

Police investigating more burglaries

Thieves take safe, \$1,200 from Jimmy John's, smash window, ransack office at Starbucks

Hinsdale police are working to determine whether two early morning burglaries Tuesday are connected to incidents reported last week.

A safe containing \$1,200 was stolen from Jimmy John's, 777 N. York Road, in Gateway Square at 4 a.m. Tuesday, Hinsdale Police Chief Brian King told The Hinsdalean. Suspects used a landscaping brick to break the window.

Shortly after, a chair was used to shatter the window at Starbucks, 500 E. Ogden Ave. The office was ransacked but nothing was taken.

"We're currently investigating if there is a connection between these and burglaries that have occurred along the Burlington tracks in Hinsdale and towns just west of us," King said. "We have leads on all four cases that we're actively pursuing."

Last week suspects broke a window at Wild Ginger, 44 S. Washington St., and entered Hinsdale Barber Shop, 20 W. Hinsdale Ave., at just after 5 a.m. July 6. Nothing was taken from either business.

A video canvass showed the offenders had tried the back door of Kramer Foods before crossing the tracks and heading to the barber shop.

In an unrelated incident, Monday, a clerk at J McLaughlin reported credit cards had been taken from her purse while two women were in the store.

"There was an attempt to use the credit cards afterward at the Oak Brook shopping center," King said.

Similar incidents are happening in many suburban towns, he noted.

"There is an increase in regional crime," he said. "Hinsdale is not immune to that. In the same regard, we still have low activity in town in terms of robberies and burglaries."

Police have made progress on the two armed robberies that have occurred in town since the beginning of the year — one of a postal carrier in town and one at the Verizon store.

"One has been cleared by an arrest," he said, referring to the June 16 incident at Verizon. "The second, we've been able to seize the vehicle used in the robbery, recovered the property that has been taken and we're preparing a case against the two known offenders."

The mailbox skeleton key taken from the postal worker has been recovered, he added.

He encouraged merchants or shoppers who see something suspicious to call 911.

"Sometimes there's an active surveillance or suspicious walk-through before a business gets hit, although not in these four cases," he said. "Make sure the alarm system and your video system are operating appropriately."

Police have instituted extra patrols in the business area in the overnight hours.

"We have some degree of confidence we are going to identify and arrest the individuals responsible for this current spree," he said.

And while crime is on the rise in the region, he said his department's efforts are making a difference in the village. He pointed to a drop in vehicle burglaries in 2021 to 11, compared to an average of 43 the three previous years.

"This a low crime community," he said. "It is not a no crime community."

Camper turns counselor for TCH offering

Hinsdale Central junior enjoys leading younger students in four-week Volunteer Camp

Just a few short years ago, Alexandra Knoch of Hinsdale was a camper at The Community House's summer volunteer camp. Now a junior at Hinsdale Central High School, Knoch returned this summer as a camp counselor.

Volunteer camp is a chance for kids entering sixth through ninth grades to learn about volunteering and the organizations in their community that rely on the help of volunteers.

"It's different as a high schooler looking back," Knoch said, and yet, it's also very much the same. During her four weeks as a counselor, Knoch has visited some of the same places she went as a camper. But rather than removing brush at Oldfield Oaks or cleaning up the goat barn at Hanson Center, Knoch is there to supervise and encourage this year's campers.

The Community House offers four four-day sessions of volunteer camp, all of which are supervised by Knoch, recreation and athletics supervisor Kelci Bednar, and intern Kenton Guerig.

Each session runs from Monday to Thursday and includes a visit to

Willowbrook Corner, Hanson Center, and two other nearby destinations in need of a few helping hands. Knoch said each day begins with the campers' arrival at The Community House at about 9 a.m. Knoch leads the campers in games and ice breakers to help them get acquainted in the half hour before they depart to the day's destination.

At Willowbrook Corner, where children in first through eighth grades are cared for during the summer, campers participate in whatever is planned for the day. Sometimes they play games or accompany the children on walks, Bednar said.

The work at Hanson Center, which is home to many animals, varies depending on what needs to be done.

"We clean toys, clean saddles," Knoch said.

