Day 1

Tuesday 9th April

We all connected at Heraklion airport, loaded our vehicles and made for our base at Plakias. Flowering Oleanders *Nerium oleander* and the invasive False Acacia *Robinia pseudoacacia* lined the coast road, and after a while we stopped to stretch our legs at a pull-in and did a little botanising, finding plants such as the Eastern Strawberry Tree *Arbutus andrachne*, Branched Broomrape *Orobancha ramosa*, Cretan Cistus *Cistus incanus* subsp. *creticus*, Jerusalem Sage *Phlomis fruticosa*, the Mastic Tree *Pistacia lentiscus*, *Hypericum empetrifolium* and *Satureja montana*. The national road was closed as we neared Rethymnon and so we diverted through the congested town which slowed us down a little. As we cleared the town we noted the showy thistle *Galactites tomentosa* was flowering in profusion at the side of the road together with both varieties of the Crown Daisy *Glebionis coronaria*. It was a pleasant 65 degrees and though windy, also sunny as we drove, and it bode well for some nice weather in the coming week.

Turning south, we stopped for a welcome coffee break at a café overlooking a scenic valley near Armeni, and listened to the melodious song of a Nightingale, hidden in some dense scrub before moving on and eventually arriving at the Kourtaliotiko Gorge. Here we stopped to view Griffon Vultures, majestically soaring over the gorge, before moving to our final destination at the comfortable Plakias Bay Hotel, arriving at around 6.00 p.m. We dined at around 7.30 p.m., discussed the next days itinerary and retired, wondering what delights the following days would produce.

Day 2

Wednesday 10th April

Some of us chose a pre-breakfast walk along the cliff path to view the plants. The hillside was yellow with abundant bushes of Jerusalem Sage *Phlomis fruticosa*, contrasting with the red and bronze of the Tree Spurge *Euphorbia dendroides*.

The endemic Cretan Vipers Grass *Scorzonera cretica* and the Shrubby Mullein *Verbascum arcturus* were growing from small cracks in the vertical rock walls, however our botanising was cut short, as breakfast called. After collecting provisions for our picnic at the supermarket in Plakias, we headed east making for the Turkish Bridge, our first stop. Here we admired some bushes of Storax *Styrax officinalis* and found some fine examples of the Broomrape *Orobanche alba*.

Arriving at the monastery at Moni Preveli, we were entertained by Alpine Swifts swooping and screaming low over and around our vehicles, presumably on their way to higher altitudes. Here some chose to investigate the monastery while others looked for birds in the nearby valley. Corn Buntings jangled and Crested Larks fluted among the Yellow Asphodels *Asphodeline lutea* before we made for our next destination. We made a short stop at the Kourtalio Gorge, where today the light was more favourable, allowing us good views of a Lammergeier, soaring past, and also a pair of Bonelli's Eagles which were probably nesting in a high crevice. Red-billed Choughs and Crag Martins swooped and danced in the updrafts and majestic Peregrines patrolled the upper ridges of this spectacular gorge.

After a quick visit to the tourist town of Spili, to see the famous fountains and have coffee, we made for the nearby hill of Gious Kambos, better known as Spili Hill, to search for orchids. Magnificent stands of pink Naked Man Orchid *Orchis italica* were evident, together with Bory's Orchid *Orchis boryi*. Here also, were Sitia Orchid *Orchis sitiaca* and many Bee Orchids, including Bumblebee *Ophrys bombyliflora* and Heldreich's *Ophrys heldreichii*: the Bee Orchids bemused us with their botanical complexities. The Red Tulip *Tulipa doerfleri* was flowering in the surrounding fields, the bulbs safely below plough level, while Common Asphodel *Asphodelus aestivus* stood sentinel upon the slopes. Sated, we returned to Plakias, after a full and intriguing day to a relaxing beer and a satisfying meal, before the checklist and bed.

Day 3

Thursday 11th April

We awoke to another fine day and after breakfast made for Phaestos to the east of the island. As we drove, we enjoyed identifying some of the more obvious flowers such as the magnificent Giant Fennel *Ferula communis* and the showy purple Gladioli *Gladiolus italicus*, eventually stopping at a roadside bank emblazoned with the white Turban Buttercup *Ranunculus asiaticus*, which were scattered like abandoned confetti across the hillside. The more subtle Cretan Bee Orchid *Ophrys cretica*, Pink Butterfly Orchid *Orchis papilionacea* and Fan Lipped Orchid *Orchis collina* nestled among the display. Driving through a sea of polytunnels, we stopped to watch an amazing flock of Grey and Squacco Herons fly over, presumably migrating to some distant fishing area.

