NEW TEAM GETS STRAIGHT TO WORK

The Union's streamlined new National Executive has wasted no time in getting down to business and starting to tackle the many problems facing our clubs.

The new NEC has 15 members instead of the previous 26 and its first decision has been to dispense with separate subcommittees so all its members will be familiar with all areas of Union business.

"The National Executive now have collective responsibility," says National President George Dawson." Everyone in the Executive will know about everything that the Union is doing,"

Mr Dawson, who has been elected for a second two-year term, is at 46 one of the youngest Presidents in the Union's history and is determined to be a modernising President.

"We will be starting by meeting each of the companies that are Union National Accounts so that we all know what these companies have to offer and why we recommend them to our clubs.

"It's also vital that we have a voice in Parliament and we will be continuing to campaign along with the Save our Pubs and Clubs campaign for a separate smoking room, and for controls on supermarkets.

"This Coalition Government are fond of talking about the Big Society and the importance of communities. Our clubs are often the most vital cog in the heart of a community and instead of swamping us with red tape and letting the supermarkets destroy our clubs with their cheap drink, Government should be giving us all the help we can get.

"The smaller Executive still has a fantastic amount of experience, especially as most of us are still secretaries and committee members in our own clubs." Each member of the Executive will be adding to that experience by having spells working with the All-Party Parliamentary Group and with CORCA, the group covering

ANOTHER FINE MESS - 30 YEARS OF LAUGHING GRAVY

A Yorkshire club is celebrating 30 years as the base for the Laughing Gravy tent of the Sons of the Desert – or if you prefer, the local branch of the international Laurel and Hardy Fan Club.

Once a month the 25 members meet at Tingley WMC near Wakefield and watch a couple of Laurel and Hardy films. Tradition dictates they then don fezzes, as worn by their heroes in the film Sons of the Desert, and their head, the Grand Sheikh, raises a toast to the comic duo.

The club even have their own crest with the motto suggested by Stan Laurel "two minds without a single thought", translated into Latin as Duae tabulae rasae in quibus nihil scriptum est (literally: "two blank slates on which nothing has been written.")

Over the years members have been to Hollywood where a couple of them met the producer Hal Roach before his death, and to Stan Laurel's birthplace, Ulverston, near Barrow-in-Furness, to celebrate the centenary of his birth in 1990.

On another trip to Lancashire one of the members laughed so hard at one of the films that his false teeth flew out in the cinema, sparking a scene that could have come out of a Laurel and Hardy film as the entire audience tried to find them.

All the 150 branches — or tents — around the world are named after films and Laughing Gravy, which was being shot when he was born, is founder Graham McKenna's favourite film. Graham has just stepped down at 80 after 30 years as the Grand Sheikh and is being succeeded by David Bulmer who says

that he represents a new generation of lovers of Laurel and Hardy.

"The films aren't shown on TV as often as they used to be so attracting younger members isn't as easy," says David, who is also a member of Rothwell WMC. "We're all paid-up members of the club but we're grateful for the way the social club look after us. They always put on an excellent pie-and-pea supper when we have a meeting."

Among their members is Stan Laurel's first cousin, Nancy Wardell, who lives in Dewsbury and the group are also in touch with Stan's daughter Lois Laurel-Hawes. Graham's collection of movie memorabilia includes a letter from Charlie Chaplin but his most treasured possession is a typewritten letter, signed by Stan Laurel himself just before his death in 1964.

ANOTHER FIRST AS CAROL IS FIRST WOMAN

The recent Presidential and National Executive elections have seen nine members leave the National Executive and one new member - its first woman, Carol Goddard.

Carol (pictured right after the result was announced) was elected to represent Warwickshire and South East Midlands. She was already the first female Branch Secretary after being elected by South East Midlands Branch in 2010. In 2007 Carol, who is 64, also became the first woman to stand for an Executive post when she stood as National Vice-President and surprised many people, including herself, by gaining 41 per cent of the vote.

Before that she worked with the Union's long serving National President Derek Dormer for 30 years and was the Union's Parliamentary Liaison Officer. "I've been involved with carrying out Union policy for many years," she said. "But this will be the first time I have been involved in policy decision making.

"We have a large amount of women club members and there are around 300 women club secretaries among our 2,000 clubs so it is only right to have a woman's voice on the Executive. Women have been very active in clubs for many years but in the past were often confined to selling bingo tickets."

Originally from London, clubs are in Carol's blood as she was in her pram when her parents first took her to the Eagle Club in Shoeburyness, Essex.