Some campers use their camp hours to fulfill requirements for service hours, but Volunteer Camp also teaches campers about the needs and resources of their community, Knoch said, and how they can help. Most visits include a tour and information about the organization and its work in the community, followed by about two hours of hands-on work.

Campers return to The Community House at noon, leaving them and Knoch with an afternoon to spend however they please.

"That's one of my favorite things about it," said Knoch, who enjoys the balance between work and relaxation that her summer job offers.

Since attending camp herself, Knoch said she has come to realize the importance of giving her time. She's now a member of the Habitat for Humanity organization at Hinsdale Central High School, as well as Family Career and Consumer Leaders of America, which teaches kids skills such as cooking, baking and sewing. The group also prepared food for a homeless shelter.

Knoch said Willowbrook Corner is a favorite of nearly every camper, but she remembers Mayslake in Oak

Brook as one her best camp experiences. She pulled weeds outside and sorted through donated books in the historic building.

Even as a counselor, Volunteer Camp held some new experiences for Knoch, who had never visited Harvester Place assisted living in Burr Ridge before this summer's camp.

Bednar said learning is a big part of the job. She said she sees the summer position as a chance to learn leadership skills that can follow the summer counselor into school and beyond. She said she tries to give the summer counselor as much responsibility as possible, not to make her own job easier, but to prepare him or her for whatever their next job might be.

Bednar said a main purpose of Volunteer Camp is to teach young people that they can have fun while doing something to help their community. Knoch said she learned that lesson as a camper and is learning it all over again as a counselor.

MEETING ROUNDUP

Hinsdale Village Board

Among other action at Tuesday's meeting, trustees:

• reviewed plans for Vine Street Station, the 12-unit lifestyle housing development proposed for 125 S. Vine St. and the subject of a May 26 public hearing before the plan commission, which unanimously approved of the plan with some changes. Trustees said they want the building to be age restricted rather than age targeted. The plan will be up for a vote at the Aug. 16 village board meeting. If approved, developer Holladay Properties Services Midwest Inc. will have to present a detailed plan which will be subject to a plan commission public hearing and village board approval.

• approved a revised intergovernmental agreement with the Illinois State Toll Authority for fire protection and emergency services for about three miles of the Tri-State. The village now will receive \$500 for responding to a call and will bill the patient if he or she is taken to the hospital. Previously the Tollway paid the village \$300 for a call in cases where the patient was not billed.

• approved an outdoor dining application for Corner Bakery, 42 E. Hinsdale Ave., to have three tables on Hinsdale Avenue

• listened as Village President Tom Cauley read a proclamation designating July as Parks and Recreation Month in the village

Number of new COVID cases in Hinsdale rises

The DuPage County Health Department reported 42 new cases of COVID-19 in Hinsdale over the past week, bringing the total number of cases in the DuPage County portion of Hinsdale to 3,895, compared to 3,853 last week. The Cook County Health Department no longer reports on cases specific to Hinsdale.

The number of cases per 100,000 population in DuPage was 40.5 on July 12, compared to 31.3 on July 6. The community level remains high.

Signs lead the way to Hinsdale history

Commission hopes to elevate profile of Robbins Park Historic District with gateway signs

As Hinsdale officials structure ways to keep vintage residences from being torn down, they also want to install signage to draw attention to the village's most heritage-rich neighborhood.

At their July 6 meeting, historic preservation commissioners discussed location preferences for new Robbins Park Historic District gateway signs.

"We are trying to put some general parameters together about the locations and general design ideas so that we can then put out a bid to request some proposals from sign contractors," reported Bethany Salmon, village planner.

The southeast section of the village is on the National Register of Historic Places and features dozens of homes dating back to Hinsdale's early days, brick-paved streets and distinctive streetscapes designed by famed landscape architect Frederick Law Olmsted. To direct people into it, the village is planning to install stand-alone single-post signs at various locations. Commissioners reached consensus that the busy intersection of Chicago and Garfield Avenue, while technically the northwest edge of the district, would not be a good choice.

"There's too much going on," said Commissioner Jim Prisby, who joined colleagues in favoring a location one block east, at Blaine and Chicago. "There's plenty of room in the parkway there, on either corner."

Other slated sign sites include County Line Road and Chicago Avenue, First Street and County Line and Eighth Street at both the County Line and Garfield crossings. Commissioners also want to underscore the entry to Robbins from the west side of First Street but acknowledged sign clutter at First and Garfield made that location less than ideal.