Upon arriving at Phaestos, those who wished to visited the ruins while the picnic was being prepared. Stonechats, Barn Swallows, Hoopoes and Alpine Swifts interrupted our lunch as we looked across the fertile valley full of endless rows of olive trees, framed against a backdrop of the snow-capped Mount Ida. Our return was via the beautiful Amari Valley, with Walnut *Juglans regia* and Oriental Plane *Platanus orientalis* breaking into leaf at the road edges. We finally emerged near to yesterdays Spili Hill and discovered yet another hillside abloom with orchids. These were so absorbing, we got back rather late for dinner...

Day 4

Friday 12th April

The weather was set fair today for our trek down the Imbros Gorge and we drove west stopping at the Kotsifou Gorge to look at plants of the Cretan Arum *Arum creticum* and some fine clumps of the Tree Flax *Linum arboreum* clinging to the gorge walls. We continued along winding roads through ancient villages, with vistas of hills and valleys of astounding landscape at every turn, stopping to view a Black-eared Wheatear singing on top of a rock. The journey took us via Rhodoniko, and eventually brought us to Frangocastello. Just before the castle we stopped at a favoured bird migration spot where low phrygana sheltered larks and small passerines. Here Northern Wheatears and Crested Larks competed for our attention, while a lone ringtail Montague's Harrier quartered the fields nearby in search of prey.

At the castle a small fresh water pool on the beach produced a Ringed Plover and Common Sandpiper, however a promised cheese and honey pancake awaited our arrival at the tavern at the head of the Imbros Gorge and so we made our way up the exhilarating windy road to the top and fortified ourselves in readiness for the trek to the bottom. Those who opted not to traverse the gorge drove to the bottom instead, birding and botanising along the way, and at a scenic pull-in on the way down found a singing Ruppell's Warbler, probably on migration as it eventually flew off into the distance.

The trekkers were excited to find a rare Nettle Tree Butterfly on the rare Nettle Tree *Celtis tournfortii*, together with other chasmophytes before arriving at a taverna, the agreed meeting place, where we downed a light late lunch, while the leaders retrieved the vehicle from the top. Returning along the coastal road, we made a stop or two for photos and to see the Hairy Lupin *Lupinus micranthus*. On arriving back at the hotel, we relaxed with a beverage beneath the trained White Mulberries *Morus alba* on the hotel patio before assembling for our well earned dinner, and tired but satisfied made for bed after our days exertions.

Day 5

Saturday 13th April

The vehicles were all packed and loaded by the end of breakfast, ready for our move to Chania but before leaving we opted for a walk. Although we had partly explored the track along to the tunnels, this morning we were to fully explore this historically and botanically rich site. Ascending via the sand dunes at the base we found the diminutive *Muscari spreitzenboferi* and tracks of a Beech Marten, the many corpses of which we were seeing on the roads. Upon reaching the track we noted the *italiae* race of House Sparrow were building nests in the holes in the sheer rock face, and growing at the base were plants of the Cretan Birthwort *Aristolochia cretica* and a non-flowering Mandrake *Mandragora autumnalis*. Crag Martins were building their mud nests at the end of the tunnels and as we returned the sun broke over the spectacular cliff, and so, with some regret, we said our goodbyes and left the beautiful Plakias Bay.

Passing through Kotsifou Gorge, we drove north, arriving at the Armeni cemetery, where tombs had been excavated out of the rock by the Minoans. A brief exploration was made while the picnic was being prepared, after which we explored the site in depth. Tongue Orchids *Serapias* spp. were in profusion here and more Bee Orchids *Ophrys* spp. were discovered, growing under the Valonian Oak *Quercus macrolepis* canopy. Chaffinch dominated the bird scene and took full advantage of our crumbs before we set out for our next stop at Georgeopolis.

This coastal town is blessed with a natural spring, draining from the mountains which surfaces in a large pond. The fresh water is normally a magnet for migrant birds but the clear calm weather which we were experiencing was a signal for birds to move north and only the resident Cetti's Warbler and a few water birds were present. As it was quiet, we chose to visit the nearby town centre for a coffee break before making for the Souda Bay War Cemetery. The immaculately kept graves reminded us of the futility of war, and we left in a reflective mood for our final destination, the Halepa Hotel at Chania. Here we were made welcome and soon settled in to our comfortable rooms, before walking to a local tavern and sharing a selection of traditional food.

