WELCOME

Worthing Community Chest is a local charity whose aim is to support projects and activities in Worthing that enable social and economic well being.

We do this through our grants project, awarding up to £1,500 to community groups and charities in the town. We will consider supporting any group in the area who match our criteria and whose objective is to improve the community.

Worthing Community Chest is run by volunteer trustees who meet every six weeks to develop the charity. The trustee board includes representatives from groups previously awarded funds.

Worthing Community Chest works in partnership with Worthing Borough Council. They put funds into the chest and they also provide our office space. The rest of our funds comes from fundraising and the rental money from a property that we own.

REVIEW OF THE YEAR

Heather Foster October 2015

2014-2015 has been a year of big changes for Worthing Community Partnership trading as Worthing Community Chest. The board has a number of new faces and has said goodbye to others. The office has also had changes with a retirement and new staff joining us.

With Catherine Attwood developing her role of Charity Co-ordinator, a huge step was taken to raise the profile of the charity. The first task was to improve the digital presence with the construction and launch of a brand new, responsive website. It contains information about Worthing Community Chest, how to apply for a grant and also information about the groups we have supported in the past. This is an area that will continue to develop in the future. Worthing Community Chest now has a social media presence for the first time, with over 700 followers on Twitter. This can be used to engage

with the community, making more people aware about who Worthing Community Chest is and how we help local groups. This engagement can already be seen with the increase in grant applications.

At the end of 2014 Jenni Pilgram announced her retirement from Worthing Community Chest. This was sad news to everyone at the charity, as Jenni had been a huge part of WCC for over ten years and many Worthing groups were regularly in contact with her. Our new Grants Administrator is Inga Lielgalve, who is the main contact for grant applications and queries.

With three trustees leaving (Jenny Brooker, Alastair Vickers and now Jane Claxton), Worthing Community Partnership has lost a wealth of experience and with four new trustees joining the board, it became apparent that Governance was an area that would benefit from an update.

I am therefore grateful to Jenny Brooker who commenced work on the Governance Review including improving its internal strength through undertaking a board skills audit. A working party was then formed which has resulted in a brand new welcome pack for trustees, governance training and updating of policy documents.

Another working party has been set up to review the guidance to applicants on the completion of bids for grants and the training of the Appraisal Panel; so far a new training pack for the Appraisal Panel members including a Role Description and a Code of Conduct has been produced. In 2016 the working party will review the application form and how the grants awarded have contributed to the community.

In March Val Challenger stepped down as Vice Chair, pleasingly she has remained on the Board, and Heather Foster was appointed to succeed her. We unfortunately said goodbye to Alastair Vickers, our Treasurer, in early 2015 and have appointed a new Treasurer, Roger Wolstencroft.

With Inga developing in her role as Grants Administrator, the Trustees felt it very important to improve visibility of the charity. Inga has liaised with groups we had funded to make sure that our support was as visible as possible. In the summer of 2015 posters featuring our logo were mentioned in programmes for events and there have been articles in the local press. This has all added to the awareness and positive exposure of Worthing Community Chest.

Volunteers are a huge part of the charity, the Appraisal Panel are volunteers who give up their time to review the applications and now we also have volunteers

in the office to support the team. This helps to make the charity as efficient as possible.

Before this year's AGM, Jane Claxton, the Worthing Community Chest chair, announced that she would be stepping down and leaving the charity in September. This was sad news to anyone who has been part of the board, she has been a prime mover of the charity and always had amazing vision for it. Jane leaves us after fourteen years, most of which she was Chair. Worthing Community Chest will never forget the part she has played in its history.

I would also like to thank the other members of the Board who have given up their time freely to support the charity. The charity is grateful for the valuable contribution from Worthing Borough Council through its Small Grants scheme

which, in line with the conditions of the grant, we match fund. This assists Worthing Community Chest in its role of enabling and supporting community regeneration within Worthing.

In 2016 Worthing Community Chest will be fifteen years old. We think that this is something worth celebrating. We will be encouraging all the groups that we have supported since 2001 to do their bit and either fundraise or promote the charity. We feel it is the perfect opportunity to celebrate everything that we have achieved since 2001; to look to the future and help even more groups.


Our ambition is to increase our grant awards, to do that we need to increase funds coming into the charity.

JANE CLAXTON'S REVIEW OF FOURTEEN YEARS WITH THE WORTHING COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIP

In the fourteen years I have been involved with Worthing Community Partnership I have seen it develop from a vehicle for delivering £850k of single regeneration budget (SRB) 6 programme monies into Worthing, which supported a myriad of projects from the CAB, Guildcare, Worthing Churches and many others self-sustaining а Charity in its own right which distributes monies into Worthing through the Community Chest.