She started working for the CIU in the 1970s as a shorthand typist at the Branch Office. When the All-Party Parliamentary Group for



Non-Profitmaking Clubs was formed she worked initially as minutes secretary and then as the liaison officer between MPs and CORCA (The Committee of Registered Club Associations), while continuing to work in the Branch office.

In 2007 she was elected Branch Vice-President and in 2010 became the first woman to be elected as Branch Secretary.

The Union would like to thank the nine members of the National Executive, who have left after proving unsuccessful in the December elections.

Derbyshire Branch JOHN Secretary **BATCHELOR** was elected to the National Executive in 2001 and was Chairman of the Standing Orders Committee at the annual conference in Blackpool. He has been Secretary of



Alvaston & Crewton Social Club since 1980 and a member of the Branch Executive for 14 years.

DAN CAPEWELL was elected to the National Executive in October 2002 a year after taking over as North Staffordshire Branch Secretary. He has been on the Committee at Pittshill Victory Club for 25 years, the last 19 as

Secretary, and has been on the Branch Executive since 1987.



PHILIP LARKIN had renresented West Yorkshire Branch on the National Executive for two years. A keen advocate of

Union schools, he has been a member of East Ward Labour Club in Bradford for more than 20 years and has

served on the Branch Executive for 18 years.

MARK BREWER was elected to the National Executive in 1995 and became the Western Counties Branch Secretary the following year. He is also Treasurer of Chippenham West End Club, where he has been on the




Committee for nearly 40 years, serving previously as Secretary and President.

GARDENING

Jobs for February

If you have a greenhouse, now is the time to give it a good spring clean to clear out over-wintering pests. To combat bacterial and fungal diseases use one of the natural garden disinfectants sold at garden centres. These can be safely used on all greenhouse surfaces including pots, staging and tools.

Growing potatoes is more popular than ever and to get your seed potatoes off to a speedy start put them in seed or egg trays to allow them to "chit" before planting. This allows strong shoots - ideally dark green or purple and about one inch long - to develop on the tubers and is strongly recommended for first and second "earlies" and salad varieties. Place the potatoes in trays with the "rose" end where most of the "eyes" are uppermost. Place in a cool, light, frost-free place.

February is also a good time to sow tomato, pepper, leek and onion seeds. If possible use a heated propagator. To sow peppers and tomatoes indoors, fill a seed tray with moist compost. Sow the seeds evenly over the surface and lightly cover with a bit more compost. Peppers should be kept in a warm place, 18-25 deg C (64-77F), and tomatoes need 18-20 deg C (64-68F). Keep the seed trays moist. Other vegetables that can be sown indoors now include leeks, onions, lettuce

and early cabbage and cauliflower.

Other February jobs are: Putting new edges on the lawn: depending on the weather, cutting the lawn with the lawnmower at a high setting; tidying up herbaceous perennials and ordering bedding plant plugs such as geraniums, begonias and Busy Lizzie. You should be able to buy 40 plugs for around a tenner. Gazania are particularly good value and are cheaper than buying seed.

Bridge view savings of £18,000 a year

Wadsley Bridge Working Men's Club in Sheffield are astounded at the savings they are going to make as a direct result of meeting Envtec Services at last year's CIU Beer & Trades Exhibition in Blackpool.

Last year their gas and electricity costs were nearly £30,000 a year. But with a new energy-efficient heating system and new cellar cooling they hope to save £18,000 on energy bills this year – and they are now holding fitness classes in the once-cold concert room – bringing in extra revenue.

Club Secretary Phil Cooper (pictured right) said: "When I became Club Secretary in 2007 overheads were way too high compared to income, which had dropped significantly since the smoking ban came into force. We had to make redundancies, finish leases where possible and basically made cuts everywhere.

"We were looking at our energy usage but we had boilers under five years old and were reluctant to mothball them. But then last year we had a leak in our old cast-iron pipes and knew we had to do something.

"We had met Baly Shiel from Envtec at the Blackpool Beer & Trades Exhibition so we asked her to visit us. She came and explained everything regarding electric v gas; she invited me and the committee to another



club where Envtec had already installed a brand new energy-efficient system and we were all very impressed with it. After submission to the Carbon Trust we were offered a loan and received funding for the main part of the club, so we agreed to have the system installed.

"Since the new heating and cellar coolers have been installed we are now very happy to use the concert room during the week for

small groups as the cost of heating the room is minimal. It used to take at least an hour before use but now it only takes seven minutes to heat the room and we have attracted such activities as sequence dancing, a slimming club, and bokwa, the latest fitness dance craze, in a room that was shut midweek."