Day 6

Sunday 14th April

Breakfasted, we were keen to get to Agia Lake, a well known spot on Crete for birds. As we disembarked from the vehicles, we spotted Alpine Swifts swooping low over the water and scooping a drink before moving on to their elevated breeding grounds. The resident Little Crakes showed well and two Booted Eagles passed over as we scanned the lake for waders. Both Wood and Common Sandpipers competed with two smart Black-winged Stilts for our attention, as a lone Marsh Harrier patrolled the distant Reeds. Sedge Warblers chattered here, as we listened to the hurried jingle of a Serin singing in the top of a conifer.

Our main destination today was the Omalos Plateau, and with the weather set fair, we set off to negotiate the many S bends and eventually the road widening construction works. We stopped at Lakki for a photo and were pleased we had chosen a Sunday for this expedition, as the construction teams had the day off and so we experienced no hold ups or traffic. After a welcome coffee stop at Omalos, where there was a stuffed Lammergeier and Golden Eagle to wonder at, we reached the plateau proper and were pleased to see the pink Rock Tulip *Tulipa saxatilis (bakeri)*, in full bloom and complimented by the mainly blue Crown Anemone *Anemone coronaria*. The Cretan Barberry *Berberis cretica* was coming into bloom here and many of the accompanying trees were cropped and shaped by nibbling sheep and goats. Woodlark sang their musical songs from treetops and Northern Wheatears vied for territory, whilst Stonechats perched on posts declaring possession of their patch.

After our picnic, we made for the head of the Samaria Gorge and admired the magnificence of the surrounding mountains. *Ambrieta deltoidea* grew on the slopes here and a fine stand of *Orchis pauciflora* warranted a hike up the hillside for a closer look. The car park also had some fine specimens of the endemic elm relative *Zelkova abelicea*, just coming into leaf and Clusius' Paeony *Paeonia clusii* was in bud and about to open outside the café. Our exit from the plateau was made via a clockwise circuit around the perimeter, passing a small freshwater pool designated as a nature reserve. Here we found a flock of Wood Sandpipers feeding around the edge and a passing flock of sheep were attended by Whinchats, a Woodchat Shrike and both Black-eared and Northern Wheatears, who were taking advantage of the disturbed insects. Arriving back at our hotel we quickly refreshed ourselves, before making for the town and our selected eating place for another delicious Cretan meal.

Day 7

Monday 15th April

The characterful town of Chania was our first target this morning and we explored the shops and market and bought provisions for our picnic. Then we headed out to the Akrotiri Peninsula, visiting Agia Triada Monastery and its grounds before moving into the headland for our picnic.

Here Dragon Arums *Dracunculus vulgaris* were in abundance their spathes giving off a rather pungent smell of rotting flesh. A nearby water trough attracted migrant birds, Spotted, Pied and a smart Collared Flycatcher sallied forth from the Carob Trees *Ceratonia siliqua*, and a Nightingale sang from deep within a bush, giving us a glimpse as it passed. A flitting Red-throated Pipit, minus the red throat, gave us some identification difficulties. We discovered that picnics, with food in one hand and binoculars in the other proved quite challenging.

Moving further into the peninsula, we arrived at the Moni Gouverneto. We walked through the gardens, to emerge at an old building where the rare diminutive onion with corkscrew leaves *Allium circinnatum* subsp. *circinnatum* was growing. A path from here led downhill via a long track to the Cave of St. John and onwards to the ruined Katholikou Monastery, where the Cretan Sneezewort *Achillea cretica* and Shrubby Verbascum *Verbascum arcturus* grew profusely on the walls. For our final evening in Crete, we enjoyed another delicious meal in a tavern near the harbour, before catching taxis back to the hotel.

Day 8

Tuesday 16th April

We said our goodbyes at the Halepa and left soon after 9.00 a.m. for the airport. The long drive east along the coast road was accomplished in good time and allowed a short visit to Knossos. The lovely weather we had experienced for our week had now broken leaving us with cloud, strong winds and occasional rain but we were pleased it passed over quite quickly. Arriving at the airport David and Barry said their goodbyes in readiness to receive the next group...