Commissioner Bill Haarlow favored a sign a block east along the parkway near the historic Grace Episcopal Church and its parsonage, the so-called "Hallmark House."

"That (location) would note the importance of those two very old and significant structures," Haarlow said. But Prisby said he still wanted to consider putting the sign close to Garfield, even if the dentist's office there isn't historic.

"To me, it's also an important consideration to have it at that important intersection," he said.

Commissioner Frank Gonzales agreed, noting drivers at the four-way stop are more likely to see it.

"I see it more like gateway — you're entering this historic district, not necessarily that every building you're going to see is historical," he said.

Commissioner Shannon Weinberger noted that the dentist's building reflects the village's colonial revival architectural period in the early 20th century.

Haarlow expressed hope that, as part of the Tri-State Tollway widening project, the Illinois Tollway can install a sign alerting Tri-State drivers to Hinsdale's historic downtown. Motorists currently see a sign guiding them to La Grange's downtown.

Underscoring the redevelopment challenges the village is facing, commissioners earlier in the meeting unanimously approved a demolition application for the 1938 home at 430 E. Seventh St. in the Robbins subdivision for new construction. Prior to the vote, commissioner Alexis Braden expressed some concern that the new home's design did go far enough in reflecting the area's heritage.

"I don't see a ton of architectural elements from these more historic homes that your pointed out (in the application). It still looks very much new," she said.

Commission Chairman John Bohnen also offered a word of caution about the stormwater impact that new builds can have on neighboring properties if drainage is not adequately addressed.

"Water runoff is a very significant concern," he said.

As for the wayfinding signs, Salmon said the village will put them out to bid and expects the eventual sign contractor to provide additional guidance regarding sign placement.

"We're just picking the general locations," she said. "They'll be able to figure out how signs can be oriented to be the best path of travel."

Hinsdale resident tells story of his Army friendship

The sedate suburbs couldn't compare with the daily unpredictability that U.S. Army Reservists and inseparable buddies Bob Allen and Brad Drake had faced on a 10-month deployment to Afghanistan.

Despite their exhausting, unrelenting assignment helping run the Bagram Theater Internment Facility as military police in 2003-04, the two Hinsdale South graduates had grown to love the grind. From going on middle-of-the-night helicopter "ring routes" to collect enemy detainees to a harrowing evacuation of prisoners when the jail caught fire, life was never dull.

"We were really good at what we did," Hinsdale resident Drake said of the experience in his early 20s. "There was a war going on, and that's what I wanted to continue doing."

Allen was particularly enamored with the military, said Drake, who earlier this year published a chronicle of those years of combat and camaraderie titled, "Bob, Afghanistan and Me."

The two knew of each other but had little contact at South due to Allen being a year younger. Drake was already serving when he saw Allen show up to the Arlington Heights Army Reserve Center one day as a civilian. Following a temporary loan to a different camp, Drake returned in the fall of 2002 to discover Allen was now in his unit.

"We became fast friends. We had a lot in common," Drake said, citing their shared taste in music. "We always agreed that Alice in Chains had the best unplugged album ever."

Their company was activated in 2003 at the outset of the Iraq War. But the marching orders defied expectations.

"They ended up sending us to Afghanistan instead."

The jail they oversaw was housed in a 50-year-old former Soviet-era MiG aircraft repair shop next to Bagram Airfield, 10,000 feet up in the Hindu Kush mountains. The cells were primitive and inmates used porta-a-johns.

"Twice a day we would have to haul out the toilets. They called that job 'The Brown Mile,' " Drake quipped.

The number of detainees swelled as the war wore on.

"I lost like 20 or 30 pounds. It was high stress," he said. "I probably averaged three-anda-half, four hours of sleep a night."

They also lost comrades in

battle. Thankfully Drake had someone with whom to share the journey.

"Bob and I just became real, real tight on that deployment. We did everything together."

The pair returned to the States in April of 2004, and Drake still gets choked up recalling their disembarkation at Bangor, Maine.

"There's this gauntlet of VFW and American Legion people, and they're cheering and going nuts and giving us hugs."