Govt to abandon

The Government have listened to the views of clubs and their suppliers and have decided to exempt income from VAT on gaming machines.

After a review they have confirmed that from February 2013 as well as exempting income from gaming machines from VAT, they intend to replace Amusement Machine Licence Duty (AMLD) with Machine Games Duty (MGD). It will apply to any machine where the player inserts a stake into a machine in the hope of winning a cash prize.

Chris Haley, Managing Director of the Union's recommended club machine suppliers Dransfields, said change was inevitable given the amount of VAT that the Treasury was losing through legal challenges. "The Rank/Linneweber fiscal neutrality challenges alone amount to tens of millions of pounds in potential lost VAT revenue - although the Revenue continue to dispute the cases." he said.

"I am broadly in favour of the new tax especially as the Government listened to our concerns surrounding B3A and agreed to exempt the product from MGD. This demonstrates that the Treasury understands the unique position that notfor-profit clubs, owned by their members,

hold within the communities in which they are based and that the tax-free B3A machine provides a much-needed source of revenue for struggling clubs.


"I also think that the removal of the disproportionate licence duty charge of £2,185 per annum on jackpot B4 machines will assist clubs as this enormous cost is incurred regardless of how well the machine to which it relates actually performs.

"Under MGD, the tax will be progressive and will be cashbox-based - in other words the tax payable will be directly related to machine performance with lower-earning machines paying less; of course, the concern now is the rate at which MGD will be set and we won't know the rate until it is announced in the Budget in March."

Provided the tax is not punitive there should be an opportunity for clubs to increase the number of gaming machines in their premises as there will be no upfront licence fee to pay and they can choose to income share with their supplier rather than pay a fixed rental. The club has the chance to receive income without any cost (other than electricity and carpet!) The main issue will be potential nonrecoverability of input tax relating to VATexempt supplies and this will require close

scrutiny. For the wider gaming machine industry there are some major concerns with the new tax. For example at the moment all machines other than Category D (such as are found in seaside





Treasury to think again on MGD bandings.

"WE TOLD YOU FIRST

Last year I challenged a top executive to a public debate on whether Her Majesty's Revenue & Customs (HMRC) are fit for purpose.

This was based on the billions of pounds in tax they let big business off by the shake of a hand and the inefficient and monstrous way they treat our clubs and their members. Needless to say HMRC did not rise to the challenge.

Lo and behold, months later the papers state that the same question is being asked in the halls of Westminster. Then on Radio 4 Nick Clegg tries to put the blame for these losses on hordes of highly qualified accountants acting for big industry.

That simply does not wash. If all the reports from many sources are true the giveaway of up to £25billion was done over the heads of HMRC staff - who were diligently chasing the money due - by the HMRC supremo Dave Hartnett who spoke on the record with disregard for his staff, small business and individual taxpayers. He was equally vociferous on the need to support big business. Mr Hartnett has agreed to retire in the summer but his legacy lives on.

The Deputy PM wants to look at the law and the blatant disregard for it shown by the Government's own top brass rather than blame professional accountants whose function is to legally minimise the tax bills of their employers or clients there is nothing wrong with that.

I reiterate my challenge for a face-to-face public debate in the sure knowledge that, unless Mr Hartnett's regime has been disbanded, it will once again be totally ignored.

HOW TO USE CCTV IN DISCIPLINARY HEARINGS

Clubs can use closed circuit TV (CCTV) images as part of a disciplinary procedure - provided

they follow the right procedures. Follow and document the procedure below and you will ensure that your club complies with the Data Protection Act 1998 (DPA), the CCTV Code of Practice and other relevant legislation and demonstrate that the club has taken all steps possible to protect the personal information of anyone captured by CCTV footage.

The approved procedure is as follows:

- 1. Acknowledge that the club does have CCTV in place, with appropriate signage. State that the function of the CCTV is to prevent crime and protect public safety. Remind the staff that the use of CCTV in disciplinary proceedings is referred to in their employment contract and the employee handbook.
- 2. State that the CCTV allegedly caught an employee committing a disciplinary offence (which may also be deemed to be a criminal act) in the course of their employment. The CCTV footage may also show images of other staff not involved in the offence/crime.
- 3. State that the club wishes to use the CCTV images in connection with the disciplinary proceedings against the staff members. The CCTV footage may also be made available to the police.
- 4. State that the club recognises that the CCTV images contain personal information and therefore to comply with the DPA they cannot be disclosed or released. However, section 35(2), DPA exempts the CCTV images from the non-disclosure provisions of the DPA where they are used for the purposes of, or in connection with, legal proceedings.
- 5. State that in the opinion of the club the disciplinary proceedings constitute legal proceedings in the light of the alleged criminal activity, and therefore the proposed use of the images in connection with the disciplinary proceedings is exempt from the non-disclosure provisions of the DPA.
- 6. State that the staff member will be given a chance to view the CCTV images and to fully explain and/or challenge their content.
- 7. Where relevant, state that the club has investigated the possibility of obscuring the images of other staff members, and whether or not

this was possible. The obscuring of the identity of persons not relevant to the alleged misconduct should be attempted before the CCTV footage is shown to the staff member.