The Partnership originally comprised all of those organisations who received money under the SRB programme, but has since developed into a grass roots organisation whose members consist of supporters of the Charity and those who have received Community Chest grants.

It has always been an integral part of the wider community being a key player in the West Sussex Strategic Partnership, the Local Strategic Partnership (LSP) helping it develop in Waves Ahead and playing a pivotal role in setting up the Sussex Credit Union.

Working in partnership with the NHS at the time, now the Western Sussex Hospital Trust, the Charity used SRB monies to purchase a building in Rowlands Road - Renaissance House - which it lets to Community and voluntary groups at below market rents to enable them to have a town centre presence. It continues to work closely with the Western Sussex Hospital Trust who use the ground floor of the building as a surgery and clinic.

Another key partner is Worthing Borough Council who provide office accommodation for the WCP in return for us donating the rental equivalent monies into the Community Chest. This enables the WCP to have an office as part of the community hub in the Town hall working alongside the CAB and VAWorthing. WBC also provide monies which we match fund for distribution to grass roots organisations through the Community Chest and we are grateful for their continued support and will be working with them to see if we can assist in the delivery of other targeted projects.

In 2014 we said goodbye to Jenni Pilgram, our Community Chest coordinator, who after many years of excellent work decided to move to the Isle of Wight taking our thanks and good wishes with her.

Over the past year, I and other members of the Board have strengthened and restructured the WCC so that we can grow and further develop our unique model for supporting local organisations. We have undergone a Governance review, finalised our rebranding, recruited Board members, as well as staff to the office (including local volunteers) and are currently in the process of reviewing our Community Chest application process.

I am extremely proud to have been part of delivering over £250k of grants into Worthing. Supporting all manner of diverse organisations from Choirs, to dance troops and even the local scuba club!

After a fascinating, interesting and rewarding fourteen years, I too am now leaving the Worthing Community Partnership. I leave it in very safe hands and in extremely good shape to face the challenges of the coming years. I would like to thank all of those who have worked with me in helping put in place, what I believe, is a dynamic and unique mechanism for supporting the grass roots organisations in Worthing in all that they do.



WORTHING COMMUNITY CHEST GRANTS PROCESS

We know projects and proposals have differing needs, some of them complex, but we are here for those group too and we encourage them to apply for a grant.

If a group needs funds for an event or project, or they need money to pay for equipment or to help with venue hire Worthing Community Chest is here for them.

Worthing Community Chest help throughout the application process, we want the Appraisal Panel to see the best application. From experience we know that applications can be tricky, especially the first time. The Grants Administrator will let groups know if we think there needs to be more information in the application.

Our Appraisal Panel meet four times a year to applications assess and award funds. The panel is comprised of volunteer representatives who have previously been awarded grants. We think they are the best people to assess applications as they have experienced the process first hand and they come from a wide range of backgrounds.

At Worthing Community Chest we use a reimbursement system to pay out the grants. We make the payment when we receive receipts for the items purchased.

Once a group has been awarded a grant they must wait two years until they can apply again. This allows us to support other projects and events in the area.

GOVERNANCE REVIEW 2015

During the year the Board has undertaken a review of the governance arrangements of the charity. It was felt to be an appropriate time for such a review for two main reasons. Firstly, the charity's plans to increase our support to local organisations through enhanced fundraising, including the appointment to the new post of Charity Co-ordinator, and secondly, the changes in Board membership with a number of new Trustees joining over the past year.

The review was led by a small task group and was undertaken using the Charity Commission's recommended guidance, "Good Governance: a Code for the Voluntary and Community sector". The guidance sets out six key principles that represent best practice.

The review did not reveal any major areas of concern, although it did highlight some aspects where there was scope for improvement. The resulting actions to address those aspects have included:

- A training session for all Trustees to ensure a shared understanding of their roles and responsibilities.
- A skills audit to identify any areas where the Board needed additional experience in key areas. The results of the skills audit help to inform the appointment of new Trustees.
- A review of the role and training of Appraisal Panel members to maintain the highest standards of integrity and decision making.
- Implementation of marketing and communication plans, supported by a relevant budgeting process.

Governance matters will continue to be reviewed in the context of national debates on the fundraising activities of charities and any other issues that may arise.

The Board is assured that current governance arrangements meet or exceed the guidance and are adequate to provide a firm foundation for the future ambitions of the charity.