But civilian life was a tough adjustment. In March of 2005 Drake got a call from his unit: high-quality MPs were needed back in Bagram. He and Allen accepted the call.

That would be the last deployment for Drake. Allen stayed in, and regular contact between the two became more difficult over the next decade. On July 1, 2018, a mutual friend phoned Drake to break the news that Allen had died of a heart attack. He was 36.

"I drove up to the bar where we used to hang out, sat at the same spot and played the whole Alice in Chains album," Drake said. "I wanted Bob Allen's story to be told. He was a soldier's soldier."

Mom shares story of loss hoping to reach others

Sarah was about four months pregnant when she received news no mother ever wants to hear.

She was told her baby had triploidy and would not survive.

"She had an underdeveloped brain, underdeveloped kidneys, underdeveloped heart. I don't think she had a spleen. It was pretty heart-wrenching when I found that out," said Sarah, a Hinsdale resident who asked that I not use her last name.

She had two choices: Wait for her baby to die and deliver her stillborn or terminate the pregnancy. Based on the advice of her doctor, Sarah and her husband chose the latter.

'They said probably the safest thing for me as a mom was to have a D&E," she said. "I was just kind of wrecked about it because I did not want to do that. At the same time, I couldn't get out of bed and I was so sad and I couldn't wait for the inevitable to happen. I didn't think I could deliver her. I didn't have that in me."

So on Dec. 5, the pregnancy was

terminated through a procedure known as dilation and evacuation. "We had an abortion. I don't know how else to say it. With my Catholic upbringing, I can't even believe I'm saying these words," Sarah said.

The loss was even

more painful because she and her husband had Pamela Lannom

been trying for years to have a third child. Their daughters were 4 and 5 at the time.

'They're both healthy and wonderful and I'm so blessed," she said. "My husband I are both one of three and we really wanted three. We just tried really hard and I had a few miscarriages, but they were all pretty early, before 10 weeks, before 12 weeks, so we didn't tell anyone."

There had been minor issues early in the pregnancy, Sarah said. Her hormone levels were low and the baby was small at the 16-week ultrasound. Another ultrasound 2 1/2 weeks later confirmed something was wrong with the baby's growth and organs, and results of an amniocentesis clearly indicated the baby had complete triploidy. Triploidy is a rare chro-

mosomal abnormality that affects 1 to 3 percent of pregnancies. It is the presence of an additional set of chromosomes in the cell for a total

of 69 rather than the normal 46. Triploidy usually causes a miscarriage early in pregnancy. Infants born with triploidy usually die within days or months of birth.

"We wanted her. We created her. We named her," Sarah said. "She is in our bedroom. It is not a decision I took lightly. I don't feel any guilt about it. I feel complete sadness that she is not here.'

Sarah said she and her husband don't know why this pregnancy didn't result in a miscarriage.

"I still don't understand why she hung around," Sarah said of her daughter, whom she named Hope.

"I don't know what lesson it was to teach me

"I have not been able to find a lesson in this," she to me later in our conversation. "I have not been able to find a why. When I emailed you, I thought maybe it's to share my story.'

Sarah described the days after her procedure as lonely and said she was hesitant to talk about what happened.

She'd like for women to be able to find support and compassion during challenging times like this, and she hopes sharing her story will help.

So many conversations about difficult topics like this are based on statistics and generalizations and assumptions. I hope sharing Sarah's story serves as a reminder that people's lives and their circumstances are unique. I hope it encourages all of us to listen to more of these stories.


Enthusiast, an absolutely tireless Seeker of Light.





IT TAKES A VILLAGE

CHRIS BRUTON, VILLAGE CLERK

At the time Chris Bruton graduated from college, women were encouraged to follow one of two career paths — nursing or teaching. She planned to be an English teacher, only to discover the job market was flooded with women with the same ambition.

"Life takes a different turn. You never know," said Bruton.

A career in municipal government never occurred to her at the time, she said.

"I had no idea. None. However, had I had a sense of it when I went away to school, that this was actually a thing you could learn about, that would have opened my eyes a lot sooner," she said.

Her first contact with municipal government was working in the parks and recreation department in Riverside, where she was employed part-time while her son and daughter were young. She later became village clerk in Riverside and, when she was ready to work full time, came to work in the water billing department in Hinsdale. When the village clerk position became vacant, then-village manager Dave Cook offered Bruton the job.