8. State that circulation of the images will be restricted to those attending the disciplinary meeting and those attending are covered by confidentiality provisions.

Clubs should ensure that they document the above process within their meeting notes before release of the CCTV images, otherwise they will breach the DPA.

Equality Act 2010

The 2010 Equality Act continues to cause difficulties in clubs so here's a reminder of what it does and doesn't say.

The Act allows clubs to restrict membership to certain characteristics but not others. It is acceptable to have a men-only club but if, like 99 per cent of our clubs, women are allowed to be members or guests they must be treated equally. It is no longer legal in these clubs to have men-only bars, cheaper but restricted membership for women or not to allow women on the Committee.

The Act sets out a list of what are called "protected characteristics" that cannot be used as means of discrimination. These are:

- age
- disability
- gender reassignment
- marriage and civil partnership
- pregnancy and maternity
- race
- religion or belief (or lack of belief)
- sex
- sexual orientation

It is still legal to offer different rates on grounds of age though there are proposals to stop this as well. Family membership is permitted provided it does not refer to husband and wife, or otherwise assume people are heterosexual.

If they have not done so already clubs need to:

- update their rules to remove all reference to gender;
- · make procedures clear and open to eligible members regardless of gender:

LAW QUIZ ANSWERS

1 ANSWER (b)

The Data Protection Act 1998 (DPA) can apply to computerised and manual records, photographs, CCTV footage, mainframes, laptops, organisers, palm pilots, audio and video systems, telephone logging/surveillance systems, microfiche and microfilm.

The definition of data falling within the DPA is complex. It includes information:

- which is personal data relating to a living individual, and
- includes any expression of opinion about the individual and/or
- includes an indication of the intentions of the data controller or any other person in respect of the individual.

The individual must be identified from the data (or from the data and other information

2. ANSWER a)

The website of the Information Commissioner is the most comprehensive source for guidance as to good practice.

The Information Commissioner has published codes of practice, good practice notes, technical guidance notes and other guidance. The guidance evolves and develops over time to reflect new case law and the practical experience gained as the Data Protection Act 1998 is applied.

3. ANSWER b)

Yes; the staff member can legally be provided with, or view, a copy of the relevant CCTV images. Where relevant, state that the club has investigated the possibility of obscuring the images of other staff members, and whether or not this was possible. The obscuring of the identity of persons not relevant to the alleged

misconduct should be attempted prior to the CCTV footage being shown to the staff member concerned. State that the circulation of the images will be restricted to those attending the disciplinary hearing and those covered by confidentiality provisions.

4. ANSWER a)

Yes; If the CCTV evidence caught someone committing a disciplinary offence during the course of their employment that could be deemed to be a criminal offence. The club should recognise that the CCTV images contain personal information and therefore to comply with the DPA they cannot be disclosed or released. However, section 35(2) of the DPA exempts the CCTV images from the non-disclosure provisions of the DPA where they are used for the purposes of, or in connection with, criminal proceedings.

- make subscription rates for members the same for men and women. It is still legal to offer different rates based on age but there are proposals to stop this.
- review all activities they organise on a male or female basis and ensure they can defend themselves and not contravene the Act.

It remains illegal to have a club that restricts membership because of the colour of people's skin though you can restrict by ethnic origin. The example given by the Home Office is: "The constitution of the Black Women's Culture Club states that membership is open to any woman whose national origins are in Africa or the Caribbean. This would be permitted because, even though colour is referred to in the name, it restricts membership based on ethnic origin rather than colour."

Home Office guidelines also state that "private clubs can treat men and women differently in any sport, game or activity of a competitive nature where the physical strength, stamina or physique of the average woman puts her at a disadvantage compared with the average man, or vice versa." You would think the Government would have better things to think about but this effectively gives the green light for clubs to have women's darts teams but not women's dominoes teams.

JOHN ALLEN


A former printer who wrote a popular weekly column about the Coventry CIU Games League has died at the age of 84.

Shaun and Duncan got a £30,000 loan and a £20,000 overdraft and gradually started to turn things around.
