestigious universities across the country, including Cambridge, UCL, St Andrews, Bristol, Durham, Nottingham and Manchester. A Level study in Stockport Grammar's brand new Sixth Form building is the next step for the GCSE students.

Jamie Carson and Eve Gibbons were among the students celebrating their A Level success, with both now studying at Cambridge University.

Jamie was delighted with his 4 A*s in English Literature, French, German and Mathematics and is studying Languages. Model United Nations and Debating Competitions were amongst the activities Jamie enjoyed at SGS. Eve is studying Veterinary Science following her 2 A*s in Chemistry and Mathematics, A in Biology and A* in her EPQ.

Over 10% of the year group have gone on to take Medical degrees, including Head Girl Kate Roberts and Deputy Head Girl Phoebe Christodoulou -Kate is studying Medicine at Bristol and Phoebe is at Nottingham studying Veterinary Science.

At GCSE, Isabel Marshall was very pleased with straight 9s across all her ten subjects. A Levels in Maths, Physics, Psychology and Geography in the SGS Sixth Form are next for keen climber Isabel who also plans to take on the challenge of the Duke of Edinburgh Gold award.

Joseph Farrelly who achieved seven 9s, three 8s and a 7 in his eleven GCSEs said "so many teachers have inspired me at SGS, it's been great". Joseph is involved with lots of SGS sport - athletics, basketball, table tennis, swimming, climbing and football. He is now studying A Levels in English Literature, History, Maths and Economics in the SGS Sixth Form.

FABULOUSLY FESTIVE CONCERT

Pupils and Old Stopfordians worked hard to produce a Virtual Christmas Celebration to mark the traditional Stockport Grammar School Carol Service, which is usually held at St. George's Church each year.

The virtual celebration brought together carols performed by Chamber Choir, Chorus and Junior Chamber Choir as well as the story of the birth of Jesus, read by current and former Head Girls and Head Boys, Old Stopfordian President Graham Earles, former Headmasters Mr Wright and Mr Chicken, and current Headmaster Dr Owen. The Service was directed by School Chaplain, Reverend Leaver, and Director of Music, Mr Dow.

Audiences enjoyed traditional carols including Once in Royal David's City, Good King Wenceslas, O Little Town of Bethlehem and Come All Ye Faithful, alongside beautiful choral compositions including Gaudete, The Angel Gabriel, Torches and Lullay My Liking.

A total of 31 readers participated in the celebration, the artwork featured was designed by Third Year pupil Beatrice Downing and teacher Dr T Kampelmann.

CREST AWARD EXTENDS KNOWLEDGE

Each year, pupils from the Fourth and Fifth Year at Stockport Grammar School have the opportunity to take part in the Silver CREST Award. CREST is a nationally recognised scheme for student-led project work in the STEM subjects (science, technology, engineering and maths).

Last year, 25 pupils split into three groups achieved the award. One of the groups investigated the topic of pain relievers and the organic chemistry behind them, including its functional groups, and carried out chemical tests for them.

Guided by their teachers and using SGS's state of the art chemistry labs, the pupils formulated a sample of synthesised aspirin and tested it using recrystallisation. They then analysed the product and calculated its purity by doing a titration experiment.

Group member Yicheng Xia said: "Throughout the project we evaluated our experiments, to see how we could improve them to obtain more accurate

results. I found many of the practicals fascinating because we could use equipment and techniques that we don't normally do in class.

"I'm now studying A Level
Chemistry at SGS's Sixth Form.
I believe the CREST project has
contributed to my learning of
Chemistry at A Level and will
help me beyond the classroom.
I found the project really
inspiring; it is a fantastic
opportunity to explore an area
of a subject that is beyond
the syllabus and learn some
useful knowledge and skills."

SGS Chemistry teacher Jess
Berry said: "The pupils worked
extremely hard both individually
and as a team throughout their
project. We guided them through
areas of the chemistry and
facilitated the practical work
but everything else was down
to them. Their final project
was very detailed and they
should be very proud of what
they achieved."

RESPECTS PAID TO FALLEN HEROES

Stockport Grammar School marked this year's Remembrance with virtual services shared across the Pre-Reception, Junior and Senior Schools.

The Senior School service was led by Senior School Headmaster Dr Paul Owen, with Upper Sixth Form pupils present for their final service in school.

Readings were given by Upper Sixth Form pupils Rebeeah-Nuur Mohammed, Henry Davies and Holly Buckley.

The Last Post was played by Patrick Owen, while the wreath was laid by Head Boy, Cam Wylie, and Head Girl, Grace Shropshire, during the two-minute silence. Due to coronavirus restrictions, the Act of Remembrance was filmed and shared virtually with pupils across the school in their classrooms, as well as with Old Stopfordians who would normally be present for the service.

Old Stopfordians who were unable to attend the service were asked to share their school-time memories with the school.

For the service for Old Stopfordians, a selection of memories was read by Cam Wylie, Grace Shropshire, Deputy Head Boy, Panashe Munaiwa and Deputy Head Girl, Lydia Johnson.