"You maintain all the official records of the village, all the ordi-

nances and resolutions, the laws of the land, if you will," she said. "I push a lot of paper. The way I think of myself is the chief paper pusher." Bruton also is responsible for

compiling digital board packets, which can exceed 200 pages, and for recording minutes at the village board and zoning board of appeals meetings.

"A lot of people hate attending those kinds of meetings," she said. "I actually like it because I can only be an observer. You really get to see who people are and what's really going on with them and what their concerns are. I enjoy it.

"I don't enjoy it after 9 o'clock," she added with a laugh.

But her favorite part of the job is dealing with residents. And the occasional nonresident.

"You'll get a call from an older person, resident — sometimes not — and they'll want to know where there is a good restaurant," she said. "They'll want to know something anybody could Google, but they can't, so you get to talk to them and that's kind of nice. They're cute."

Complaint calls aren't that common, she said, crediting her colleagues in village hall.

"We have a very qualified, friend-

ly, capable staff," she said.

Bruton admitted to having some trepidation when she first came to work here.

"When I first came from Riverside and I lived there, I knew lots of people. When I came here, I was like, well, I won't know anybody. It will be different," she said.

It was — but only for a while. "After all these years, I've met so many nice residents and know them by name and by sight," she said. "There's a lot of nice people here."

She also appreciates the people she works with and expressed particular admiration for those who serve on the village board.

"You have to admire the time they spend of their own free will without financial renumeration," she said. "It's a gift to the community."

She also appreciates the opportunity to see how government operates locally.

"It's a perspective you don't get if you just look at the state and federal level," she said. "At the municipal level, these are your neighbors. It's actually personal and effective — as opposed to not."



Niche sport has presence in Hinsdale

Game invented to help train divers, British commandos now played across the globe

When sisters Ariel and Vania Leung head to the pool, it's rarely for a leisurely soak. As members of the Underwater Hockey Club of Chicago, a trip to the pool means they are prepared for a workout.

"It's a very niche sport," said Ariel, a native of Hinsdale who recently settled in La Grange. She learned of the sport from her sister and brotherin-law, Hinsdale resident Brian Lin. Lin is a former member of the University of Illinois club and a current member of the Chicago team.

Underwater hockey has thousands of enthusiasts making up teams and clubs across the country and is played throughout the world. Known as octopush in areas like the United Kingdom, underwater hockey employs two teams that maneuver a puck across the bottom of a swimming pool toward goals on opposite ends. Wearing fins, masks and snorkels, players use short sticks to help their team move the puck into their respective goals.

The team known as the Chicago Shorgis practices twice a week and competes across the country. Travel is optional, with some members choosing to stay close to home.

Vania said she and her husband have met people from all over the country and the world through their participation in underwater hockey. The sport has also introduced them to a variety of people closer to home.

Members of the Hinsdale club include men and women ages 21 to 83 from throughout the Chicago area.

underwater hockey about four years ago. Looking back, she said her first practice was rough. But she's since gained skill, strength and perhaps most importantly, breath control. Underwater hockey requires players to hold their breath while under water.

While previous swimming or snorkeling experience can help, it's not a prerequisite for the sport, Ariel said.

"By the third practice, that's when you start to get the hang of it," she said.

Ariel said the water is an equalizer when it comes to weight and size, allowing people of different ages, sizes and fitness levels to play together. While she's not the fastest or the strongest member of the team, Ariel said her strength is her experience, both in the water and in the sport.

A former member of the Hinsdale Swim Club, Ariel ran track and field at Hinsdale Central High School and now runs marathons. She said underwater hockey has helped to increase her stamina. "I've definitely noticed when I work out, it's not as hard as it used to be," Ariel

said. Vania said she had never heard of underwater hockey before meeting her husband.

"It's a very strategic sport," she said, and one that requires players to work together. As a swimmer and triathlete, Vania said she enjoys the teamwork underwater hockey requires.

Practices take place twice a week and are typically held either at Hinsdale's outdoor pool or at the Water's Edge Aquatic Center in Bensenville. All practices are open to anyone who wants to give the sport a try.