Mozart's Eine kleine Nachtmusik (1st movement – Allegro) was played by the school's String Quartet, and Fifth Year pupil, Ella Moran, sang Handel's Lascia ch'io pianga accompanied by Director of Music, Mr Dow, on piano. In the Junior School, the Head Boy and Head Girl created a short video about Remembrance Day that was shown to pupils before they went outside.

When they were outside, the pupils – many of whom were wearing their personally designed poppies – lined up in year group bubbles as they listened to Senior School musician Emily Edwards play The Last Post. The pupils impeccably observed the two-minute silence.

WALKING ADVENTURE AWAITS AWARD WINNER

Upper Sixth student Matthew Howling will head to south-west England next summer after winning this year's Albert Johnston Travel Award.

Matthew impressed the six-strong judging panel with his confident and well-researched 'Walking the Cornish Coast Path' proposal and he will now put his plan, which is to walk the approximate 300 miles from Morwenstow to Plymouth over three weeks, into action.

The Sixth Former has previously completed long distance walks including the Pennine Way (270 miles) and he is part of the Duke of Edinburgh Award scheme at SGS.

Matthew said: "I was really happy when I found out that I had won. I felt fairly relaxed when I was doing my presentation – I had done a lot of research.

"As well as visiting museums and theatres, I would also like to explore the small village churches along the way as I would like to plan a choir tour to Cornwall in the future."

The judging panel this year included Old Stopfordians Hayley Shepherd (OS 2007), Oliver Hopwood (OS 2003), Bursar Chris Watson (OS 1973), Archivist Stuart Helm (OS 1964), Governor Chris Muscutt and Psychology Teacher Mrs Larkin, who is the organiser of the Award. Hayley and Oliver are both former winners of the prize.

The morning was spent drawing the industrial architecture around Castlefield Basin before they moved on to Spinningfields, Chinatown and the Northern Quarter in the afternoon.



IMPRESSIVE IT SKILLS DEMONSTRATED

Hats off to Year Five pupils who have been developing flowcharts in order to control technology using simulation software.

The boys and girls began by talking about light sequences on school crossing patrols, zebra crossings and traffic lights.

To create the flowcharts, the pupils had to choose the correct symbols and place them in a specific order to ensure they worked correctly.

After mastering this, the children moved on to controlling physical objects using a FlowGo interface connected to their computer - where they programmed lights on a clown, a light on a light house using a sensor and a car with a very noisy horn.



WONDERFUL **CHILDREN IN NEED CELEBRATIONS**

Stockport Grammar Junior School supported Children in Need by dressing up in non-uniform, taking part in a range of Pudsey themed activities and enjoying the stunning scenery on our doorstep.

The focus this year was children's mental well-being with a theme of 'The Great Outdoors'.

In the run up to the day, each year group was set their own unique wellbeing activities via Google Classroom or

Pupils were encouraged to spend time outdoors and take part in an activity this included walking, making art from woodland materials, raking up leaves and reading outdoors.

In classes, Year Two pupils worked on iPads in their ICT lessons to create a colourful picture of Pudsey Bear at a disco. After discussing what augmented reality was, they used an AR app to bring Pudsey to life and were astounded when they saw a spinning disco ball with shooting stars and their Pudsey Bear dancing and spinning on his head to music.

On the day itself, the school was awash with colour as pupils from Pre-Reception right through to Year Six dressed up as something, or someone, following the outdoors theme. Outfits included zookeepers, policemen, rock climbers, pirates, weather presenters, snowboarders, racing drivers and adventurers.



TASTY SCIENCE EXPLORATION

As part of their work on senses in Science, Year One pupils had a blast making rice crispy cakes.

The children suggested ways of melting the chocolate and decided the best way would be to use the heat from hot water. When mixing the ingredients together, the children thought of words to describe the smell, appearance, sound, feel and taste of the mixture before it set.

Once it had cooled, the children thoroughly enjoyed eating their cupcake and describing it using all of their senses.

Alston said: "It tastes like hot chocolate."

Zeena described the appearance as "liquid with crumbs" when they were mixing the ingredients together.

Ada added: "It was really crunchy, like when I eat popping candy."



FANTASTIC FITNESS CHALLENGE COMPLETED

A huge well done to Year Five pupil Sophia S and her Year Three brother Ethan and to Year Five Anabelle W and her Year Two sister Lola who took part in My Virtual Mission & The Conqueror Event Series.

The fitness challenge involved a collective effort of the group to cover the equivalent 1,083 mile journey from Land's End to John O'Groats.

The pupils, along with their respective parents, covered the distance by walking to school, jogging, doing sports and cycling, between August 22 and October 2.

SPORTS SKILLS CONTINUE TO GROW

Although there are currently no sporting fixtures for Junior School pupils, all of the children have been working hard to improve their skills and fitness.

In Games, pupils continue to make good progress working with their coaches and have been enjoying House competitions in football, rugby, hockey and netball.

In PE lessons this half term, pupils covered health and fitness and learnt why it is important to lead a healthy active lifestyle.
